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1	MS. LIGHTFOOT: We're going to get started.
2	Good evening everyone, my name is Lori Lightfoot,
3	and I'm president of the Chicago Police Board, and
4	I'm calling the meeting to order. Board members
5	Ballate and Simpson are unable to attend this
6	meeting in person and wish to attend via
7	video-audio. Is there a motion to permit them to do
8	so?
9	MR. FOREMAN: So moved.
10	MR. CONLON: Second.
11	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor?
12	(chorus of ayes.) Opposed? Motion passes.
13	At this time I would like to welcome
14	acting Superintendent John Escalante to his first
15	Police Board meeting. Welcome. If you have a few
16	remarks, please do so.
17	SUPERINTENDENT ESCALANTE: Thank you. I'll
18	stand for those that cannot see me in the back.
19	Briefly I want to introduce myself. My name is John
20	Escalante, and I'm the Interim Superintendent for
21	the Chicago Police Department, and I'll be filling
22	in as the Interim Superintendent until a new
23	superintendent is named. During that time I intend
24	to do what I can to keep the Department moving



forward, and specifically tonight listen to your 1 2 concerns and make sure that they are addressed. 3 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you Acting Superintendent Escalante. Also, new to the Police Board meeting 4 tonight is the new Chief of the Independent Police 5 Review Authority, Sharon Fairley. Ms. Fairley, 6 7 please make a few comments. I'll stand as well. Good evening 8 MS. FAIRLEY: 9 everyone. My name is Sharon Fairley, and I'm the new acting Chief Administrator of IPRA. 10 I'm honored and humbled to be in this position at this time, 11 12 with the challenges that this organization faces. Ι 13 promise you all that my goal in this role will be to 14 pursue integrity and transparency in the work that 15 IPRA does, and that I hope at the end of the day, I 16 will achieve that goal, and that you will all feel 17 confident that you can trust that quality of the investigation that is undertaken on behalf of that 18

2	MR. FOREMAN: Second.	
3	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor by a show of	
4	hands. Any opposed? Voting in favor are Board	
5	members Foreman, Ballate, Conlon, Eaddy, Fry,	
6	Simpson, Sweeney, Valenzuela, and myself. Motion	
7	passes.	
8	Is there a motion to adopt the written	
9	findings and decision that has been reviewed by all	
10	Board members who participated in the case?	
11	MS. FRY: So moved.	
12	MR. FOREMAN: Second.	
13	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor? (Chorus of	
14	ayes.) Any opposed? The motion passes by unanimous	
15	vote.	
16	The Board's decisions in all cases in	
17	which we took final action this evening will be	
18	entered as of today's date and will be issued to the	
19	parties. A copy of the written decisions will be	
20	posted on the Board's website within ten business	
21	days pursuant to the Municipal Code of Chicago.	
22	The general orders and other directives	
23	issued by the Superintendent of Police during the	
24	previous months are listed in the blue books and are	

available on the Police Department's website. 1 There 2 are a couple of additional issues that I want to call to the public's attention. 3 As you're aware, the Police Board has 4 started the process of selection of a new police 5 superintendent. We will be announcing that process 6 7 formally tomorrow with the issuance of an application that will be available for interested 8 9 parties to use in applying for the job, and specific steps related to what our process will be, and all 10 that information will be available to the public 11 12 tomorrow.

I'll say that we are clearly mindful of the fact that we need to move with an appropriate speed to make sure that we provide three qualified members -- three qualified candidates to the mayor for purposes of selection.

As a part of our process, we have heard from a number of voices. We expect and hope that we will continue to hear from those voices as we engage in the process, and we will be holding public hearings as a Police Board body for the purposes of hearing specifically from the public, both about the qualities that you believe the next superintendent



should have, as well as any specific policies or
 issues that you believe that we should take into
 consideration as we interview candidates for this
 very important position. We will have more on that
 for you tomorrow.

