Good evening. 1 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: This is Ghian Foreman, president of the Chicago Police 2 Board, and I'm calling the Board's January 19th 3 public meeting to order. 4 To protect the public's health in 5 response to the COVID-19 pandemic, this meeting 6 7 is taking place remotely. Pursuant to the Illinois Open 8 9 Meetings Act, I've determined that holding this 10 meeting in person is not practical, nor prudent. 11 The City of Chicago remains subject to the Governor's disaster proclamation due to 12 13 the COVID-19 pandemic and the disease continues 14 to be a threat, especially to the unvaccinated 15 and people with certain health conditions. We 16 are therefore having this meeting remotely this 17 month. 18 This meeting is open to the public 19 via video and audio conference. It is being 20 carried live by CAN-TV. Members of the public 21 are on mute in order to reduce background noise 22 and disruptions. We also have a court reporter 23 making a transcript of this meeting. 24 In addition to the Chicago Police

2	(4), and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings Act.
3	A summary of items discussed in the
4	executive sessions is posted in the minutes of
5	the meetings on our website.

10	the Superintendent filed charges against Sergeant
11	Raul Alvarez recommending that he be discharged
12	from the Chicago Police Department for engaging
13	in sexual misconduct. The Superintendent
14	subsequently moved to withdraw these charges
15	without prejudice because Raul Alvarez resigned
16	from the Chicago Police Department.

7	Max, we have don't we have some
8	individual cases, disagreement cases?
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CAPRONI: Yes. We do have
10	three announcements of rulings and disagreement
11	cases. And I believe Vice President Wolff and
12	Board Members Block and Doorley will be making
13	those announcements.
14	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: Thank you. I was
15	randomly selected from the Police Board's
16	membership to consider one matter on which the
17	Chief Administrator of the Civilian Office of
18	Police Accountability and the Superintendent of
19	Police did not agree regarding the discipline of
20	a police officer.
21	In request for review number 22-25,
22	the Chief Administrator recommended that field
23	training officer Mark Johnson be suspended for
24	366 days for using excessive force on a student

1	while off duty and working a second job as a
2	Chicago Public School security officer.
3	The Superintendent agreed with the
4	allegations of misconduct and that they be
5	sustained but proposed a 365-day suspension.
6	After considering this matter, it's
7	my opinion that the Superintendent did not meet
8	the burden of overcoming the Chief
9	Administrator's recommendation for discipline.
10	A copy of the written opinion will
11	be posted on the Police Board's website.
12	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.
13	BOARD MEMBER BLOCK: I was randomly selected
14	from the Police Board's membership to consider
15	one matter on which the Chief Administrator of
16	the Civilian Office of Police Accountability and
17	the Superintendent of Police did not agree
18	regarding the discipline of two police officers.
19	In request for review numbers 22-26
20	and 27, the Chief Administrator recommended that
21	officers Cody Maloney and Tito Jiminez each be
22	suspended for ten days for failing to activate
23	his body-worn camera during law enforcement
24	activity; and in the case of Officer Maloney,

1	failing to submit a tactical response report.
2	The Superintendent agreed that the
3	allegations of misconduct be sustained but
4	proposed a one-day suspension of each officer.
5	After considering this matter, and
6	as set forth more fully in the written opinion,
7	there is nothing in the record before me to
8	support the determination that either the
9	Superintendent's recommendation or COPA's
10	recommendation regarding discipline is more or
11	less reasonable than the other; therefore, I find
12	the Superintendent did not meet the burden of
13	overcoming the Chief Administrator's
14	recommendation for discipline.
15	A copy of the written opinion will
16	be posted on the Board's website.
17	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. We will now
18	have a report from Max Caproni. I'm sorry,
19	Nanette.
20	BOARD MEMBER DOORLEY: It is my opinion that
21	based on a thorough review of the request for
22	review of material, the Superintendent met the
23	burden of overcoming the Chief Administrator's
24	recommendation for discipline regarding Officer

