PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: We're going to get 1 2 started. My name is Lori Lightfoot. I am 3 President of the Chicago Police Board. I am 4 calling the meeting to order. 5 Board Member Delgado is unable to 6 attend this meeting in person. Is there a 7 motion to attend via audio conference? 8 VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: So moved. 9 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second. PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor? 10 11 (Chorus of Ayes.) 12 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? 13 (No Response.) 14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Motion passes. 15 First item of business is approval of the minutes of the Board's regular 16 public meeting on September 18th. 17 18 Is there a motion to approve the 19 minutes? 20 VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: So moved. 21 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second. 22 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor? 23 (Chorus of Ayes.) 24 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?

1 (No Response.) 2 BOARD MEMBER DELGADO: Aye. 3 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Motion passes. 4 Our next regular public meeting 5 will be on Thursday, November 16th, at 7:30 p.m. here at Chicago Public Safety 6 7 Headquarters. At this time, I ask for a motion 8 9 to close the series of executives sessions for 10 the purposes of considering personnel matters 11 and litigation as authorized by Sections 12 2(c)(1), (3)(4) and (11) of the Illinois Open 13 Meetings Act. Is there such a motion? 14 15 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: So moved. 16 VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Second. 17 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor? 18 (Chorus of Ayes.) 19 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed? 20 (No Response.) 21 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Motion passes. 22 A report of disciplinary actions 23 taken by the Board during the previous month 24 has been made available at this evening's

1 meeting. This report and the Board's written 2 Findings and Decisions are posted on the 3 Board's Website. 4 The general orders and other 5 directives issued by the Superintendent of Police during this previous month are listed in 6 7 the books made available at this evening's 8 meeting and also posted on the Police 9 Department's website. First Deputy Navarro, do you have 10 11 a report? 12 FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: Yes. First off, I wanted to thank everybody for 13 14 attending the meeting. 15 The last two years, CPD has began focusing our efforts to be a better agency for 16 both the public, you, and our officers. 17 18 We've made a lot of progress, but 19 the challenges won't occur overnight. Can't fix the Department overnight. We realize that. 20 21 The Superintendent has made it 22 quite clear that it's very important that we 23 get it done right, not quickly. 24 A couple of highlights: Our new

use-of-force policy went into effect a few days 1 2 ago. Of course, as everybody knows, this is the first use-of-force policy where we had 3 public input, and we appreciate that, first 4 5 time ever. 6 The use-of-force policy focuses 7 on the sanctity of life and deescalation. So we want officers to look at that. 8 9 We also want officers to be trained on this use-of-force policy every year. 10 11 That hasn't been done before. So officers will be trained on 12 13 the proper use of force every year. 14 By the end of the year, every 15 officer on patrol will have a body camera and a 16 Taser. 17 We want to make sure that the 18 transparency is there. And with the use of 19 body cameras, we think that will happen. 20 We're working to spread community 21 policing throughout the Department. 22 As the Superintendent has said 23 before, community policing is not a unit in the 24 Police Department, it's a philosophy. We want

1 our officers to get out of the cars and talk 2 and mingle and interact with the citizens. 3 Officers in the academy are now 4 given cultural sensitivity training at the 5 DuSable Museum. That's something new that we've done for a few months now. 6 And 7 additional resources will be coming for 8 community policing as the Mayor has announced 9 from the budget. We've also taken recommendations 10 11 from the Advisory Panel with public input coming soon. So we'll be looking forward to 12 13 that. 14 We had made a recent personnel 15 change recently. Dwayne Betts, the former commander of the 15th District, is now the new 16 deputy chief of the CAPS program. 17 18 Dwayne, if you can stand up, 19 please, and be recognized. Thank you. 20 Something unique. We're working 21 with the Attorney General, the Illinois 22 Attorney General, on the next steps in the 23 consent decree process. 24 So those are some of our

1 highlights.

2 Once, again, thank you all for 3 being here. We appreciate it. 4 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, First 5 Deputy Navarro. 6 Before we open it up to comments 7 from members of the public who signed up in 8 advance to speak, I want to note two things. 9 We obviously have a number of speakers that have signed up tonight, which is, I think, a 10 11 good thing. Encouraging that citizens from all 12 corners of our City come to share information, to give information. But I think -- I want to 13 14 emphasize it's important that we are respectful 15 to each other. These are tense, difficult times. We're all aware of that. We know 16 there's a lot of anger and frustration on the 17 18 part of folks who have had different kinds of 19 experiences with policing. And we certainly encourage people to give a voice to their 20 21 concerns and interests. 22 But I want to also make sure that 23 everybody who has signed up to speak has the 24 opportunity to do so.

1	So that's why we have people sign
2	up in advance. That's why we respectfully have
3	time limits on the amount of time people speak.
4	We want to make sure we're all considerate to
5	each other, because no voice is more important,
6	no voice should be louder than anybody else.
7	We want to make sure we give everybody the
8	opportunity to come and share whatever it is
9	that they want to share.
10	The other thing that I want to
11	say is that we all blindfolded of the fact that
12	we are on the eve of an important milestone in
13	the civic life of our history, and that, of
14	course, is the untimely death of the Laquan
15	McDonald.
16	That young man's death, the
17	circumstances in which he died, the
18	circumstances under which the fact of his death
19	came to public view, including the videotape,
20	profoundly affected all of us, is something
21	that is important in the City's history, and I
22	think has bent the arc of justice in ways that
23	are important. And that progress has to be
24	made on a number of different fronts, and that

1	will be the way in which we take advantage of
2	the opportunities, frankly, that this moment
3	presents to us and be part of the legacy we
4	leave for him and his family.
5	So I want to take that moment to
6	make sure that if everything that we do, we are
7	respectful of that life lost, as the lives of
8	others that have been lost that many of you
9	have come to speak about to us at our various
10	meetings, particularly the last couple
11	meetings.
12	Now, with that, I will start to
13	call members of the public who have signed up
14	in advance to speak.
15	Obviously, when your name is
16	called, please step up to the microphone. As
17	we always say, try to keep your comments
18	limited to two minutes in deference to the
19	other people that will be coming after you.
20	The first speaker is Linda
21	Fields. Ms. Fields, are you here? Linda
22	Fields.
23	Next speaker is Jacqueline
24	McCowan. Ms. McCowan, are you here?

1 Next speaker is Pat Pearson. Pat 2 Pearson, are you here? 3 Next speaker is Jeffrie Baker. 4 Mr. Baker, please come forward. 5 MR. BAKER: Hello. 6 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good evening, sir. 7 MR. BAKER: Hi. Thank you for the 8 opportunity to speak, address this unelected, 9 undemocratic and ultimately unaccountable 10 forum, which we the people exercise no control 11 over. 12 My name is Jeffrie Baker. I'm with the Chicago Alliance Against Racism and 13 14 Political Repression. 15 We are here to speak out and say 16 that Laquan's murder was not an isolated event. 17 On the three-year anniversary of 18 his execution, we are here to say enough is 19 enough. 20 Too many young men of color in 21 this City have been murdered, tortured and 22 framed by the Jason Van Dykes, the Jon Burges, 23 and the Reynaldo Guev -- Guevara, sorry, of the 24 Chicago Police Department.

1	We had the Illinois Commission on
2	Torture, the Department of Justice
3	investigation, IPRA, and now COPA. All have
4	been by and large ineffective.
5	Our communities are still
6	unfairly, unlawfully and systematically
7	subjected to harassment, obstruction,
8	imprisonment, torture and murder. Nothing has
9	changed.
10	The system that paid Jason Van
11	Dyke for 400 days after he murdered Laquan
12	McDonald is still in place.
13	Nothing has changed because the
14	police remain beyond reach of democracy.
15	Nothing has changed because the
16	people of Chicago still have no power over the
17	police who operate in our communities and who
18	kill in our name.
19	These wrongs will continue until
20	the Chicago Police Department comes under
21	community control.
22	We demand a fully elected,
23	democratically governed, all-civilian police
24	accountability board with the power to fire

police officers and hire the police 1 superintendent. 2 3 We demand CPAC, the Civilian 4 Police Accountability Council, to become law of 5 the land once and for all 6 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you. 7 Next speaker is Kimberly Veal. 8 Ms. Veal, are you here? 9 Next speaker is Joseph D'Antonio. 10 Mr. D'Antonio. 11 MR. D'ANTONIO: My name is Josh D'Antonio. 12 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sorry. I misspoke, 13 Josh. Good evening, sir. 14 MR. D'ANTONIO: My name is Josh D'Antonio, 15 and I am with the Alliance Against Political Racism and Political Repression. 16 17 I want to thank you for letting 18 me speak this evening. I am very disappointed 19 that this Board is still unelected. And I'm also very skeptical whether or not my words 20 21 will make any sort of a difference here, 22 because I and the community have no say, no 23 real voice in this process and with the Chicago 24 Police Department, and we want one.

