Tom was an outstanding hearing officer and a wonderful man. All of us on the 14 15 Board admired and respected Tom's deep 16 knowledge of the law and commitment to 17 fairness. His work was of the highest caliber. 18 Most importantly, he was in our eyes and by all 19 accounts a thoughtful, kind, and caring man. We will miss him greatly. And we offer our 20 21 prayers and condolences to Tom and Leslie's 22 sons and family. 23 We also take a moment to 24 remember former Police Board member Scott

- 1 Davis, who died last week after a courageous
- 2 struggle with ALS. Scott joined the Board in
- 3 1989 and was vice-president from 1996 to 2013.
- 4 He was the longest-serving member in the
- 5 Board's history. With his vast knowledge of
- 6 the law, thoughtfulness and uncompromising
- 7 ethics, Scott served our City with great
- 8 distinction.
- 9 While he excelled in his work and
- 10 in teaching, devotion to family and friends was
- 11 most important in his life.

- 13 condolences to Scott's wife Anne, who was also
- 14 very close friends with Tom and Leslie, and to

Vice President Wolff 17 will make the announcement. 18 BOARD MEMBER WOLFF: Paula Wolff again. 19 When the Chief Administrator of COPA and the 20 Superintendent of the Police Department do not 2.1 concur regarding discipline of a police 22 officer, the Chicago Municipal Code requires 23 the Chief Administrator to refer the matter to 24 the Police Board, and one member is selected at

Page 9 1 random to resolve the discipline case. Pursuant to Section 2-78-130 of 2 3 the Municipal Code of Chicago, as the person 4 randomly selected, I considered one matter on which the Chief Administrator of the Civilian 5 Office of Police Accountability and the 6 7 Superintendent of Police did not agree regarding the discipline of an officer. 8 9 Chief Administrator Roberts 10 recommended that then Sergeant James Cascone be 11 suspended for 15 days for entering and searching a residence without a warrant or 12 13 permission. Then-Interim Superintendent Beck 14 recommended that the allegations be classified 15 as Exonerated. 16 After considering this matter, it 17 is my opinion that the Superintendent did not 18 meet the burden of overcoming the Chief 19 Administrator's recommendation for discipline. 20 A copy of the written decision 21 will be posted on the Board's website as 22 required by the Municipal Code. 23 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you, 24 Vice-President Wolff.

But without detailed data

1 data is incomplete. We hope this data analysis will 2 3 not reflect a change in the amount of police personnel and services assigned to our area. 4 5 Manpower allocations are tied to reported incidents of crime, and we want to 6 7 make sure that our district will remain the 8 same during these unprecedented times. 9 We observed more interactions by 10 residents in the CAPS conferencing meetings, 11 asking questions and reporting about incidents. 12 May be due to the availability of being able to 13 call instead of being present. 14 We suggest teleconferencing calls 15 be added to the existing meetings when 16 restrictions are lifted. 17 We have examples of what we suggest for the police, but because of time 18 19 constraints, we're going to move on to 20 something else that we think is more important. 21 We hope that the CPD can assist 22 with targeting some of the hardest-hit areas of 23 COVID-19 by suggesting that the City of Chicago 24 follow the example of the Chicago Loop

Page 14 1 Alliance. On March 26, 2020, they initiated 2 3 a --PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Ms. Edwards? 4 5 MS. EDWARDS: Yes? 6 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Can you wrap up your 7 statement, please? 8 MS. EDWARDS: Okay. We're just hoping that 9 we can get our police stations, our fire 10 stations disinfected on a regular basis, our 11 transit areas, because we do have healthcare 12 workers and service workers, quite a few in our 13 area, that are traveling. And we're just 14 hoping on the example of Senator Elgie Sims did 15 this in the nursing homes and fire stations. 16 Thank you. 17 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Next speaker, June Norfleet. 18 19 Norfleet, can you hear me? 20 MS. NORFLEET: Hello? 21 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Yes, Ms. Norfleet. 22 MS. NORFLEET: I'm sorry. You didn't hear 23 me? 24 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: No. But you are

- 1 unmuted now, so you can go ahead and speak now.
- 2 MS. NORFLEET: Thank you. Welcome to our
- 3 new Superintendent. And we at Communities
- 4 Organized to Win are very grateful for this
- 5 opportunity to present what we believe that
- 6 every medium and every voice must be used to
- 7 politically advance the message of staying
- 8 healthy.
- 9 So Communities Organized to Win
- 10 are asking to do some simple things. Some of
- 11 them may seem even fun. We have a problem with
- 12 getting the message out about staying home and
- 13 staying safe. So we're asking the Police
- 14 Department to partner with other civic
- 15 organizations and citizens and let's have a
- 16 parade of support in targeted areas where we
- 17 see that people are not adhering to that
- 18 particular process.
- 19 Our second project is, we're
- 20 asking the Chicago Police Department to help us
- 21 with something called SignUp where we're asking
- 22 the Chicago Police Department and other
- 23 departments in the City of Chicago to create
- 24 large signs that support the principles and the