One other issue that I want to speak 6 about before we hear from individuals who have 7 signed up to speak tonight. Regarding the case of 8 9 Dante Servin, that's clearly been a case that a 10 number of you have spoken about for quite some time at each of the Police Board meeting as well as other 11 12 circumstances. As you're aware, I believe from the 13 media, the Superintendent concurred with the 14 recommendations of IPRA to terminate Dante Servin. 15 Formal charges have been filed recently with the 16 Police Board and we have started our process. There 17 will be an initial status in the matter later this 18 month, and I want to assure the public that the 19 process by which the Police Board reaches its 20 ultimate decision with respect to the charges with 21 Dante Servin, like in any case, will be transparent 22 and will be public.

And specifically, the hearing, the evidentiary hearing, it will take place and the



matter will be open to the public. There will be 1 2 advance notice so those members who are interested in coming to that hearing will be notified and able 3 to participate. Like all of our decisions with 4 respect to disciplinary cases, our final decision 5 will both be in writing and that decision will be 6 If you 7 made available to members of the public. have specific questions or want to be informed about 8 9 that case or any other case as they proceed, feel free to talk to the -- contact the Police Board 10 11 Offices.

12 One last thing I want to say before we 13 open this up for public questions. Obviously in 14 this city we are faced with a remarkable challenge, 15 but also in my view a remarkable opportunity. The 16 events of the last two weeks which many of you have participated in and given voice to your concerns, 17 18 your comments, your complaints about policing, about 19 the way in which police engage the public, have been 20 really a part of, I think this historic opportunity 21 for us to move the Department and the city in a very 22 different and necessary direction.

I want you to know on behalf of thePolice Board, we have heard you. We have heard you



at our meetings. We have heard and seen you in the 1 2 We have heard and listened to you as you streets. have corresponded with us individually and 3 collectively, and we will continue to listen. 4 Ι think that's important for you all to know, 5 And we want to share that with you before we open up 6 7 the meeting to the public portion of the process. But I can assure you, we are listening. 8 We do hear 9 you, and we take your thoughts and concerns into consideration, and we are mindful of the fact that 10 11 all of us are here to serve you, members of the 12 public.

13 At this time, I'll call upon those 14 members of the public who signed up in advance to 15 When your name is called, please step up to speak. 16 the microphone. And as always, we ask you to limit 17 your comment to two minutes. We have a number of 18 people who have signed up to speak tonight. And 19 again, I would encourage us, as we have in the past 20 meetings, to be mindful of that fact, and be respectful of the people who will be coming after 21 22 you so that all people who have signed up in advance 23 have an opportunity to speak. The first person is 24 Megan Vaughn Brand Holmberg.



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1	MS. HOLMBERG: Good evening members of the
2	Board, Superintendent Escalante, and Chief
3	Administrator Fairley. My name is Megan Vaughn
4	Brand Holmberg. I'm here to speak to you about the
5	CPD's longstanding pattern of violence against
6	people of color, and am deeply concerned about the
7	safety of my neighbors when the people who are hired
8	to protect us have attacked us. My primary question
9	to you this evening though is not about your
10	reaction to the horrific acts of police violence,
11	although I find these reactions to be incredibly
12	inadequate. I believe also that Officer Servin
13	should be fired immediately without pension, and I
14	should say, and the force of those who have
15	committed acts of violence without reason.
16	And I would like to my primary
17	question to you tonight is, how are you becoming
18	proactive? What are you doing to solve this problem
19	before it starts? There is overwhelming evidence
20	that leading the public to believe that the
21	Chicago Police Department is racist.
22	And I must assume that if these
23	accusations really concerned you, that you would be

24 actively promoting your initiatives to develop an



1	anti-racist organizational culture. I have heard
2	nothing of the sort being publicized, at least not
3	until some words this past week, but not the words
4	"anti racist" have not been used. And if you're not
5	allowing a culture of racism into CPD, what evidence
6	do you have to support that claim? On the issue of
7	police training, I want to know how many hours of
8	cultural responsiveness and anti-racism training are
9	required to become a Chicago Police Officer?
10	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up. Please wrap
11	it up.
12	MS. HOLMBERG: How many hours of continuing
13	education? I'm a teacher and my spouse is a social
14	worker. As fellow public servants, we understand
15	the importance being called upon
16	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am, please wrap up.
17	MS. HOLMBERG: Our licensure not only requires
18	one semester of on the courses dedicated
19	exclusively to racism and culpability and that every
20	other required course
21	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.
22	MS. HOLMBERG: On this topic, these standards
23	are crucial to being reflective of your work. And
24	if you have not included that so far, then you



