

CHI BIZ STRONG ORDINANCE REDUCES REGULATIONS AND FINANCIAL BURDENS FOR THE TAXICAB INDUSTRY

EFFECTIVE AUGUST 1, 2021:

- 1. <u>Longer Life and Utilization for Taxicab Vehicles:</u> Allow taxicab medallion owners to continue to use existing vehicles for a longer time providing them economic relief by deferring expenses of buying a replacement vehicle. To ensure public safety, taxicab vehicles must continue to pass safety inspections.
 - Fifteen years for wheelchair accessible vehicle (WAV) and fuel-efficient taxicabs (5 years added to previous 10 years maximum)
 - Ten years for gasoline fuel source non-WAV taxicabs (3 years added to previous 7 years maximum)
- 2. <u>Higher odometer mileage for a vehicle being initiated as a taxicab</u>: For taxicab medallion owners buying a used vehicle, allow purchase of a lower cost vehicle with higher odometer mileage. To ensure public safety, vehicle must pass safety inspections before operating as a taxicab.
 - New maximum odometer mileage for 1st time onboard taxicab vehicle is 150,000 miles (previous maximum was 125,000 miles)
- 3. <u>Flexibility for smaller taxicab owners:</u> Those who own 4 or less taxicab medallion licenses will have the option to be affiliated or independent. Independent taxicab medallion license holders must continue to comply with insurance (auto-liability and worker's compensation) requirements; electronic fare payment processing; and Pace TAP participation.
- 4. <u>Defer WAV taxicab mandate:</u> Those who own 5 or more medallions will now have an extra five years to place 1 wheelchair accessible vehicle taxicab into service delaying expenditures required for wheelchair accessible vehicle conversion costs. Those who own 5 or more medallions will have more time to plan and expense placing a wheelchair accessible vehicle into taxicab fleet.
- 5. <u>Opens up opportunity for more individuals to be taxicab drivers</u>: Maintain public safety by applying an equity framework distinguishing conviction of non-violent offenses from violent crimes. Refer to the ChiBizStrong amendments to Chapter 9-104 of the Municipal Code of Chicago for details.
