1 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Good evening, good 2 My name is Ghian Foreman, president of the Chicago Police Board, and I am calling the Board's 3 October 19th public meeting to order. 4 We'd like to thank CAN-TV for 5 covering this meeting. It is being broadcast on 6 Channel 27 and live streamed on CAN-TV.org and the 7 CAN-TV.app. We're grateful you guys are here. You 8 could be watching the President's prime-time 9 10 special, but you are with us tonight. We appreciate 11 that. We have some technical difficulty. 12 13 There was a storm and the AV systems were blown out, 14 so we don't have Zoom options today. We don't have 15 microphones, so we are going to do our best to 16 project to the audience on TV and to all so all of 17 you can hear us. 18 As a result, we're going to ask to 19 make sure that please let's try to keep the talking 20 in the audience down to a minimum, just so the 21 audience -- the cameras don't pick up any background 22 noise right now. 7	There's one announcement of a ruling
8	in a disagreement case this evening. Board Member
9	Carr-Favors will make this announcement.
LO	BOARD MEMBER CAR-FAVORS: I was randomly
11	selected from the Police Board's membership to
L2	consider one matter on which the Chief Administrator
L3	of the Civilian Office of Police Accountability and
14	the Superintendent of Police did not agree regarding
15	the discipline of a police officer.
16	In request for review number 23-11,
17	Officer Chris Chausse received discipline
L8	received discipline of a minimum of 180-day
19	suspension, up to, and including, discharge from the
20	CPD for use of excessive force and for failing to
21	activate his body-worn camera.
22	The Superintendent proposed that the
23	excessive force allegation be classified as not
24	sustained, and that the officer be suspended for ten

days for failing to activate his BWC. 1 2 After considering this matter, it is my opinion that the Superintendent did not meet the 3 burden of overcoming the Chief Administrator's 4 5 recommendation for discipline. 6 A copy of the written opinion will be posted on the Board's website. 7 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. 8 Chief Kersten, if you would like to 9 give your report. So we don't have microphones. 10 We 11 had an AV issue. So we're going to ask you to 12 project for the cameras and for the audience. 13 CHIEF ADMINISTRATOR KERSTEN: I can project. 14 Thank you. 15 So as I do every month at these 16 meetings, I will report on the statistics about 17 cases that we received and closed. 18 Last month, which would be September, so in September, COPA received 387 complaints and 19 20 notifications. Of those, 93 were retained as being 21 under our jurisdiction. 28 percent of them, as 22 usual and as we come to expect, the highest category 23 were Fourth Amendment or improper search and seizure 24 complaints.

There were two officer-involved 1 2 shooting notifications that we received last month, and we also concluded two officer-involved 3 shootings. 4 5 Of the cases that we closed, 6 approximately 117 cases were closed with findings last month, meaning that there were allegations that 7 had been served, and we had to come to 8 determinations as to whether a preponderance of the 9 10 evidence had been met to sustain those allegations. 11 Of cases closed with allegations, 12 approximately 51 percent of them included sustained 13 findings, but of the total number of cases that were 14 closed last month, many of them, in fact the 15 majority, did not include allegations. And so if 16 you look at the whole, about 13 percent of all of 17 the cases that we concluded last month had sustained 18 findings. 19 I'd also like to provide just a brief 20 I've spoken before this Board several times update. 21 about COPA's timeliness initiatives. I've spoken 22 personally to Superintendent Snelling about two 23 really big priorities for me as chief administrator 24 and my leadership of COPA are, number one, to reduce

October 19, 2023 the length of time that it takes for us to conclude investigations, and then also to increase our consistency across the board, whether that's with disciplinary recommendations or our findings. With respect to timeliness, as I've said before this Board, we launched a timeliness initiative over the course of this summer, and I can report out on that that as of this time, we've reviewed 600 of our aging cases, cases that are over 18 months old, cases that met specific criteria, meaning they weren't officer-involved shootings, they weren't Rule 14s, they weren't anything causing significant injury; however, they were more low-level infractions potentially. Of those 600 cases that we reviewed, we were able to conclude 434 of them without making disciplinary recommendations.

In the course of those reviews, we did identify approximately 281 officers that may be eligible for retraining on some of the things that we encountered in those investigations.

The categories in which we are seeking potentially to see if officers need to be retrained would be body-worn camera activation.