cannot say that you have been working --1 2 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am. MS. HOLMBERG: -- towards this problem. 3 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am, your time is up. 4 MS. HOLMBERG: What curriculum do you intend 5 to teach to your officers about race and culture? 6 7 Who --MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ms. Aubrey Keyes. 8 The next 9 speaker is Aubrey Pierre Keyes. Ma'am, you need to 10 yield the floor. (No response.) Otha McCoy is the 11 next person. Good evening sir. 12 MR. McCOY: Good evening. My name is Otha 13 McCoy, The Second. I'm a retired Chicago police 14 officer, 28-years-and-a-half years, and 19 years ago 15 this month the Chicago Police Department's Internal 16 Affairs Division came on the West Side of Chicago 17 and destroyed the Austin community. They brought a 18 bunch of liars, a bunch of thieves, and destroyed 19 the community that I put my life in. I talked to 20 Superintendent Weiss. I brought this down to 21 McCarthy. The IAD people kicked the can down the 22 road. Three officers, two black and Hispanic, is 23 now in jail for crimes they didn't commit.

The Chicago Police Department gave a man

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1	who looks like me, an undercover police, orders to
2	do a robbery of an FBI agent. The federal
3	government participated in this fraud investigation
4	that destroyed the black community. I have come
5	down here, a highly decorated police officer with
6	over 225 honorable mentions. I have two masters
7	degrees and helped numerous people from both sides
8	of the aisle. You can't find one policeman or one
9	criminal that says I ever did anything or my guys
10	did anything wrong to them. And my guys sent me
11	here tonight to read you something real quickly, and
12	I'm going to give you a document to show you the
13	crime they put on these Black officers and this
14	Hispanic officer 19 years ago. And if they had a
15	listened to me 19 years ago, we would not be here
16	tonight. This was what they told me to say to you.
17	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is almost up. If
18	you could
19	MR. McCOY: "They told you a story so now I
20	can tell you the truth. I wasn't arrested, I was
21	kidnapped. I wasn't indicted, I was framed. I
22	wasn't interrogated, I was tortured. This is not an
23	investigation, this is a conspiracy to violate the

24 civil rights of the people of the Austin community,



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1	a violation of their civil rights of equal
2	protection under the law. I'm not going to it's
3	not going to be my word against theirs. I'm going
4	to tell you what they said. I'm going to tell you
5	what they did. Was that a police corruption or was
6	that a government conspiracy? This time, you will
7	decide who is guilty or innocent. Let the trial
8	begin."
9	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you sir. Next speaker
10	is Paul McKinley. (No response.) Jonathan
11	Projanski. Good evening.
12	MR. PROJANSKI: Good evening. I wish I could
13	say it was a better evening, but tonight many people
14	have come here on behalf of the victims of police
15	violence who can no longer speak for themselves to
16	ensure those officers who decided to abuse the
17	authority they were given and to take the lives of
18	some of the same people they swore to protect and
19	serve. We are here in solidary with Martinez
20	Sutton, who has come before you time and time again
21	just to ensure justice for his sister, Rekia Boyd.
22	My question is, why should he or anyone else have to
23	go to these lengths when there is clearly someone
24	responsible? Why should he have to delay his



ability to grieve for his sister just to make sure that the Chicago Police Department properly disciplines and dismisses their own officers? We are talking about law enforcement, which means we are talking about public safety, and therefore, people's lives.

7 Have you ever lost somebody close to you, your parent, your sibling, your child? Well I have, 8 9 and so has Martinez Sutton, Dorothy Holmes, and so many more parents and siblings throughout the city. 10 11 If you would experience a loss like this, you would 12 know there is no time line on the grieving process. 13 You would know it's something you're going to have 14 to figure out how to live with for the rest of your 15 life. Some of the most traumatic losses are those 16 that happen when there is a death of a child and 17 And I'm here to tell you, you have no siblings. 18 right to inflict further violence on these families.

