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- 1 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: We're going to get
- 2 started.
- 3 Good evening. I am Lori Lightfoot,
- 4 President of the Chicago Police Board. I am
- 5 calling the meeting to order.
- 6 We begin the meeting by welcoming
- 7 a new member and friend, Andrea Zopp, president
- 8 and CEO of World Business Chicago. The City
- 9 Council approved Mayor Emanuel's appointment of
- 10 Ms. Zopp on November 21st, and we welcome her
- 11 to the Board.
- 12 The first item of business is
- 13 approval of minutes of the Board's regular
- 14 public meeting held on November 16th. Is there
- 15 a motion to approve the minutes?
- 16 BOARD MEMBER SIMPSON: So moved.
- 17 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.
- 18 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?
- 19 (CHORUS OF AYES.)
- 20 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?
- 21 (NO RESPONSE.)
- 22 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Motion passes.
- 23 The schedule of the Board's
- 24 regular public meeting for 2018 will be posted

- 1 on the Board's website shortly.
- 2 Our next regular public meeting
- 3 will be Thursday, January 18th, at 7:30 p.m.
- 4 here at Chicago Public Safety Headquarters.
- 5 At this time, I ask for a motion
- 6 to close a series of executive sessions for the
- 7 purpose of considering personnel matters and
- 8 litigation as authorized by Sections 2(c)(1),
- 9 (3,)(4) and (11) of the Illinois Open Meetings
- 10 Act. Is there such a motion?
- 11 BOARD MEMBER FOREMAN: So moved.
- 12 BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.
- 13 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?
- 14 (CHORUS OF AYES.)
- 15 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?
- 16 (NO RESPONSE.)
- 17 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Motion passes.
- 18 Earlier this evening, the Board,
- 19 as required by the Illinois Open Meetings Act,
- 20 met and considered minutes and recordings of
- 21 all past closed meetings to determine whether
- 22 the need for confidentiality still exists. The
- 23 Board members unanimously agreed that it
- 24 continues to be necessary to keep confidential

- the minutes and recordings of its past closed 1
- 2 meetings.
- 3 A report of disciplinary actions
- 4 taken by the Board in the previous month has
- been made available at this evening's meeting. 5
- 6 This report and the Board's written findings
- 7 and decisions are posted on the Board's
- 8 website.
- 9 The general orders and other
- directives issued by the Superintendent of 10
- 11 Police during the previous month are listed in
- the books made available at this evening's 12
- 13 meetings and are posted on the Police
- 14 Department's website.
- 15 The next item is the
- 16 Superintendent's report to the Board.
- 17 Superintendent, will there be an
- 18 oral report?
- 19 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Yes, ma'am. I
- want to say happy holidays to everyone. 20
- 21 be brief. But first, before I begin on our
- 22 report, I'd just like to thank all of you for
- 23 the well wishes and support you gave me. I saw
- 24 through the transplant surgery, and this is my

- 1 first meeting back since then. So thank you
- 2 all for being patient with me.
- 3 And I'll just touch on briefly
- 4 and give you a broad overview of what CPD is
- 5 doing right now in terms of the crime fight and
- 6 reform moving into 2018.
- 7 In terms of the crime fight, we
- 8 continue to implement technology as one of the
- 9 basic foundations around crime strategy, while
- 10 we also add more officers, and we plan on
- 11 growing the Department by a thousand members at
- 12 the end of 2018.
- 13 This past November was the ninth
- 14 consecutive month of reductions in gun violence
- 15 in Chicago. That's something we should all be
- 16 proud of. We had 21 percent fewer shootings,
- 17 20 percent less shooting victims, and 15
- 18 percent less murders. That actually equates
- 19 out to 20 of 22 police districts in Chicago
- 20 have seen reductions in gun violence compared
- 21 to the same time in year 2016.
- 22 Several of those police districts
- 23 have actually seen gun violence reductions less
- 24 than what we had in 2015. So we're on the road

