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

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – HIGHLIGHTS

1.4.B. Create an Office of Community Wealth Building (CWB) in the Mayor's Office or as a division within the Department of Planning and Development to raise awareness, provide technical support and training of CWB models

1.1.D. Establish a Chicago public finance/banking taskforce to help close financing gaps in private banking.



1.4.C. Provide Community Investment Vehicles (CIVs) first access to acquisition of blighted, abandoned, foreclosed and/or other off-market properties.

2.2.A. Update and simplify commercial zoning to reduce the number of businesses needing a special use permit and standardize and publicize the zoning approval process in all 50 wards.

2.2.C. Partner with the appraisal industry to reduce barriers to entry and increase the number of Black and Latino commercial property appraisers.

🗼 🗱 ENVIRONMENT, CLIMATE, + ENERGY – HIGHLIGHTS

1.2B Establish an environmental impact assessment – include both environmental justice impact and climate impacts – to be used during development process

2.2E Understand and accommodate climate migrants and the impact on existing infrastructure

2.3B Acknowledge impact of loss of land and culture on affected communities as a result of climate change and evaluate options for repair

2.4A Prioritize resource distribution to resolve historic and future issues in industrial corridors and during the PMD review process

🔸 ENVIRONMENT, CLIMATE, + ENERGY – CHALLENGES

- Policies addressing environmental justice and harms caused by environmental racism
- Lack of awareness of existing environmental policies leading to challenges with developing **bold goals to drive resiliency and fossil fuel** divestment
- How to hold corporations accountable for emissions transparency, waste reduction, pollution
- How to change **resident behaviors** around waste reduction

🔸 ENVIRONMENT, CLIMATE, + ENERGY– CONTENT GAPS

- Incorporation of water quality including the Chicago River (policy being created under Goal 4)
- Bolder objectives + policies for Goal 5: Mitigate then eliminate sources of carbon emissions in alignment with national and global climate goals; (Co-chairs, City Rep reviewing and making recommendations)

🗖 苯 HOUSING + NEIGHBORHOODS – HIGHLIGHTS

1.1D - Provide civic education on development approval and other decision-making processes to support engagement [of residents, property owners, businesses].

1.2B - Create standard ward-based engagement processes with enforceable transparency standards.

2.2D - Support community ownership models like tenant rights of first refusal and limited-equity housing cooperatives.

2.3B - Expand eTOD programs that align public funding with local partnerships to achieve community goals.



1.1A - Reduce barriers to public participation for Black, Latino, Native American and other communities who have not been included in decision making.

- Challenge: crafting inclusive and sensitive language
- **1.3D** Require inclusive and equitable participatory budgeting in all wards.
 - Challenge: 50 City Council members and ward oversight

HOUSING + NEIGHBORHOODS – CONTENT GAPS

- Gaps: Population loss & density
- Gaps action item(s): Revised goal #5 and developed new objectives
 - Original goal Strengthen neighborhood vibrancy and sustainability while recognizing existing disparities across community areas.
 - <u>Revised goal</u> Attract and retain residents by strengthening neighborhood vibrancy and increasing density, especially on the South and West Sides.
 - o <u>New objective</u> Prioritize redevelopment of vacant land and buildings.

LIFELONG LEARNING – HIGHLIGHTS

Objective 1.1: Create Department of Learning within City to improve collaboration between citywide education-focused organizations to share learning opportunities available to the public.

Policy 2.3B: Provide additional funding and services to ensure equitable access to the workforce regardless of ability, language, age, and immigration status.

Policy 2.4A: Hire a dedicated City-funded partnership coordinator to support collaboration between key employers, workforce development programs and educational institutions (e.g. CPS, CCC, UIC, U of C, Loyola).

Policy 2.4B: Pursue partnerships between the City, key educational institutions, and key employers focused on serving communities that have been historically disenfranchised. (e.g. CPS)

X LIFELONG LEARNING – CHALLENGES

Idea: How do we reinforce existing programs and partnerships that are working but require more resources?

• An additional level of complexity is added in developing a policy when we do not have full sight of what programs currently exist or are in the pipeline

Idea: How can the City incentivize/encourage the private sector to provide workforce training and mentorship programs?

🔸 LIFELONG LEARNING – CONTENT GAPS

- How can we repair harm in communities where schools were closed? (developing a new objective and policies to address this)
- How do we foster a sense of belonging in lifelong learning, regardless of regardless of race, gender, income level, age, ability, citizen status, and language proficiency? (addressed by new pillar)

1.2.B: Establish a funding program to reopen or open new local drugstores in Black and Latinx neighborhoods where there are gaps in pharmacy services.

- Develop impactful public safety policies through a public health lens
- Integrate safe freedom of movement policies as safety strategies that go beyond transportation and traffic safety
- Outline specific public safety policies that benefit communities most impacted by the criminal-legal system

TRANSPORTATION + INFRASTRUCTURE - HIGHLIGHTS

1.1.F - Establish metrics and processes to ensure infrastructure funding is equitable across all wards

1.2.B - Coordinate across departments to leverage roadway maintenance and utility infrastructure projects as an opportunity to add co-benefits, such as safety enhancements, green infrastructure, fiber optic infrastructure, or electric vehicle charging stations

1.5.B - Ensure universal access for those in need by investing in high-speed, reliable, and affordable broadband service in areas of the city with the lowest rate of household connectivity.

TRANSPORTATION + INFRASTRUCTURE – CHALLENGES
