1 PRESIDENT COOPER: Good evening, everyone.
2 I'm going to now call the Board's August 21st
3 public meeting to order.

4 My name is Kyle Cooper, and I'm the
5 president of the Chicago Police Board.

6 I want to thank CAN-TV for covering
7 this meeting today. It is being live-streamed at
8 CAN-TV.org, and on the CAN-TV app and televised
9 on CAN-TV 27.

10 Along with myself, we have the
11 following Board members in attendance this
12 evening. We have Vice President of the Board Ms.
13 Claudia Badillo, Board Member Tyler Hall, Board
14 Member Kathryn Liss, Board Member Arlette Porter,
15 Board Member Andreas Safakas, and Board Member
16 Cynthia Velazquez, and Board Member Block is
17 unable to attend this meeting. He may be joining
18 us later remotely when he does.

19 In addition to the Police Board
20 members, we have the following City officials
21 with us this evening. We have Chief Angel
22 Novalez for the Superintendent of Police, Mr.
23 Larry Snelling. We have the Interim Chief
24 Administrator for the Civilian Office of Police

1 Accountability, Ms. LaKenya White. We have the
2 Deputy Inspector General for Public Safety Ms.
3 Tobara Richardson. We have Deputy Chief of the
4 Chicago Police Department's Bureau of Internal
5 Affairs Ms. Traci Walker. We have the General
6 Counsel to the Superintendent Scott Spears. And
7 with us, as always, is the Police Board's
8 Executive Director Mr. Max Caproni.

9 We will now proceed to the items on
10 the meeting agenda. Is there a motion to approve
11 the draft minutes of the Board's public and
12 closed meeting held on July 17th?

13 MS. BADILLO: So moved.

14 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

15 PRESIDENT COOPER: All in favor, raise your
16 hand and say aye.

17 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

18 PRESIDENT COOPER: Seeing all hands raised,
19 the motion passes.

20 The next regular meeting of the
21 Chicago Police Board will take place September
22 18th at 7:30 p.m., and that meeting will take
23 place where all the Chicago Police Board meetings
24 take place, which is right here at the Chicago

1 Public Safety Headquarters.

2 The Board meets in executive session
3 to discuss various matters. Those discussions
4 are closed to the public as authorized by Section
5 2(c)(1), (4), (11), and (21) of the Illinois Open
6 Meetings Act. Information on matters discussed
7 in the executive sessions is included in the
8 minutes of the meetings posted on the Board's
9 website.

10 Is there a motion to close a series
11 of future meetings -- future executive sessions
12 as authorized by these sections of the Open
13 Meetings Act?

14 MS. BADILLO: Yes. So moved.

15 BOARD MEMBER LISS: I second.

16 PRESIDENT COOPER: All in favor, raise your
17 hand and say aye.

18 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

19 PRESIDENT COOPER: Seeing all hands raised,
20 the motion passes.

21 The next item on the agenda is
22 police disciplinary cases. This includes taking
23 final action on two matters and then an update on
24 the status of litigation regarding the

1 arbitration of serious cases of police
2 misconduct.

3 The Police Board hears cases when
4 the Superintendent files charges recommending
5 that the sworn officer be discharged from the
6 Chicago Police Department for violating CPD's
7 rules of conduct.

8 The Board, as authorized by the Open
9 Meetings Act, has discussed in a closed meeting
10 two police disciplinary cases. We will now take
11 final action on these cases.

12 Regarding case number 24 PB 3038, is
13 is there a motion to find Police Officer Thomas
14 McNichols not guilty of failing to reside in the
15 City of Chicago?

16 MS. BADILLO: Yes. So moved.

17 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

18 PRESIDENT COOPER: All in favor?

19 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

20 PRESIDENT COOPER: I will now call on the
21 members of the Board for their votes. Board
22 Member Badillo.

23 MS. BADILLO: Aye.

24 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Hall.

1 BOARD MEMBER HALL: Aye.

2 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Liss.

3 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Aye.

4 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Porter.

5 BOARD MEMBER PORTER: Aye.

6 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Safakas.

7 BOARD MEMBER SAFAKAS: Aye.

8 PRESIDENT COOPER: And Board Member

9 Velazquez.

10 BOARD MEMBER VELAZQUEZ: Aye.

11 PRESIDENT COOPER: I also vote in favor of
12 the motion. Voting in favor are Board Members
13 Badillo, Block, Hall, Liss, Porter, Safakas,
14 Velazquez, and myself. The motion passes.

15 Is there a motion to adopt the draft
16 of the written findings and decision that has
17 been reviewed by all Board members who
18 participated in deciding this case?

19 MS. BADILLO: Yes, so moved.

20 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

21 PRESIDENT COOPER: All in favor?

22 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

23 PRESIDENT COOPER: Seeing all hands raised
24 and hearing all ayes, the motion passes. The

1 written findings and decision will be entered as
2 of today's date, sent to the parties, and then
3 promptly posted on the Police Board's website.

4 The next disciplinary case is case
5 number 22 PB 3009-1, which the Board decided in
6 October 2023 regarding Police Officer Armando
7 Ugarte. He filed a second motion requesting that
8 the Board change the date of his reinstatement to
9 the Chicago Police Department. Is there a motion
10 to deny Officer Ugarte's second motion?

11 MS. BADILLO: Yes. So moved.

12 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

13 PRESIDENT COOPER: I will now call on members
14 of the Board for their votes. Board Member
15 Badillo.

16 MS. BADILLO: Aye.

17 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Hall.

18 BOARD MEMBER HALL: Aye.

19 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Liss.

20 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Aye.

21 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Porter.

22 BOARD MEMBER PORTER: Aye.

23 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Safakas.

24 BOARD MEMBER SAFAKAS: Aye.

1 PRESIDENT COOPER: And Board Member
2 Velazquez.

3 BOARD MEMBER VELAZQUEZ: Aye.

4 PRESIDENT COOPER: I also vote in favor of
5 the motion and the motion passes.

6 A written order will be entered as
7 of today's date, sent to the parties, and then
8 promptly posted on the Police Board's website.

9 I will now provide an update on the
10 status of litigation on the arbitration of police
11 disciplinary cases.

12 As some of you may know, on August
13 8th, the Illinois Appellate Court affirmed the
14 Circuit Court's ruling that arbitration
15 proceedings of the most serious cases of police
16 misconduct must be open to the public. This
17 decision is a victory for both the residents of
18 Chicago and the hard-working members of the
19 Chicago Police Department. Full public access to
20 these hearings and decisions is essential for
21 ensuring accountability and increasing the
22 community's trust in the Chicago Police
23 Department and its officers. Transparency not
24 only reassures the public that alleged misconduct

1 is addressed fairly and consistently, but it also
2 protects the vast majority of the Chicago police
3 officers who serve honorably by making clear the
4 difference between those who uphold the law and
5 those who violate it.

6 While this part of the decision
7 received the most attention, I want to alert the
8 public to the second part of the Appellate
9 Court's decision. The second part of the
10 Appellate Court's decision involves a ruling in
11 which the Court ruled in favor of the Fraternal
12 Order of Police by striking down the
13 long-standing practice of allowing CPD to suspend
14 officers without pay while the charges are
15 brought and while cases are pending.

16 The parties now have 35 days from
17 August 8th, which is until September 12th, to
18 attempt to appeal this decision to the Illinois
19 Supreme Court in the form of filing a petition
20 for leave.

21 If a petition for leave to appeal is
22 filed, it likely will not be ruled upon for
23 several months; therefore, it might be some time
24 before this litigation is concluded and an

1 arbitration process that is agreed to by the
2 parties is fully resolved.

3 Then, once a process is in place,
4 there may be a backlog of cases to be heard as
5 all discharge cases in which the accused officer
6 has elected arbitration -- there's about 20 of
7 those cases right now -- have been on hold for
8 about a year and a half.

9 As I have, and I will continue to
10 do, I encourage officers facing instances and
11 violations or allegations of police misconduct
12 to have their cases heard by the Board rather
13 than waiting an indefinite period of time before
14 an arbitration process is set up.

15 As I repeatedly stated, the Board,
16 as evidenced by its decisions this year I think
17 makes clear, is committed to ensuring that
18 officers face a fair and public hearing in front
19 of their fellow Chicago citizens.

20 We at the Police Board will continue
21 to keep the public informed of any new
22 developments in the litigation and of the status
23 of the current disciplinary cases pending before
24 the Board. And I encourage you all to check out

1 the news and discipline section of our website
2 which is Chicago.gov/PoliceBoard for the most
3 current information.

4 The next item on the agenda is
5 appeals. When a person who applies to become a
6 Chicago police officer is disqualified or removed
7 from the eligibility list due to the results of a
8 background investigation, that individual has a
9 right to appeal that decision to the Police
10 Board.

