

MEDICAL CENTER REHAB PLANNED

Chicago Animal Care and Control is committed to alleviating the suffering of the sick and injured Chicago animals that arrive at the shelter. To more effectively help these animals, a major renovation of CACC's medical center in planned for 2019.

The medical renovation will including a critically needed new isolation area, which will help reduce the transmission of infectious disease. In all, about \$1.5 million in upgrades are planned for the the exam, triage, surgery, and recovery rooms, including new lighting, and mechanical and electrical systems.

The improved facility will also allow CACC to partner with the University of Illinois veterinary program. Veterinary medical students will assist with caring for the shelter animals while getting essential experience in shelter medicine.

In addition to renovations, CACC's non-profit partner, Friends of Chicago Animal Care and Control is planning to procure new medical equipment for the renovated medical facility, including an autoclave, new surgical tables, and diagnostic equipment.

CACC also receives crucial medical program support from organizations across the city. CACC received a donation of heartworm treatment to treat dogs at the shelter from the Chicago Wolves. Prior to this, heartworm-positive dogs could not be treated until they were transferred to a rescue partner. CACC is also grateful to PAWS Chicago for assisting with spay/neuter surgeries at CACC, and to 4 Paw Luv, the Anti-Cruelty Society, and Northern Illinois Transport Team for their help getting our animals spayed and neutered in preparation for adoption and rescue.



There I was laying on the sidewalk. I couldn't get up because my leg really hurt! I don't remember when or how it happened. Somehow I had found a way to move a bit and find scraps to eat. I tried to find someone to help me, but most people looked away.

Finally, a nice man said: "What happened big fella?" He took me to this big place with a lot of other dogs and cats. The people there were surprised to see my bones sticking out, but they didn't look away. They sprung into action and gave me a shot. I started to fall asleep, and the pain finally went away. When I woke up, they gave me lots of good stuff to eat and someone even gave me a piece of hot dog that had medicine in it. They think they fooled me, but I knew it was in there.

I waited for my person to come get me, but they never did. I was sad, but the people at the shelter loved me and I loved them. Still, my leg wasn't getting better. I heard them say they wish they had gotten to me sooner. I heard the nice doctor talking about something called amputation? I didn't know what that was, but if it made me feel better I was all for it. After they did my "surgery," I slept a lot.

When I felt better I learned to walk on three legs. Now I'm ready to find a new family who will look past my missing leg, but won't look past me. Together, I hope we can run in the grass, share yummy food, and snuggle every night!
