1 MR. FOREMAN: Good evening. I am Ghian
2 Foremen. I am the vice president of the
3 Chicago Police Board, and I am calling the
4 meeting to order. Board members Lighfoot and
5 Sweeney are unable to attend this meeting in
6 person and wish to attend via audio conference.

7 Is there a motion to permit them to do so?

8 MR. EADDY: So move.

9 MR. SIMPSON: Second.

10 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor?

11 (Ayes in unison.)

12 MR. FOREMAN: The motion passes.

13 The first item of business is approval of
14 the minutes of the board's regular public
15 meeting held on November 17th, 2016. Is there
16 a motion to approve the minutes?

17 MS. FRY: So moved.

18 MR. SIMPSON: Second.

19 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor?

20 (Ayes in unison.)

21 MR. FOREMAN: None opposed. The motion
22 passes. Our next regular public meeting will
23 be on Thursday, January 19th at 7:30 p.m. here
24 at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.



1 At this time I ask for a motion to close a
2 series of executive sessions for the purpose of
3 considering personnel matters in litigation as
4 authorized by Section 2(c)(1),(3),(4),(11) of
5 the Illinois Open Meetings Act. Is there such
6 a motion?

7 MS. FRY: So move.

8 MS. DELGADO: Second.

9 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor?

10 (Ayes in unison.)

11 MR. FOREMAN: None opposed. The motion
12 passes. The schedule of the Board's regular
13 monthly public meetings for 2017 has been made
14 available at tonight's meeting and will be
15 posted on the Board's website.

16 Earlier this evening the Board as required
17 by the Illinois Open Meetings Act met and
18 considered minutes and recordings of all past
19 closed meetings to determine whether the need
20 for confidentiality still exists. The Board
21 members unanimously agreed that it continues to
22 be necessary to keep confidential the minutes
23 and recordings of its past closed meetings.

24 A report of disciplinary action taken by



1 the Board during the previous month has been
2 made available at this evening's meetings.
3 This report and the Board's written findings
4 and decisions are posted on the Board's
5 website.

6 The Police Board, as authorized by the
7 Open Meetings Act, has considered in a closed
8 meeting one disciplinary case. The Board will
9 now take final action on this case. Regarding
10 case number 15 PB 2894, is there a motion to
11 find Detective Jamie Duignan guilty of
12 disobeying a direct order to report to internal
13 affairs for a statement regarding investigation
14 of alleged misconduct and to discharge her from
15 the Chicago Police Department?

16 MR. SIMPSON: So move.

17 MR. EADDY: Second.

18 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor by a show of
19 hands? Any opposed? Voting in favor are board
20 members Lightfoot, Delgado, Eaddy, Fry,
21 Simpson, Sweeney and myself. The motion passes
22 by unanimous vote.

23 Is there a motion to adopt the written
24 findings and decision that has been reviewed by



1 all Board members who participated in the case?

2 MS. FRY: So move.

3 MR. SIMPSON: Second.

4 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor?

5 (Ayes in unison.)

6 MR. FOREMAN: None opposed. The motion
7 passes by unanimous vote.

8 The Board's decisions in the case on which
9 we took final action this evening will be
10 entered as of today's date. It will be issued
11 to the parties. A copy of the written decision
12 will be posted on the Board's website within 10
13 business dates pursuant to the Municipal Code
14 of Chicago.

15 Pursuant to Rule 52 of the Police Board's
16 rules and regulations, the Superintendent has
17 requested the Board's permission to solicit
18 funds from sponsors for the Annual Police
19 Recognition Ceremony and Luncheon to be held in
20 May 2017.

21 Is there a motion to approve the
22 Superintendent's request, conditional upon
23 accounting of all funds received and expended
24 being provided to the Police Board following



1 the conclusion of this event and conditional
2 upon the soliciting of funds being done
3 consistent with the City's ethics rules?

4 MR. SIMPSON: So moved.

5 MR. EADDY: Second.

6 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor?

7 (Ayes in unison.)

8 MR. FOREMAN: Any opposed? The motion
9 passes.

10 The general orders and other directives
11 issued by the Superintendent of Police during
12 the previous month are listed in the books made
13 available at this evenings meeting, and are
14 posted on the Police Department's website.