I know full well, I know who appointed who. Rahm Emanuel is the same person who is now trying to apologize for his failed oversight of the public safety of Chicago but only because of public and political pressure. If he really cared, he would resigned, this Board would resign, and we



1	would have an elected police accountability board.
2	Rekia deserves to rest and our families deserve to
3	heal, and you will determine what you deserve based
4	on the decision you make about Officer Dante Servin
5	and anyone else who dares take the life of our
6	children, our people, throughout this city of
7	Chicago. Say her name.
8	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker, Jhaytan Travis.
9	Good evening, ma'am.

10 MS. TRAVIS: In 2007 a young man in my community was killed by the police in the heart of 11 12 my neighborhood though he was unarmed. Usually 13 leaders organize and demonstrate and march from the 14 scene of his murder to this police station calling 15 for justice, just as for the past three years 16 community leaders called for justice in the police 17 killing of Rekia Boyd. This Board has been confronted by a unified call for these killers to be 18 19 fired for years, a community call that this Board 20 has also ignored for years. First, this Board 21 should move to fire Dante Servin, the killer of 22 Rekia Boyd. This Board should also move to fire 23 every officer associated with the murder of LaQuan McDonald and the subsequent cover up, as well as the 24





officer involved in the killing and cover up of 1 2 Ronald Johnson. Second, the members of the Police Board 3 should stand with the people of the city who are 4 demanding that a broken system of police 5 accountability be fixed by resigning as a group in 6 7 protest of this broken system and demanding instead that you be replaced. You be replaced by a 8 9 democratically elected police board. 10 Finally, everyone here and across the state should demand their state representative --11 12 support state representatives for the legislation to 13 make it possible for voters to recall the mayor who 14 has failed, has failed, has failed to -- in the city 15 for more than four years. Our leadership has 16 refused to take action and we need new leadership. 17 We have endured decades of brutality, murder, and 18 mistreatment at the hands of officers paid by our 19 tax dollars. We have drive the -- dried the tears 20 of mothers, fathers, children, and friends whose lives will never be the same due to the tragic 21 22 losses from the very hands that agreed to protect 23 them.

MS. LIGHTFOOT: Please wrap up.

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1	MS. TRAVIS: Our community where our own sons
2	and daughters are the victims of police violence at
3	the hands of police officers who are never held
4	accountable for their crimes. I stand
5	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.
6	MS. TRAVIS: With young people who will lead
7	this movement. We are with you in this struggle
8	because we stand together.
9	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is Joseph
10	Watkins. (No response.) Next speaker is Monica
11	James.
12	MS. JAMES: Greetings to the people, greetings
13	to the Board. The City of Chicago is facing the
14	worst uprising during my time. Sadly, the city of
15	Chicago in its trust delegated chief officers, and
16	the officers have failed to uphold the integrity of
17	the Chicago Police Department's mission statement,
18	the Police Department's core values, and your pledge
19	against racism and gender profiling. In doing so,
20	you all have concealed the recklessness of police
21	conduct that has came across your desk, reckless
22	conduct that has resulted in mass incarceration, in
23	the loss of life, and in that absence of trust
24	that has been the trust has been shattered of



1	these beautiful people that you see here.
2	And as we aim to restore the dignity and
3	safety of our community, we ask and demand that you
4	all step down because the because it is you
5	people that's seen all of what's going on today
6	before we even had a chance to address it. What you
7	see here today is a body of professionals, a body of
8	parents, families, friends, and students who have
9	sacrificed their livelihood to do the job that we
10	have paid you all to do.
11	Justice will not come until each and
12	every last one of you are removed because there is
13	no quick fix to this. We need new representation.
14	You have not been just by our communities, by our
15	people, and with that, we ask, we beg, and we plead
16	for you all to have dignity and grace and step down.
17	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is Solo John.
18	Good evening.
19	MR. JOHN: Good evening. I'm here
20	representing the fast food workers and Fight For
21	Fifteen. We don't tolerate the disrespect we have
22	been shown and the injustice that our communities
23	are facing. We don't have confidence that the
24	Chicago police officers are serving and protect us



1	because they haven't been held accountable for their
2	actions. Shooting unarmed men and women is not
3	justice. Lying on police reports and withholding
4	evidence is not justice. Phoney investigations and
5	and the delay of releasing dash cam videos are
6	not justice. And Rahm, first of all, he is not even
7	here with us. He's not even here. He's not
8	listening to us. Rahm thinks that he can fix us by
9	appointing his friends and his biggest donors to the
10	Board. That's not justice. We continue to lift up
11	the names of our lost loved ones like Rekia Boyd,
12	LaQuan McDonald, and Randy Man Johnson.

