CHICAGO SAYS "NO" TO DISCRIMINATION AGAINST CURRENT AND FORMER MEMBERS OF THE MILITARY

As of March 16, 2016, it is illegal to discriminate in Chicago against veterans, active duty military personnel, members of the reserve, and members of the National Guard.

Here are some examples of prohibited conduct under the new law:

Employment

Employers may not discriminate against current or former members of the military in hiring, promotions, or wages.

Housing

Landlords cannot refuse to rent, charge higher rents, or require higher security deposits to qualified applicants who are current or former members of the military.

If you believe you have been a victim of discrimination in Chicago based on your military status as described above, you can file a complaint with the Chicago Commission on Human Relations.
