16	Spears. And, as always, Police Board Executive
17	Director Max Caproni.
18	We will now proceed to the items on
19	the meeting agenda. The first items are minutes.

proceedings be open to the public, and that 1 accused officers may be suspended without pay 2 while their case is pending. 3 We learned earlier this week that 4 the Appellate Court has scheduled oral arguments 5 for June 17th. It, therefore, will be at least 6 several months before the Appellate Court decides 7 the case, and then there may even be an appeal to 8 our Illinois Supreme Court. 9 10 Four new disciplinary cases were 11 filed with the Police Board in the last month. 12 Prior to these filings, no new cases were filed 13 since early October. As President Cooper noted in our 14 15 March meeting, there was significant decrease in 16 cases filed with the Board after the litigation 17 on the arbitration option commenced in early 18 2024. There are now 17 cases currently 19 20 before the Police Board in which the accused 21 officer has requested arbitration. These cases 22 are on hold. There will be no arbitration 23 hearings until the establishment of a public 2.4 arbitration process, and there will be no Police

1 Board hearings without the consent of the accused 2 officer. Five Police Board cases are moving 3 forward because the accused officers elected to 4 have a Police Board hearing rather than wait for 5 arbitration. 6 The Police Board website, 7 Chicago.gov/PoliceBoard, will continue to keep 8 the public informed of any new developments in 9 10 the ongoing litigation and of the status of 11 disciplinary cases currently before the Board. 12 I encourage all of to you check the 13 news and the police discipline sections of our website for the most current information. 14 15 Now we're moving on to appeals. 16 now turn to appeals by disqualified applicants to 17 become a Chicago police officer. 18 When a person who applies to become a Chicago police officer is disqualified and 19 20 removed from the eligibility list due to the 21 results of a background investigation, that 22 person has a right to appeal to the Police Board. 23 The Board, as authorized by the Open Meetings 2.4 Act, has discussed in a closed meeting several

1	appeals. We will now take final action on those
2	appeals.

1 BOARD MEMBER VELAZOUEZ: Ave. VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: I also vote in favor of the motion, therefore the motion passes. 3 The written decisions of these 4 appeals will be entered as of today's date, sent 5 to the parties, and will then be posted on the 6 Board's website. 7 Now we're moving on to rules 8 The next item of business is a 9 revisions. proposed revision of the rules for attendance at 10 11 Police Board meetings by audio or video 12 conference. The proposed revision was posted on 13 the Board's website along with the agenda for 14 tonight's meeting. 15 The Illinois Open Meetings Act 16 allows members of public bodies to attend 17 meetings remotely for certain reasons. Is there 18 a motion to revise the Police Board's rules to 19 add "unexpected child care obligations" as a 20 reason to permit remote attendance which is now 21 allowed by The Open Meetings Act? 22 BOARD MEMBER HALL: So moved. 23 BOARD MEMBER TERRY: Second. 2.4 VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: All in favor, please

6	motion passes.
7	We now move on to the
8	Superintendent's report which will be given by
9	First Deputy Superintendent Yolanda Talley.
10	FIRST DEPUTY TALLEY: Thank you. Good
11	evening, everyone.
12	This month the Chicago Police
13	Department released its strategy for
14	organizational excellence. This strategy is a
15	three-year plan that focuses on four foundations
16	which are vital to strengthening public safety in
17	the City. These four foundations include
18	building, developing, and supporting our
19	workforce, community trust, neighborhood safety,
20	and organizational infrastructure.
21	The goal of this plan is to
22	continue growing our department while addressing
23	the unique and diverse needs of our City's
24	residents.

