Chicago Police Board Meeting, held at 3510 South
Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, on the 20th day
of August, A.D., 2015, commencing at the hour of
7:30 p.m.

1 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Good evening. If I could have
2 everyon'es attention, we are going to get started.
3 My name is Lori Lightfoot. I'm the president of the
4 Chicago Police Board. I'm calling the meeting to
5 order. Board member Sweeney is unavailable to
6 attend this meeting in person and wishes to attend
7 via audio conference. Is there a motion to permit
8 him to do so? (Motion, second.) All those in favor
9 say aye. Motion passes.

10 The first item of business is the
11 approval of the minutes of the Board's public
12 meeting of July 16, 2015. Is there a motion to
13 approve the minutes?

14 MS. FRY: So moved.

15 MR. EADDY: Second.

16 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Motion
17 passes. Our next regular public meeting will be on
18 Thursday, September 17th at 7:30 p.m. here at the
19 Chicago Public Safety headquarters. At this time, I
20 ask for a motion to close a series of executive
21 sessions for the purposes of considering litigation
22 and personnel matters as authorized by Sections 2C,
23 1, 3, 4, and 11 of the Illinois Open Meetings Act.
24 Is there such a motion?

1 MS. BALLATE: So moved.

2 MR. CONLON: Second.

3 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor say aye.

4 Motion passes. A report of the disciplinary actions
5 taken by the Board in the previous month appears in
6 the blue books that are available at this evening's
7 meeting. This report and the Board's written
8 findings and decisions are posted on the Board's
9 website. There are no disciplinary cases on the
10 agenda for final action at this evening's meeting.

11 The next item on the agenda, copies of
12 orders issued by the Superintendent of Police during
13 the previous month are listed in the blue books and
14 are available on the Police Department's website.

15 Next item is the Superintendent's report
16 to the Board. I ask for motion to waive the
17 superintendent's oral report received instead in
18 writing. Do I have such a motion?

19 MS. FRY: So moved.

20 MR. EADDY: Second.

21 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor say aye.

22 Motion passes.

23 The next item is a report from Scott
24 Ando, chief administrator of the Independent Police

1 Review Authority.

2 MR. ANDO: Good evening. Just wanted to give
3 you a slight update on the Dante Servin
4 investigation. IPRA recognizes the seriousness of
5 this case, and we have dedicated extra resources to
6 make sure our investigation is completed carefully
7 and thoroughly but also as quickly as possible. As
8 the chief administrator, I'll make every effort
9 possible to have this investigation completed by the
10 next police board meeting, which is
11 September 17, 2015. In the meantime, I want to
12 assure everyone that I and my staff will be working
13 diligently to bring this investigation to a
14 conclusion. Thank you.

15 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Now the next item on our
16 agenda is hearing from members of the public.
17 Before we open the meeting for comment, and because
18 this is my first public meeting as president of the
19 Police Board, I wanted to offer a few words.

20 For those of who don't know me or know
21 much about my background, I come to this important
22 responsibility with experience in virtually every
23 facets of the issues that come before the Police
24 Board. I have spent a significant part of my career

1 investigating police misconduct as a former federal
2 prosecutor and later as the head of the Office of
3 Professional Standards. I have also defended
4 individual police officers in civil and criminal
5 matters as well as represented the city of Chicago
6 in civil cases. These experiences helped me see the
7 nuances as well as challenges and opportunities in
8 addressing the range of issues that frequently bring
9 us together in dialogue.

10 I know that I speak for all members of
11 the Board in saying that we place tremendous value
12 on these meetings. They present important
13 opportunities for us to learn from you as you bring
14 your questions and concerns to the attention of the
15 Superintendent, his command staff, as well as the
16 head of IPRA, as well as the Board. Whether it's an
17 issue on your block, your beat, or an issue beyond
18 your immediate neighborhood, these meetings afford
19 you the chance to be heard. And let me say again,
20 we value hearing from you.