15 The next item is the Superintendent's
16 report to the Board. Is there a motion to
17 waive the oral presentation and receive the
18 monthly report in writing?

19 MS. FRY: So move.

20 MR. FOREMAN: Second? All those in favor?

21 (Ayes in unison.)

22 MR. FOREMAN: The motion passes.

23 I will now call upon those members of the
24 public who signed up in advance to speak. When



1 your name is called, please step up to the
2 microphone. We ask you limit your comments to
3 two minutes. The first speaker is Deandra
4 Leuver.

5 DEANNDRRA LEUVER: Good evening. My name
6 is Deandra Leuver. I, again, apologize for
7 any pauses. I was recently hospitalized for my
8 active or for active symptoms of PTSD and the
9 concussion which has left me with a mild
10 traumatic brain injury. Those were sustained
11 from being attacked on March 28th, 2016.

12 I am here, again, today to try to
13 understand why I am so petrified to step
14 outside my apartment. I have spoken to Scott
15 waespack on November 14th after my friend was
16 attacked. I have not heard back from his
17 office. So now I am even more petrified,
18 because it seems as if nobody is listening to
19 me.

20 I appreciate Mr. Caproni taking the time
21 to listen to me and for giving me the
22 opportunity to speak to you, but nothing in my
23 life has changed. I am still terrified to walk
24 alone in my community. Women, regardless of



1 race, religion, sexual identity or even
2 location are unsafe in Chicago. That is a
3 problem.

4 My friend being attacked is what provoked
5 me to speak up on November 17th. The next day,
6 November 18th, another friend of mine was
7 attacked. I went into the hospital on
8 November 20th. Since my hospitalization, I am
9 continuing to fight to get my life back and
10 part of that includes ensuring my safety and
11 the safety of my loved ones who live in every
12 corner of this city. So my question now is
13 what is the Chicago Police Board doing for the
14 community to help ensure my safety and the
15 safety of the women in Chicago?

16 Thank you for listening to me and giving
17 me the opportunity to speak to you today. I
18 really appreciate that. I hope you guys have a
19 good evening.

20 MR. FOREMAN: Thank you. I actually have
21 a copy of your statement, so I'll pass it to
22 the Superintendent Johnson as well.

23 DEANNDRRA LEUVER: Thank you.

24 MR. FOREMAN: Next speaker is Marie



1 Mestas.

2 MARIE MESTAS: Hi. Thank you for allowing
3 me to speak today. This is one of my first or
4 my second time coming to a meeting like this
5 and I will say that last meeting kind of blew
6 me out of the water hearing stories from people
7 all across the city and how they are effected
8 by the police or how they were effected by the
9 community.

10 A couple of my friends, as you just heard
11 Deandra, they have been mugged within the last
12 month and they have been affected by this
13 clearly, and I think that just upsets me
14 because it's so close to home. I also have a
15 one-year-old son and hearing the mother speak
16 last week about her son being shot by a police
17 officer lit a fire in my belly. It's no news
18 that this has become an issue across this
19 nation, and I want to know how we as Chicago,
20 the city of Chicago and the officers of the law
21 of this city will make the change and how we
22 will stand out. Of all of cities and towns in
23 this nation, how are we going to stand out and
24 say hey, we are different, we protect our own,



1 we don't hurt our own, but we protect our own.
2 We protect the city. We protect our citizens,
3 and we also protect the animals. Judging by
4 the meeting last week, that also lit a fire in
5 my belly. It was ridiculous to hear that and I
6 want to know how we are going to make that
7 change? How are you going to positively affect
8 the city, this time around this year, within
9 the future. Thank you.

10 MR. FOREMAN: Thank you. Superintendent,
11 do you want to make a comment?

12 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: We have been
13 working hard, as some of you know, since I
14 became Superintendent in April to restore the
15 faith that the community has in the police
16 department. Mistrust and inappropriate
17 behavior didn't happen overnight, this happened
18 over decades. So to that I will say that it's
19 going to take sometime to fix it, not decades,
20 but since April I have seen a lot of positive
21 progress in that interaction.

22 I will continue to go out into the
23 communities to see what your concerns are.
24 The command staff will continue to go out, but



1 I can assure you of one thing, CPD has begun a
2 shift in our culture in how we do business and
3 we will continue that until we absolutely get
4 it right.