1	As our department continues to
2	grow, we are also continuing to make progress in
3	our Consent Decree and reform efforts.
4	Last week, the Independent
5	Monitoring Team released its 11th semiannual
6	report. During this monitoring period, CPD
7	nearly doubled operational compliance, which is
8	now at 16 percent. Of all accessible paragraphs,
9	93 percent have achieved some level of
10	compliance. Significant progress was made in
11	areas of use of force and community engagement.
12	Additionally, reports highlighted
13	the Department's preparations and success leading
14	up to and during the Democratic National
15	Convention.
16	We are also continuing to see a
17	reduction in violent crime and overall crime due
18	to the work of our members.
19	The men and women of CPD are out
20	there every day taking guns and violent offenders
21	off the street.
22	This month, we announced charges
23	against an offender responsible for multiple
24	criminal sexual assaults. This investigation

1	spanned nearly two years and speaks to how we
2	will never stop fighting for justice.
3	As we respond to and work to prevent
4	violent crime, we are also supporting the victims
5	of crime.
6	We held a series of engagements in
7	honor of National Crime Victims Rights Week last
8	week. This included a community resource expo
9	that was hosted here at headquarters, which I
10	know some of you were in attendance here tonight.
11	We are thankful for your partnership
12	and all you're doing for your fellow Chicagoans.
13	Thank you.
14	VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, First
15	Deputy Superintendent.
16	We now move on to the Chief
17	Administrator's report, Chief Administrator
18	White.
19	INTERIM CHIEF ADMINISTRATOR WHITE: Good
20	evening, everybody. I want to take a moment and
21	thank the members of the Board, First Deputy
22	Superintendent Talley, and other representatives
23	from the Department, Deputy Inspector General
24	Richardson, and members of the community who are

here tonight for welcoming me at my first Police 1 2 Board meeting as Interim Chief Administrator. I am committed to grounding our work 3 in COPA's guiding principle of integrity, 4 5 transparency, independence, and timeliness, and provide exemplary services to all Chicagoans, 6 both civilians and members of the Chicago Police 7 Department. 8 9 I have had the privilege of serving in Chicago's accountability space for over 25 10 11 years. 12 Throughout my years of service, I 13 have gained valuable insight into the various 14 factors and processes that shape this vital work, 15 and I plan to leverage those experiences to 16 further advance our work in a way that is 17 grounded in thorough investigations and just 18 outcomes. 19 Looking ahead, we plan to re-affirm 20 our relationships with many of our key partners, 21 including the Chicago Police Department, the Cook 22 County State's Attorney, the Community Commission 23 for Public Safety and Accountability, and the 2.4 Chicago Police Board.

1	COPA's work involves many
2	stakeholders, and we must ensure robust,
3	collaborative relationships with our partners.
4	I will be remiss if I did not
5	highlight the hard-working members of COPA staff.
6	Day in and day out, these individuals come to
7	work with one mission in mind, to be a partner in
8	delivering a safe community to the City that they
9	call home.
10	Our work often draws strong opinions
11	both internally and externally; however, COPA
12	staff are mission-driven, and their commitment to
13	the work through the ups and downs continue to be
14	the inspiration that drives our service. That
15	drives me.
16	Lastly, I would like to highlight
17	some data and accomplishments from our recently
18	published quarterly report, which is available to
19	be viewed on our website at www.COPA.org.
20	In quarter 1 2025, COPA received
21	1,513 complaints and notifications. An increase
22	in 4 percent compared to the first quarter of
23	2024. Of the total intake in quarter 1, 2025,
24	1,122 fell outside of COPA's investigative

1	jurisdiction and was referred to the Bureau of
2	Internal Affairs, BIA.
3	In quarter 1, 2025, COPA logged
4	1,797 allegations against Department members.
5	The most common allegations involved
6	operation/personnel violations and civil rights
7	violations.
8	These categories have consistently
9	represented COPA's largest percentage of
10	allegations on an annual basis.
11	As COPA prepares to launch the third
12	phase of Chicago's community police mediation
13	pilot program, a series of community-focused
14	listening sessions are currently underway.
15	COPA successfully hosted several
16	sessions during the first quarter of 2025 and
17	continued these efforts through the second
18	quarter.
19	Insights gathered will directly
20	inform the launch of phase III of the pilot
21	program later this year.
22	COPA strives to conclude its
23	investigations within six months of receiving a
24	complaint of misconduct or a notification from

1	the Department of a police-involved incident for
2	investigation.
3	Of the 98 concluded investigations
4	during quarter 1, 2025, 24 were completed in six
5	months and 78 were completed in 18 months.
6	Finally, I am happy to recognize the
7	City's Consent Decree process as reported in the
8	IMG biannual report.
9	COPA sustained our position at over
10	90 percent of our full compliance requirements.
11	Several of our remaining goals are
12	shared with BIA, including increasing consistency
13	of our disciplinary recommendations and
14	finalizing the next phase of the City's Community
15	Police Mediation Program.
16	I applaud the significant process
17	made by the Chicago Police Department, and our
18	BIA partners in the accountability section.
19	We now look forward to doubling down
20	our efforts internally and in our partnership
21	with BIA in the coming months on these few
22	remaining benchmarks.
23	Thank you for your time and
24	attention, and I thank my staff also for being

1 Thank you. here. VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Ms. 2 3 White, on your first meeting. Great job. We will now move on to public 4 5 comments. And this is the time that we give two minutes for public comments. We have six people 6 signed up. I will now call upon members of the 7 public who signed up in advance to speak. Again, 8 to make sure we have time to hear from all our 9 10 speakers, we will follow our standard practice of 11 limiting everyone to two minutes. I will be 12 using my phone. If you hear an alarm go off, 13 it's because your two minutes is up. Our first public speaker is Melanie 14 15 Hogan. 16 Hello, everyone. I'm Melanie MS. HOGAN: 17 Hogan, founder of ChiLove. I want to speak on 18 Uno reverse, as I call it. So when the police 19 are being roque, we advocated for the cameras to 20 be put on them, correct? They now wear cameras. 21 But what can also be seen from the same camera is you will see some police officers who are in 22 23 alignment with their training, but you see the 24 residents who are not regulating themselves, who

are not adhering to deescalation tactics. So I say that to say it's not just one side or the other side. Both the police and the residents of Chicago need to do some work on, one, healing, being able to understand each other, even if we can't directly relate due to the environments that we grew up in. But we cannot continue to put everything off on those who are in authority when they have went to their training, and they are -- they got the cameras on, and you see them being calm while other people are being irate.

So I just -- it's something that I know it's like an Uno reverse.

definitely have some wrinkles to get together, and that's fine. And the people as well. Just because you don't have a badge on, it does not give you the right to act -- behave uncivilized. And, yes, we do have a past with them. But once people are doing -- putting in the effort to make a change in how they address situations, the people need to try to match that energy. If the police are calm, calm down. It's as simple as that. We are all humane. I got a little thing

for blue. We're not just blue, we're human, too. 1 Police are humans, too, just like the residents. 2 That's all I want to say. Thank you, all. 3 VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Ms. 4 The next speaker who signed up for public 5 comment is Bobby Kennedy. 6 MR. KENNEDY: A lot of new faces. I've been 7 here a few times about the same subject. Chicago 8 Affinity Police Program, CPD Special Order 9 10 SO2-03. 11 I was contacted by Internal Affairs 12 on April 2nd after I've written Deborah Witzburg, 13 Inspector General, three times, as well as called 14 several times, and on a third try I filed a FOIA. 15 I'm sure that's helped the response. 16 informed me they referred this matter to Officer 17 of Community Policing Glen Brooks and Chief Angel 18 Novalez. Now I've gone full circle again. I dealt with them before. And no one wants to 19 20 touch this rainbow car, which is a progressive 21 segregation issue, which is what I told her. 22 In the December 10th public 23 Consent Decree hearing, the judge, as well as 24 Angel Novalez, said that the Affinity Policing

1	Program is not part of the Consent Decree. It is
2	a CPD program.
3	As the Chief of Constitutional
4	Policing, Chief Novalez said, community policing
5	is under his purview. There are no artificial
6	caps in place on other groups. We are completely
7	transparent he said.
8	Angel Novalez is in the open
9	forum, he will ensure that either Deputy Director
10	Milstein or Director Brooks respond to me. I
11	will take Chief Novalez at his word. No FOIA
12	required.
13	I would like these three things. I

I was 13 hoping that Angel would be here, but he is not. 14 VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Mr. 15 Kennedy. 16 Our next speaker who signed up for 17 public comment is Brad Kessler. 18 Hi, everyone. I just wanted to MR. KESSLER: make a comment in honor of an officer who lost 19 20 her life on April 10th in the 18th District. My 21 name is Brad, and I'm chair of the 18th District 22 Council. And so Officer Melissa Torres lost 23 her life to a self-inflicted wound at 2:00 a.m. 2.4

on April 10th. She was a CAPS officer. She was incredibly involved in our neighborhood, like most CAPS officers throughout the City. She was caring, kind, professional, a mom of a nine-year-old.