- 1 to reducing gun violence citywide.
- 2 In terms of the reform strategies
- moving into 2018, we have over two -- graduated 3
- 4 200 recruits from the academy this year, while
- 5 we're still promoting transparency and
- technology through the Department. 6
- 7 Last week, we completed our
- 8 entire rollout of body-worn cameras so all CPD
- 9 officers and bureau of patrol that's out on
- patrol will have body-worn cameras. 10
- 11 This rollout is actually a year
- ahead of schedule. And, honestly, I think that 12
- 13 will help in two ways; it will help build trust
- 14 hopefully within the communities that we serve,
- 15 but also show us what officers are doing and
- 16 where we can improve.
- 17 So I think that's a great thing.
- 18 Last piece of that is the
- 19 community policing advisory panel submitted
- recommendations to me earlier on just a few 20
- 21 weeks ago, and I decided to adopt all the
- 22 recommendations that many of you all sent in
- 23 implemented or recommended.
- 24 One of the most significant of

- 1 those recommendations is the creation of a
- 2 community policing office, along with a deputy
- 3 chief to lead that effort, which I have already
- 4 implemented. So now we have Deputy Chief
- 5 Dwayne Betts, he was appointed commander at the
- 6 15th District.
- 7 And I can tell you that CPD is
- 8 committed to harboring the communities that we
- 9 serve, because I think that the police
- 10 department should be something that we all can
- 11 be proud off.
- 12 With that, I close and wish
- 13 everyone a happy holiday season.
- 14 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you,
- 15 Mr. Superintendent.
- 16 I will now call upon members of
- 17 the public who signed up in advance to speak.
- 18 When your name is called, please step up to the
- 19 microphone.
- 20 And, again, pursuant to Police
- 21 Board rules, we ask that you limit your
- 22 comments to two minutes in respect to others
- 23 who come in after you.
- 24 First speaker is Ellen Corley.

- 1 Ellen Corley.
- Next speaker is John Perryman.
- 3 MR. PERRYMAN: Good evening.
- 4 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good evening,
- 5 Mr. Perryman.
- 6 MR. PERRYMAN: I'm here to talk about some
- 7 problems with the 12th District on the edge of
- 8 the 11th District.
- 9 On September 6th, four people
- 10 were shot on a corner a block from my house. A
- 11 week later a new drug house and drug corner
- 12 opened up a block way. I immediately told
- 13 CAPS, Sergeant Schenk in the 12th. This is the
- 14 12th side. They did not do anything. Nothing
- 15 effective.
- 16 October 10th there was a shooting
- 17 at the very house I told CAPS about, Sergeant
- 18 Schenk. And even a stray bullet even hitting a
- 19 squad car in this shooting. This was
- 20 completely preventable. But I kept pressing
- 21 Sergeant Schenk for help and yet the drug
- 22 corner exists today.
- 23 And even Commander Chung's
- 24 office, yet it still exists.

- Whatever they're doing is
- 2 ineffective. And it's frustrating that I have
- 3 to come all the way down here to try to get
- 4 some help in the community.
- 5 Shootings may be down, but when
- 6 they're next to your house, it's not very
- 7 comforting that they're down 20 percent.
- 8 So, I guess, here's what I'm
- 9 asking, since Commander Chung's district does
- 10 not seem up to the challenge, I'm asking for
- 11 help from downtown officers to come.
- 12 There's one thing that's worked.
- 13 I've been in the 11th for a long time. This is
- 14 on the 12th side. Buy busts, several over a
- 15 week, and then some surveillance will shut this
- 16 down probably in one week. Yet we've been
- 17 sitting on it and pushing up on five months
- 18 soon.
- 19 So, I guess, what I'm asking for
- 20 is some help. Commander Chung's office does
- 21 not seem up to it. I talked to Commander Chung
- 22 once. I keep reaching out to his office.
- 23 Nobody reaches back.
- When the community reaches out,

- 1 and no one seems to care or it's just something
- 2 that's bothersome to our police, it's deeply
- 3 troubling. So I'd like a response on that.
- 4 And I was wondering if you could help us. Not
- 5 someone from the 12th. 12th doesn't seem up to
- 6 it. From downtown.
- 7 And this -- by the way, this is a
- 8 corner that the community fought hard to take
- 9 back. And yet now after five months -- and
- 10 here's the thing, it exists that long --
- 11 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Sir, your time is up.
- 12 MR. PERRYMAN: Let me finish my thought.
- 13 If you wait that long, even if they do make a
- 14 big bust now, it's going to open up, because
- 15 now that's the spot. It's highly desirable. I
- 16 wait for a response on that.
- 17 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir.
- 18 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: I'll have an
- 19 officer get your information.
- 20 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Perryman, this
- 21 officer here, I think, is coming to you to take
- 22 your information.
- Our next speaker is Crista Noel.
- 24 Crista Noel.

