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OVER 70 CHICAGO BUSINESS SERVICE ORGANIZATIONS WILL RECEIVE FUNDING TO DELIVER NO-COST BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE TO START-UP ENTREPRENEURS AND BUSINESS OWNERS

The hyper-local support is part of the Neighborhood Business Development Centers (NBDC) grant program designed to support and strengthen the small business ecosystem

CHICAGO –Today, the Chicago Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection (BACP) announced the grantees of the BACP Neighborhood Business Development Centers (NBDC) grant program. Participants of the \$3.3 million NBDC program will deliver highly specialized business programs and services that help entrepreneurs start, and business owners grow or sustain their small businesses, as well as assist their program peers to build their respective capacities. The long-standing program provides funding to nonprofit local business service organizations, such as economic development corporations and chambers of commerce, to deliver free and confidential business assistance programs that benefit communities in every corner of the city. The goal of the NBDC program is to strengthen the small business ecosystem while also addressing the racial and ethnic wealth gap in Chicago. The program ensures alignment with the ever-evolving needs of the diverse business community of the city.

"The NBDC grants program is just one example of the many ways the City of Chicago is working to support our small business community as they continue to recover from the aftermath of the pandemic," said Chicago Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot. "Through professional development opportunities, technical training, and ongoing support, this program will help small businesses across Chicago build capacity, grow sustainably, and make our economy that much more resilient."

"Chicago is a city with a strong, engaged business community and this program enhances our efforts to connect with small business needs," said BACP Commissioner Kenneth J. Meyer. "I encourage start-ups and established businesses to tap into their local NBDC. The no-cost programs and services can assist from business idea, launch and expansion."

The NBDC program is designed to drive collaboration and coordination among grantees to reach small business owners and entrepreneurs, especially Black, Latinx, women, immigrant and refugee entrepreneurs. Business assistance programs play a critical role in enabling community wealth building by supporting residents in exercising ownership, acquiring assets, getting access to fair capital, creating inclusive, living wage jobs; and being empowered and equipped to play a critical role in the revitalization of their neighborhood. As such, the NBDC program will align its resources to promote equitable and inclusive growth and recovery across the entire city of Chicago, with a focus on the most underserved and underinvested communities.

This year, BACP awarded 18 new grantees to the program which further reinforced efforts of providing business resources in every corner of Chicago. The new 2023/2024 BACP Neighborhood Business Development Centers (NBDCs) Program delegate agencies include:
