COVID - 19 IMPACT

- Prior to COVID-19, the arts and culture sector was a significant employer and economic driver in the City of Chicago.
- In 2015, Chicago's arts sector generated:
 - \$3.2 billion in total economic activity
 - \$336.5 million in local and state government revenue
 - 85,000 creative jobs
- But the pandemic has had a major impact on the sector, resulting in a significant loss of creative jobs and related revenue. As of February 2021, Chicago ranked #2 among peer regions for decreases in creative occupations.



COVID - 19 IMPACT

- In spring 2020, the Arts for Illinois Relief Fund was created providing over \$8.18 million in financial relief to workers, non-profit organizations, and creative businesses impacted by COVID-19.
- It was a significant effort that involved partnership of government, foundations, organizations and individuals.
- The Fund focused on equity, prioritizing BIPOC, women and artists with disabilities. Of the 2,493 individual artist grant recipients from the Fund:
 - 63% were artists of color
 - 12% were disability-identified
 - 44% were women





APPROACH TO ARTS 77

- The arts are uniquely positioned to aid in Chicago's recovery efforts, and creative workers stand ready.
- To ensure that Chicago thrives post-pandemic, the City will leverage the power of its arts and culture sector, putting artists to work rebuilding, reimagining, unifying, and healing our neighborhoods.






EXPANDED CULTURAL POLICY

"Arts 77" is a citywide arts recovery and reopening plan for all of Chicago's 77 community areas, representing an initial investment of over \$60 million from DCASE, the Chicago Park District, other city agencies, and private funding to support local artists and organizations.

EXPAND ACCESS IN THE ARTS



The City has begun to announce new guidelines, funding opportunities, and programs to increase access and reopen the cultural sector through the following strategies:

- Provide support and guidance for cultural venues and organizations to assist with reopening
- Provide financial support for cultural programs in neighborhoods to ensure access in all parts of the city, not just downtown
- Build cultural facilities on the south and west sides to support the work of local organizations and artists
- Increase support for arts education to engage youth
- In partnership with MOPD, expand arts access for people with disabilities through grants and capacity building programs




Chicago Presents & Band Roster



- A new funding program to support cultural presenters as they activate cultural programs that comply with public health guidelines in neighborhoods throughout Chicago in Summer 2021
- Additionally, presenters may select up to two solo musicians and/or bands from the Chicago Band Roster to play at their event



Culture in my Neighborhood



- The network of Cultural Centers and libraries within the City will help increase access in all neighborhoods
- Arts and culture organizations will be able to access these spaces to deliver high quality programs for residents with enhanced production capability
- Community-led visioning, expanded use, funding opportunities, and marketing support will accompany this new program









CREATIVE WORKFORCE



The City is supporting programs that are designed to recognize the talents of artists as creative problem solvers that can help address issues of critical importance to Chicagoans:

- Provide direct grants to artists for relief, recovery and rebuilding programs
- Employ artists and creative skilled workers through the capital plan
- Hire artists to work in and with city departments through artist in residence programs
- Provide free professional development programs for organizations and individuals
- Better understand, support and plan for creative workforce development in Chicago




Direct Artist Response Grants

- \$1.2 million investment
- Five artists and artist teams receiving \$100,000 in grants
- Seven arts organizations will receive grants ranging from \$80,000 –
 \$100,000 to re-grant funds to approximately 60 artists
- Artists will apply directly to these programs for grants ranging from \$2,500 – \$10,000

Artist Profile – SANTIAGO X



The Coiled Serpent Mound is intended as a celebration of the connection between the peoples and the waterways of the Chicagoland area, created by Indigenous futurist, multidisciplinary artist and architect, Santiago X (Koasati/Chamoru). This is notably the first-time effigy earthworks have been constructed by Indigenous peoples in North America since the founding of the United States.



Art and Infrastructure

The Capital Plan, for the first time, invests at least \$15 million in public art over the next five years to turn the everyday into the extraordinary, physically and symbolically communicating connections between neighborhoods, histories, people, and futures.

DEEPEN PUBLIC SECTOR INVESTMENT



The City will invest in short-term grants and funding programs that are critical to recovery, along with long-term cultural policy interventions that stabilize and grow Chicago's creative and cultural sector including:

- Relief programs for artists
- Increased direct support to the most impacted communities
- Centering the arts in recovery planning
- •Public awareness and advocacy opportunities for artists

This work is foundational to the "next generation" role of DCASE in Chicago's arts communities



Neighborhood Access

This program has broad eligibility to include community-based organizations. Grants are \$5,000 - \$50,000. There's three ways that you can share your idea with us:

- Narrative: Provide a brief written narrative describing your idea
- Recording: Provide a 5-minute video or audio recording describing your idea (Video does not need to be highly edited. iPhone videos are fine!)
- PDF/JPEG file upload: Provide a PowerPoint or other presentation with images and text describing your idea