11 The Board, as authorized by the Open
12 Meetings Act, has discussed in a closed meeting
13 one appeal. We will now take final action on
14 this appeal. Is there a motion to reverse the
15 disqualification decision for the following
16 appeal 25 AA 07?

17 MS. BADILLO: Yes. So moved.

18 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

19 PRESIDENT COOPER: I will now call on the
20 members of the Board for their vote.
21 Vice-president Badillo.

22 VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Aye.

23 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Hall.

24 BOARD MEMBER HALL: Aye.

1 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Liss.

2 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Aye.

3 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Porter.

4 BOARD MEMBER PORTER: Aye.

5 PRESIDENT COOPER: Board Member Safakas.

6 BOARD MEMBER SAFAKAS: Aye.

7 PRESIDENT COOPER: And Board Member
8 Velazquez.

9 BOARD MEMBER VELAZQUEZ: Aye.

10 PRESIDENT COOPER: I also vote in favor of
11 the motion. The motion passes. The written
12 decisions of these appeals will be entered as of
13 today's date, sent to the parties, and promptly
14 posted on the Police Board's website.

15 The next item on the agenda is
16 Superintendent's request for the Board's
17 authorization to solicit funds to cover the cost
18 of hosting the CPD's annual Police Recognition
19 Ceremony and luncheon in May 2026.

20 Is there a motion to approve the
21 Superintendent's request?

22 VICE PRESIDENT BADILLO: Yes. So moved.

23 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

24 PRESIDENT COOPER: All in favor, raise your

1 hands and say aye.

2 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

3 PRESIDENT COOPER: I also vote in favor of
4 the motion, and the motion passes.

5 At this time, I would like to call
6 on Chief Novalez to give the Superintendent's
7 report.

8 CHIEF NOVALEZ: Thank you very much. Good
9 evening, everyone. My name is Chief Novalez with
10 the Chicago Police Department, and I'm honored to
11 be here on behalf of Superintendent Larry
12 Snelling.

13 And as always, I will take copious
14 notes and ensure I share it with the
15 Superintendent upon his return.

16 This month, we continued to secure
17 multiple large events like Lollapalooza, Fiesta
18 del Sol, the Air and Water Show, and Bud
19 Billiken. Thousands of residents and visitors
20 were in attendance in these events and our
21 Chicago police officers were visible and present
22 throughout each of these events maintaining
23 public safety.

24 I want to thank the officers who

1 worked canceled days off to ensure these large
2 events, as well as the officers who continued to
3 work citywide to protect our neighborhoods. They
4 missed personal events and family functions
5 because they understand how important it is to
6 keep our City safe.

7 As part of our ongoing efforts to
8 strengthen trust with the community, CPD hosted
9 national night-out engagements across Chicago
10 earlier this month.

11 Each of our districts hosted
12 engagements that brought together officers,
13 community members, families, children for a safe
14 and fun night of food and games.

15 In addition, since January 2025,
16 CPD has brought into their community engagement
17 management system 9,824 community engagements.
18 5,251 of these gave folks the opportunity to
19 connect with police and work together to keep
20 their community safe.

21 We also continue to reduce crime
22 and make Chicago a city safe for all.

23 So far this year, homicides are
24 down 32 percent, shooting victims are down 37

1 percent, and shooting incidents are down 37
2 percent.

3 In our drive to increase compliance
4 with the City's Consent Decree, CPD has posted
5 three policies for public comment. Important
6 policies pertaining to protection of human
7 rights. This policy closes on September 22,
8 2025. Prohibitions regarding racial profiling
9 and other biased-based policing, that policy
10 comment period closes September 22, 2025.

11 De-escalation in response to resistance and use
12 of force, that policy will be closing September
13 26, 2025. CPD invites everyone here tonight
14 watching at home to log on to
15 WWW.ChicagoPolice.org/transform, review the
16 policies, provide your feedback.

17 This is every Chicagoan's police
18 department and your input is important.

19 In closing, as summer begins to
20 wind down and our youth begin a new school year,
21 we will continue to do everything we can to
22 protect the kids and the people in the City of
23 Chicago. Thank you very much.

24 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you, Chief Novalez.

1 I would like to call on Chief Administrator White
2 to give her report.

3 CHIEF ADMINISTRATOR WHITE: Thank you. Good
4 evening, everyone. So I have some data from
5 July. So in July of 2025, we registered 622
6 complaints and notifications. Of those 622
7 complaints, 77 were retained by COPA because it
8 fell under our jurisdiction.

9 In July, we did one video release.
10 COPA released video and other materials from the
11 fatal officer-involved shooting near 4300 West
12 North Avenue.