1 We're here to demand justice for 2 Laguan McDonald and for everyone else who's been a victim of the Chicago Police Department. 3 4 We demand justice and conviction 5 of Jason Van Dyke. 6 We demand justice to correct the 7 long history of wrongs perpetrated by the 8 Chicago Police Department, and these wrongs 9 will continue until the CPD comes under community control and democratic process. 10 11 We demand fully elected, democratically governed, all-civilian police 12 13 accountability board with the power to fire 14 police officers and hire the police 15 superintendent. We demand CPAC, the Civilian 16 Police Accountability Council, to become the 17 18 law of the land once and for all. Thank you. 19 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir. 20 Our next speaker is Pierre 21 Glover. Mr. Glover, are you here? 22 Our next speaker is Serethea 23 Reid. 24 MS. REID: Good evening. I'm an Austin

1	resident, and I would appreciate it if you
2	would summarize my statements as related to the
3	effective community policing does not have the
4	full commitment of the Police Department.
5	To be effective, the performance
6	management process for police officers must be
7	firmly tied to the Department's strategy
8	objectives. That set of objectives must
9	reflect those metrics that the members of our
10	society view as important; that really dictate
11	to us or mean to us in terms of what we feel
12	means safety to us.
13	In our community, the widely held
14	view is community policing is a failure.
15	Residents do not have a system of safety. They
16	don't know their beat officers. They have no
17	sense of confidence that attendance at a CAPS
18	meeting will result in meaningful, lasting,
19	positive change.
20	In fact, they are fearful. I
21	spent about four hours this week alone
<u>4</u> 1	
22	listening to residents who called me to talk
	listening to residents who called me to talk about their frustration, lack of comfort in

1 their block.

2 They feel that when they say 3 things, it comes back, and they're tormented by 4 the gang-bangers, the people committing the violence in their communities. 5 6 The current policing system 7 appears to transfer most of the responsibility 8 for the quality of this fractured relationship 9 on the people that it serves. Residents in distressed 10 11 communities like Austin feel that they are 12 running hard on a treadmill trying to close the 13 gap to reach a basic sense of security which is held out of our reach. 14 15 Residents of the most distressed communities like Austin, which have suffered 16 from long-term disinvestment, feel that there 17 18 is a highly unreasonable requirement for 19 personal commitment towards achieving a sense 20 of security. 21 They must employ a greater 22 percentage of their human and personal capital 23 that is required from Chicago communities that 24 enjoy the majority of the City's investments.

1 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, Ms. Reid. 2 Mr. Reid, are you also going to 3 speak? 4 Our next speaker is Ronald Reid. 5 MR. REID: Good evening. I'm Ron Reid, 6 also with the Central Austin Neighborhood 7 Association. 8 We were last here February 16th 9 asking for your help. We had to return because 10 little has changed. In fact, things are worse. 11 We've experienced two shootings 12 and murders this past Monday on North Mason, 13 the 200 block of North Mason, within eyeshot of 14 our home. 15 Once again, we feel we've done everything we could possibly do to get CPD to 16 17 clean up the open drug market and as a result 18 resulting violence in our community. 19 On our way to the meeting 20 tonight, we passed through a block of drug dealers and gang-bangers a block from the 21 22 murders that happened earlier in the week. 23 These shootings and murders have 24 little bearing on cleaning up drug sources and

1 much violence.

2	Almost every weekend we hear
3	gunfire. I personally made numerous 911 calls.
4	I called the 15th District tactical office. We
5	appealed directly to the 15th District
6	commander, prior commander. We attended CAPS
7	meetings, we did phone trees, we organized a
8	block, 16 blocks, we did Quality of Life Unit,
9	planned parties, did trips to concerts, ballet,
10	we planted flowers on 23 corners, we held
11	meetings with principals for the past six
12	years, we worked with the ACLU to improve our
13	safety, even volunteered with the Explorers
14	Program of the 15th, we provided police
15	management with the addresses of the same drug
16	houses, open-market locations for the past six
17	years. Why do you allow this to continue?
18	Those who draw paychecks on the
19	backs of poor Austin residents and provide
20	little service and ignoring this travesty
21	should be ashamed.
22	Those who promote officers up,
23	individuals who have failed to have an impact
24	upon these problems in the community, should

1 also be ashamed.

