

# PLAN FOR CONTINUAL IMPROVEMENT



January 2018

















Chicago Animal Care and Control's (CACC) Plan for Continual Improvement will enable CACC to help more of the city's people and pets. CACC developed this plan in consultation with key stakeholders, including aldermen, rescue partners, and animal welfare and community leaders to enhance community services and improve overall performance.

CACC is the city's only municipally run, open-admission animal control and sheltering facility. The Department's mission is to protect public safety and ensure the humane care of animals through sheltering, pet placement, education, and animal law enforcement. CACC must accept all animals that come through its doors: the stray, owner-surrendered, injured, abused, neglected, and even dangerous. In 2017, nearly 15,000 animals entered the shelter, and CACC's animal control officers responded to more than 37,000 service requests.

CACC is committed to being a valuable community resource. Throughout the year, CACC provides a host of services, including:

- Pet wellness checks
- Trapped/injured animal response
- Low-cost microchip and vaccine clinics
- Stray animal response
- Pet adoption events and services
- Lost pet services
- Bite and dangerous dog investigations
- Wildlife in residential quarters response
- Low-cost euthanasia services

The Department is also in communities during the warmer months at service fairs, clinics, and adoption events, distributing information about its services, and those provided by CACC's valued partners.

In the spirit of creating a more humane Chicago, CACC is committed to saving all healthy and treatable animals as resources and capacity for care permit. CACC's live release rate (i.e., the percentage of animals that were transferred, adopted, and returned to owner) has improved every year thanks to the steadfast determination of CACC employees, volunteers, non-profit partners, legislators, and the public. For 2017, CACC's live release rate for cats was 90 percent and 88 percent for dogs. CACC strives to euthanize only those animals that are irremediably suffering or behaviorally untreatable and unsafe, but must balance this goal with its capacity to care for the animals in a humane and healthful way within its space and resource constraints.



## **2017 YEAR IN REVIEW**

Throughout 2017, CACC explored a number of innovative approaches to sheltering, as well as innovative partnerships, all of which have helped to improve performance. Highlights include:

- Friends of Chicago Animal Care and Control donated a digital X-ray machine and many other supplies, including huge rolling bins for clean blankets, enhancing CACC's ability to provide comfort and care to the animals.
- CACC hosted more adoption events than ever before and adopted out 1,551 animals (719 dogs and 832 cats) a 41% increase over 2016.
- CACC continued to refine its cleaning procedures, and implemented a jobs training program through a partnership with the Department of Family Support Services; the shelter now has more cleaning power in all seven dog pavilions than at any other time prior.
- The Department's partnership with the Chicagoland Rescue Intervention Support Program (CRISP) grew from one day a week to three days a week, enabling its partners to help more Chicagoans in need, and to place many family pets into rescue before being impounded at the city shelter.
- CACC's partnership with Safe Humane Chicago expanded, and Safe Humane began conducting more programming (playgroups, manners classes, and in-kennel enrichment) within the shelter for the dogs, significantly increasing CACC's capacity for care.
- Thanks to donations from generous supporters, CACC placed a collar, ID tag and leash on every dog that left the building through adoption or redemption.
- CACC participated in more in-house and community vaccine/microchip clinics than ever before, servicing more than 1,500 residents' pets.
- CACC's monthly e-Newsletter continued to be sent to each ward, providing valuable pet services information to pet owners.
- Internally, CACC revamped its counseling process for people surrendering their pets, to provide more options to pet owners and to help more animals find swifter opportunities for rescue.

- CACC held bi-monthly meetings with its rescue partners to keep an open dialogue on the challenges faced by rescues and CACC, and to share information and resources.
- CACC arranged for an automatic upload of its lost pet data to the well-known database,
   Helping Lost Pets, and partnered more closely with Lost Dogs of Illinois to return more pets to their owners.
- The Department partnered with 4 Paw Luv, the Anti-Cruelty Society (ACS), and the Northern Illinois Transport Team to shuttle CACC cats for spay/neuter at ACS, improving their opportunity for rescue and adoption.
- CACC partnered with PAWS Chicago to make low-cost spay/neuter available to owners redeeming their dogs at the shelter.
- The Department held two City Council days, inviting aldermen to learn about CACC's services, and how 50 wards can create 50 opportunities for enhanced pet services for Chicago residents.
- Major renovations at the shelter were completed in June 2017, and all seven dog pavilions became operational.
- CACC's first official Facebook page grew to more than 10,000 followers, and CACC expanded its social media to Twitter and Instagram.
- CACC revised its euthanasia policy and vaccine protocols to better align with best practices.
- The Chicago Wolves organization donated Canine Influenza and Bordetella vaccines to the City shelter. As a result of this generous gift, CACC has been vaccinating all dogs on intake with these vaccines, in addition to the core vaccines, and better supporting the health and wellbeing of these animals.
- CACC became a Best Friends Animal Society Network Partner in an effort to continually find innovative ways to save more lives.



