INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Honorable Richard M. Daley, Mayor Members of the City Council City of Chicago. Illinois

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project of the City of Chicago, Illinois, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2002, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the City of Chicago's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements present only the Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project and do not purport to, and do not present fairly the financial position of the City of Chicago, Illinois, as of December 31, 2002, and the changes in its financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project of the City of Chicago, Illinois, as of December 31, 2002, and the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

As described in Note 1, the City of Chicago has implemented a new financial reporting model, as required by the provisions of GASB Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments, as of December 31, 2002.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis on pages 3 and 4 is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements taken as a whole. The schedule of expenditures by statutory code on page 10, which is also the responsibility of the City of Chicago's management, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project of the City of Chicago, Illinois. Such additional information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (UNAUDITED)

As management of the Fullerton/Milwaukee Tax Increment Redevelopment Project Area (Project), we offer the readers of the Project's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the Project's financial performance for the year ended December 31, 2002. Please read it in conjunction with the Project's financial statements, which follow this section.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Project's basic financial statements. The Project's basic financial statements include three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) governmental fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information concerning the Project's expenditures by statutory code.

Basic Financial Statements. The basic financial statements include two kinds of financial statements that present different views of the Project – the Government-Wide Financial Statements and the Governmental Fund Financial Statements. These financial statements also include the notes to the financial statements that explain some of the information in the financial statements and provide more detail.

Government-Wide Financial Statements provide both long-term and short-term information about the Project's financial status and use accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net assets includes all of the project's assets and liabilities. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities regardless of when cash is received or paid. The two government-wide statements report the Project's net assets and how they have changed. Net assets – the difference between the Project's assets and liabilities – is one way to measure the Project's financial health, or position.

Governmental Fund Financial Statements provide more detailed information about the Project's significant funds – not the Project as a whole. Governmental funds focus on: 1) how cash and other financial assets can readily be converted to cash flows and 2) the year-end balances that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps determine whether there are more financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Project. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the government-wide statements, we provide additional information at the bottom of the statements to explain the relationship (or differences) between them.

Notes to the Financial Statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and governmental fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements follow the basic financial statements.

Other Supplementary Information. In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents a schedule of expenditures by statutory code. This supplementary information follows the notes to the financial statements.

In future years, when prior year information is available, a comparative analysis of government-wide data will be presented.

Analysis of Overall Financial Position and Results of Operations

Property tax revenue for the Project was \$1,187,931 for the year. This was an increase of 64 percent over the prior year. Excess of revenues over expenditures produced an increase in fund balance of \$1,154,516. The Project's fund balance increased by 260 percent (including proceeds of debt) from the prior year making available \$2,567,007 of funding to be provided for purposes of future redevelopment in the Project's designated area. Revenues increased this year due to the Project's economic growth and accordingly increasing the total equalized assessed value of parcels and subsequent tax increment and related collection. Expenditures increased this year due to the Project's formulation of a redevelopment plan or necessary funding was substantially complete and available. Excess of revenues and other financing sources over expenditures produced an increase in fund balance in the current year.

Debt Administration

Tax Increment Allocation Notes outstanding at December 31, 2002 amounted to \$700,000. More detailed information about the Project's long-term liabilities is presented in Note 2 of the financial statements.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Reporting Entity

In February 2000, the City of Chicago (City) established the Fullerton/Milwaukee Tax Increment Redevelopment Project Area (Project). The area has been established to finance improvements, leverage private investment and create and retain jobs. The Project is accounted for within the capital projects, debt service and special revenue funds of the City.

(b) Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The accompanying financial statements of the Project have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). In June 1999, the GASB unanimously approved Statement No. 34 (as amended by Statement No. 37), Basic Financial Statements - Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments and at a later date, Statement No. 38 Certain Financial Statements Disclosures. In fiscal year 2002, the City adopted these new standards. Certain of the significant changes in the Statements include the following:

- For the first time the financial statements include:
 - A Management Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) section providing an analysis of the Project's overall financial position and results of operations.
 - Government-wide financial statements prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting for all the Project's activities.
 - Fund financial statements, which focus on the Project's governmental funds *current* financial resources measurement focus.

These and other changes are reflected in the accompanying financial statements (including notes to the financial statements).

(c) Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statements Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied.

The governmental fund financial statements are prepared on the *modified accrual basis of accounting* with only current assets and liabilities included on the balance sheet. Under *the modified accrual basis of accounting*, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual, i.e., both measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current period. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Property taxes are susceptible to accrual and recognized as a receivable in the year levied. Revenue recognition is deferred unless the taxes are received within 60 days subsequent to year-end. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred.