We demand real justice for all Black and Brown people. We demand real justice by letting our -- electing our own Board president, consistently shows that Black lives does not matter, that no, it's time to take matters into our own hands.

18 As fast food workers from our community 19 we make low wages, and we still have to pay tax 20 dollars to support Chicago PD's corrupt system and 21 We aren't going to let this happen any coverups. 22 more. We refuse to support the salary of killers 23 like Dante Servin, so fire Dante Servin. We are 24 Black and Brown workers and the same people you're



killing in these streets are not going to stop until 1 2 we win. 3 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is Ilona Gersh. 4 My name is Ilona Gersh. 5 MS. GERSH: I speak for the American Socialist Workers Party. Rekia 6 7 Boyd, you need to fire Dante Servin now. Hasn't IPRA's process taken long enough? 8 Do it now. 9 LaQuan McDonald on the video, we saw him walk away 10 from the cops. Has Van Dyke been fired? No. Do it 11 now. What's the problem? Have those who were 12 complicit in hiding the truth been charged, 13 including Emmanuel and Alvarez, the other cops on 14 What's the problem? the scene? No. Isn't 400 days 15 long enough? 16 We watched the video of Ronald Johnson.

17 We saw him run away from the cops into the park. Ι watched with my coworkers in the lunchroom at 18 19 Walmart where I work. They were riveted to the T.V. 20 The breaks were longer that day than any other day 21 We saw the video countless times that that week. We saw it in slow motion. We saw a blow up of 22 day. 23 Did we see a gun in his hand? No. Alvarez it. 24 says no charges were being made against the cops who



1	killed him because he could have turned to shoot at
2	the cops, because he could have been running towards
3	the cops parked in the car on the other side of the
4	park. Is killing justified on that basis because
5	someone could possibly be a threat in the future?
6	No.
7	Those cops need to be charged and
8	prosecuted. We watched the video the same day of
9	Phillip Coleman. This video of Phillip Coleman was
10	held for three years. The day it was released the
11	parents watched it on TV news. They hadn't been
12	told that it was it had been released. They
13	watched, and we watched as their son was attacked in
14	a jail cell by six cops.
15	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.
16	MS. GERSH: Where he was being held by the
17	gang who when they held him with a pole. Was he
18	a threat to the cops in jail? To the he
19	shouldn't have been there in the first place.
20	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.
21	MS. GERSH: There can be no justice for this
22	family. The US has the largest apparatus in the
23	world.
24	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am



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And the highest incarceration 1 MS. GERSH: 2 rate, and we need to resolve these questions now. 3 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you. Our next speaker is Rachel Williams. Good evening, Ms. Williams. 4 MS. WILLIAMS: Good evening unelected Board. 5 6 You cannot be a representation of a community in 7 which you do not serve. I have never seen one of I have never seen you but downtown. 8 vou but here. 9 You ain't never been in Austin, North Lawndale, 10 Roseland so you cannot be a representation of the 11 community in which we are a part of. Again, when we 12 talk about Rekia, we have been pushing Rekia. One, 13 the FOP contract in this city states that police 14 officers can be suspended upon termination for 30 15 davs. Why haven't any of you enacted that with 16 Dante Servin, Jason Van Dyke, or George Hernandez 17 and many other officers who have caused bodily harm to families? 18

19 I have a question. Since IPRA has a new 20 chief of administrator, so has IPRA justified my 21 mother's getting hit in the face with her face 22 having to be sewn? Reopen that. As a matter of 23 fact, reopen everything that has been justified by 24 your police department. There is no reason anything



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you should say that is unjustified when there is 1 2 video. There is no reason. There is no reason I'm paying tax dollars for you, for the people who cause 3 There is no reason that we should have 4 bodily harm. My plan and what I'm saying, you want a 5 this issue. 6 new plan for the new superintendent? Defund CPD. 7 Take back that four million dollars in operating budget and defund it because there is no reason 8 9 there should be more police officers than counselors, and there is no reason there should be 10 11 more police officers than nurses in the schools. 12 Until you do what is right by the community which 13 you obviously do not serve, we will be here.

MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is JohnHawkins.

16 MR. HAWKINS: My name is John Hawkins. I'm speaking on behalf of the Socialist Workers Party. 17 18 I would like to say that my party is very proud to 19 be here with the four organizations that have been 20 organizing to speak before you to tell the truth to 21 Black Youth Project, 100, We Charge the Board. 22 Genocide, Black Lives Matter, The Chicago Alliance 23 Against Racist and Political Oppression have 24 mobilized people to come out, and you see every



single month the crowd gets bigger. 1 This represents 2 something bigger than the issue of police brutality in Chicago. There is something afoot in the 3 The Chicago Police Board better listen to 4 country. it because it reflects itself not only in this fight 5 and other fights around the country against racist 6 7 abuse and against mistreatment of African Americans, and a new mood in the country in which we will not 8 9 tolerate this anymore.

A number of cases that this Board should 10 11 take note of, the most prominent have been 12 mentioned, the case of LaQuan McDonald, the case of 13 Rekia Boyd, the case of Ronald Johnson, but you have 14 to take up the case of Cedrick Chapman. It has to 15 be taken up and reopened. There is the case of 16 Dakota Bright, whose mother hasn't even received an 17 autopsy report on the killing of her son. The City 18 has refused to release the autopsy report. Doesn't 19 she have the right to see what was done to her 20 Shouldn't the officers who did it need to be child? 21 held accountable?

There is a case of two related cases, Flint Farmer and Darius Pinax, who were both killed by the same officer who was drunk the night he



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1	killed Flint Farmer and shot him execution style the
2	same way Van Dyke shot McDonald. We all know that
3	officers are trained to discharge their weapons
4	until a suspect so-called suspect stops. That's
5	how they're trained. And they're not they're
6	trained to shoot and keep shooting until the
7	so-called threat has been eliminated. That means
8	they empty their gun on almost every occasion.
9	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.
10	MR. HAWKINS: That is what happened in the
11	case of Flint Farmer as well. This Board should
12	fire Servin now. It should fire Van Dyke now, and
13	should fire all the cops who are on the scene who
14	lie, lie on their reports, now. That should be done
15	now.
16	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.
17	MR. HAWKINS: And
18	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Please wrap up. Our next
19	speaker is LaCreshia Birts.
20	MS. BIRTS: I don't have anything to say. I
21	want to give my time to Dorothy Holmes.
22	MS. HOLMES: You all seen the video just as
23	well as we all did. All you all that's sitting up
24	there, even those two that's not paying attention on



that end, my son was unarmed when he was murdered by 1 Detective George Hernandez. And for Anita Alvarez 2 to sit up there and blow that tape up and make it 3 look big to say he had an object in his hand, I'm 4 going to say to you all, she's a bald faced liar. 5 There is nothing that could keep her from covering 6 7 it up, and I'm going to keep on fighting, and I'm going to keep on fighting because it's left up to me 8 9 she needs a DOC suit on. When she puts it on, she 10 can take Rahm Emanuel with her. That apology he did 11 today, he could have saved that for the birds. He 12 didn't mean that. It should not have took no 400 13 days for this man to look at a video showing that my 14 son was murdered.

Then you have LaQuan, he was murdered eight days after my son. Then you release the videos after elections. That's a cover up. Ya'll don't know my pain unless ya'll kids was killed by these people that's standing right here looking at us as criminals.

