2	Lightfoot and I'm the president of the Chicago
3	Police Board. I'm calling this meeting to order.
4	The first item of business is approval of the

8	MS. BALLATE: So moved.
9	MR. FOREMAN: Second.
10	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?
11	(chorus of ayes.) Any opposed? The motion passes.
12	Our next public meeting will be on
13	Thursday, April 21st at 7:30 p.m. here at the
14	Chicago Public Safety Headquarters. At this time I
15	ask for a motion to close a series of executive
16	sessions for the purposes of considering personnel
17	matters and litigation as authorized by
18	Section $2(C)$ (1), (3), (4), and (11) of the Illinois
19	Open Meetings Act. Is there such a motion?
20	MS. FRY: So moved.
21	MR. FOREMAN: Second.
22	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? (Chorus of
23	ayes.) The motion passes. A report of disciplinary
24	action taken by the Board during the previous month





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1	has been made available at this evening's meeting.
2	This report and the Board's written Findings and
3	Decisions are posted on the Board's website. The
4	Police Board, as authorized by the Open Meetings

7	misconduct related to the Koschman homicide
8	investigation. The superintendent subsequently
9	moved to withdraw the charges without prejudice
10	because the Respondent, Lieutenant Denis Walsh,
11	resigned from the Chicago Police Department. Is
12	there a motion to grant the Superintendent's motion
13	to withdraw the charges?
14	MS. FRY: So moved.
15	MR. FOREMAN: Second.
16	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? (Show of
17	hands.) Any opposed? Voting in favor are Board
18	members Foreman, Ballate, Conlon, Eaddy, Fry,
19	Simpson, Sweeney, Valenzuela, and myself. Motion
20	passes.
21	Regarding case number 16 PB 2902, the
22	Superintendent filed charges to discharge Sergeant
23	James Eldridge from the Chicago Police Department
24	for receiving bribes. The Superintendent



1	subsequently moved to withdraw the charges without
2	prejudice because the Respondent resigned from the
3	CPD. Is there a motion to grant the
4	Superintendent's motion to withdraw the charges
5	without prejudice?
6	MR. FOREMAN: So moved.
7	MR. EADDY: Second.
8	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? (Chorus of
9	ayes). Any opposed? Voting in favor are Board
10	members Foreman, Ballate, Conlon, Eaddy, Fry,
11	Simpson, Sweeney, Valenzuela and myself. Motion
12	passes.
13	The Board's decisions in all cases in
14	which we took final action this evening will be

12	mother to be able to say oh my son did this or my
13	son did that. She don't have that opportunity.
14	Nobody in his family has that opportunity, but that
15	don't bother ya'll. Ya'll still going to be like
16	I'm so tired of hearing these people. April 21st,
17	you will still be tired of hearing people talk.
18	Probably the tomorrow it will be new people from
19	them losing their family members. These police is
20	killing us every day.

We don't even have a chance. We have no chance out here in the world, but that don't bother you because ya'll safe. Everybody else ain't safe but ya'll are.



MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you ma'am.
MS. EDWARDS: Yes I know.
MS. LIGHTFOOT: Curly Cowen.
MR. COWEN: We are here to call to order a
people to a people's assembly. We know that this
Board does not care about Black women and does not
care about Black girls. They don't care about Black
people. We know that they care about protecting the
police, corporate lawyers cronies, only care about
making them happy and making Rahm look good.

We have no way to deal with counseling with children and families dealing with trauma by CPD. We are tired and we will be here til this bitch burns down.



We demand that there is a creation of an 1 2 independent, publicly elected police accountability council. We want to know what you want. 3 The Chicago Police Board's job is to decide disciplinary 4 cases involving policemen's misconduct. But they 5 have procrastinated making a decision on the firing 6 of Dante Servin, all these killer cops. 7 They have disregarded, disrespected the families of police 8 9 That ain't right. Over 4700 people have violence. signed a petition in support of firing Dante Servin. 10 Chicago and the people all over the country want to 11 12 see justice for Rekia Boyd, justice for Rekia Boyd. 13 CPD has spent more than 500 million 14 dollars on the past ten years in settlements for

15 police misconduct. No killing. Rahm Emmanuel has 16 led the passing of a budget that gives 200 million 17 dollars to policing. Meanwhile unemployment among 18 Blacks is higher in Chicago than it is nationally. 19 That ain't right. This Board --

13	you're I'll ask you to respect the rights of
14	other people to speak.
15	THE CROWD: We kept showing up. They put a
16	time check on the ability to speak at the mike.
17	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Officers.
18	THE CROWD: They continued to interrupt Ms.
19	Panzy when she speaks.
20	MS. LIGHTFOOT: I'll ask you for the last time
21	to allow these people to sign up to speak. After
22	that, we will clear the room by CPD. Officers,
23	please clear the room.
24	THE CROWD: Not today.



