1. Administrative Matters

• Roll Call & Quorum:

Councilors Perez and McDonald present; quorum confirmed.

• Approval of Previous Minutes:

April 17, 2024, meeting minutes approved unanimously.

2. District Council Reports

a. Nominating Committee - Report by Councilor Marquinn McDonald

- Most recent committee meeting postponed; new date pending.
- No substantive updates.

b. Community Engagement - Report by Councilor Alexander Perez

• Self-Defense Course:

Recognized Councilor McDonald's successful women's self-defense event. Plans to expand.

• "Community & Canvas" Events:

- o It will be held across two Friday evenings; approx. 35 attendees total.
- o Activities included painting, music, and food alongside education on DSPs.
- o Surveys were administered to gather community feedback on policing strategies.

• Youth Summit Announcement:

- Scheduled for June 3, 2025, at 4930 S. Cottage Grove Ave (Village Leadership Academy campus).
- o Target Audience: Middle and high school students.
- o Focus Areas: Violence prevention, job resources, and youth empowerment.
- o Event Partners: Village Leadership Academy and others.
- The VLA building to serve as a future community center under Perez's leadership.

3. District Strategic Plans (DSPs) – Community Engagement

Background:

- DSPs are the framework for community-informed policing.
- Historically limited public engagement: current efforts aim to reform this.

Community Engagement Strategies:

- Physical and digital surveys distributed (also available via QR code).
- Surveys gather input on public safety priorities and DSP familiarity.

Key Feedback Themes:

- Youth-related concerns remain largely unaddressed in DSPs.
- Successful but defunded programs (e.g., high school open gyms) highlighted.
- Emphasis on including youth directly in DSP design.
- Recognition that systemic adult-driven issues often affect youth outcomes.

Action Steps:

- Encourage survey completion (digital and physical).
- Summer outreach planned at fieldhouses and park districts.

4. Guest Presentation

Presenter: Tisa Morris, Chief of Community Engagement **Organization:** Cook County State's Attorney's Office (SAO)

Overview of SAO:

- Staff: Approx. 1,500 (attorneys, investigators, victim support personnel).
- Functions: Criminal/civil cases, victim services, juvenile/adult court jurisdiction.

Specialized Programs:

• Diversion Programs:

- o Retail theft, peer jury, and juvenile diversion.
- New firearm possession alternatives: program route instead of charges for valid but expired FOID/CCL holders.

• Reproductive Rights:

 New unit for addressing threats and intimidation related to reproductive healthcare.

• Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault:

o Specialized, multi-jurisdictional teams.

• Wrongful Convictions Unit:

o Fully staffed with dedicated resources.

• Training:

 New State's Attorney Eileen O'Neill Burke is prioritizing robust training and accountability.

5. Community Concerns: Felony Review Bypass Pilot

Program Overview:

- Active in CPD Districts 5 and 7.
- Allows officers to file certain gun charges (e.g., UUW) without immediate SAO review.
- Intended to reduce delays in returning officers to duty.

Community Concerns:

Transparency & Oversight:

- o Program introduced without community or council input.
- o Viewed as targeting majority-Black districts (Englewood, etc.).
- o Concerns about civil rights violations and due process risks.

• Potential Harms:

- o Arrest records can cause long-term harm (employment, housing, family).
- o Risk of abuse (e.g., planted evidence).

• SAO Response:

- Cases are still reviewed by judges; no plan to expand beyond possession charges at this time.
- o Community input will influence pilot evaluation.
- o Acknowledged historic mistrust and vowed better communication.

Broader Perspectives:

- Divides within communities on public safety approach:
 - o Elders may support stricter enforcement.
 - Younger residents and reform advocates call for prevention and opportunitybased solutions.

6. Public Comment

Highlights:

• Felony Review Bypass Criticisms:

- o Sheron Shapiro submitted written comments citing:
 - Violations of the consent decree.
 - Targeted policing.
 - Risks to due process and increased community harm.
 - Urged the District Council to formally oppose the policy.

• Procedural Note:

- o Comments were read **after** the guest speaker's departure.
- o The council committed to forwarding all feedback to the SAO.

- Youth Summit June 3, 2025 (See Section 2).
- Documentary Screening:
 - "Incident" to screen at the South Black History Museum on Wednesday at 7:00 PM, followed by Q&A with the filmmaker.