1	Lane based on the totality of the circumstances,
2	including that Officer Lane was pursuing a man
3	with a gun and was working with Sergeant Stevens
4	who was not his regular partner. I am persuaded
5	that the allegation that Officer Lane failed to
6	make the required notification to OEMC should not
7	be sustained and therefore a one-day reduction in
8	the suspension from 366 to 365 is appropriate.
9	Regarding Lieutenant Ortega, I
10	believe that a 30-day suspension without pay is a
11	significant level of discipline that will
12	communicate to Lieutenant Ortega and CPD
13	supervisors the importance of reporting an
14	officer's misconduct to COPA. Therefore,
15	pursuant to Section 2-78 of the Municipal Code of
16	Chicago, the Superintendent's proposed discipline
17	of Police Officer Paul Lane, star number 15431,
18	and Lieutenant Elvis Ortega, star number 457,
19	shall be implemented. Nanette Doorley.
20	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Now we'll
21	have a report on Police Board's compliance with
22	the consent degree.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CAPRONI: Thank you,
24	President Foreman.

1	As many of you know, in early 2019,
2	the US District Court approved a Consent Decree
3	on policing in Chicago. The goals of the Consent
4	Decree include ensuring lawful and constitutional
5	policing, building trust between police officers
6	and the communities they serve, promoting
7	community and officer safety, and providing CPD
8	members with the resources and support they need.
9	The Police Board is committed to
10	supporting the goals of the Consent Decree and
11	has made significant progress in implementing
12	reforms in the areas of police accountability and
13	transparency.
14	Every six months, the Independent
15	Monitor of the Consent Decree assesses the City's
16	compliance with the decree.
17	I'm pleased to report that the
18	Police Board has achieved a level of compliance
19	with 100 percent of the paragraphs it is
20	responsible for implementing.
21	The Independent Monitor released
22	its sixth semiannual report on December 15th of
23	last year.
24	Of the 14 paragraphs the Police

1	Board is responsible for implementing, the
2	Monitor found the Board to be in full compliance
3	with the requirements of ten paragraphs, in
4	secondary compliance with one paragraph, and in
5	preliminary compliance with three paragraphs.
6	Preliminary compliance means that
7	the Board has established the framework and
8	resources to achieve the reform.
9	Secondary compliance means the
10	Board has effectively communicated the reform to
11	relevant personnel. And full compliance means
12	the Board has successfully implemented the reform
13	in practice.
14

1	to improve the disciplinary process and to report
2	data on these cases.
3	The Board has also achieved full
4	compliance in the areas of public meetings;
5	primarily by ensuring responsiveness to the
6	community's issues of concern that are raised at
7	these meetings.
8	The Board also has regular meetings
9	with the Civilian Office of Police Accountability
10	and the Deputy Inspector General for public
11	safety to discuss policy issues and possible
12	solutions. And the Board achieved full
13	compliance in this area as well, along with COPA
14	and the Inspector General.
15	The one area where the Board needs
16	to complete additional work is in training. The
17	Board has developed and continues to implement a
18	curriculum for training Board members and hearing
19	officers on a variety of topics, including police
20	use of force, the Fourth Amendment, procedural
21	justice, and community outreach.
22	This year the Board plans to
23	complete all required training and achieve full
24	compliance with the three paragraphs in this

1 area. We have a section of our website 2 devoted to the Consent Decree. And members of 3 the public and everyone here can find more 4 detailed information on the requirements of the 5 Consent Decree and the progress the Board has 6 made in meeting them. And our website is 7 Chicago.gov/PoliceBoard. 8 9 So thank you very much for giving me this opportunity to report on the Board's 10 11 progress in this area. And I'm happy to respond 12 to any questions that you have. 13 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Are there any questions 14 for Max? Hearing no questions, thank you, Max. 15 Superintendent, if you would like 16 to provide your report. 17 SUPERINTENDENT BROWN: I'd like to recap 18 2022's crime and then update you on the first 19 days of 2023's crime. Also update you on officer 19 20 wellness and recruitment and retention. 21 Starting with the recap of 2022. 22 We ended the year with a 20 percent reduction in 23 shootings, a 13 percent reduction in homicides, a 24 10 percent reduction in carjackings, as well as a