5 MR. FOREMAN: Thank you. Next speaker is
6 Pamela Hunt. Pamela Hunt? Next speaker
7 Gwendolyn Moore. Good evening.

8 GWENDOLYN MOORE: Good evening. Is it
9 possible that I could give you guys a copy of
10 something?

11 First of all, I want to thank you for the
12 opportunity to allow me to speak before your
13 Board. My name is Gwendolyn Moore. I am the
14 mother of six children, Xavier, Darius,
15 Justido, Jasmine, Jason and Jamaal Moore Sr.
16 who was murdered by a member of the CPD whose
17 names is Ruth Castelli.

18 On December 15th, 2012 my son, Jamaal
19 Raymone Moore was brutally murdered and justice
20 has not been served.

21 In our society today the world depicts
22 what is it perfect and righteous. According to
23 this world standards Jamaal is not a perfect
24 child but he was righteous. He had a heart of



1 gold and always did the right thing when it
2 came to his family. Jamaal had just become a
3 father of a baby boy that looked just like him,
4 Liam Joseph Moore, which is his son and looks
5 like him as I afore stated.

6 At that time in December 2012 Jamaal's son
7 Liam Joseph Moore was two months old at the
8 time of Jamaal's death. At the time of
9 Jamaal's death his son began to cry
10 uncontrollably and had to be taken to the
11 emergency room, to the hospital for
12 observation. Once Liam's mother explained what
13 had just happened to Liam's father Jamaal, the
14 doctors stated that baby Liam was grieving and
15 knew that something had happened to his father.
16 This went on for two days until his crying
17 stopped. On that day my family's life changed.
18 My youngest son was tragically taken from my
19 family by the hands of Ruth Castelli.

20 I stand here not as a protester, not as a
21 person who does not like police officers. I
22 have personal relationships with police
23 officers in my life. I stand here as a mother
24 who has lost a son, her youngest son.



1 Since Jamaal's death, I lost my father and
2 my husband of 34 years who wanted justice for
3 his son Jamaal. I am not able to move on in
4 the grieving process for my son Jamaal because
5 justice has not been served for him as yet. I
6 stand here alone today because daily I am
7 alone. No one is with me when I go into my
8 bedroom and cry at night. No one is with me
9 when I drive in my car and think of him all
10 day. When I try to sleep, I can't. When I try
11 to move forward in life, it's difficult. I am
12 haunted every day with a nightmare that plagues
13 my life since December 15th, 2012.

14 I don't despise or hate police officers.
15 Again, as I stated, I have friends and personal
16 relationships with Chicago police officers who
17 do their job and serve and protect us very
18 well.

19 My life has been haunted and is standing
20 still, because I have not had justice for my
21 son Jamaal Raymone Moore Senior. Oftentimes we
22 don't take things personal until it happens to
23 us in our lives. That is when we pay
24 attention. I have lost my son in



1 December 2012, my father due to sickness in
2 2015 who talked about Jamaal often, and my
3 husband, Joseph Moore, Jamaal's father, who
4 died hurting, grieving and trying to fight for
5 his son this year in January 2016.

6 I stand before you asking, beseeching and
7 asking you to take a look into the case of
8 Jamaal Raymone Moore and hold the Chicago
9 Police Department Officer Ruth Castelli
10 accountable for the death and murder of my
11 youngest son Jamaal Moore Senior. My life, my
12 childrens' lives, his brother's life, his
13 sister's life, his friends' life and his son
14 Liam Joseph Moore's life will never be the
15 same. This Board was designed with justice in
16 mind, accountability in mind, and to understand
17 the citizens of Chicago need you.

18 Everyday you wake up and greet your loved
19 ones, each day you kiss your loved ones, each
20 day you hug your loved ones, and remember there
21 goes like me, we need justice for our loved
22 ones that have been wrongfully murdered. I
23 thank you for your time and patience to listen.

24 I ask you be open and investigate Jamaal



1 Raymone Moore Seniors case and bring justice by
2 persecuting and convicting Ruth Castelli for
3 the death and murder of my baby boy, my
4 youngest son, Jamaal Raymone Moore Senior.
5 Thank you.