About 47 percent of those recommendations are for

Investigatory stop report and receipt 1 BWC. training, about 28 percent of those 281 officers. 2 Fourth Amendment in general is 11 percent. Use of 3 force, only 8 percent of those officers would be 4 5 recommended for retraining on use of force potentially. And then around 6 percent of them are 6 miscellaneous recommendations for training. 7 All of this is to say that our 8 current open caseload, and this is all in for COPA, 9 10 meaning everything that's in an intake posture, 11 everything that's in a full investigative posture, 12 every single complaint that is currently pending in 13 our agency totals 960 currently. 14 I understand that still sounds like a 15 really big number. But when I was here last fall --16 when I testified at budget last fall, it was about 17 We are continuing to trend in the right 18 direction. 19 Our commitment to the officers and 20 complainants whose cases we have to decide is that 21 we will work steadfastly to make sure that all of 22 them are concluded between 6 and 18 months. That is 23 the goal. We won't stop until we get to that point, and we are well on our way. 2.4

1 That's my update. Thank you. 2 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Congratulations. you, Chief. You know, I think that this timeliness 3 issue has continued to be an issue for the Board 4 over time, and we've seen the progress. It hasn't 5 always been fun. It certainly hasn't always been 6 easy, but we definitely appreciate the willingness 7 and even some of the criticisms that you had to take 8 as a result of taking these kinds of actions. You 9 10 know, I think that overall we know that the goal is 11 to make the process better, and it's definitely 12 showing up. So really appreciate it. 13 Next, we have -- we're going to get 14 the report from Superintendent Snelling, but before 15 I hand it over to him, I just want to say first 16 congratulations. 17 (AUDIENCE APPLAUSE.) 18 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: And thank you very much for 19 taking on this big responsibility. 20 You know, public safety is of utmost 21 importance to all Chicagoans. And you've taken on 22 this very serious responsibility. 23 As we talked last week, I want to 2.4 make sure that you not only are thinking about the

health of your team, but you're thinking about your 1 2 health as well, and make sure that you stay healthy. We need you to be able to support the rest of us. 3 On that, I met Superintendent 4 5 Snelling, about 13 years ago as a Police Board member. We had to go to the training academy, and 6 they had something called 13 doors, 15 doors or 7 something. We had to go into a scenario teaching 8 us, the civilians, what it's like as a police 9 10 officer to go into a situation that you don't know. 11 You have tools, your voice. You have a Taser. have a baton. You have a gun. I think I failed the 12 13 class worse than anybody else who's ever gone 14 through it. 15 So I got a chance to get to know him 16 from that perspective, and we've maintained a 17 relationship over the time. 18 So I think that the Mayor, CPD, they 19 made an excellent choice. Really proud to work with 20 you. 21 SUPERINTENDENT SNELLING: Thank you. Ι 22 appreciate it. 23 I just want to let you know that he 24 got it right before he left. He went back through

1 it again. He wanted to get it right, and that's important to do that. 2 3 Thank you. And thank you to the members of the Board. I appreciate your time and 4 5 appreciate you being here. 6 Thank you to all the community members who are here and everybody who is here 7 participating in this event. It's very important. 8 9 What I will say is that since I've 10 stepped in this position, I've been to a lot of meetings, and I talked to a lot of people within the 11 12 community. And what I'm hearing from them more than anything else is that they want to feel safe. 13 14 want to feel safe in their communities. 15 The other thing that I've heard from 16 them is that they actually want to engage with our 17 officers. They want our officers to mingle. They 18 want our officers to get out of their vehicles. 19 They want our officers to talk to them, talk to 20 businesses and business owners. They want our 21 officers to stop in and say hello and just check on 22 them, just to make sure, just in case they need 23 anything, and that our officers are highly visible. 24 So hearing that and knowing and

understanding the importance of public safety and 1 2 keeping our community members safe -- and I can tell you right now, I see a group of people who are 3 sitting here right in the front row who take public 4 5 safety in their neighborhood to a new level. I'll tell you this right now, and they will hold you 6 I know. 7 accountable. But I will say the great work they do 8 in the community is what I'm looking for, 9 10 partnerships, because this is what is going to get 11 us to where we need to be when it comes to public 12 safety. We need to be in partnership with our 13 community members. 14 They're not always the loudest 15 voices. Well, this group is. But they're not 16 always the loudest voices, but they should be heard, 17 and I hear them. And I want to make sure that we're 18 reaching out to that part of our community who just 19 wants to feel safe. 20 That being said, I'm moving forward 21 with an initiative to make sure that our officers --22 every single one of our officers, not just our 23 officers who are assigned to community policing, but 24 that all of our officers are community police

officers. All of our officers are reaching out the same way that our community police officers do. We can't have a separation in those roles. When you're a police officer, you're a community police officer.