1	really significant increase in the number of
2	illegal guns recovered in the City of Chicago,
3	over 12,000 again for the second consecutive
4	year.
5	In addition, our officers engaged
6	the community in ways that were consistent with
7	the Consent Decree.
8	We ended our six-month report with
9	a 78 percent compliance. I just want to remind
10	the Police Board, just two and a half years ago
11	when we started when I started here, we were
12	11 percent compliance. So we made up significant
13	ground in catching up to 78 percent compliance
14	with the Consent Decree. A lot more work to do.
15	As it relates to officer wellness,
16	we are now at 17 newly hired licensed clinicians.
17	Our goal is to have 22. We have a couple more
18	being processed now. So we hope to get to the
19	full complement of 22 licensed clinicians, one
20	for each of our police districts.
21	In addition, we recently hired a
22	director of wellness. That's been one of our
23	goals for the last six months. We've been
24	interviewing and finally got someone on board.

1	We'd love to schedule maybe a meeting with the
2	new director of wellness for one of the Police
3	Board meetings so we can walk through his
4	credentials, resumé, and you guys can all ask him
5	questions.
б	In addition, we've been upgrading
7	our police district gyms and fitness equipment,
8	as well as each of the districts, adding a quiet
9	room in the district where officers can
10	decompress during or after their shifts.
11	The really exciting news is that
12	we've turned a corner on hiring new officers. At
13	the end of '22, we hired 956 new Chicago police
14	officers. That's the most we've hired since
15	2017, 2018. The group of 956 officers are 70
16	percent people of color and 30 percent women. We
17	have much more work to do. We've obviously got a
18	very aggressive scheduling of visiting colleges,
19	universities in and around Chicagoan, outside the
20	city, and as well as historically black colleges
21	and universities where a lot of Chicago kids go
22	to college. So we're continuing to be aggressive
23	there.
24	So far this year, 2023, we

1	continued to have momentum around violent crime
2	reduction. Shootings are down 8 percent so far
3	this year and homicides are down 15 percent so
4	far in 2023.
5	So we ended 2022 with a 20 percent
6	reduction in shootings. So far, the first 19
7	days of 2023 shootings are down 8 percent.
8	We ended 2022 with 13 percent
9	reduction in homicides. So far for the first 19
10	days of 2023, homicides are down 15 percent.
11	So our officers are hard at work.
12	We're engaging the community. We're gaining
13	trust. But our work is never done. There's so
14	much to do.
15	I want to close with a couple other
16	challenges to make you aware of.
17	Auto thefts and robberies, and
18	increasingly more juveniles, more young people as
19	the offender.
20	Last year for most of the year, our
21	carjacking offenders were about half juvenile.
22	About 53 percent of the offenders in carjackings
23	were juveniles. So far this year that number's
24	increased to about 70 percent are juvenile

carjacking offenders. 1 2 I want to flag a couple of models of cars that's being stolen. The Kia and Hyundai 3 models are the number one and two cars being 4 stolen in Chicago and around the country because 5 of a steering column flaw that allows your 6 charging USB to turn the ignition, like it were 7 the key. Hyundai hadn't recalled these models to 8 correct that flaw. They're working on it. We're 9 10 engaged with them. 11 In the interim, we're really encouraging people 12 who own the Kia and Hyundai models to invest in 13 the steering block, the old club. Many of you 14 may remember the old club. That really works at 15 preventing someone from stealing your car once 16 they break the steering column and turn the USB 17 port. Unfortunately, this is as a result -- this 18 wave of these stolen Kias and Hyundais is the 19 result of a TikTok video on how to steal a Kia 20 and Hyundai by using the USB port. 21 This advent of stealing these cars 22 started last summer and it's really escalated 23 sense.