- 1 Our next speaker is Queen Sister.
- 2 Queen Sister.
- 3 Our next speaker is David Evans.
- 4 Mr. Evans.
- 5 MR. EVANS: Thank you.
- 6 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Good evening,
- 7 Mr. Evans.
- 8 MR. EVANS: Good evening. I live in the
- 9 4500 block of Oakenwald. At the end of
- 10 October, I had a man break in my house.
- 11 Fortunately, my kids weren't there. My wife
- 12 was there. 2nd District got there relatively
- 13 quickly. However, the greatest concern is that
- 14 they let him out on an I-bond. He clearly
- 15 showed that he had issues. He broke a window
- 16 with a shovel and ran through my bathroom.
- 17 Locked himself in until they came. And they
- 18 let him out on an I-bond. The next day he
- 19 stole a City water truck and took cops on a
- 20 chase through Roseland. As a result, a City
- 21 worker had lacerations on his hands.
- That's not the only real concern
- 23 in the 4th Ward. We've had an increase in
- 24 carjackings. The day after Thanksgiving, one

- 1 of my neighbors was almost carjacked. And
- 2 there's been an increase of robberies at the BP
- 3 in the 4700 block of Woodlawn and throughout
- 4 the ward.
- 5 Being North Kenwood, a highly
- 6 desirable area for developers and people who
- 7 are moving there, we've had kind of a weak
- 8 police response. We've seen kind of an uptick
- 9 in crime in the last several months. And I
- 10 reached out to Commander King, no response.
- 11 One of their detectives reached out, but wasn't
- 12 able to provide much of a solution.
- 13 So ultimately, at this point, I
- 14 want to know what can be done to kind of
- 15 assist, kind of combat the uptick in crime,
- 16 motor vehicle threats, carjackings, things of
- 17 that nuisance?
- 18 And the second, specifically in
- 19 North Kenwood. Thank you.
- 20 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: I'll comment on
- 21 that briefly. I can tell you this, that
- 22 there's some things going on over there that
- 23 you won't see that are designed to tackle
- 24 exactly what you're talking about. So we are

- 1 aware of it, you know, down here.
- 2 We have had conversations with
- 3 the district over there, and I think you will
- 4 be quite pleased come -- some of these things
- 5 take longer than others. I can assure you we
- 6 put some things in place over there.
- 7 If you can give your information
- 8 to that officer back there, I'll talk to you
- 9 some more.
- 10 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Next speaker is Helen
- 11 Henning.
- 12 MS. HENNING: Good afternoon,
- 13 Mr. Superintendent and the Board. I'm coming
- 14 again -- well, the latest incident, I've been a
- 15 victim of organized crime and stalking for the
- 16 last 14 years. I've never been high on drugs
- 17 in my entire life. Never raised my kids on
- 18 drugs. I've been -- they've been doing all
- 19 kinds of dirty stuff behind my back. I was
- 20 forced into an unwanted sex act. They passed
- 21 the tape around showing different people. And
- 22 I was awarded money way back to the field crime
- 23 administration, which I've never gotten.
- 24 The latest concern of mine that I

- 1 heard last month that some New York -- during
- 2 the summertime, I go up to New York and work at
- 3 Saratoga Springs. It stemmed from my job and
- 4 it escalated to the streets.
- 5 Some New Work police came back to
- 6 Chicago, and I don't know how they got into the
- 7 Chicago system, but I was told, and I've also
- 8 seen, the elements that they brought people who
- 9 were plugged or tied up in organized crime.
- 10 They go somewhere. Where, I don't know where.
- 11 And I've been trying to find out for many
- 12 years. And they distributed my money to them
- 13 off of lies and dirt that they trying to frame
- 14 me up in. And I would like an answer
- 15 how -- how could they come in and have access
- 16 to money with somebody else's name on it. And
- 17 whoever gave the money away to them said they
- 18 didn't know, and then they said they was trying
- 19 to make the police department pay.
- 20 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Ma'am, I have no
- 21 knowledge of that, but I'll tell you what,
- 22 we'll look into it. I have no firsthand
- 23 knowledge about what you're talking about.
- 24 MS. HENNING: Okay. This is a true story,