2 Once again, who do we go to for relief and accountability? 3 4 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: First Deputy 5 Navarro, the Reids have been here, as Mr. Reid 6 indicated, several times asking for specific 7 interventions in their neighborhood. 8 I wonder if you could speak with 9 him directly. FIRST DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT NAVARRO: 10 Ι 11 will do that after the meeting, no problem. 12 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: I appreciate that. 13 Our next speaker is Jeff Baker. Jeff Baker here? 14 15 Our next speaker is Gabriel 16 Montero. Mr. Montero, are you here? MR. MONTERO: Yes. Thank you for the 17 18 opportunity. 19 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good evening. MR. MONTERO: My name is Gabriel Montero. 20 21 I'm also with the Chicago Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression. 22 23 I'm also here to speak out on the 24 third anniversary of the execution of Laquan

1 McDonald to say enough is enough.

2	We know nothing has changed since
3	Laquan was executed. We know nothing has
4	changed because the police remain beyond
5	democracy's reach, and we are here to demand
6	change. We're here to demand, once again, a
7	fully elected, democratically governed,
8	all-civilian police accountability board with
9	the power to fire police officers and hire a
10	police superintendent, and we demand that CPAC,
11	Civilian Police Accountability Council, become
12	the law of the land.
13	We demand CPAC now as the only
14	solution to ending the murder, coverup,
15	miscarriage of justice committed by the CPD.
16	The members of the communities all over the
17	Chicago, we say no to police brutality and
18	oppression. We say no to IPRA, no to COPA, no
19	to any unelected political police oversight
20	board. We say yes to full democracy, yes to
21	elected community control of the police, yes to
22	CPAC. Justice for Laquan and justice for all
23	communities in Chicago. Thank you.
24	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir.

1 Our next speaker is Nataki 2 Rhodes. Ms. Rhodes. 3 MS. RHODES: Thank you for the opportunity 4 for letting me address this unelected, 5 undemocratic, ultimately unaccountable board, which we, the people, exercise no control over. 6 7 Now, you say that this is a 8 profound day for you all. It can't be 9 possible, because just earlier this year, you allowed four police officers to come back to 10 11 work that was involved in Laquan McDonald. You 12 all, the Board, continues to cover up all the 13 way up to Rahm Emanuel. You all allow four 14 officers to come back from suspension and to 15 come back to desk duty. We, the people, do not want them 16 17 to be at desk duty. We, the people, do not 18 want them to collect benefits. We, the people, 19 want for you to start the process of firing. Rahm Emanuel must start the process of firing 20 21 Jason Van Dyke, the four officers, plus the 22 fifth officer. You all have heard the tape. 23 Lori lightfoot, if you are really profound, 24 show justice. Show us justice.

1	I'm not here to ask you. We are
2	demanding. In 2019, you all will not exist,
3	because our voice will count in 2019.
4	So you can sit there in your
5	pretty suits, you can sit there with your high
6	attitude and look down on us, but in 2019 we're
7	going to show up, we're going to show out,
8	because you allow four officers nobody in
9	here that killed somebody can come back to work
10	and do paperwork who have already covered up
11	paperwork. The FOP is a gang. The Chicago
12	Police is a gang, because you all exercise
13	power over the people through the Board,
14	through the mayor and through Eddie Johnson.
15	2019, you all will not be here.
16	VICE PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Next
17	speaker.
18	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker is Mark
19	Maxwell. Mark Maxwell.
20	MR. MAXWELL: Good evening. Thank you. I
21	am also with the Chicago Alliance Against
22	Racism and Political Repression.
23	I want to echo the thoughts of my
24	fellow members and everybody else in the

1	community and just say that it's preposterous
2	that three years three years after Laquan
3	McDonald was executed, with no trial, murderer
4	is still out, still planning with his lawyer
5	how he is going to get off. And we're not
6	going to let it happen. He needs to go to
7	prison. This body and any unelected body holds
8	no credibility with the community. We need an
9	elected civilian accountability council. We're
10	demanding it now. Thank you.
11	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir.
12	Our next speaker is Armanda