So we are doing a lot of community

24

1	engagement. We're actually walking block by
2	block, knocking on doors, giving crime prevention
3	tips, soliciting crime intelligence from the
4	community. It's really gone well. We've done
5	that for a few weeks so far this month. And
6	we'll continue engaging the community,
7	particularly where these crime patterns are
8	occurring, so people can be aware and we can
9	solicit information from the community and build
10	trust.
11	With that, I will turn it back over
12	to you, President Ghian.
13	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you,
14	Superintendent. Some great updates.
15	Next up, Chief Administrator
16	Kersten.
17	CHIEF KERSTEN: Thank you, President Foreman.
18	Appreciate the opportunity to be before this
19	Board this evening.
20	So I'll start off just by giving
21	sort of our statistical recap of the events of
22	December.
23	So last month, COPA received 403
24	complaints and notifications. Of those, 96 cases

1	or complaints were under COPA's jurisdiction and
2	retained by our agency. We saw the highest
3	complaint type again being Fourth Amendment,
4	improper search and seizure, about 26 percent of
5	those cases.
б	We also received nine
7	officer-involved shooting notifications in the
8	month of December, which was a significantly high
9	number of officer-involved shootings.
10	It was particularly difficult. Two
11	of them occurred on Christmas Eve, in fact.
12	I just want to mention that was a
13	time where we had incredibly cold and frigid
14	temperatures and our staff is working outside
15	alongside CPD, which requires a lot of
16	coordination and cooperation, and no one wants to
17	work on the holidays. Certainly even more
18	difficult to do so in frigid temperatures. Just
19	appreciate the work of our staff at COPA, as well
20	as our CPD partners, particularly on the incident
21	response team, to get through those joint
22	investigations and scenes as quickly as we can.
23	Also, of the 71 cases that we
24	closed this month, 25 percent of them included

sustained allegations. So in three guarters of 1 the cases and investigations we concluded this 2 month, officers' conduct was either exonerated, 3 unfounded, or there was not sufficient evidence 4 5 to sustain any allegation of misconduct. And I think it's important to point out when you 6 contextualize that memorandum, as you hear a lot 7 and as we talk about matters before this Board, 8 9 the things that typically rise to the surface are 10 the most serious allegations of eqregious 11 misconduct that the Police Board hears in full 12 evidentiary hearings or the disagreements that 13 occur on other levels of discipline 14 recommendations between myself and the 15 Superintendent of the Police Department. But by 16 and large, what doesn't get reported are cases which are concluded without sustained 17 18 allegations. And sometimes I think the public 19 misses the fuller picture of the kind of conduct 20 that we review and how our investigations come 21 down in many of these instances. I think that's 22 important to remember.

Additionally, in the month of
December, despite it being the holiday season, we

1	were out and about in the community for seven
2	events of community engagement. I'll just
3	highlight two that were particularly important to
4	me. One was I think I mentioned this at the
5	December's Police Board's hearing. Being able to
6	report out before the Community Commission on
7	public safety and accountability regarding COPA's
8	goals for 2023.
9	All of the public safety entities
10	under that Commission's purview, so COPA, the
11	Police Board, and the Police Department are all
12	tasked with developing goals each year, and this
13	is the first year of that endeavor. So we're
14	excited as an agency to put forth, you know, our
15	plan, our road map for how to sort of meet
16	expectations in those goals and in the
17	development of those goals and work alongside the
18	Commission and the community members that serve
19	on that Commission in order to try and achieve
20	those goals in 2023.
21	Another community engagement event
22	I wanted to highlight was my privilege of being
23	able to serve as civic leader who got to judge
24	the Mikva Challenge soap box competition. It's a

1	public speaking event; took place at Jones Prep,
2	CPS high school. And it was students from as
3	young as 7th grade, 13, 14 years old, all the way
4	up to high school speaking on subjects of
5	particular social or political importance for
6	them. We heard all topics, everything from
7	gender equality to public safety, police
8	accountability, domestic violence, cultural
9	appropriation. And they each gave prepared
10	speeches of three to four minutes in length. And
11	it was a powerful reminder to me of the weight of
12	words. And that even the youngest among us, you
13	know, are impacted by the events that take place
14	in our world. And it is a privilege for me as
15	the Chief Administrator of COPA to have a soap
16	box from which to speak on and to try to paint
17	the picture of what police accountability from
18	our lens at COPA looks like here in Chicago. And
19	that's a privilege that I don't take lightly.
20	But sometimes we need to be reminded of that even
21	by young people in and around us in our city.
22	So that was a tremendous
23	opportunity for me and I was happy to
24	participate.