- 1 tenets of social distancing and community
- 2 safety.
- 3 And then finally, we're asking
- 4 the Police Department to use their outreach
- 5 program to assist our young people by
- 6 developing a program using our college students
- 7 to team up with high school students and med
- 8 students to create and invent up public service
- 9 announcements for the process of advancing the
- 10 ideas of social distancing and any other
- 11 projects or safety initiatives that may come to
- 12 the Board.
- 13 So these are our three
- 14 initiatives. And we're hoping that the Police
- 15 Department will be a very strong and vibrant
- 16 partner with us in these initiatives. Thank
- 17 you for your time.
- 18 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you very much.
- 19 Next speaker Matt Brandon.
- MR. BRANDON: Good evening. President
- 21 Foreman, members of the Board, Superintendent
- 22 Brown.
- Thank you for reconvening this
- 24 forum during the pandemic. The path of

- 1 community-policing partnership can only be
- 2 paved by maintaining an open process of meeting
- 3 and exchanging ideas.
- We, the community, partners with
- 5 Communities Organized to Win, view this form as
- 6 the initial point of contact to those in our
- 7 society elected to serve our communities.
- 8 We also recognize this is a space
- 9 where those of us who have been, or believe we
- 10 have been, mistreated by the police can air our
- 11 grievances and seek recourse.
- But we also come here to fulfill
- 13 part of our civic duty. To participate rather
- 14 than agitate. To bring recommendations,
- 15 proposals and support from our communities for
- 16 our police officers. We interact with the
- 17 police in our communities every day. We are
- 18 developing strategies to engage with our police
- 19 officers outside of conflict where we can offer
- 20 them a view of our true normality.
- The COVID-19 pandemic slowed
- 22 everything down to a fall. And until the
- 23 shelter-in-placement requirement is lifted and
- 24 we are all safe to interact in a common space,

- 1 those strategies, once finalized, will be on
- 2 hold.
- 3 Over the past year we have
- 4 participated in both the CPD and the federal
- 5 monitor's community conversation.
- The CPD is still trying to come
- 7 into compliance with the Consent Decree.
- 8 We agree with the CPD that the
- 9 best way to attain community policing
- 10 partnering is through expansion of CAPS. What
- 11 we believe from those conversations is a bit
- 12 different than what CPD understood our
- 13 community priorities.
- 14 The five main ones from CPD by
- 15 our communities are, number one: Beat
- 16 integrity. Keep the officers in the same beat
- 17 every day. Two: Increase foot patrols.
- 18 Design strategies for community members to walk
- 19 with the officers. Three: Enhancement of
- 20 district abandoned building office and troubled
- 21 business office participation with grass roots
- 22 community activists. A CAPS curriculum in the
- training academy that will be implemented
- 24 department wide. Five: Promotional awards

- 1 policy equivalent to existing patrol
- 2 enforcement recognition.
- 3 One of the recommendations is
- 4 having the City require that the park district
- 5 remove all basketball rims from our parks and
- 6 play lots. This not only supports the social
- 7 distancing strategy, it also minimizes the
- 8 probabilities of having to use our police
- 9 officers to clear these areas in an effort to
- 10 maintain compliance.
- 11 We feel that this will decrease
- 12 the likelihood of the police being scapegoated
- 13 by having to take enforcement action when it's
- 14 so simple to avoid. It won't continue much
- 15 longer. We're running out of time to be
- 16 proactive.
- 17 In closing, to Superintendent
- 18 Brown, welcome, and thank you for your
- 19 continued commitment to public safety. Your
- 20 vast wealth of experience and knowledge in
- 21 public safety give rise to our hopes that the
- 22 gap between our communities and our police can
- 23 be bridged. Please know that as you confront
- the enormous and unprecedented challenges