6 MR. FOREMAN: Thank you.

7 MR. EADDY: Thank you.

8 MS. DELGADO: Thank you.

9 MR. FOREMAN: Roosevelt Slaughter.

10 ROOSEVELT SLAUGHTER: First of all, good
11 evening to everybody and every member on the
12 Board. Thank you for the opportunity to take a
13 chance to speak. Me myself, Superintendent
14 Johnson, I am also a victim of Chicago police
15 corruption that took place 11 years ago where
16 anything could have happened to me when an
17 officer on my block lied and had our home
18 raided, but today I am not up here just for me,
19 I am up here to talk about the tragic murder of
20 Kuwan Ray. I feel that whatever he was doing
21 or whatever he was stopped for with the culture
22 of policing in this country now, I could
23 understand why he would run. At this point if
24 an officer encountered me, I probably would



1 run, but the worst and dirtiest thing Sergeant
2 John Kowlis (phonetic) did to him was shoot him
3 in the back. I feel that is the worst thing
4 you could ever do to somebody is shoot them in
5 the back, because they are not a threat to you.
6 If anything, the threat was trying to escape.
7 The threat was trying to leave. The only thing
8 the police and even the media could bring up is
9 that certain things that he did in his past.

10 why is it that us in the black and Latin
11 community, even all over this city, no matter
12 what race or gender, no matter what sexuality
13 are always judged from the past, because any of
14 you all know if a police officer stops you or
15 pulls you over, what is one of the main
16 questions they ask you? Have you ever been
17 arrested before? What does that have to do
18 with it? I have been asking the question for
19 years, but nobody has been able to tell me what
20 does this have to do with what you are pulling
21 me over for now? I wish one of the Board
22 members or one of the guys or gals in blue
23 could come and tell me that, because that don't
24 have anything to do with it.



1 I believe what the Scripture says, God
2 says in the Bible, Jesus said that we all,
3 every single last one of us, you Superintendent
4 Johnson, every single member on this Board,
5 every single body in this room, every single
6 gal and guy in blue has sinned and fallen short
7 of the glory of God. So, therefore, we cannot
8 be judged upon our past, whatever it is that we
9 did, whatever it is Mr. Ray did in the past, he
10 was not doing it right then. And just because
11 somebody had a rough past or whatever it is,
12 shouldn't be brought up in the media and
13 brought up by police to make them look bad, and
14 that's exactly what happened. It was an
15 embarrassment to him, an embarrassment to his
16 family and embarrassment to his legacy. We all
17 have sinned and fallen short of glory. I am
18 pretty sure some officers are still out there
19 sinning now.

20 MR. FOREMAN: Please limit your comments.

21 ROOSEVELT SLAUGHTER: So Superintendent,
22 you should make the right choice in suspending
23 his police powers. He needs to be brought up
24 on charges and brought to justice. And with



1 that, I am going to sit down and have a happy
2 holiday, all the members and every single body
3 in this room.

4 MR. EADDY: Thank you.

5 MS. FRY: Thank you.

6 MR. FOREMAN: Next speaker, Dorothy
7 Holmes. Next speaker, Darva Watkins. Next
8 speaker, Minister Robert Plum.

9 MINISTER PLUM: As we say, we don't die,
10 we multiply, and we say as, asa lama lakum,
11 shalom, this is the reason why I am here. I am
12 yours truly Minister Robert Plum, and I am at
13 your service. The service is the way God wants
14 us to be, and the only way for us to be is to
15 do it right or not at all. And I am also in a
16 reflection of the Honorable Mayor Harold
17 Washington. I am not a biological son, I am
18 that I am a spiritual son. There is a balance.
19 The balance is as each human beings, black,
20 white, red, brown and yellow, all, as the last
21 speaker has said, fall short of glory of God.
22 And in the beginning De or Da equals 23.
23 Justice equals 23. We in the community are the
24 children. We are the people and we are the



1 world. We deserve respect. Respect is
2 everything, and we must give respect. However,
3 wrong hurts all of us. It's right that helps
4 all of us. So we must amend, we must correct
5 the things between us. At this point it is a
6 serious issue. It is a serious dilemma that
7 Chicago was raided during Daley's
8 administration. It was cited in the news 666,
9 we have even surpassed 666. We have a
10 solution. The solution is 277 plus 23 and
11 every human being, when you look at your
12 brains, you see how I am doing my hands, that
13 means your brains ain't no bigger than mine,
14 mine ain't no bigger than yours, and you have
15 no bigger eyes. That's 99.5 equals 23. The
16 Honorable Mayor Harold Washington said --