1	Lastly, we had one video release in
2	the month of December. And so that was our
3	agency's fulfillment of the City of Chicago's
4	video release policy. That, of course, means we
5	publish and make transparent videos of
6	officer-involved shootings and certain other
7	incidents in compliance with that policy. So one
8	of those video publications went up in the month
9	of December.
10	And then lastly I'll just continue
11	to kind of lift up my staff. They worked really
12	hard as we ended rounded out the year to close
13	all of our remaining cases that were in the CLEAR
14	case management system. So for those of you who
15	are unfamiliar, in early 2019, both the Bureau of
16	Internal Affairs at CPD and COPA entered into
17	sort of a new case management platform that we
18	have to jointly use that was replacing a legacy
19	system called the CLEAR system, and obviously
20	CLEAR has other functions for the Police
21	Department which remain fully functional, but as
22	far as the misconduct investigation module, that
23	is sunsetting, and COPA worked steadily to make
24	sure that all of those cases were closed before

the migration of that information was even 1 necessary over to CMS. And that really took a 2 coordinated effort from investigations, our legal 3 staff, quality management folks and everyone on 4 the senior leadership team that's tasked with 5 reviewing and finalizing those reports. 6 7 So just want to say a big thank you to our staff at COPA for staying the course and 8 setting a goal and meeting it. It's exciting to 9 10 And I hope that it portends progress to see. 11 come for us in this new year. So thank you. 12 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: I'm not sure that most 13 can understand the relevance of that. But from a 14 Police Board perspective, really sincere thank 15 you for that. That's really comforting to hear. 16 And from past years, we understand some of those 17 challenges, some of those legacy systems and 18 legacy cases, so thank you for your diligent 19 effort. 20 Next on the agenda is the Board's 21 standard operating procedures and policies. We 22 thought it was important to let the public and 23 all stakeholders know that we publish on our 24 website all policies that the Board adopts at its

1	public meetings, as well as procedures regarding
2	the operations of the Board and its staff.
3	These are all collected in a
4	document titled Police Board standard operating
5	procedures and policies, which is available on
6	our home page at Chicago.gov/PoliceBoard.
7	Finally, I will call members of the
8	public who signed up in advance to speak. To
9	ensure that we have time to hear from all
10	speakers, we are setting a two-minute time limit
11	on comments.
12	Speakers, when we call your name,
13	you can press +6 to unmute yourself. Our first
14	speaker from the Youth Council Dajee Allen.
15	Dajee, are you here?
16	Our second speaker, Anthony Bryant.
17	MR. BRYANT: Hello everyone. Good evening.
18	My name is Anthony David Bryant. Thank you, all,
19	for allowing us to participate in the meeting.
20	I'm a resident of Woodlawn, as well as a resident
21	of the 3rd District. I'm running for the local
22	police district council. I'm speaking on the
23	police district council because I think this can
24	be a crucial resource to the community, as well

as a resource for the Commission on Public safety 1 and Accountability, as well as with COPA and the 2 Police Board. 3 I think this police district council 4 5 can help with increasing transparency to crime data, as well as facts about hiring, 6 demographics, as well as valuable information on 7 strategies and practices. This district council 8 can definitely expand what holding police 9 accountable looks like, especially for causing 10 11 harm, as well as associating with hate groups and

13 I think there needs to be potential 14 decreasing militarizing practices, as well as 15 potentially holding officers accountable with 16 suspending their paid administrative leave if 17 they're under investigation. And then listen to 18 the residents' input on alternatives to policing 19 in our communities. So expanding mental health 20 first aid responders, as well as input team and 21 expanding resources of justice and violence 22 programs.