- 1 and I have records and complaints and
- 2 complaints way back from maybe 2007 until
- 3 current, and I've not got one answer.
- I see results, and I have to give
- 5 kudos to the Police Department, because I would
- 6 be dead if it wasn't for them protecting me.
- 7 I have to say there are really
- 8 some brothers out here doing their job, as well
- 9 as Caucasians. I have to give them credit for
- 10 that. But it has gone on much too long. Much
- 11 too long.
- 12 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, Ms.
- 13 Henning.
- 14 MS. HENNING: Thank you.
- 15 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is
- 16 George Blakemore. Good evening.
- 17 MR. BLAKEMORE: Good evening, ma'am. And
- 18 good evening to the MPC, the spirit of the
- 19 people I see present, and to the few that were
- 20 able to come out in this cold weather.
- 21 I kind of feel uncomfortable
- 22 talking about our situation, I, I, I, when you
- 23 all have so many problems with the Police
- 24 Department. I'm just ashamed to just come up

- 1 and talk about my little problem. It's
- 2 nothing. But these little problems can grow to
- 3 big problems.
- 4 On October the 28th of -- or 29th
- 5 of October, I was in front of Joe (inaudible)
- 6 on the Gold Coast, the 42nd Ward, the rich and
- 7 powerful golden apple of our great city, and I
- 8 had some of my artwork and some other items.
- 9 And for years the business people in that area
- 10 have terrorized me. They came out, "This man
- 11 stole these goods." This man, "Have you got a
- 12 peddler's license to sell?" And with their
- 13 cameras. So when the police arrived, the
- 14 police -- I told them how he was harassing me.
- 15 And several times just I felt -- just too much.
- 16 But little concern with the crime that's going
- 17 on in Chicago. So they all -- the items, put
- 18 them in five black bags. Did not secure them.
- 19 Did not inventory those bags at all and itemize
- 20 them and put them in those clear bags and seal
- 21 them. They went out with them -- they were
- 22 very disrespectful. I told them I was over
- 23 there (inaudible.) They say -- they didn't
- 24 come, so I just decided to be whatever. Right

- 1 on the floor. They stuck they fingers up using
- 2 racial remarks.
- 3 BOARD MEMBER FOREMAN: Mr. Blakemore, can
- 4 you wrap up your comments?
- 5 MR. BLAKEMORE: Wrap up your comments. The
- 6 intent of the Open Meetings Act and the two
- 7 minutes was to not let anybody hog up the time,
- 8 not that you can't give a person an extra
- 9 minute or two. The intent, we have to look at
- 10 the intent of this. Nobody's here.
- 11 So usually when I come like this,
- 12 you all just happy to run right out.
- 13 But anyway, I'll go more into
- 14 detail about what had happened.
- 15 When I went to the police station
- 16 the next day to get these items, they said
- 17 stand back, Mr. Blakemore, you can't go in
- 18 here, we have bedbugs. You won't be able to
- 19 come back. Those items were not sealed. Those
- 20 items. So it's terrible.
- 21 So sometimes you got to look at
- 22 the little things that the police are doing,
- 23 and then that's another step for the big thing.
- 24 They indicate or -- that says

- 1 serve and protect. They serve and protect the
- 2 business people. Said I was loud. How loud is
- 3 loud? (Inaudible.) And I'm going to discuss
- 4 that with one of the ladies or men that you
- 5 will -- the Superintendent will talk to me, and
- 6 I will go more in detail. When I went to --
- 7 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Blakemore, you
- 8 need to wrap up. I was going to ask you. I
- 9 think you brought this issue to our attention
- 10 before.
- 11 MR. BLAKEMORE: No, no, I don't know if I
- 12 did.
- 13 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: I thought you had
- 14 talked to -- it was IPRA at the time, but I
- 15 think you talked to them about the confiscation
- 16 of your goods.
- 17 MR. BLAKEMORE: This is a new incident, but
- 18 it's similar to the old incident, so they are
- 19 persistent and I'm persistent. Sunrise,
- 20 sunset. So it's nothing under the sun. So you
- 21 all ready to go and it's cold. So I'll let you
- 22 go. I'm going to sit down and go into detail
- 23 with one of the policemen. And I hope that I
- 24 get some favorable results.