What we need is to partner up with our community members. need our community members to come to the table. They have to be stakeholders. We have stakeholders right here. People who have stepped up and said that they're not going to tolerate the nonsense within their communities. And when they do that, what we have to think about is what they risk, their They risk their safety every single day safety. stepping up to make sure that their communities are safe. We can take that risk with them. We do every day. But most times we do it silo. We can't be We have to work together, partnership. silo.

Now, that being said, we are pushing to come into compliance with our consent decree.

In doing so, we are laser focused on accountability for our Department members, for our officers, to make sure that our officers are out there policing constitutionally. We're looking to make sure that our supervisors are holding everyone accountable, as they will be held accountable for making sure that we push down the message to our officers.

We will make sure that we work on officer wellness, because our officers are seeing things on the daily basis that the average person doesn't see.

Our officers suffer from vicarious trauma and the trauma that they see inflicted upon others in violent acts and violent crimes, from shootings, to robberies, to homicides.

These are things that our officers have to decompress from. And we're going to make sure that our officers have that time to decompress, while at the same time assessing the situation to make sure that we're maintaining a healthy number of officers out there to make sure that our communities

1	are safe.
2	So that being said, we are going to
3	stand with our community members. We hope that our
4	community members are going to stand with us.
5	We need everybody to be a stakeholder
6	in this, and then, and only then, can we get to the
7	bottom of true public safety.
8	So I thank everybody for being here.
9	And I thank the Board. Thank you very much.
10	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you.
11	(AUDIENCE APPLAUSE.)
12	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: I will now call on members
13	of the public who signed up in advance to speak.
14	To make sure we have time to hear
15	from all speakers, there is a two-minute time limit
16	for comments. And let me try to get to this list.
17	First speaker, Kyton Toney. I'm
18	going to ask you to speak loudly. Speak loud for
19	the camera and to the audience. Normally we have a
20	microphone.
21	MR. TONEY: This is my first meeting with you
22	guys.
23	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: A little louder for me.
24	MR. TONEY: My first question is, are you aware

of the number of use-of-force allegations -- not 1 even use of force, but allegations altogether this 2 year? So from January 1st to right now, do you know 3 how many? 4 5 CHIEF ADMINISTRATOR KERSTEN: I don't have that number here today, but I can tell you I can 6 7 provide you --MR. TONEY: A little bit over 3,000. Do you 8 9 know how many are excessive force and improper 10 search and seizure? 11 CHIEF ADMINISTRATOR KERSTEN: The majority we 12 receive are always improper search and seizure. 13 Excessive force is a close second. 14 MR. TONEY: And you guys don't see an issue 15 with that? Just like how you said before, you said 16 retraining of cutting on the body cam. It's not 17 hard to cut on your body cam. You shouldn't have to 18 be retrained. I told you once, I've told you twice, 19 your body cam should be on. 20 It's already been discussed by you 21 guys that you should be penalized if your body cam 22 isn't on. Y'all give chance after chance to these 23 officers. 24 I can tell you right now, I got on

this suit, I got all this, but when I leave here and put on my street clothes, I look like everybody else out there.

Y'all honestly do not know what's going on here on these streets. You do not. You do not. You don't. And I see a large group of people in high places of color, and I can't even say I'm proud, because it's not changing at all. It's not. You don't know how old I am, where I work, none of that. You don't. But at the same time, I still go through the same thing that everybody else -- I don't have all the resources. I don't have all the money that you guys do. But I still came up here on I'm not a lawyer. I didn't go to law my own. None of that. And I came up here because I'm tired. I went through use-of-force policies. Ι went through -- what is it? The force review divisions, most recent one I found in 2020. Let's see, can anyone explain to me what the narrative deficiency is? Anyone up here?

PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Maybe the Superintendent.

Just so you're clear, so our role is we evaluate

cases after a case is brought to us. So we don't

always have the statistics. We look at cases that

1	are brought.
2	MR. TONEY: You should have the statistics.
3	You've been paid. You should have them.
4	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Okay.
5	MR. TONEY: Don't tell me off the top of your
6	head
7	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Okay. You may think that's
8	the case, but that's not the case.
9	So, you know, our job is to evaluate
10	the cases that are brought before us. Right? So we
11	look at each case as an individual case.
12	MR. TONEY: And if you're doing your job
13	back-to-back, back-to-back, day-to-day, it should be
14	off the top of your head like that.
15	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Okay.
16	MR. TONEY: It should be.
17	PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Okay. All right.
18	MR. TONEY: The main question I came up here
19	for let's see, the use of force. Let me see.
20	Out of 42 pages, I do not see where it says that an
21	officer is able to grab someone by the collar. Can
22	someone explain to me where that is in the policy?
23	SUPERINTENDENT SNELLING: That would depend on
24	the circumstances. The policies cannot account for

every single thing that includes physical contact. 1 2 You would have to put that into context. So what are the circumstances of the case that led to those 3 particular situations? 4 MR. TONEY: I saw that it said that the 5 officer, basically I would say, matched the 6 7 aggressiveness or -- whatever you want to call it from the subject. 8 9 The problem is, your officers, they too aggressive. They too aggressive. It is not 10 11 It's bullying. It's bullying. 12 officers out here on day-to-day bullying. Doing 13 whatever they want. You all don't see that. 14 all not out there. 15 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: So because this was your 16 first time, and I thought this was a good 17 discussion, I'm going to stop you right here. We 18 went over time. 19 MR. TONEY: No one can answer anything that I 20 That proved my point right there. ask. 21 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All right. Thank you. 22 That proves my point right there. MR. TONEY: 23 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Our next speaker, Matt 24 Brandon.

I'm being grabbed by my collar by 1 MR. TONEY: 2 your officers every day. Harassed by your officers 3 every day. Every day. I'm coming for they badges, because 4 you are all full of shit. I don't want to use this 5 language, but I am tired because you are not getting 6 grabbed every day. Y'all not. 7 MR. BRANDON: Members of the Board, CPD Command 8 Staff, Office of the IG, and public, good evening. 9 10 My name is Matt Brandon. I'm the president of 11 Operation Neighborhood Safety. The acronym is ONS. 12 I'm here on behalf of the 15-member organization 13 that comprises ONS to welcome our newly appointed 14 Superintendent of Police, Larry Snelling. 15 I purposely did not yet offer our 16 congratulations to the Superintendent, because 17 unless you are given free rein to draft policies, 18 correct mistakes made by the past administration, have the final approval of command staffing 19 20 decisions, and implement your vision for CPD, it 21 will all be for naught. They tease me about using 22 naught, too. 23 Unlike your predecessor, and I don't 24 mean Fred Waller, you have nothing to prove.

success is well documented. Your commitment to the community partnerships resulted in an entire community standing in front of the 7th District police station to thwart a crowd of anarchists, intent on using Englewood as a launching pad for violence and confrontation. That would never have happened unless you were trusted and respected by the community that you serve and work with.

Going forward, ONS and those communities we serve give notice to those who are given authority over you that we are watching. Just as we watched the behavior of the police, we are watching you.

We are in total agreement with your decision to make Larry Snelling the Superintendent.

We welcome the new Superintendent's commitment to aggressively pursue criminal activity. We know Superintendent Snelling, and we know that his commitment to aggressive pursuit is not a contradiction or a betrayal of his proven dedication to assertiveness and compassion. We know Larry Snelling. We believe in Larry Snelling. We trust Larry Snelling. We now ask that everyone stand

aside and let him lead. Thank you. 1 2 (AUDIENCE APPLAUSE.) 3 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Next speaker, C. Lee. C. 4 Lee. Next speaker, Rita Pritchett. 5 6 MS. PRITCHETT: Good evening. How is everyone this evening? 7 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: All is well. 8 MS. PRITCHETT: That's wonderful. I would run. 9 I just don't want to show off. I'm Rita Pritchett. 10 11 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Ms. Pritchett, speak a 12 little louder. 13 MS. PRITCHETT: Okay. I'm a retired Chicago police officer. 14 15 (AUDIENCE APPLAUSE.) 16 MS. PRITCHETT: To this honorable Board, in my 54 years of service with the Chicago Department of 17 18 Police, 13 years as a civilian, 31 years as a police 19 officer, 10 years as an associate chaplain, and 20 continuing as a member of peer support, it has been 21 my personal effort, because I have been with the 22 Chicago Police Department my entire life. 23 I came to Chicago Police Department 24 right out of high school at age 18. I'm 78 years

1 old.