23 So I just wanted to just speak on 24 that right quick. I appreciate you all as well

2	well as any presentations and slides that you all
3	may have on your website. Thank you
4	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.
5	Our next speaker, Rabbi Michael Ben
6	Yosef.
7	RABBI BEN YOSEF: Can you hear me?
8	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Yes, sir.
9	RABBI BEN YOSEF: Good evening. My name is
10	Michael Ben Yosef, human rights activist here in
11	Chicago. I'm here to address the Chicago Police
12	Board on behalf of the Toledo family and their
13	loved one Adam Toledo who was murdered by Eric
14	Stillman on October 20, 2022.
15	This Board made a recommendation to
16	fire Eric Stillman for his involvement in the
17	murder of Adam Toledo. There was a
18	recommendation to proceed with evidentiary
19	hearing. As of today, approximately 50 days
20	later since that meeting, no hearing has been
21	scheduled for the union. In fact, Eric Stillman
22	is still actively carrying out police duties,
23	receiving a pension, and enjoying his life to the
24	fullest while the Toledo family grieves.

1	We ask for empathy on behalf of
2	this Board to consider if you were in the shoes
3	of this family patiently waiting, every day the
4	struggle, knowing your loved one was killed by a
5	killer cop. That day Adam was murdered, Eric
б	Stillman was prosecutor, the judge, and the jury.
7	He demonstrated no remorse.
8	Had Adam been white, we would not
9	be sitting here today.
10	It's not fair to the Toledo family
11	and they deserve justice. And now the second
12	year of the anniversary of Adam Toledo's death is
13	approaching on March 29th, 2023.
14	We are asking that this Board
15	fulfill its ultimate duty to hold this meeting as
16	soon as possible. The mother deserves to
17	confront her son's killer. The mother deserves
18	accountability for what happened to Adam Toledo.
19	The mother deserves to see this Board act on its
20	recommendation to ensure this nightmare does not
21	happen to another family.
22	Eric Stillman murdered Adam in cold
23	blood. Eric Stillman was the hunter and Adam was
24	the hunted. These are the facts and we're asking

1 this Board expeditiously to hold this meeting to 2 move forward. 3 As I close, may this family be comforted during the times of difficult days of 4 5 their bereavement and soon come swiftly justice. This is my hope and this is my prayer. God 6 bless. 7 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Rabbi, I think it's 8 9 important we make sure we're sharing factual 10 information. 11 So we did not make a recommendation 12 -- we recommended that there should be a hearing 13 first. 14 Second. Max, can you give us an 15 update in terms of where we are in terms of the 16 hearing moving forward? I know that he does --17 officer does not -- he's been stripped of his 18 police powers, so he's not still carrying out his duties as a police officer. 19 20 Max, where are we in terms of status 21 on the hearing? 22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CAPRONI: As of right now, 23 charges have not been filed with the Police Board 24 against Officer Stillman. So the Board has not

Γ

1	yet received those charges and has not yet taken
2	jurisdiction of the case. So it's still in a
3	state where it's not been filed with the Board,
4	and the Board has not been able to move forward
5	with the case because it hasn't been filed.
6	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Chief?
7	CHIEF KERSTEN: Thank you, President. I
8	wanted to add, and so it's clear and for this
9	particular speaker, that it is the Department of
10	Law that's responsible for filing those charges.
11	So the Police Board, CPD, COPA, none of us have
12	any control over when the charges actually get
13	filed before the Police Board. That rests within
14	the purview of the Department of Law.
15	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: So as soon as we have an
16	opportunity when it's filed, we'll have the
17	ability to set that hearing date. So we
18	definitely pay our attention to our website. We
19	will keep that updated as soon as we get the
20	information. I'm sure it will be in the
21	newspaper before it will be on our website.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CAPRONI: And, President
23	Foreman, if I can just comment on the process
24	once the charges are filed. So once the charges