17 MR. FOREMAN: You are done.

18 MINISTER PLUM: Vision is also 23. So if
19 you have the Honorable Mayor Harold Washington,
20 23 is a better way of life when we can share.
21 There is an understanding through God and
22 there's a way of life that we must do it right
23 or not at all. That is on the community side,
24 the police need the community and the community



1 need the police. So let's create a balance
2 which would be a paradigm, a way of life we can
3 make a difference. God bless you. Thank you
4 all, and good to see you Superintendent
5 Johnson. You know, we was last at Father
6 George Clemmons place last time I seen you at
7 his church. So I think you know the right
8 intent is good so that we can continue to
9 promote peace in our community. God bless you
10 all. Thanks a million. Again, pray for
11 Chicago because this is what I do, is pray for
12 Chicago, America and the world. All power to
13 the people. All power to the people.

14 MR. FOREMAN: John Catanzara.

15 JOHN CATANZARA: First, I'd like to say to
16 the Board members, as you go forward deciding
17 the fate and employment over a handful of
18 officers in the Laquan McDonald incident, a
19 Rule 14 violation sustained is not an automatic
20 fire rule offense. I stand before you as
21 evidence of that, so keep that in mind and
22 don't bother with public pressure.

23 Mr. Superintendent, in February when you
24 were the acting first deputy I asked you about



1 a promotion to then Commander Buslik about --
2 after he was shortly sustained CR for
3 threatening and harassing and intimidating a
4 licensed business owner and why he was not
5 demoted but promoted from captain to commander.
6 You said you were going to look into that
7 incident. Did you get a chance to look into
8 that?

9 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Not fully.

10 MR. SIMPSON: Pardon me?

11 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Not fully.

12 JOHN CATANZARA: I will forward everything
13 I got to your secretary's office, and hopefully
14 we can get an answer soon here, because I still
15 don't understand how he got promoted.

16 Lastly, over the course of the last few
17 years then First Deputy Wysinger, I asked him
18 several times, the Archdiocese of Chicago gets
19 free police protection at the Cardinal's
20 residence, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.
21 This has been going on for at least 16 years I
22 know. I am sure it's been going on for
23 decades.

24 Does that money get paid back to the



1 police department of the city of Chicago for
2 that police protection?

3 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: I am not aware.

4 JOHN CATANZARA: 18th District, as a
5 policeman there, first, second and third watch
6 is their detail, if that's what they're told to
7 do, that's what is done, but these are active
8 policemen. That's several hundred thousand
9 dollars a year of police protection the
10 Archdiocese of Chicago gets. Seems like a
11 gross violation of separation of church and
12 state and a waste of tax dollars. So, I mean,
13 Deputy Wysinger refused to answer the question
14 on two separate occasions six months apart. So
15 I would appreciate it if you could find out. I
16 still haven't gotten an answer five years
17 later. Thank you.

18 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Thank you.

19 MR. FOREMAN: EveAngel Yhwnewbn.

20 EVEANGEL YHWNEWBN: Halleluiaah, greetings.
21 For the record, Mr. Robert Plum is a very good
22 friend of mine, but I object to you not
23 following the rules. That is why -- excuse me,
24 excuse me, that's why you are not trusted or



1 respected because you don't follow your own
2 rules.

3 I have two questions, in high homicide and
4 shooting areas like Englewood, why are the
5 officers not wearing body cameras?

6 Question number two, Superintendent you
7 have put a lot of emphasis on repeat -- repeat,
8 stiffer penalties for repeat shooting, repeat
9 gun violators, you put a lot of emphasis on
10 that and thought and said they should get more
11 time when they repeat these offenders, these
12 offenses. But my question is, do you have any
13 plans to put stiffer penalties for repeat
14 killer cops, violators that commit or commit
15 homicide or shoot unarmed suspects? Do you
16 have any emphasis you plan to put on that? why
17 or why not?

18 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: I'll start with
19 your first question. Regarding body cameras in
20 Englewood, by 2018 all officers that you see
21 patrolling in marked squad cars all across the
22 city, citywide will have body cameras. You are
23 correct, Englewood doesn't have them yet but
24 there are plans in place that they will get



1 them in the not too distant future, but, of
2 course, with any technology like that that you
3 roll out, funding is always the issue. If I
4 had the money for it, the entire police force
5 would have body cameras. I am a fan of it. I
6 think it shows the incident in its entirety and
7 takes a lot of questions away. So they will be
8 getting the body worn cameras.