- 1 And God bless each one of you.
- 2 Feliz Navidad to the Hispanic community. And
- 3 to our Jewish community, a Hanukkah. And to
- 4 our Christian community, Merry Christmas and
- 5 may God bless. And you in the blessing
- 6 business and so bless everyone. Thank you.
- 7 PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you,
- 8 Mr. Blakemore.
- 9 Our last speaker is Robert More.
- 10 MR. MORE: It is December 14th, 2017.
- 11 Robert J. More speaking at the Police Board
- 12 meeting. This is the -- this is -- I'm not
- 13 doing the whole room, because there is a very
- 14 important issue here, that is that all
- 15 government officials here, I'm not
- 16 sure (Inaudible) if everyone can hear what's
- 17 being said. Everyone that's a government
- 18 representative is responsible for what they
- 19 hear, and no one can legitimately claim
- 20 (inaudible) regarding various developments.
- 21 Here's the first purpose of this.
- 22 So after the extermination apparatus,
- 23 recognizing that within that, there is not what
- 24 Franco referred to as the fifth column, but

- 1 there's probably a seventh or eighth column
- 2 that is in place of the fifth column.
- 3 The very pertinent point I need
- 4 to get is, first of all, (inaudible) of the
- 5 body of a citizen that would end up dead and
- 6 regarding his death, any number (inaudible)
- 7 chief suspects is the cause of death, either as
- 8 direct perpetrator or as a participant, so that
- 9 the crime evidence cannot be modified, the body
- 10 not cremated, to make certain that all the
- 11 laborers of a given individual (inaudible.)
- 12 Had this been in place, Lincoln,
- 13 Garfield, McKinley, John F. Kennedy, Martin
- 14 Luther King, Robert F. Kennedy, all these other
- 15 deaths and protocols in place, the Franklin
- 16 coverup, Ted Kennedy, Chan Siddiqui (phonetic),
- 17 Richard Lee Guthrie, all these alleged
- 18 incidences in which there was an instigation of
- 19 government conduct that resulted in the death
- 20 of the (inaudible). Then we can get
- 21 investigations of bodies as Jack Kennedy did in
- 22 the death of his brother Ted Kennedy to
- 23 demonstrate it was physically impossible this
- 24 guy actually committed suicide.

- 1 In the case of Richard Lee
- 2 Guthrie, he had nothing to do with the bombs in
- 3 Oklahoma City. Richard Guthrie ended up dead
- 4 sometime after his incarceration, that also
- 5 alleged suicide, as was the roommate Kenneth
- 6 Trentadue. The point is, I need protocols.
- 7 Are you familiar with this issue
- 8 at all, Mr. Superintendent? It is an
- 9 issue of supereminent importance. What can be
- 10 done right now that if my body is found dead or
- 11 the body of anyone similarly concerned to make
- 12 sure that that evidence is preserved?
- 13 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Thank you,
- 14 Mr. More. I have to admit, I am not familiar.
- 15 MR. MORE: Is there any way to contact you?
- 16 Is there an e-mail address? Mr. Chief Camile
- 17 is no longer here. Do you get e-mails from Mr.
- 18 Chief Camile?
- 19 SUPERINTENDENT JOHNSON: Yes.
- 20 MR. MORE: I presume if he receives it, it
- 21 doesn't bounce back, that you got it, because
- 22 if we start plugging the thing in the back, we
- 23 can work backwards and correct the rest of the
- 24 problem.

1	I'm out of time. I apologize for
2	the flashlight. I buy phones, I lose them. I
3	buy the next phone. By the time I figure out
4	how the flashlight works, Christ will return
5	hopefully.
6	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, sir.
7	So at this point, all the
8	persons who signed up in advance to speak have
9	been recognized.
10	Is there a motion to adjourn?
11	BOARD MEMBER FOREMAN: So moved.
12	BOARD MEMBER EADDY: Second.
13	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: All those in favor?
14	(CHORUS OF AYES.)
15	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Any opposed?
16	(NO RESPONSE.)
17	PRESIDENT LIGHTFOOT: Motion passes.
18	Happy holidays, everyone.