13 COPA also attended 26 community
14 engagement events, and I just want to highlight
15 some of those events that we attended. The
16 Budget Engagement Round Tables, the third series,
17 which was at Kennedy King College, the Youth
18 Budget Engagement Round Tables, My Chi, My
19 Future, Take Back the Block, Aldermen in the
20 Park, and CPS Back to School Bash.

21 We also attended the National Night
22 Out this month for the police districts which was
23 the 7th, the 11th, and 14th District.

24 I'm excited to announce session 5

1 of COPA'S Peoples Academy which will begin next
2 month starting September 23rd, 2025, through
3 October 28th, 2025. It will be on Tuesdays from
4 6:00 to 8:30 p.m. at Kennedy King College. This
5 will be an in-person session only. This six-week
6 condensed version of COPA's training academy is
7 for the public, civilian or sworn, and
8 organizations around the country interested in
9 learning about civilian police oversight,
10 investigative and legal concepts, as well as the
11 role of COPA's Policy, Research, and Analysis
12 Division. That's our PRAD division. Each course
13 will be taught by COPA subject matter experts.
14 If you would like to sign up or learn more,
15 please visit us at ChicagoCOPA.org, and we also
16 have some cards here on the table for you to
17 take. Thank you very much.

18 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you, Chief
19 Administrator White.

20 At this time, I will now call upon
21 the members of public who have signed in advance
22 to speak. And to make sure that everybody who
23 has signed up to speak gets a turn at the
24 lectern, I would just ask that you limit your

1 comments to two minutes.

2 The first person who signed up to
3 speak is T.C. McCoy the Second.

4 MR. MCCOY: Good evening, ladies and
5 gentlemen. My name is T.C. McCoy the Second. I
6 was a Chicago police officer for 28 and a half
7 years. I was here last month. I was a Cook
8 County Sheriff for five and a half years before
9 that. I come here to say this to you. For 30
10 years, I've been working on an investigation. I
11 want this officer to stand up, please, again.
12 Officer Edward Jackson, Junior, better known as
13 Pacman, was sentenced to the penitentiary for 115
14 years for a crime he didn't commit.

15 I want this officer to stand up.
16 This is Officer Gregory Crittleton. They sent
17 him to the penitentiary for 12 years for a crime
18 he didn't commit.

19 When people talk about you and brag
20 about you, they call that praise. When you brag
21 about yourself, they call that boasting.

22 Commander O'Shield started
23 community policing in 1988 on the west side of
24 Chicago. He went to Washington, DC, and he told

1 the president of the United States about me and
2 my partner Jerry Saffold, Howard Saffold's
3 brother. The president of the United States made
4 a trip from 1700 Pennsylvania Avenue to come to
5 the west side to meet with me and Jerry Saffold.
6 I was on the front page of the Chicago Tribune,
7 and he came close to me. I'm carrying a .357
8 revolver. The most powerful man in the world,
9 and he stopped and talked to me for five minutes
10 inside the station because the commander told him
11 we went from the second worst crime district to
12 the third most livable district in the City of
13 Chicago. Check your records.

14 Right after that, less than a week
15 after that, Chicago Police Department promoted
16 this gentleman right here, his name is Michael W.
17 Hoke, and made him Deputy Superintendent of
18 Internal Affairs. This is Jon Burge's first
19 partner. He came up with a scheme to frame me
20 and my officers for doing a good job.

21 I just made 75 on August the 11th
22 this month, and you can't find one person in the
23 City of Chicago in 75 years to say a big boss
24 stole anything from them. He came up with a

1 scheme, like I told you last month, and what he
2 did was he gave an undercover car, this car right
3 here, to a criminal that they hired to go take to
4 another lawbreaker who looked like me.

5 I'm going to be here every month
6 until we get this thing adjudicated. I'm not
7 going nowhere.

8 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you, Mr. McCoy.
9 Appreciate your time.

10 The next person who signed up to
11 speak is Talia Janjua. Is Talia in the audience?

12 If not, the next person is Linko
13 Perry.

14 MR. PERRY: I relinquish my time to McCoy.

15 PRESIDENT COOPER: Okay. Two minutes.

16 MR. MCCOY: That's my police partner, Linko
17 Perry. All-American high school basketball
18 player at Marshall High School in the '60s.