9 EVEANGEL YHWNEWBN: I was concerned maybe
10 you have cameras on officers in areas maybe on
11 the north side or something that don't have
12 high rates of homicide and suspect shooting.
13 And there should be some priority put on the
14 areas of need, that is what I was wanting you
15 to address.

16 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: That's duly
17 noted, but as I said, everybody at a certain
18 point will have a body worn camera. I will
19 take that into consideration.

20 In regards to your second question about
21 repeat gun offenders, in terms of police
22 officers, listen, I have said from day one that
23 accountability within CPD starts with me, and
24 goes all the way down to the last probationary



1 police officer. So if we find an instance
2 where a police officer is wrongfully committing
3 use of force, then that person will be dealt
4 with swiftly. It's as simple as that, but we
5 also have to keep in mind we have due process
6 that we have to go through. CPD does not
7 investigate use of force incidents within CPD,
8 so we have to wait for the investigation to be
9 done by IPRA, which is turning into COPA and
10 that's the system that we have. But to that
11 end, if we find police officers engaging in
12 misconduct, they'll be dealt with accordingly.

13 EVEANGEL YHWNEWBN: I appreciate your
14 answer. I was at a hearing down at city hall.
15 They said the police officers had more rights
16 than the Bill of Rights, so I hope some of
17 these things when they are -- police contracts
18 comes up again, that you take some of those
19 rights away and treat them like other citizens
20 who should not break the rules just because
21 they have the power to violate as you did young
22 man. Thank you.

23 MR. FOREMAN: Thank you. Queen Sister.

24 QUEEN SISTER: Blessings. I would have



1 loved to have seen your face, I would have
2 loved to have seen your face when my name come
3 up all the way in Rome at the Vatican, but more
4 than that, I like to know what it is you were
5 doing in Rome when black folks was dying in the
6 streets here. You have a duty and an
7 obligation to us here. You have a lot of damn
8 nerve not showing up 12 times a year here. How
9 come when you first got here, I introduced you
10 to the village trustee. I am disturbed that
11 you had not contacted me to take that into
12 consideration, but I know why because it was a
13 culturally incompetent homicide prevention, not
14 planned, not programmed, not project, but a
15 strategy that will result to self-sufficiency
16 to black folk.

17 Now, you went into that closet with that
18 country club mayor and you made the deal at the
19 expense of the peoples' safety, and today we
20 don't know whether or not it come with a
21 country club membership but what we do know is
22 you have community meetings in dark closets
23 with these little girly boys running around as
24 paid protesters under the false pretense of



1 activists that we know today are agent
2 provocateurs. That video that is going viral
3 on the internet where (inaudible) parlays into
4 the hands of the police officers and claims to
5 have been taken into custody, I know it wasn't
6 him because we had every attorney from legal
7 defense and every precinct in this city and he
8 was not in custody.

9 I don't know what kind of thrill it is you
10 get from the game you playing, but I think you
11 get more pleasure out of playing with yourself
12 because of the satisfaction guarantee.

13 MR. FOREMAN: Conclude your comments.

14 QUEEN SISTER: Now, we come here at the
15 end of the year with 3,486 citizens shot and
16 wounded, 672 killed with a total of gun
17 violence, with a total of 4,158 victims that is
18 creating this 2016 blood flowing through my
19 streets. You sit there on your black ass with
20 your chest pulled out like that's something to
21 be proud about. Everything that Jew boy does
22 is out of respect for Jewish culture, but we
23 know not to expect nothing from you because you
24 know not who you are and where you come from,



1 and you have no respect for those of us out
2 here paying the price and the ultimate
3 sacrifice.

4 MR. FOREMAN: Next speaker. Robert Moore.
5 At this time, all those persons who signed up
6 to speak have been recognized. Is there a
7 motion adjourn?

8 MR. SIMPSON: So move.

9 MR. EADDY: Second.

10 MR. FOREMAN: All in favor?

11 (Ayes in unison.)

12 MR. FOREMAN: The motion passes and the
13 meeting is adjourned.

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