13	Shackelford. Armanda Shackelford. Are you

1	My son was tortured into signing
2	a confession for two crimes he did not commit.
3	He told the police that he didn't do it. But
4	they didn't take him at his word. They made up
5	a statement and tortured him into signing that
6	confession. It wasn't Jon Burge, but it was
7	guys that was working under him. And because
8	my son wouldn't sign the confession at first,
9	they beat him.
10	Years before this happened in
11	1990 is when this happened. My son has been
12	incarcerated 27 years. And before this
13	happened to him, my son had gotten shot, and to
14	put his right leg back together, they put a rod
15	in that leg. On the second night of his
16	arrest, they tortured him so bad, they broke
17	that rod in his leg. They messed up his right
18	hip. And it took them 26 years to decide on
19	doing part of his surgery. Right now my son's
20	in a wheelchair. He's been in a wheelchair
21	since the day before Thanksgiving of last year.
22	And it hurts to know your child was tortured
23	because he wouldn't sign a paper that you typed
24	up.

1	If I say I didn't do something,
2	don't torture me. Don't beat me. Get out
3	there on that street and prove that I did that
4	crime, but, no, they wouldn't do that.
5	And you don't know it hurts so
6	bad to go to court and see my son in a
7	wheelchair, it hurts so bad that the special
8	prosecutor is torturing my son over and over
9	again.
10	His case has been in court for
11	five years now.
12	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am, you need to
13	wrap up.
14	MS. SHACKELFORD: I will. But it hurts.
15	And those types of tactics shouldn't have never
16	been going on in the first place.
17	But I feel like if CPAC had been
18	in there, those types of things wouldn't be
19	going on, because it happens late at night,
20	when they do those things.
21	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am.
22	MS. SHACKELFORD: They don't do them in the
23	daytime. And it's wrong.
24	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you. Our next

speaker is Jennifer No. Jennifer No. 1 2 Our next speaker is Andrew 3 Klenzmar. Andrew Klenzmar. 4 MR. KLENZMAR: My name is Andrew Klenzmar. 5 And it is frustrating to see how little progress has been made for substantial change 6 7 since the murder of Laquan McDonald. 8 And as we heard from the people 9 in here and the people outside, we will not stop fighting for that change and that justice. 10 11 And that justice is something that will honor his memory and his family, that a substantial 12 13 change that will hold police accountable for 14 the crimes that they've committed, and that 15 justice is CPAC. Thank you. 16 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you. 17 The next speaker is Crista Noel. 18 Ms. Noel, are you here? 19 Our next speaker is Queen Sister. 20 MS. QUEEN SISTER: It's been a year since 21 I've been here. And I've actually been part of our village project in the neighborhoods. 22 23 These are the decals that been put in the 24 windows of our elders to keep them safe, and to

also let the children know that they will not
 be distributing candy.

3 Every time we come and request 4 assistance with this public safety issue, we 5 are constantly met with resistance.

6 And then there's no way to track 7 the money. There's nothing in this blue book 8 regarding the budget, and that's a problem.

9 I want to speak today regarding 10 the Byrne Grant that the Superintendent is 11 pushing, stating that these sanctuary settlers is not a part of the crime and violence that's 12 13 taking place in our streets, as if the 20-year 14 Mexican drug cartel targeting Chicago's black 15 communities and housing developments, public 16 housing developments, never exists, and we know 17 they did.

18 These sanctuary settlers are 19 coming over here, as Donald Trump say, 20 smuggling in and hunkering down and taking 21 advantage of our resources while we're 22 suffering.

We've become victims of domestic
violence. We're getting our asses kicked in

1 our own homes. And it's not fair. It's 2 unacceptable. It's uncivilized and Donald says 3 it's not American. 4 The United States is a nation 5 established by laws, documented in black and 6 white. They smuggle in over here without 7 medical exams, bringing diseases, and we're getting the butt end of their criminals because 8 9 they are not getting background checks. We are a nation that deals with 10 11 due process. 12 The other issue I want to bring to your attention that it's come to our 13 14 attention that the Chicago Police was called to 15 Sheriff Tom Dart's residence on a domestic 16 violence, and whereas the policy to arrest on domestic violence, he was allowed to leave, and 17 18 he was not arrested. 19 Had it been any one of these young brothers on the street, they'd been 20 21 arrested and done time for the crime. 22 We're sick of the coverups, 23 people. We're covering up --24 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.