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I wanted to make this statement largely to highlight, and we've heard earlier in comments, officers are humans. We have to look out for each other, whether they're an officer or whether they are a community member or whether they are a member of this Board, whether it's a hello from a commander or from a superior officer or from a community member that's saying hello. It is a big, big loss for our community, but it's another horrific tragic reminder that we are not focusing as a City on the mental health of our officers. And those are the individuals that are looking out for our safety protection. If they are mentally unstable or need help, we have to address it, and we desperately need to come together and focus on it.

I ask this Board as another representative body thinking about officer wellness and health that you also get involved in

1 trying to carry this forward. Thank you. VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Mr. Kessler. 3 Our next speaker is Darryl Jackson. 4 MR. JACKSON: Good evening, afternoon. 5 Congratulations to your new spot. 6 7 Congratulations to your career moving forward, as it should be. 8 9 I just had a couple of things here. So you say officers that are disqualified because 10 11 of their background, right? So we do have a 12 convicted felon that's in the -- that's president 13 of the United States, so when we say background, should not be the only thing that we looking at 14 15 if we just look at the background. That's one 16 thing that I would kind of -- just food for 17 thought. 18 I did want to hear and understand 19 your elaboration of community trust that you just 20 said on there. I'm big on that, too. I want to 21 understand that. 22 But I do want to -- I can't 23 understand why with these teen takeovers. So 24 they go on the internet, and they all meet up

downtown. Everybody know it. And then they
coming downtown for destruction. It's called
"organized chaos." They organize it to go
downtown to just commit chaos. So we still have
disorderly conduct, mob action, and property
damage. Right? So if we have those things as
the law, why can't we have the Bluebirds, the
Cook County buses park downtown in the same areas
and fill them up because they still committing
they actually committing crime. So we want the
police to stand there and watch them commit
crimes and not do nothing? How does that make
sense? How as a Police Board can you all go with
that? That makes no sense to us. We instill for
them to protect and serve. That's it.
VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Mr.
Jackson.
Our next speaker is Jennifer
Edwards.
MS. EDWARDS: Hello, everybody. I'll be
quick, hopefully. I'm going to try to.
I want to welcome Ms. LaKenya White
from COPA. I did take the in-person COPA class.
I was very critical every week because I did not

believe that you were looking at our communities. 1 Some of the things that were being told that the 2 police shouldn't do we did -- I did make 3 suggestion that we have hot spots. We do have a 4 5 lot of different crime in different areas. So I was real critical. Ms. Andrea she knew that. 6 7 Hey, what can you do? Just speak up. I'm just not -- I call myself a regular community person, 8 but I am also a member of the TCAC Committee at 9 10 the academy, and I've been there a couple of 11 That is a committee that the community 12 and the police when they're training, we get to 13 learn what's going on. 14 I'm also a member of the New Blue 15 Project that is nationwide, and they're trying to 16 figure out what can we do with crime. 17 I'm also what -- else can I say? 18 Together We Can is a project -- police project 19 that we're trying to do in Area 1 and part of 20 Area 2. And I want to say I am retired. Okay? 21 And I love to say that every day. I get a smile 22 on your faces. But I just wanted to mention 23 things, please be looking at our communities when 24 you are teaching these classes because I did take

1	the COPA class. So what else can I say quickly?
2	First Deputy Superintendent Yolanda
3	Talley. She is one of our favorites. We love
4	her. She's been a while in the community with
5	us. Thank you. I'm so happy that she has got
6	this position. I think it's an excellent choice.
7	I bugged her enough, and I'm going to keep on
8	bugging her. Look on your desk.
9	I'll say this quickly. We are
10	honoring our Commissioner of the Fire Department,
11	because she's been around and in the community.
12	We're also very happy that there's
13	legislation that's going through Springfield
14	about squatters. That's a big problem that
15	police have, and we have a lot of squatters in
16	our neighborhoods. Thank you.
17	We have cookies tonight. I want to
18	tell you all that. Homemade cookies. And we
19	just love Ms. Yolanda Talley.
20	VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Ms.
21	Edwards.
22	Our final speaker of the night
23	signed up tonight is Pastor Doyle.
24	PASTOR DOYLE: Good evening. For the record,