21 We also recognize that some of your
22 concerns will inspire great passion and emotion. We
23 want you to know that we respect those feelings and
24 the perspectives that you bring.

1 These meetings also provide the Police
2 Board with an opportunity to update you on our
3 activities. Any of you who have been here before
4 know that it is at these regularly scheduled
5 meetings that the Board announces for the first time
6 its decisions in cases filed before us. We publicly
7 go on record with not only our decisions, but our
8 individual votes which provides a measure of
9 accountability to you.

10 As we go forward, there may be times when
11 you disagree with our decisions, and of course you
12 have every right to articulate your disagreement
13 within certain bounds of decency. And let me
14 explain what I mean by that. Thank you for the
15 salute. We are all mindful that the issues that the
16 Police Board grapples with and the issues about
17 which you individually and collectively bear witness
18 are being played out against a national conversation
19 about police and community relations. Many of these
20 national story lines have resonance here. We
21 understand that. But it's also important that
22 passion and emotion do not devolve into
23 disrespectful or worse exchanges. There is no place
24 for that here. I caution against personal attacks

1 or trying to shame members of this Board for the
2 decisions we make. We do our best to decide each
3 case fairly based on the record before us. That is
4 what the law requires and that's our duty and we
5 take that duty very seriously.

6 Again, you may disagree with our
7 decisions, but I urge you for the sake of our
8 continued and important dialogue, be respectful. We
9 want to hear from you, but I will not hesitate to
10 take action if the lines of decency are crossed. I
11 hope that will never be necessary. So please, let's
12 engage in a respectful dialogue.

13 We all love our city, and we are all part
14 of an engaged citizenry so let's keep the
15 discussion, both the tone and content, focused on
16 what's important.

17 I will now call upon those members of the
18 public who signed up in advance to speak. When your
19 name is called, please step to the microphone. We
20 ask that you limit your comments to two minutes.
21 The first speaker is Aislinn Sol.

22 MS. SOL: So this is the first time that --
23 the fourth time we have been here before you all as
24 an unelected body demanding that you do your due

1 diligence, which is honor the word and the
2 sentiments of the people to fire Dante Servin.
3 There is no reason that it should have taken three
4 years for a decision to have come out. Now you're
5 telling us that you will have a decision next month?
6 That is unacceptable. What he did was unjustified
7 and it was murder. There is no gray area here. You
8 have a responsibility to the people of Chicago to
9 honor what we've been saying over the past three
10 years. And you're right, this is part of a national
11 conversation. This is part of a national movement
12 to demand that not only are our elected officials
13 but the bodies that are supposedly sworn to serve
14 and protect us, not kill us, and that when they do
15 kill us, that they be held responsible for those
16 killings.

17 There have been multiple conversations
18 around this, multiple ideas thrown around in trying
19 to figure out how to establish system of real
20 accountability within the police department. And
21 you all are supposed to be the system of
22 accountability here in Chicago.

23 You have never held a police officer
24 accountable for an unjustified shooting. History

1 will look upon you all either as proponents of
2 defenders of human rights and of humanity, or as
3 being absolutely complicit in the crimes against
4 humanity that have been waged against the people of
5 Chicago. On May 6, finally after over 20 years of
6 organizing by survivors and attorneys and families,
7 the city of Chicago passed the reparations ordinance
8 for torture survivors. We do have an opportunity to
9 again, lead the country in transforming the systems
10 in place of power regarding police and police
11 accountability. You can either be a part of that or
12 you will be against us.

13 Because next month we may have a thousand
14 people here today. We will have 10,000 people.
15 And if you don't fire him next month, we will come
16 back with 20,000 people, 30,000 people, and 100,000
17 people until we force you to do your responsibility
18 which is to carry out -- carry out the desires of
19 the populous of Chicago. You're not an elected
20 body. You respond directly to the mayor, but we
21 will vote him out, and we will one day establish an
22 elected body that is responsible directly to the
23 people.

24 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up, but I'll let

1 you finish.