We aren't the criminals. They are the criminals. Then he stated that on his deposition, which was November 19th, he wasn't worried about going to jail. Maybe he had a talk with Anita



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1	Alvarez. She had already told him he wasn't going
2	because I feel like he should been indicted. He
3	lied and he lied under oath. So that means you are
4	saying it's okay for him to lie under oath instead
5	of a person's life? It's not okay to lie. Those
6	lies catch up with you, and I'm a lover and I love
7	my son and his life matters to me.
8	And evidently it matters to everybody
9	else that's in this room or this room would be
10	empty. So I know Martinez Sutton's pain. His
11	sister was murdered by Dante Servin, and ya'll still
12	haven't took this man's job. So you must like
13	paying for what he did. So you're paying for
14	murderers to be on the street.
15	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ma'am, your time is running
16	out.
17	MS. HOLMES: That ain't right. It ain't over
18	with yet. I promise you it ain't. Just like
19	they're trying to throw my son's name under the bus,
20	I'm going to throw ya'll up under the bus with it.
21	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is Christa
22	Noel. Please proceed.
23	MS. NOEL: You know what I see today? I see
24	something beautiful. I see the people speak out. I





1	see us exercising our First Amendment rights. I see
2	us being Americans, and I see us taking control of
3	what we need to take control of, which is our life.
4	When we first started this battle with
5	Rekia Boyd back in April of 2012, and there are a
6	few of ya'll in the room that were here in April
7	2012. Why don't you all stand up? When we started
8	this battle for Rekia back in April of 2012, we had
9	no idea it would come to this.
10	You know, we have a DOJ investigation of
11	people standing around in this room. We have a new
12	IPRA chief administrator. We have a new chief
13	administrator which I happen to be happy about that.
14	And I like what you said about if you find something
15	wrong, then you will look at the policy and change
16	the policy. That's something new. Most people just
17	say if we find something wrong, we find something
18	wrong. They don't go deep diving and say we're
19	going to change the policy. So as of this moment,
20	you have my confidence.
21	Vou all algo have my confidence in firing

You all also have my confidence in firing Dante Servin. I ain't worried about that. I'm not going to worry about that. I know you're going to do it. I know there are police officers in this



1	room who think Dante Servin should be fired, okay.
2	In April of 2012 many of them walked up to Martinez
3	Sutton and apologized to him. I read online police
4	officers say I'll tell you what one police
5	officer said. He said, "he's going to mess it up
б	for all of us," and he did. He did. He messed it
7	up for everybody. Now you all really, really,
8	really are going to be held accountable. You're
9	going to always think.
10	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Ms. Noel
11	MS. NOEL: Think when you put your hand on
12	that gun and pull it, you're always going to think
13	whether or not you should be doing that in this
14	moment at that time. You're going to look to make
15	sure you're going to look to make sure that there
16	is something in their hands that makes you afraid,
17	and it ain't a cell phone, it ain't a wallet, and it
18	ain't a candy bar. Thank you. Fire Dante.
19	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker is Wallace
20	Bradley. (No response.) Next is Queen Sister. (No

21 response.) Next speaker is Robert Moore.

22 MR. MORE: It is December 9, 2015, speaking on 23 behalf of St. Michael the Archangel. First of all, 24 so I address every -- all the comments that I



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1	believe are in (unintelligible.)
2	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Please have some respect for
3	those folks. They would like to speak and would
4	like to be heard just like you would. Please
5	proceed.
6	MR. MORE: Thank you, Ms. Lightfoot. I'm
7	wondering, are you the new superintendent are you
8	the acting superintendent or what is your position?
9	MS. LIGHTFOOT: He's the acting
10	superintendent.
11	MR. MORE: I would like to go to the
12	substantive issues, get back to the structural issue
13	of this dynamic arrangement. But first of all, my
14	question is, what is the present status of the Land
15	Young and Spencer murder investigation?
16	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More
17	MR. MORE: What is the present status of those
18	investigations?
19	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More, please make your
20	statement.
21	MR. MORE: I'm asking.
22	MS. LIGHTFOOT: This is not the appropriate
23	forum for those kinds of questions.
24	MR. MORE: Number two, Mr. Superintendent,



would you be willing to wear a wire under the terms
and conditions that are listed in the
thirstforjusticetripod.com website to protect
ongoing investigations and other legitimate reliance
interests? Would you be willing to wear a wire so
that the priority upon which activity conducted by
you, superintendent of the police department, can be
apprehended by all the members of the public when
they make their determination for themselves whether
or not the activity of this entity is being
conducted to accommodate there legitimate reliance
or accommodate some other agenda that is
incompatible with their agenda interests?
MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More, that is not an
appropriate question.
MR. MORE: Ms. Lightfoot
MS. LIGHTFOOT: Please proceed.
MR. MORE: I have the next issue is this,
under what authority do you determine that these are
not appropriate questions? There is a restriction
that is promulgated. There is a due process issue
here, and your predecessor was not able to keep his
activity between the lines in that regard. He is
subject to an indictment.