Private-sector standards of accounting and financial reporting issued prior to December 1, 1989, generally are followed in government-wide financial statements to the extent that those standards do not conflict with or contradict guidance of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. The City has elected not to follow subsequent private-sector guidance.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the City's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources, as they are needed.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from these estimates.

(d) Assets, Liabilities and Net Assets

Cash and Investments

Cash belonging to the City is generally deposited with the City Treasurer as required by the Municipal Code of Chicago. The City Comptroller issues warrants for authorized City expenditures which represent a claim for payment when presented to the City Treasurer. Payment for all City warrants clearing is made by checks drawn on the City's various operating bank accounts.

The City Treasurer and City Comptroller share responsibility for investing in authorized investments. Interest earned on pooled investments is allocated to participating funds based upon their average combined cash and investment balances.

The City values its investments at fair value or amortized cost. U.S. Government securities purchased at a price other than par with a maturity of less than one year are reported at amortized cost.

Capital Assets

Fixed assets are not capitalized in the governmental funds but, instead, are charged as current expenditures when purchased. The Government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net assets and the statement of changes in net assets) of the City includes the capital assets and related depreciation, if any, of the Project in which ownership of the capital asset will remain with the City (i.e. infrastructure, or municipal building). All other construction will be expensed in both the government-wide financial statements and the governmental funds as the City nor Project will retain the right of ownership.

(e) Stewardship, Compliance, and Accountability

Illinois Tax Increment Redevelopment Allocation Act Compliance

The Project's expenditures include reimbursements for various eligible costs as described in subsection (q) of Section 11-74.4-3 of the Illinois Tax Increment Redevelopment Allocation Act and the Redevelopment Agreement relating specifically to the Project. Eligible costs include but are not limited to survey, property assembly, rehabilitation, public infrastructure, financing and relocation costs.

Reimbursements

Reimbursements, if any, are made to the developer for project costs, as public improvements are completed and pass City inspection. The annual principal and interest payments are made solely from incremental real property taxes, which are paid in the redevelopment district.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

Note 2 - Notes Payable

In December 2002, the City issued Fullerton/Milwaukee Tax Increment Allocation Notes, Series 2002. The notes are for \$700,000 and have an interest rate of 8.5 percent and maturity dates ranging from January 1, 2004 to January 1, 2012. Net proceeds of \$700,000 were used to finance certain project costs in the Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project Area.

Attorneys, past and present, in the Law Department of the City familiar with the requirements of the Act have had general involvement in the proceedings affecting the Redevelopment Project Area, including the preparation of ordinances adopted by the City Council of the City with respect to the following matters: approval of the redevelopment plan and project for the Redevelopment Project Area, designation of the Redevelopment Project Area as a redevelopment project area and adoption of tax increment allocation financing for the Redevelopment Project Area, all in accordance with the then applicable provisions of the Act. Various departments of the City, including, if applicable, the Law Department, Department of Planning and Development, Department of Housing, Department of Finance and Office of Budget and Management, have personnel responsible for and familiar with the activities in the Redevelopment Project Area affecting such Department(s) and with the requirements of the Act in connection therewith. Such personnel are encouraged to seek and obtain, and do seek and obtain, the legal guidance of the Law Department with respect to issues that may arise from time to time regarding the requirements of, and compliance with, the Act.

In addition, I have caused to be examined or reviewed by members of the Law Department of the City the certified audit report, to the extent required to be obtained by Section 11-74.4-5(d)(9) of the Act and submitted as part of the Report, which is required to review compliance with the Act in certain respects, to determine if such audit report contains information that might affect my opinion. I have also caused to be examined or reviewed such other documents and records as were deemed necessary to enable me to render this opinion. Nothing has come to my attention that would result in my need to qualify the opinion hereinafter expressed, subject to the limitations hereinafter set forth, unless and except to the extent set forth in an Exception Schedule attached hereto as Schedule 1.

Based on the foregoing, I am of the opinion that, in all material respects, the City is in compliance with the provisions and requirements of the Act in effect and then applicable at the time actions were taken from time to time with respect to the Redevelopment Project Area.

This opinion is given in an official capacity and not personally and no personal liability shall derive herefrom. Furthermore, the only opinion that is expressed is the opinion specifically set forth herein, and no opinion is implied or should be inferred as to any other matter. Further, this opinion may be relied upon only by the addressees hereof and the Mayor of the City in providing his required certification in connection with the Report, and not by any other party.



Payment of principal of and interest on this Note shall be made on each applicable payment date to the Registered Owner of this Note on the registration books of the City maintained by the Registrar at the close of business on the 15th day of the month next preceding the applicable payment date and shall be paid by check or draft of the Registrar mailed to the address of such Registered Owner as it appears on such registration books or at such other address furnished in writing by such Registered Owner to the Registrar.

- [2] This Note is issued pursuant to Division 74.4 of Article 11 of the Illinois Municipal Code (the "Act"), and all laws amendatory of the Act and supplemental to the Act, and the principal of and interest on this Note are payable from Pledged Revenues (as defined in the hereinafter defined Note Ordinance), including the ad valorem taxes, if any, arising from the taxes levied upon taxable real property in the Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project Area established by the City in accordance with the provisions of the Act (the "Project Area") by any and all taxing districts or municipal corporations having the power to tax real property in the Project Area, which taxes are attributable to the increase in the then current equalized assessed valuation of each taxable lot, block, tract or parcel of real property in the Project Area over and above the initial equalized assessed value of each such piece of property as of February 16, 2000, as determined by the County Clerk of The County of Cook, Illinois, in accordance with the provisions of the Act (the "Incremental Taxes"). This Note is being issued for the purpose of providing funds to pay a portion of the Project Costs which have been approved for the Project Area, all as more fully described in an ordinance authorizing the issuance of this Note (the "Note Ordinance") adopted by the City Council of the City on October 2, 2002 to all the provisions of which the Registered Owner by the acceptance of this Note assents. This Note, together with the interest on this Note, are limited obligations of the City, payable solely from Pledged Revenues, including the Incremental Taxes and the amounts on deposit in and pledged to the various funds and accounts as provided in the Note Ordinance. For the prompt payment of this Note, both principal and interest, as stated above, at maturity, the Pledged Revenues are hereby irrevocably pledged. THIS NOTE DOES NOT CONSTITUTE AN INDEBTEDNESS OF THE CITY WITHIN THE MEANING OF ANY CONSTITUTIONAL OR STATUTORY PROVISION OR LIMITATION, EXCEPT AS HEREIN PROVIDED. NO REGISTERED OWNER OF THIS NOTE SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO COMPEL THE EXERCISE OF ANY TAXING POWER OF THE CITY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF OR INTEREST ON THIS NOTE.
- [3] Under the Act and the Note Ordinance, the Incremental Taxes shall be deposited in the Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project Area Special Tax Allocation Fund of the City (the "Tax Allocation Fund"). Moneys on deposit in the Note Fund created within the Tax Allocation Fund shall be used and are pledged for paying the principal of and interest on this Note and then in making any further required payments to the funds and accounts as provided by the terms of the Note Ordinance.
- [4] It is hereby certified and recited that all conditions, acts and things required by law to exist or to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this Note did exist, have happened, been done and performed in regular and due form and time as required by law, and the City by this Note covenants and agrees that it has made provision for the segregation of those Incremental Taxes to be deposited in the Note Fund, and that it will properly account for those taxes and will comply with all the covenants of and maintain the funds and accounts as provided by the Note Ordinance.
- [5] This Note is issued initially in fully registered form and is transferable by the Registered Owner hereof in person or by his attorney duly authorized in writing at the office of the Registrar in Chicago, Illinois, but only in the manner, subject to the limitations and upon payment

of the charges provided in the Note Ordinance, and upon surrender and cancellation of this Note. Upon such transfer a new Note or Notes of authorized denominations of the same maturity and for the same aggregate principal amount will be issued to the transferee in exchange for the old Note or Notes.

- [6] The City and the Registrar may deem and treat the Registered Owner of this Note as the absolute owner of this Note for the purpose of receiving payment of or on account of principal of this Note, premium, if any, and interest due on this Note and for all other purposes and neither the City nor the Registrar shall be affected by any notice to the contrary.
- [7] This Note may be prepaid prior to maturity at the option of the City, in whole or in part on any date from any available funds of the City without penalty or premium. Any prepayments of principal of this Note shall be made in inverse order of maturity.
- [8] The rights and obligations of the City and of the Registered Owner of this Note may be modified or amended at any time with the consent of the City and of the Registered Owner of not less than a majority in outstanding principal amount of this Note, provided that no such modification or amendment shall extend the maturity or reduce the interest rate on or otherwise alter or impair the obligation of the City to pay the principal of and interest on this Note, at the time and place and at the rate and in the currency provided in the Note Ordinance without the express consent of the Registered Owner of such Note or permit the creation of a preference or priority of any Note or Notes over any other Note or Notes.

(11) GENERAL DESCRIPTION AND MAP

The Fullerton/Milwaukee Redevelopment Project Area is located 5 miles northwest of the City's central business district. The Project Area encompasses portions of three major corridors: West Armitage Avenue from North Ridgeway Avenue to North Milwaukee Avenue, West Fullerton Avenue from North Kimball Avenue to North Francisco Avenue, and North Milwaukee Avenue from West Armitage Avenue to West School Avenue.