1 Wrap it up.

2	MS. QUEEN SISTER: And Tom Dart is not
3	above the law. Patricia Dart filed charges.
4	In the report it states offender unknown.
5	That's impossible for a domestic offender to be
6	unknown.
7	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you.
8	MS. QUEEN SISTER: Thank you.
9	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is
10	Ms. EvAngel.
11	MS. QUEEN SISTER: Let me say this. The
12	word on the street is Megs is the commander
13	that went into Monterey station and covered up
14	for him and pulled him out of there.
15	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, Queen
16	Sister.
17	Ms. NewBN.
18	MS. NEWBN: My name is EvAngel,
19	Mamadeelove, Newbn. And I have two questions.
20	Mr. Superintendent oh, he is not here. I
21	thought he returned back to work.
22	Mr. Superintendent, you have
23	refused to call Attorney General Jeff Sessions
24	regarding illegal sanctuary settlers who have

already broken immigration and customs 1 2 enforcement governmental laws by being here in the first place. 3 4 Secondly, they are in police custody being charged with other crimes. 5 6 Your reason for noncompliance 7 with the U.S. Attorney General is it will 8 prevent illegals from calling the police, and 9 you don't want them to be afraid; however, poor blacks who live in high-crime areas in spite of 10 11 being afraid of perpetrators and officers, they still call the police often even when they 12 don't come. 13 14 Now, they will be hampered from 15 calling 911 for help because they will suffer financial hardship due to increased calls in 16 cell phones and land lines that is being 17 18 proposed in Mayor Rahm Emanuel's budget. 19 My question, Mr. Superintendent: 20 Since you support law-breaking illegal 21 sanctuary settlers, will you step up and oppose the 911 charges that fall hardest on the 22 23 high-crime, high-poverty, predominantly black, 24 law-abiding citizens who will not be able to

1 call police for help because they can't afford 2 it?

3 Now, question two. In Chicago, 4 since January of this year, 3,040 mostly black 5 people have been shot and 529 shot and killed. However, when one white woman was shot, the 6 7 Chicago Tribune, on October 17th, 2017, read 8 This is a Wake-Up Call. 9 The City and suburbs slept through 3,040 shootings, but when one white 10 11 woman was killed, they became woke. 12 If the patterns and practices rooted in the scent of racism continues to 13 14 reign and rule, not even the life of a white 15 woman will be sacred. What are you going to do about that? 16 17 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, ma'am. 18 Your time is up. 19 MS. NEWBN: Thank you. 20 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is 21 George Blakemore. Mr. Blakemore. 22 MR. BLAKEMORE: This is to the U.S. 23 citizens and the staff and the police that are 24 present. I attended a meeting, and they had

1	the Department of Health, the Fire Department
2	and the Police Department to make a report
3	about Marybeth Anjala now doing opium. I said
4	what is that? Some kind of drug. And now
5	they're saying that given to our policemen, a
6	little spray of something to bring them back
7	alive. And the judicial system, they're saying
8	do not arrest them. It is a health problem.
9	When Marybeth fall out and died, and Marybeth
10	is all in the ghetto. All walking around in
11	the ghetto getting high. What about the
12	egregious act that has happened to my people
13	throughout the south and here? White cocaine.
14	Is it a safety problem? No. It was a drug
15	problem. Lock them up.
16	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore.
17	MR. BLAKEMORE: So Mr. Blakemore will
18	address this. And also sanctuary. My people
19	need sanctuary. Why would you tell our
20	policemen to don't obey the law? Do
21	not okay. Thank you. Thank you. Thank
22	you.
23	Why would you tell our good
24	policemen, officers, black, white, Hispanic,

illegal citizen, do not lock them? Do not obey 1 2 our United States immigration and 3 naturalization laws? 4 I pledge allegiance to the United 5 States of America. My people was enslaved 6 here. They didn't get a dime here. 7 Now you bringing another group 8 here, treating them as special citizens. What 9 does my citizenship count for? Black lives do not matter. But black lives, you know how it 10 11 don't matter, not only to beat up on these 12 people here, beat up on your black leadership. 13 Your 18 black aldermen. Beat up on them. Beat 14 up on Reverend Fufu and all these other house 15 blacks. So don't put all the burden on the 16 police department. You got 18 black aldermen 17 that is sold on sanctuary. Beat up on them. 18 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our final speaker --19 MR. BLAKEMORE: You understand where I'm 20 coming from, Ms. Lightfoot? 21 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you. 22 Mr. Robert More. 23 MR. BLAKEMORE: Stop, stop, stop this

24 nonsense.

1 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore,

2 please. Thank you.