- 1 facing public safety leaders today, you have a
- 2 willing partner in Communities Organized to
- 3 Win.
- 4 May God bless us and keep us all
- 5 safe. Thank you.
- 6 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you very much.
- 7 Next speaker is CPD Transparency.
- 8 CPD TRANSPARENCY: Hello, again. I'm very
- 9 sorry about you friend and wife. I'm referring
- 10 to the Police Board hearing officer.
- 11 Welcome to Mr. Brown. I lost
- 12 faith totally recently in this Chicago Police
- 13 Board. The case is Sergeant Khalil Muhammad
- 14 who tried to kill a boy who has autism. I gave
- 15 you the benefit of the doubt when you said you
- 16 had nothing to do with CPD retaliating against
- 17 people just for signing up to speak. But see
- 18 Chip Mitchell's WBEZ article. One comment to
- 19 the press. Find out if Mr. Muhammad changed
- 20 his last name. Find out what his last name
- 21 was. Find out who Mr. Muhammad's clout is.
- The general public needs to be
- 23 warned about Chicago cops and why a federal
- 24 judge has taken over the Chicago Police

- 1 Department.
- 2 Their imagination should picture
- 3 Chicago Police uniforms as carrying a warning
- 4 to the public like the Surgeon General's
- 5 warning on cigarettes.
- The only person involved with the
- 7 Chicago Police that can be trusted at all is
- 8 Maggie Hickey, the federal monitor.
- 9 Read Jamie Kalven's Code of
- 10 Silence. People need to be told to film cops.
- 11 YouTube videos are forever. That's one of the
- 12 few solaces if you go against CPD. The
- 13 pleasure of reading is another. Chicago cops
- 14 can barely, just barely, read.
- The next part isn't for the
- 16 Police Board. I want to finish with a bedtime
- 17 story for Chicago cops. It's by Flannery
- 18 O'Connor. Listen closely. Are you ready,
- 19 sleepy heads? They could have been a good cop
- 20 if it had been someone there to record them
- 21 every minute of their life. Flannery O'Connor.
- 22 End of story. Thank you very much.
- 23 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Next
- 24 speaker, Robert More.

- 1 MR. MORE: Hello. Hello. Hello.
- 2 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: I think you have two
- 3 phone lines, don't you?
- 4 MR. MORE: Hold on. Let me shut this other
- 5 one off. Okay. Can you hear me now, please?
- 6 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: We can hear you.
- 7 MR. MORE: Okay. Gotcha. I don't
- 8 know -- I will go quickly through this. I got
- 9 to interrupt my overall agenda because of this
- 10 Covid-19, so I'm using whatever time I have
- 11 here to report a crime in the sense that as if

- 14 The most reliable, from what I can see, the
- 15 least likely to be errant explanation of the

- 18 e-mail to Charlie.Beck@Chicagopolice.org about
- 19 an hour ago. I don't know if Charlie Beck is
- 20 the person there or the new appointee. But
- 21 here is the bottom line. StopTheCrime.net, and
- 22 that e-mail -- I'll send the next one to -- I
- 23 think it's David Brown, if I recall correctly,
- 24 is the name of the new Superintendent. But

- 1 I'll send a copy of that in the next hour.
- 2 That what the origin of this entity allegedly
- 3 is is the United States military medical
- 4 laboratory. That's Debra Tavares
- 5 StopTheCrime.net. I've never found her or the
- 6 people she's interviewed to sensationalize, to
- 7 exaggerate. I don't see any ax to grind. I
- 8 don't see motivation. But the theory that is
- 9 least likely for me to adopt at this juncture
- 10 is that it was manufactured, and that that
- 11 means that all the victims in the City of
- 12 Chicago, within the State of Illinois, that
- 13 there's crimes at least for reckless
- 14 endangerment, if not worse, because the victims
- 15 are in Chicago, Illinois, or reasonably could
- 16 have been foreseen that the victims in --
- 17 people in Chicago, Illinois, would end up
- 18 encountering this, incurring this and some of
- 19 those people died. So it is a matter of
- 20 enormous importance.
- 21 So this constitutes a report
- 22 StopTheCrime.net. My e-mail address is Anselm,
- 23 A-N-S-E-L-M@gmail.com, and I can be contacted
- 24 at that. And I will continue to convey this

And I just invite people to show me where this StopTheCrime.net e-mail is errant 2. 3 in terms of the possibility that it did 4 originate as a manufactured entity in a United 5 States military medical laboratory, and therefore there's criminal liability that's 6 7 prosecutable under the state laws of the State 8 of Illinois under the police powers. 9 So, if necessary -- regardless of 10 how difficult or how distasteful this is in --11 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All right. Thank you 12 very much. At this time, all members of the 13 14 public who signed up to speak have been called. 15 Is there a motion to adjourn? 16 BOARD MEMBER WOLFF: So moved. 17 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Michael Eaddy.