# CHICAGO ANIMAL CARE AND CONTROL'S LIVE RELEASE PERFORMANCE

CACC's effort to save all healthy and treatable animals, as far as its resources and capacity for care permit, is measured by its live release rate (LRR).\* Success in increasing live outcomes and decreasing euthanasia over the years can be largely attributed to CACC employees' dedication, CACC's partnerships with volunteers and rescue organizations in the Chicagoland area, as well as partners' innovative community programming and low and no-cost services, including:

- Friends of Chicago Animal Care and Control's Pets for Life program
- PAWS Chicago's PAWS for Life program
- Animal Welfare League's low-cost veterinary clinic
- PAWS', Anti-Cruelty Society's, and Spay Illinois' low-cost spay/neuter services
- The Chicagoland Rescue Intervention Support Program's pet owner assistance programming
- · PAWS', Tree House Humane Society's, and Whisker and Tails Foundation's community cat programming

The table below illustrates CACC's LRR over the past four years, and the considerable improvement attributable to the dedicated Chicago community.

- \* To calculate the total LRR, we perform the following calculation from our Outcome data:
- 1) Add the total number of dog and cat adoptions, transfers to rescue groups, and returns to owner.
- Divide this number by the total number of cat and dog Outcomes minus "Euthanasia by Request" and "Dead on Arrival."
- 3) Multiply the result by 100 to arrive at the LRR.

# IN THE COMMUNITY

CACC's Continual Improvement Plan identifies strategies for helping more people and pets in the community in 2018. These strategies are set forth below.

CACC is committed to accountability for its operations through communication and transparency of performance. Efforts will include:

- Developing informational campaigns through public service announcements and other media
  vehicles to better enable residents to find lost pets, treat all dogs as individuals, understand cats
  in the community, and live harmoniously with wildlife.
- Exploring opportunities to partner with Chicago Public Schools in an effort to make humane education part of every child's learning experience.
- Enhancing the way CACC reports its data for clarity, and expanding the kind of data collected.
- Continuing monthly communications with aldermen and their constituents to share performance data, as well as valuable pet services and information on pet care.
- Improving CACC's web site, with the goal of creating a centralized resource for information for residents regarding services and programs offered by both CACC and its partners.
- Continually expanding social media reach to share success stories, services and information; promote the animals; and communicate challenges. Residents can engage with CACC on Facebook at @ChicagoAnimalCareandControl, on Twitter at @ChicagoACC and on Instagram at @Chicagoanimalcare.

CACC will focus on broadening and deepening partnerships with non-profit organizations, donors, and educational institutions to expand access to pet information and services that will encourage responsible pet stewardship. Efforts will include:

- Expanding its partnership with the Chicagoland Rescue Intervention Support Program (CRISP) to
  provide assistance to pet owners who would prefer to keep their pets, but who need assistance in
  order to do so.
- Strengthening and expanding CACC's partnership with Safe Humane Chicago, which teaches
  dog handling and safe dog skills to veterans, as well as youth from the Illinois Youth Center and
  Lindblom Math and Science Academy to inspire safer, more humane communities.
- Deepening partnerships with organizations like Lost Dogs of Illinois that assist in the return of lost animals to their owners and My Pitbull is Family, an organization that helps people find pet-welcome housing – and continuing to augment the Department's ability to reconnect people and pets.
- Expanding access to low-cost vaccine and microchip clinics, both in-shelter and in the community.
- In partnership with Best Friends Animal Society, coordinating a citywide conversation with invested community stakeholders to create a plan for saving the city's healthy and treatable animals.

CACC is dedicated to making field operations more efficient. In the coming year, CACC's efforts will include:

Conducting reviews of field operations to improve efficiencies, and updating operating
procedures and wildlife management plans to align with best practices.



## IN THE SHELTER

CACC's Continual Improvement Plan also identifies strategies for improving its in-shelter operations in 2018. CACC's in-shelter operations include many functions: sanitation, medical services, animal care, and customer service to name a few. These are essential to the animals' quality of life, and the public services CACC provides. In 2018, CACC's improvement efforts will focus on:

- Modifying the animal admissions program to increase healthy outcomes and decrease the amount of time an animal stays in the shelter.
- Strengthening and better structuring the shelter's volunteer program and the adoption program to better serve the public and increase adoptions.
- Further building on its partnership with Safe Humane to enlarge CACC's capacity to care for dogs and improve CACC's dog behavior assessment process.
- Enhancing quality of life for all cats at the shelter. With CACC's partners, the Department will continue exploring innovative stray and feral cat management strategies, such as trap, neuter, and return to field and community cat programs in the city.
- Working closely with Friends of Chicago Animal Care and Control (the nonprofit dedicated to
  providing CACC with resources that expand the Department's ability to care for the animals) to
  identify projects that enhance animal care and comfort and save more lives, and that help the
  communities that CACC serves.
- Enhancing CACC's in-shelter medical and surgical facility's operational efficiency by exploring
  technological solutions that enable staff doing rounds to report in real-time into the shelter
  management system. CACC will also seek out expert consult regarding best practices in disease
  prevention and sanitation, as well as explore potential partnerships with educational institutions
  that could enable CACC to broaden offerings both in-shelter and in the community.
- Exploring the possibility of developing a foster program for the city shelter and engaging the community in saving more lives. The proposed program would be directed at the shelter's most at-risk animals and those requiring isolation prior to transferring to one of CACC's rescue partners.
- Inspiring all employees to embrace professional excellence in their work functions through jobrelated training, alignment with best practices in shelter management, and regular opportunities for expressing concerns and ideas for improvement.