Γ

1	are filed, they will be personally served on the
2	accused officer, and then we will post them on
3	the Board's website so that they're available to
4	the public. And also on the website we keep
5	up-to-date information on the status of the case
6	and when the status hearings and ultimately the
7	evidentiary hearing, which are open to the
8	public, will be scheduled. So All of that
9	information will be available on our website once
10	charges are filed.
11	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.
12	Our next speaker, Crista Noel.
13	MS. NOEL: Hi. Hi, everyone. Good evening.
14	Okay. In regards to what I have to say today,
15	you know, we're still, you know, really upset
16	over the presentation. We really don't know how
17	CPD is supposed to respond to CCL holders. We
18	have reviewed all the statutes and all the laws
19	and Elijah didn't do anything wrong.
20	So we really just don't know why he was arrested.
21	We just have a problem with arbitrary arrests.
22	This was an arbitrary arrest. We're reviewing
23	video now. And we really, really, really would
24	like and Comparing and if you had add
	like and, Superintendent, if you're still
1	around, we really would like to know in the
----	---
2	best-case scenario what is supposed to happen?
3	How are the Chicago Police supposed to respond to
4	someone who is legally carrying their weapon in
5	their car? We do not want to have more Elijahs
6	where people are not only legal weapon owners,
7	but they are being arrested, shackled, and having
8	their weapons destroyed. And I really, really
9	have a problem with knowing that the system, the
10	judges are allowing this to happen as well.
11	So, Superintendent, I really want to
12	get with you, maybe, Ghian, you, and figure out
13	how we're going to teach cops how to approach
14	CCLs and teach our community of CCL holders what
15	the expectations are for cops.
16	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. So, Crista,
17	this one, it's a touchy subject because of
18	litigation, right, so giving an answer
19	specifically to your comment right now, because I
20	can't be prejudiced, you know, about this
21	specific case as it relates to Police Board.
22	I didn't ask very specific questions
23	about this incident, but I have followed up with
24	CPD. I have followed up with COPA. I have

followed up with the training department. We the 1 Police Board even had some training on some 2 Fourth Amendment issues, Right. In fairness, 3 right, one of the things that I've kind of gained 4 5 from my time being on the Police Board that it's important that we think about all of the 6 perspectives. And each situation is very 7 different. And how the police react to a person, 8 9 how a person reacts to how the police are acting, 10 All of those things play a role in it. So I do 11 think it's important. CCL holders, they get 12 training in a certain way, what they're supposed 13 to do. Police get training in a way that they're 14 supposed to act when a person tells them that 15 they are concealed carry holder. So there are a 16 lot of nuances that go into the situation. It is 17 going to be tough talk about this specifically 18 because of the litigation. But I do think it is 19 important for all of us to kind of understand, 20 the public to understand what happens in a police 21 encounter. And I think it's important for police 22 to understand how you need to approach us, 23 members of the public, right. And this is some 24 of the work that I think the police are trying to

1	do. I know COPA with the COPA academy, this is
2	some of the conversations they're having. And
3	next month we'll talk about some of this. We'll
4	hear presentations.
5	I understand your point, and I think
6	it's ongoing dialogue that we all need to have
7	with each other in an effort for everyone to be
8	safe.
9	I know that might not be very
10	comforting specifically what I'm saying to you,
11	but if we think about this from the perspective
12	of us trying to make a better system, you know, I
13	think we'll be able to learn from each other and
14	try to set up some ways so that, you know, we
15	won't have incidents like this again.
16	Our next speaker, Lolita Hendrix.
17	Lolita Hendrix.
18	MS. HENDRIX: Hello.
19	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Hello. Good evening.
20	MS. HENDRIX: Good evening and thank you for
21	taking my call.
22	My name is Lolita Hendrix and I am
23	the aunt of Treasure Hendrix who was found dead
24	on August 19th, 2021, in the RV of CPD Officer

Charlie Bell, who is now a -- he left the force. 1 He resigned on August 26th, which was five days 2 after she was found dead in his RV. 3 She was found also with cocaine, fentanyl, meth 4 5 amphetamine, Ecstasy, a whole host of drugs that were in her system. He testified at the scene 6 that he tried to give her CPR, that he -- and 7 that there were -- that he was present during her 8 time at his residence. My niece was an 9 10 ex-offender. So my question to you is around 11 your standard operating procedures that you just 12 applauded the team about. And the immediate 13 supervisor, who was his immediate supervisor? 14 And did his immediate supervisor within the five 15 days that he was still there on scene, meaning 16 still on the police force, did they actually do 17 any type of investigation to find out why he was 18 with someone who had the ex-felon status? To my 19 knowledge, you're not supposed to be -- officers 20 are not supposed to be in the company or in 21 association with that type of person. So I want 22 to know about that.

