**MINUTES [Draft]**

**Board Members Present:** President Lori E. Lightfoot (via audio conference), Vice President Ghian Foreman, Eva-Dina Delgado, Steve Flores, John P. O'Malley Jr., John H. Simpson (via audio conference), Rhoda D. Sweeney, and Andrea L. Zopp (via audio conference).

**Board Members Absent:** Michael Eaddy.

**Others Present:** Superintendent of Police Eddie Johnson, General Counsel to the Superintendent Charise Valente, Civilian Office of Police Accountability Public Information Officer Mia Sissac, Police Board Executive Director Max A. Caproni, and members of the public.

Vice President Foreman called the meeting to order. He reported that President Lightfoot, Mr. Simpson, and Ms. Zopp are unable to attend the meeting in person. Mr. O'Malley moved to permit attendance via audio conference. The motion passed by a vote of 5 in favor (Foreman, Delgado, Flores, O'Malley, and Sweeney) to 0 opposed.

1. Mr. Flores moved to approve the minutes of the Board's regular public meeting held on March 22, 2018. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

2. Vice President Foreman announced that the Board's next regular public meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 17, 2018, at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.

Ms. Sweeney moved to close a series of executive sessions of the Board for the purposes of considering litigation and personnel matters, as authorized by sections 2(c)(1), (3), (4), and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

3. Vice President Foreman stated that a report of disciplinary actions taken by the Board during the previous month appears in the blue books made available at the meeting, and he noted that this report and the Board's written findings and decisions are posted on the Board's website. He then announced that the Board considered in a closed meeting one disciplinary case, and that the Board will now take final action on this case.

- Case No. 18 PB 2943. Vice President Foreman reported that the Superintendent filed charges recommending that Police Officers John Gorman and Timothy Neylon be discharged from the Chicago Police Department for misconduct related to an off-duty discharge of a weapon, and that the Superintendent subsequently moved to withdraw the charges without prejudice because the respondents resigned from the Chicago Police Department. Mr. O'Malley moved to grant the Superintendent's motion. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

Vice President Foreman stated that the decision in the above case will be entered as of today's date and will be issued to the parties, and that a copy of the written decision will be posted on the Board's website as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago.

Vice President Foreman noted that there is one additional disciplinary matter to announce.

- Case No. 18 RR 03. Ms. Delgado announced that pursuant to Section 2-78-130 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, she has considered a matter on which the Chief Administrator of the Civilian Office of Police Accountability and the Superintendent of Police did not agree regarding the discipline of a police officer. Ms. Delgado reported that this matter involves allegations that Robert Rialmo shot Quintonio LeGrier and Bettie Jones without justification. The Chief Administrator recommended sustaining these allegations and discharging Officer Rialmo from the Chicago Police Department. The Superintendent recommended classifying the allegations as exonerated. Ms. Delgado reported that she finds that the objections raised in the response of the Superintendent are not sufficient to meet the burden of overcoming the Chief Administrator's recommendation for discipline. Ms. Delgado stated that based on the facts and circumstances of this matter, an evidentiary hearing before the Police Board is necessary to determine whether Officer Rialmo violated any of the Police Department's Rules of Conduct. She further stated that this finding does not mean that the conclusions reached by the Chief Administrator are correct and that the Superintendent's conclusions are incorrect, but rather that the presentation of witness testimony and evidence at a hearing is necessary to determine whether there were any rule violations related to these allegations. A copy of the written opinion will be posted on the Board's website as required by the Municipal Code.

4. Vice President Foreman announced that copies of the general orders and other directives issued by the Superintendent of Police during the previous month are listed in the blue books made available at the meeting and are accessible on the Police Department's website.

5. Vice President Foreman noted that the next item of business is the Superintendent's report. Ms. Delgado moved that the oral report be waived and that the report be received in writing. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed.

6. Vice President Foreman called upon those members of the public who had signed up in advance to speak. (*See the transcript of the meeting, posted on the Board's website, for a complete report of each speaker's remarks.*)

- Larry Rogers Jr., Latoya Jones, Jennifer No, Nataki Rhodes, Crista Noel, Martin Preib, and Pamela Hunt spoke about the fatal shooting of Quintonio LeGrier and Bettie Jones by Police Officer Robert Rialmo.
- Ellen Corley spoke about police corruption and other matters.
- Vice President Foreman called upon the following individuals and there was no response: Kit Brennan, Jackie Page, Grace Patino, and Robert More.
- John Catanzara spoke about the promotion of a commander and about police protection provided to the Archdiocese of Chicago.
- Queen Sister spoke about several issues.
- Helen Henning spoke about money she said she is owed from a settlement.
- George Blakemore spoke about a variety of matters.

Vice President Foreman stated that all persons who had signed up in advance to speak had been called. Mr. O'Malley moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion passed by a vote of 8 in favor (Lightfoot, Foreman, Delgado, Flores, O'Malley, Simpson, Sweeney, and Zopp) to 0 opposed, and Vice President Foreman announced that the meeting is adjourned.

**Policy Regarding the Attendance of and Participation by  
the Public at Board Meetings**

(Adopted 15 December 2005)

The Police Board values the attendance of the public at its meetings and the opportunity to receive comments and questions on matters concerning the Board or the Police Department. The Board will treat members of the public with courtesy and respect, and expects that the public will treat Board members and Department members in a similar manner.

Toward that end, the Board has adopted the following rules governing conduct at Board meetings:

1. An individual wishing to address the Board must sign-up in advance by contacting the Board's office by phone, fax, or in person no later than 4:30 p.m. of the day before the meeting.
2. When called upon to address the Board, each speaker is to identify him/herself and speak clearly so that all in attendance may hear and so that the court reporter may make an accurate record of the proceedings.
3. Due to time constraints, each speaker is limited to two minutes and must conclude when asked to do so by the Board member acting as parliamentarian.
4. Personal attacks, obscene language, fighting words, threats, conduct intended to disrupt or interfere with the meeting, and comments not related to matters within the Board's or the Department's jurisdiction, by a speaker or any person in attendance, are strictly prohibited.

Violation of any of the above rules may result in the removal of the violator from the meeting room, or in the immediate adjournment of the meeting; in addition, repeated violations may result in the violator not being permitted to attend or participate in future Board meetings.

## **PERSONNEL AND TRAINING**

During the month of **April 2018**, **119** training blocks were conducted for Chicago Police Recruits, Metropolitan Recruits (including surrounding agencies) and In-Service Courses.

A total of **29,995** Department attendees received In-Service/E-Learning training, which included: Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement, Force Mitigation/Crisis Recognition & Response, LEMART, , Prescribed Weapons Qualifications, Procedural Justice and Legitimacy, Power Test, Patrol Carbine Requalification A, TASER Qualification and Re-Certification, COPA Taser, TARA Gas Mask Training, Body Warn Cameras: Law and Policies, Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) Familiarization, Directives: April 2018, Standard Field Sobriety Testing Basic/Refresher Course, PAPV, POWER Test and Gang Violence Reduction Strategy.

A total of **836 Chicago Police Recruits** were in training along with **47 Metropolitan Police Recruits**.