2 MS. SOL: Fire Servin.

3 MS. LIGHTFOOT: The next speaker, Anne
4 Morrissy.

5 MS. MORRISSY: Thank you. I've always assumed
6 that most police officers were the good guys but
7 that there were a few bad guys. And I've always
8 assumed that the good guys don't want the bad guys
9 around giving policemen a bad reputation. But here
10 is where it gets a little tricky for me. It has
11 been alleged that Mr. Ando, who's a member of this
12 Police Board and who also heads the IPRA has
13 requested that his investigators change their
14 conclusions from unjustified shootings to justified
15 shootings six times. Three of those shootings
16 resulted in death. That's the number we know of.
17 There are likely more cases in which investigators
18 chose to go along with Mr. Ando's request rather
19 than be fired.

20 In March Mr. Ando changed the IPRA policy
21 so that in case of a disagreement between the
22 investigator and supervisor, the supervisor rules
23 and the investigator's work gets removed from the
24 file. That's a bad policy.

1 And between 2007 and 2013 among the 80
2 officers that Superintendent McCarthy and his
3 predecessor requested to be fired, only 21 were
4 fired by the Board. That leaves 59 still on the
5 payroll. Finally, during this period from 2008 to
6 2014 this City has paid to victims of police
7 misconduct \$344,000,000. \$344,000,000. And this
8 defies logic, millions being paid out year after
9 year to settle allegations against officers who are
10 still on the payroll. I wonder how many of those
11 six justified shootings resulted in multi million
12 dollar pay outs. Mr. Ando, do you know the answer
13 to that question?

14 MR. ANDO: I do not.

15 MS. MORRISSY: I would like to know the answer
16 to that question. Why can't we get rid of bad cops?
17 Whose interest is it to protect bad cops?

18 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up, but I will
19 let you wrap up.

20 MS. MORRISSY: It's not the interest of good
21 cops. It's not in the interest of taxpayers, and
22 it's certainly not in the interest of the black and
23 brown skinned people of this city who are most
24 likely to be a victim. Thank you.

1 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker, Jason Tompkins.

2 MR. TOMPKINS: Good evening. I will be very
3 brief. Like so many people in this room right now,
4 across the county, across this country, let's be
5 honest, all over the planet, I'm really trying to
6 figure out what left there is to investigate. I'm
7 sure all will be revealed within the month. But as
8 I mentioned before you back in May, I just was
9 overlook -- looking over your own rules of conduct,
10 and you know, I just think it's useful for us to
11 keep in mind all of this as we approach some sort of
12 response, accountability, transparency around the
13 investigation into Dante Servin.

14 Your own rules of conduct, Rule 2
15 mentions that prohibited acts include, "any action
16 or conduct that impedes Department efforts to
17 achieve its policies and goals or raise discredit
18 upon the Department." Detective Servin literally
19 has in public face said quote, "I was trying to kill
20 that motherfucker. I wish it was him that I shot in
21 the head instead of your sister. I wish it was him
22 that was dead." And this -- we are talking about a
23 detective who put himself on duty when he identified
24 himself as a detective and was doing the work of a

1 police officer when he exposed his weapon to a group
2 of people after a shift at 1:00 in the morning. So
3 that is one rule.

4 We have I believe Rule 8 that says that,
5 "it is prohibited to disrespect or maltreat any
6 person any persons while on or off duty." We're
7 going to keep it short. And I see Rule 9, it says,
8 "engaging in any unjustified verbal or physical
9 altercation with any person while on or off duty."
10 We aren't even -- we aren't even getting into
11 weapons and whether or not they were registered and
12 things like that. So I'm just going to cut it short
13 and say that, as I'm sure you know, the entire world
14 is watching you again as a set of people that were
15 not elected, that the accountability and the
16 transparency of what you do was in question before
17 you even sat down.

18 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up. Wrap up your
19 time.

20 MR. TOMPKINS: Those who stand before you must
21 hold you accountable to justice. We must demand
22 that you take action to terminate Dante Servin
23 immediately.