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1	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More, please proceed.
2	MR. MORE: What is the basis upon
3	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Please proceed sir. Your time
4	is running out.
5	MR. MORE: I understand, but I'm trying to
6	the whole point is, my presentation of this juncture
7	anyone can go to thirstforjusticetripod.com and
8	see all the things I won't be able to get into the
9	presentation. So if you could try to get to the
10	bottom of these murders, which are very important,
11	and also try to set in a structure so that there is
12	a fear of backfire that prevents any attempt to do
13	something. This is false flag tyranny.
14	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Your time is up.
15	MS. MORE: Okay, thank you.
16	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our last speaker is Queen
17	Sister.
18	QUEEN SISTER: Thank you. (Singing) "I don't
19	know what you gonna do. I come to stomp my feet. I
20	come to clap my hands. I come to do my dance."
21	Yes, welcome. I welcome you. I prayed for you.
22	You're an answer to my prayer on a nightly basis for
23	the sake of my city. Let me just say I need to flip
24	the script and reverse the curse. Everybody is



1	talking about the homicide and murder that's taking
2	place in the city, but Queen Sister loves the
3	babies. I was here in October to present to the
4	Board a Village Project Safe Neighborhood Program,
5	which is an at-risk resident, child protection,
6	community awareness, and public safety initiative.
7	Yes, it's all of that because we are in need of all
8	of that.

9 I was prevented from speaking and my rights to this open meeting were violated because 10 11 the same night of the meeting, two police officers 12 were being charged and in the news for child 13 pornography. They didn't mention it. And I told 14 them when they were here. I would like to speak 15 with you about this initiative. It's one that we 16 run during Halloween to protect our elders. It 17 It builds revenue, and it allows us creates jobs. 18 to participate in the public safety process. I was 19 the originator of the no-gun decal. It started in 20 the village. I'm also the creator of the Safe 21 Passage program that you see throughout the city 22 that everybody is taking credit for, that we haven't 23 yet been reimbursed for.

So the corruption and cover up, it



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started with Eric Holder coming and covering up for 1 2 Arne Dunkin and Mayor Daley around Darion Albert. So if we are going to go back, let us go back and 3 I have 100 youth that are being pushed 4 clean up. into the streets to eat this, and I want you to see 5 6 it here first because you don't see it anywhere. 7 And what it is is a modern day stranger danger 8 program.

9 Because I couldn't come to the meeting 10 last month because these are the lists of sexual 11 predators in my community. And I pray that you go 12 home and you pull your list so you know who you're 13 living around and who's jeopardizing your safety. 14 And these are the lists --

15

MS. LIGHTFOOT: Queen Sister.

16 OUEEN SISTER: -- of child murderers. There is a list of people in your community that are 17 18 capable of taking the life of your children. And 19 you know it, they know it. So I'm asking you to 20 call the mayor, and we're going to push up on the 21 new superintendent, and we want to see this decal as 22 a protective mechanism for our children. I filed a 23 foyer, and I told her I haven't heard from you, this 24 information regarding child protection should be

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1	readily available, and you should have received it
2	in five days. When we go on to look
3	MS. LIGHTFOOT: Please wrap up.
4	QUEEN SISTER: At your post, you posted only
5	2013 and 15 foyers. We have a right to see and know
6	what's going on today. My name is Queen Sister and
7	I represent it takes a village.
8	MS. LIGHTFOOT: At this time all those persons
9	who sign up in advance to speak have been
10	recognized. Is there a motion to adjourn?
11	MR. FOREMAN: So moved.
12	MR. EADDY: Second.
13	MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. (Chorus
14	of ayes.) Any opposed? Motion passes, and the
15	meeting is adjourned. Thank you.