1	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore, please proceed.
2	Everybody has to have the opportunity to speak. I
3	don't want to have the officers to have you clear
4	the room. If you please do not allow other people
5	to speak, we will have to clear the room.
6	MR. FOREMAN: Mr. Blakemore, please proceed.
7	MR. FOREMAN: Thank you very much sir, and I
8	am glad to be here. To Madam Lightfoot and the
9	members of the Board, I came with my own issues. I
10	have been denied the right to speak because you had
11	other speakers that did not respect this process.
12	MR. FOREMAN: Continue Mr. Blakemore.
13	MR. BLAKEMORE: I can be seated and later on
14	you can call me. Will you do that?
15	MR. FOREMAN: Absolutely. Ms. Eveangel
16	Yhwnewbn.
17	MS. YHWNEWBN: Last month the City paid out
18	5.5 million dollars to John Burge torture victims
19	torturing people Black men in holding cells.
20	They also paid out five million dollars in hush
21	money to hush up the police murder of LaQuan
22	McDonald. I'm here to follow up on the police
23	misconduct that still goes on with their unlawful
24	stops and seizures that went on last month. I told





1	you what had happened in an unlawful stop that I			
2	endured. Now, Lisa Madigan's office said that the			
3	police had seven business days to give a factual,			
4	detailed, and legal reason why I couldn't get the			
5	dash cam that the police officer said that he was			
6	using. Instead, the police office sent them a			
7	letter saying that they did not get the revised			
8	copy. Now, they have the original copy. They gave			
9	me a copy and the date stamp, but yet they claim			
10	they didn't get anything.			
11	My court date was on August on May			
12	11th. So May 9th is when they were supposed to have			
13	the legal, factual information. Instead they played			

13 the legal, factual information. Instead they played 14 this game. They stop you. They harass you, stress 15 you out, and then they don't show up in court, and 16 then the judge starts to do you a favor. He decided 17 to do you a favor and forgive the ticket that you 18 should not have got in the first place and you have 19 got no justice.

So I asked for a continuance. I have a trial coming up. I want to know why that police officer wasn't there. Why I received another letter saying that now there was no dash cam. Either FOP is lying or the police officer is lying that stopped



1	me and said I was being videotaped is lying. But		
2	either way, it goes somebody is committing		
3	perjury, and it's your job to figure out who those		
4	people are. And I want you to do your job.		
5	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker is Christa Noel.		
6	(Not speaking.) Next speaker is Robert Moore.		
7	MR. MORE: It is the 17th of March, 2016,		
8	St. Patrick's Day on the liturgical calendar. I		
9	would like to express empathy for the members of non		
10	governmental entities, which is all the root core		
11	of the problem is that it's unnecessary to

23	of language incompatible with the Tenth Commandment		
24	to protect my own claim to eventual deliverance from		





1 | all evil which is my agenda.

2 I also recognize that my -- and express 3 and support for Mr. Moran. That may raise questions in peoples minds as to what my actual agenda is, my 4 position, and I have to be vetted like everyone else 5 continually. If anyone seeks information in that 6 7 regard, I will be happy to provide that within the next year. Ms. Lightfoot, you received a number of 8 9 questions from me through the sergeant at arms in 10 the last meeting. Could you provide me some explanation to the public as to what the answers to 11 12 those questions are, and/or what your position is in 13 regards to the availability of the chief policy 14 maker under Monell versus Department of Social 15 Services of the city of New York, which is the 16 person who was in the superintendent's seat. 17 Accessibility so that the public can prove Monell 18 claims and also prove in a given instance violations 19 of 18 USC 24-1 which I'm sure you're familiar with, 20 is specific intent crimes.

So it's necessary to prove the state of mind of the Superintendent and any other individuals who are responsible to the public interest, to get legitimate prosecution and convictions for



1	violations of 18 U.S. 242. So my is there going			
2	to be answers to those questions? Is that going to