19 He also, some feel, gave this car
20 right here, this Chevrolet -- this was Michael
21 Hoke's car. He gave it to a police agent named
22 Herbert Brown, Junior, who looked just like
23 Officer Jackson here. If you seen him walk the
24 down the street, you'd think they were identical

1 twins, and they robbed an FBI agent. They framed
2 this officer right here for saying that he was
3 the driver of the car. And anybody on this
4 planet can tell you you cannot be at two
5 different places at the same time.

6 He was at 26th and California in a
7 trial at the same time that he supposed to been
8 at 5721 West Bloomingdale.

9 Chicago Police Department made us
10 go through hell to get on the police job.

11 This gentleman right here was
12 tortured at the MCC for 39 months. He was put in
13 solitary confinement because he wouldn't lie on
14 me and Jerry Saffold and other members of my
15 team.

16 This officer right here was put in
17 solitary confinement for 29 months -- 33 months
18 because he wouldn't lie on me and Jerry Saffold.

19 You can look at me like I got two
20 heads. I'm bringing it to you. Pretty soon, I'm
21 going to take it to the world.

22 I see Alderman Moore over there.
23 He was on a radio show that I was co-host, and we
24 had 10 million listeners. It was called The Butt

1 Naked Truth Show. He will tell you, my voice
2 goes all over this country.

3 This gentleman right here tried to
4 tell you all, you came at me, that was the worst
5 thing you ever did in your life. I don't care.
6 When you go on the west side of Chicago, you ask
7 those lawbreakers about me. You say, Hey, do you
8 know that guy T.C. McCoy and Jerry Saffold? They
9 will tell you, Mess with them if you want to.

10 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you, Mr. McCoy.

11 MR. MCCOY: Real quick, and I will finish up.

12 My second oldest brother was in Air
13 Force intelligence in Vietnam, and he did all
14 kinds of work all over the country for the
15 government, and he instilled in me one thing, and
16 every officer in here who get any kind of work on
17 the street will tell you this, the worst person
18 to ever meet on the street is that person that
19 don't care about living. You destroyed my life.

20 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you, Mr. McCoy.

21 MR. MCCOY: I will be back next month.

22 PRESIDENT COOPER: The next person who signed
23 up to speak is Ms. Helen Henning.

24 MS. HENNING: Good evening. My name is Helen

1 Henning. I've been coming here off and on for
2 many years and the staff has changed. I have
3 been a victim of organized crime, stalking, and
4 police misconduct. I was awarded -- I was
5 awarded \$10 million, and I went through the U.S.
6 District Attorney's Office at 219 South Dearborn
7 on the fifth floor, which I was there earlier
8 today.

9 This started around 2003 and 2004
10 when Dana -- well, later the Phil Kline and Dana
11 Starks were there. The administration and the
12 staff has changed multiple times. But, anyway,
13 my money was stolen, given out through police and
14 FBI agents working together, which was a ring of
15 them together. They have put multiple murder
16 contracts on my life. I have a task force to
17 follow me around and keep me safe. My brother
18 was also second deputy on the Chicago Police
19 Department -- he retired now -- under Leroy
20 Martin.

21 I moved to Naperville. They came
22 out there. They put me on high alert as a
23 threat. I've been -- even last week, I've had
24 these murder attempts on my life, but I have a

1 task force.

2 I live in a senior building, and
3 they old gangsters, and they say they not in the
4 mob, but they are, because the reports come back
5 that they are. They're constantly harassing me
6 in the building. I have police reports -- I have
7 the police reports, and this is one particular
8 person named John Williams, and they traced
9 through Faith Henderson which she jumped up and
10 moved. They traced the police through her phone.
11 So every time I go somewhere, they follow me
12 around. I don't care what state, what
13 jurisdiction where I live at, it's the same thing
14 but a different set of police and a different set
15 of people.

16 I can't understand why I can't get
17 to the bottom of this, and somebody can contact
18 me and tell me where to come when I filed these
19 complaints, but these people find out all my
20 personal business, and it's me who is going
21 through this.

22 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you for coming, Ms.
23 Henning. If you stick around, at the end of the
24 meeting, I'm sure one of the uniformed officers

1 will be happy to speak with you about what's
2 going on this evening.

3 MS. HENNING: Thank you.

4 PRESIDENT COOPER: You're welcome.

5 The next person who signed up to
6 speak is Jay Starks.

7 MR. STARKS: Hello. I'm Jay Starks. I
8 reside in the 2nd Police District, and I'm here
9 to add my voice to the mass of community voices
10 and other District Council members and calling
11 for a vote of no confidence on Commander John
12 Foster who's faced over 60 civilian complaints,
13 as well as involvement in coercing false
14 statements leading to wrongful convictions and
15 also calling for the investigation and
16 prosecution of Sergeant Brian Forberg for a
17 pattern of witness coercion and evidence
18 tampering leading to nearly 20 wrong convictions.