24 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker David Rucker.

1 (no response). The next speaker will be Martinez
2 Sutton.

3 MR. SUTTON: Peace everybody. I'm going to
4 start it off like this. For three years my family
5 has been disrespected. Three years. It's been
6 tough. My sister shot in the back of the head. The
7 officer telling me himself face-to-face, "I tried to
8 kill that motherfucker. I wish it was him that was
9 dead instead of your sister" then showed me how he
10 killed my sister. "I shot out like bla bla bla,
11 then I get out, I bla bla, bla. I see your sister
12 dead in the street. Sorry." What type -- then you
13 say it's justified. Justified. Killing a young
14 black woman is justified? No weapon found. You
15 disrespected me, my mother, my whole family. How
16 can you even bring yourself to do that?

17 No respect for humanity. None. I have
18 been patient. I have been harassed by officers
19 everywhere I go. I have been harassed by
20 detectives, "I can't wait to get you nigga." I
21 can't wait to get you in one of our cells," but yet
22 and still, I still stood tall and still stood as the
23 man that I am. All I'm asking is that this officer
24 gets fired. What's so hard about that? Kill my

1 sister in cold blood, cold blood, and then laughs at
2 me about it and tells me, "if this is what you want,
3 a'ight, you asked for it."

4 How can you bring yourself to that? All
5 my mother asked for was an apology, sorry for
6 killing your sister, sorry for killing your
7 daughter. And you said in the news that it should
8 never happen. The officer should never have been
9 charged in the first place. You got the judge
10 saying that if any charges were to be charged, it
11 should have been murder charges. And I got played
12 by the state's attorneys. The state's attorney
13 played with me and my family's emotions the whole
14 time, and all we ask is that you fire this officer.

15 What is so damn hard about that? Would
16 it break down the whole system? Will it make you
17 all look bad? We aren't asking for much. What if
18 it was your daughter or your son? What if it was?

19 The difference between me and the
20 officer, is you all let him walk free for three
21 years, get to go home and enjoy his family. This is
22 what I got. This is what I got. I got a fucking
23 picture on a shirt. This is what I got.

24 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Sutton --

1 MR. SUTTON: No, you listen to me.

2 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.

3 THE CROWD: Let him speak.

4 MR. SUTTON: This is what I got. I got some
5 -- I got some hair. I asked for her stuff back and
6 they gave me her fucking hair. How can you do this
7 to us? How can you do this to us?

8 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All right, sir, I understand
9 you have a lot of emotion, but we are not going do
10 that.

11 MR. SUTTON: No, you listen. This is all I
12 have of her.

13 UNKNOWN WOMAN: Say her name. Say her name.

14 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Calm down. Your time is up.

15 THE CROWD: Say her name.

16 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Everybody sit down.

17 THE CROWD: Will you fire Dante Servin now?

18 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is Angela
19 Helton.

20 UNKNOWN WOMAN: We are gathered here today to
21 declare the illegitimacy of the Chicago Police
22 Board, the Independent Police Review Authority.

23 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am, if you want to speak
24 again, you will keep talking. Otherwise, we will

1 shut this down.

2 UNKNOWN WOMAN: Dante Servin must be fired
3 now. We are committed to the pressing of this
4 Board, City Council, and the mayor until you fire
5 Dante Servin. We know --

6 MS. LIGHTFOOT: If you want to be heard, you
7 will sign up beforehand.

8 UNKNOWN WOMAN: Until you decide to fire Dante
9 Servin with no pension and get some true police
10 accountability and the chief --

11 UNKNOWN MAN: Fire Servin. Fire Servin. Fire
12 Servin. Rekia Boyd's family and community
13 have --

14 MS. LIGHTFOOT: I will entertain a motion at
15 this time to adjourn the meeting. Do I have a
16 second? (Second.) All in favor say aye. Anybody
17 who is not able to speak tonight because of the
18 disruption we will call you next time at the next
19 meeting.