23 Can somebody explain to me who24 would I talk to, either his supervisor or the

1	Superintendent could give me a rundown of what
2	the expectations are when an officer is found to
3	have had an incident such as this, someone found
4	dead in their home?
5	And then also I want to know if
6	there's anything that this Board can tell me that
7	I should be looking at or my family should be
8	looking as it relates to this former officer.
9	We're holding him accountable but
10	we're really now holding the supervisory staff
11	more accountable, because from the point that she
12	was found, within that five to six days, we don't
13	have any evidence that there was anything done
14	other than the protection of the of the union
15	to cover him.
16	Was there any detailed
17	investigation done by any of the higher-ups that
18	he reported to other than the union?
19	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Okay. Would that be you,
20	Chief, or would that be Superintendent?
21	CHIEF KERSTEN: I am familiar with this case.
22	First of all, I want to express my sympathy to
23	your family for your loss. I do know a little
24	bit factually about the case, because we received

notification of it from the Police Department, 1 and at COPA we had to evaluate whether we had any 2 jurisdiction over the case. And there was no 3 evidence to indicate that we had any jurisdiction 4 5 over this matter. So no clear indication of the things that would trigger a COPA investigation, 6 like excessive force or domestic violence that we 7 could prove or establish within the parameters of 8 what we were able to review. 9 10 The other things that you are highlighting, ma'am, as far as, you know, 11 12 potential failure to act according to directives 13 at the supervisory level, that would typically 14 fall within the purview of the Bureau of Internal 15 Affairs, failure to perform any sort of police 16 service. But I would yield to anyone from the 17 Department that wants to speak on this case. 18 SUPERINTENDENT BROWN: I'll just state that this was a death investigation. And there are 19 20 interviews, regardless of whether this officer 21 resigns during the investigation. The medical 22 examiner determines cause of death and people on 23 the scene are interviewed, evidence is collected. 24 I don't know the details of that death

investigation at this time, but we should be able 1 to follow up through the Board with that and 2 share what we can. 3 4 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Okay. Max will get your 5 information and we'll try to ensure that we can coordinate to get you some information on this 6 7 one. SUPERINTENDENT BROWN: Sorry for your loss, 8 9 ma'am. 10 Sorry for your loss. PRESIDENT FOREMAN: 11 MS. HENDRIX: Thank you, sir. 12 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: As far as the Police Board is concerned, you heard a case tonight 13 14 where the Superintendent moved to file charges 15 against an officer and that officer resigned, so 16 therefore the Superintendent withdrew the 17 charges, because he can't have any discipline 18 against someone who doesn't work there anymore. 19 Same for we the Board, we don't have 20 the ability to have a hearing on someone. That's 21 where our powers end at that point, when that 22 person is no longer employed. 23 But, you know, we'll work with the 24 Superintendent. We'll work with CPD to try to

1	get you some of the answers to the questions that
2	you have.
3	MS. HENDRIX: Thank you. I appreciate your
4	time.
5	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Our final speaker, Mr.
6	Robert More. Mr. More, unmute one of your
7	phones. Mr. More. I'm not sure Mr. More has
8	joined us today.
9	At this time, I believe all members
10	of the public who signed up to speak have been
11	called. Is there a motion to adjourn?
12	VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: So moved. Paula Wolff.
13	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second. Michael Eaddy.
14	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All in favor, please say
15	say aye.
16	(CHORUS OF AYES.)
17	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. The motion
18	passes and the meeting is adjourned. Thank you,
19	everyone, be safe.
20	(WHEREUPON, the proceedings were
21	adjourned at 8:20 p.m.)