In my ministry, I have become aware of the increase of suicide throughout this country within law enforcement. My hope is to make officers aware of the help that is available regarding suicide prevention. Then having a conversation with officers at Sister-Friend, I have come to realize that many officers — I won't say many, but some officers may feel abandoned in their effort to do the job effectively within a confinement where they don't have the cooperation of the community, or they may feel that they do not have the full support of the system.

It's kind of like trying to do your job with one hand tied behind your back.

In conjunction with Sertoma Centre and under the kind gratis availability of FOP hall, I have been successful in giving suicide awareness classes for the last year and a half. I know. I'm going to sit down in a moment. And the class is four hours long, and it yields a two-year certification. I think that that would be most instrumental in helping officers, because this job here is stressful. Thank you for your time.

Thank you. 1 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: 2 (AUDIENCE APPLAUSE.) 3 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: The last speaker. Robert More. All right. 4 We're also pleased to have with us 5 this evening Deputy Mayor Garien Gatewood. He is 6 7 here to speak to us about community safety. don't have a microphone today. This is CAN-TV. 8 This is our lovely audience. We're going to 9 10 project. 11 MR. GATEWOOD: That's not a problem. 12 you all doing tonight? Happy to be here. As Ghian said, my name is Garien 13 I am the First Deputy Mayor of Community 14 Gatewood. 15 Safety for the City of Chicago. I get the pleasure 16 of working with a lot of good folks around the City on a regular basis. I think I've seen 17 18 Superintendent Snelling several times alone today, 19 so we get to spend a lot of time together and work 20 on issues. 21 Our office -- the new office -- we've 22 historically had the Office of Public Safety. Our 23 office has been built to really look at the root 24 cause of violence, while also really trying to build

out rapid response to some of the issues in crime 1 2 we've seen around communities in the City. 3 So we get the opportunity and pleasure to work across agencies with almost every 4 5 agency in the City and also spending a lot of time working with community-based organizations, 6 philanthropic sector, business sector, faith 7 leaders, and all. So we try to continue to build 8 comprehensive plans of safety. 9 10 We have been in this role now for --11 how long has it been? 12 VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: Five months. 13 MR. GATEWOOD: Five months. Yeah, we started on June 1. And it's been a fun ride so far. 14 15 Obviously, there's a lot to learn every day. We are 16 willing to do that in conjunction with partners. 17 Happy to be here. Happy to answer any questions. 18 came here to a meeting before but happy to be here 19 tonight. And happy to stay after to talk to folks 20 if there's questions or things we can work on 21 together. So appreciate the time. 22 PRESIDENT FOREMAN: Thank you. Any questions? 23 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: We'll wait until after. VICE PRESIDENT WOLFF: Can you tell us about 2.4

the plan you put together?

MR. GATEWOOD: Absolutely. So we are working with cross sectors where we've had -- we just wrapped up meeting 2929 with groups around the City to try to create the container on the issues that we will be working on.

We understand that safety is not something that we can only ask CPD to do. We can't ask CPD to respond to everything. But what we can do is have City agencies understand our role in safety across the board, how we respond to issues in communities, how we hold each other accountable, and how we build up that work.

So in addressing the root causes of violence, the approach we've taken is, we want to look at three key populations: Youth, adults, and victims of violence of crime. How do we take those populations and look at it from education, healthcare, economic mobility, housing, community environment, policing, and community violence intervention. How do we pull those players together to the table to look at what are these root causes, and how can each of those sectors come together to address those issue.

We've probably had meetings with nearly 300 people over the last few months to really start to set the container. And we're in the process of starting to roll it out a bit more publicly throughout the City.

Because I can promise you, there is enough work in this City to go around. There are enough issues in this City to go