D-O-Y-L-E, L-A-N-D, as in David, R-Y, United 1 States Marine Corps veteran. 2 3 So I gave First Deputy Superintendent Yolanda Talley who earned her 4 5 position -- and if you are clairvoyant, you are probably looking at our first woman 6 Superintendent of the Police Department if we're 7 going to be honest, eventually. 8 So that being said, what I gave her 9 is the current -- passed-down, the current Cranes 10 11 Because everyone reads Cranes Chicago editorial. 12 Business which highlights Superintendent 13 Snelling's leadership. Again, everybody reads And for -- if you are about business in 14 Cranes. Chicago. And that's a well-written editorial 15 16 about leadership, because attitude reflects 17 leadership, and if you can't see now the 18 difference between Larry Snelling and David 19 Brown, you might be Stevie Wonder. 20 So the reason why, again, with 21 regard to the picture, today's the 17th of April, 22 and 59 years and 364 days ago was my mother's 23 last night as a single woman, and she received 24 directions from her father. Since we're talking

1 about the teen takeovers. Again, at 25, my mother was still taking directions from her 2 father about being an upstanding black woman in 3 Fort Lauderdale, Florida, knowing that he was 4 giving his consent as a father to marry a black 5 man in Chicago who, I guess, was raised right. 6 A point coming full circle as it 7 relates to the violence in Chicago, those who 8 come from families where there's direction, 9 support, and leadership are not in wards where 10 11 they do not live causing havoc. Again, we can't 12 fix what we won't face with regard to the race, 13 and the race of the individuals look like me. 14 Can't speak about anybody else. 15 As a Marine Corps veteran, we must 16 do better if we are going to save mothers the 17 trip going to the graveyard and visiting their 18 children for the rest of their lives. 19 With that being said, very, very 20 clear about your leadership coming out of Austin. And welcome to the Board. I will eventually find 21 22 out what high school you attended. That's my 23 thing. I'm a Jaquar. 24 And, again, you earned your

leadership and look forward to the day that you 1 are sworn in as our first woman superintendent. 2 3 God bless. VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Pastor 4 We have one more speaker it looks like. 5 Evangelist Latice Porter. Did I 6 7 say that correctly? MS. PORTER: Good evening, everyone. 9 here last month. I'm the lady that spearheaded 10 the Million Woman United Family March in DC, 11 August 23rd, this past year 2024 where Dr. King 12 marched, and I spoke with you last month. 13 decided to change our date from May 3rd because 14 the Superintendent let us know that he was not 15 going to be able to be present, and this march is 16 to bridge the gap between the community and 17 police. 18 We're supposed to march from the 19 back of the DuSable Museum to the lawn of the 3rd 20 District Police Department. The Police 3rd 21 District is on board with us, 2nd District is on 22 I did speak with the Superintendent. board. 23 did speak with the 6th District, as a matter of 24 fact, Ms. Jennifer that just got up. But we are

looking to the Superintendent to kind of give us 1 some dates that he's available, because I think 2 it's very important for the people to be there to 3 be able to see. And I'm one of the leadership in 4 Woodlawn. This is where the March is going to 5 take place, which happens also to be where the 6 new presidential Obama Center is coming up. 7 So it's a lot going on over there. But I think that 8 together we can, just like Ms. Jennifer said, but 9 we have to start from somewhere, and in engaging 10 11 the trust of the community with the police, we 12 need relationships going on. That's with the 13 children and adults and everyone. 14 So I just want to petition you as 15 to if you can give us some dates so we can come 16 out with the horses. I also spoke to the Cook 17 County Sheriff who was very much interested in 18 being a part of that march. 19 Thank you. God bless you tonight. 20 VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Thank you, Ms. 21 Porter. 22 I believe that is all of our public 23 comments for tonight, and we are ready to adjourn 24 the meeting. All members of the public who

1	signed up to speak have been called. Is there a
2	motion to adjourn tonight's meeting?
3	BOARD MEMBER HALL: So moved.