19 If we are really serious about
20 increasing trust between the public and the
21 Police Department, then all police involved in
22 crimes should be publicly outed and prosecuted.
23 That completes my statement.

24 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you, Mr. Starks.

1 The next individual who signed up to
2 speak is Isabel Senechalle. Is Isabel here?

3 Ray legg is the next individual who
4 signed up to speak.

5 Ms. Edwards, I guess you're next
6 then.

7 MS. EDWARDS: Ms. LaKenya, I told you I would
8 have something for you the next time I came. I'm
9 concerned about the sworn affidavits not being
10 used when people come in to complain about the --
11 I talked with four CR sergeants, two in Area 1,
12 two in Area 2 that take the complaints when
13 people come in, and because of the Safety Act,
14 that has been not allowed.

15 I think that's a problem for me and
16 for community members. If you are going to come
17 in and complain about someone, and I think you
18 should be willing to swear that you're telling
19 the truth.

20 So we'll continue to look into
21 this, and we will look at our elected officials
22 who put the Safety Act together, because there
23 are some things that we feel affect our community
24 in the wrong way, but I wanted to mention it to

1 you, as I told you I was going to have something
2 for you.

3 You come up with a lot of
4 complaints that you say you solve, and I wonder
5 would they be the same if people were swearing
6 that they were telling the truth? Okay.

7 I also when I took the COPA class a
8 few years ago, I suggested that since they had so
9 many people coming and complaining, involve
10 community members in when they come in for those
11 complaints, and Ms. Kersten did not accept that,
12 but since we're trying to involve the community
13 and the police, I think that that is something
14 you should consider.

15 So the sworn affidavits, I think
16 they should be used again like they used to be.
17 That's all I have to say. Thank you.

18 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you as always, Ms.
19 Edwards.

20 And the last individual who signed
21 up to speak is Pastor Doyle.

22 PASTOR DOYLE: Good evening, Board President
23 and Board. And what would you do if I walked
24 over here right now and slapped the Board

1 president? Yes, this is a different type of
2 presentation tonight, because you'd go, "What
3 brought that on" and you'd arrest me, correct?

4 So where is the accountability from
5 all of the miscreants on the west side who caused
6 all of that damage within the last month at 1:00,
7 2:00, 3:00 o'clock in the morning? Just saying
8 that, because, again, we play favorites, meaning
9 we charge adults for being violent, but for those
10 of us who look like me who are younger than 18,
11 they give a pass. What's wrong with that?

12 So I just want to give you
13 something to think about since school is in
14 session, and it's an opportunity to go straight
15 to the perpetrators who did that on the west side
16 in the last month and ask them a direct question,
17 what do -- what needs to happen in your house,
18 since you don't pay rent, what needs to happen in
19 your life, since you obviously don't read, to
20 change up so that you're not destructive ever?
21 Because, again, you can't fix what you won't
22 face. And I think it's abysmal with a mayor on
23 the west side that has no direct comment about
24 what happened.

1 At the end of the day, are we going
2 to continue to bury officers? Are we going to
3 continue to bury loved ones? Are we going to
4 continue to act in ignorance? Or are we going to
5 be accountable across the board? Because, again,
6 I like Attorney Cooper, and I think that would be
7 out of the norm if I walked over and slapped him.
8 But since the school year has started, it happens
9 in every school every day to teachers, every day
10 to support staff, and majority of the miscreants
11 look like me. Thank you.

12 PRESIDENT COOPER: Thank you, Pastor Doyle.

13 At this time, all the members of the
14 public who have signed up to speak have spoken.
15 I'm now calling the public meeting in August to a
16 close.

17 Before we adjourn, Board Member
18 Block has joined us on the phone. Is there a
19 motion to permit his remote appearance?

20 MS. BADILLO: Yes. So moved.

21 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

22 PRESIDENT COOPER: All in favor?

23 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

24 PRESIDENT COOPER: And with that, is there a

1 motion to adjourn tonight's meeting?

2 MS. BADILLO: Yes. I move to adjourn.

3 BOARD MEMBER LISS: Second.

4 PRESIDENT COOPER: All in favor?

5 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

6 PRESIDENT COOPER: This meeting has been
7 concluded.

8 (The proceedings were
9 adjourned at 8:03 p.m.)

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
