

- A new pillar has been added to the existing seven pillars. Goals, objectives, and policies are being crafted for Civic + Community Engagement.
- We Will Chicago plans to submit their final framework recommendations to the Chicago Plan Commission for adoption in January 2023.

## Roadmap: What's Next for We Will Chicago

We Will Chicago Roadmap (Implementation Planning)

Late June 2022: Framework Plan Draft Release

July - November 2022: Broad Public Engagement

November - December 2022: Incorporate Feedback into Framework Plan

January 2023: Submission to Chicago Plan Commission for Adoption

We Will Chicago's website will be used to gather public feedback and inform implementation.

All in-depth notes on implementation strategies, program ideas, and themes will be incorporated into a single, supporting document.

Supporting content will be posted on the website in PDF format.

Summer engagement will include:

- Pop-up engagement opportunities at city summer and fall events
- Surveys and conversations to gather feedback on framework
- Swag to build excitement and awareness
- Conversations focused on identities, experiences, issue areas and geographies that have been identified as content gaps in current draft policy framework

## 2023 and Beyond

January 2023 - Submit plan to Chicago Plan Commission for adoption

Intergovernmental agreements

- Tracking and reporting collaboration
- Regular public updates and engagement

Implementation will look different depending on context and specific policy. Individual policies could be refined for proposed ordinances. However, ordinances are much more difficult to change as opposed to department policy adoptions.

# <u>Civic + Community Engagement Policy Framework</u>

Introduced by Skyler Larrimore

This pillar was created to address a community engagement gap within the existing We Will Chicago plan.

Goal 1: Build deeper and more effective civic infrastructure to enable Chicagoans to improve their lives and neighborhoods

Objective 1.1 Create stronger, proactive, long-term partnerships with community organizations, block clubs, and other coalitions to increase engagement.

Objective 1.2 Support and encourage more inclusive and creative community engagement across City departments and sister agencies

Goal 2: Increase public access and participation in civic and democratic processes

Objective 2.1 Ensure equitable access to virtual and in-person public meetings and processes across City departments and agencies.

Objective 2.2 Increase equitable representation and participation in government and democratic processes

Objective 2.3 Welcome new immigrants and strengthen Chicago's leadership as a sanctuary city

Goal 3: Improve government transparency and Chicagoans' access to data

Objective 3.1 Improve and modernize City data collection, aggregation, and distribution systems to develop a best-in-the-world practice of affirmative and automated release of data and records.

Objective 3.2 Ensure equitable access to data for all Chicagoans.

Objective 3.3 Make it easier for Chicagoans to understand and participate in City Council, committee, and other public body processes.

Goal 4: Eliminate barriers to accessing City services and supports

Objective 4.1 Make city processes for residents, workers, visitors, and businesses more streamlined and accessible.



Objective 4.2 Protect and provide resources to support residents who are often excluded from safety net benefits and other services.

Goal 5: Ensure equity-focused and community-driven processes inform policy-making and decision-making

Objective 5.1 Establish standards and structures for community-driven decision-making.

Objective 5.2 Educate city officials and staff on equity and racial justice.

Objective 5.3 Integrate health, racial equity and climate impact tools and analysis into policymaking and planning.

Objective 5.4 Support ongoing truth, reconciliation, and healing efforts.

The pillar team separated into breakout groups. Each group discussed a different pillar goal.

## Breakout Group #1

Facilitated by Courtney Kashima (MUSE Community + Design) with notes by David Collier King (Department of Planning and Development)

Courtney began facilitation by asking whether the goals as stated were "as clear and as strong as they can be."

Several group members expressed the need for more clarity, not only in the goal, but in who is ultimately responsible for implementing the change.

April Williams-Luster commented on the importance of engaging the community members that will engage fellow community members that way they're ensuring conversation moves beyond these meetings.

Christina Harris (Metropolitan Planning Council) warned against creating fatigue in community members by planning multiple meetings discussing the same topics. Williams-Luster agreed. Colleen Mahoney added that the team should be more intentional and consider any burdens they might be creating for the community.

Group members continued to discuss the responsibilities of different city departments and alderman offices. Team members brainstormed methods for existing committees and departments to work together rather than creating new groups.

Following the breakout session the groups came together to briefly report on their individual discussions.

### Final Thoughts

Group 2, which was represented by Ellen Shepard, discussed the need for outreach to be more resourceful and impactful.

## Future considerations:

- How does the city get rid of the barriers to access?
- How does We Will provide more training opportunities and leadership development?



Group 3, represented by Isobel Araujo (Territory NFP), uses and types of data.

## Future considerations:

- Sensitive data vs access to data
- How will We Will fund data collection?

Group 4, represented by Libia Bianibi, reiterated the need to consciously include equity in future policies while reviewing current processes. They also noted that better outreach is necessary for community involvement.

Group 5, represented by Lauren Burdette (Office of Equity and Racial Justice), discussed establishing equity, historical reckoning work, and community accountability structures.

Gabriela Jirasek (Department of Planning and Development) brought up next steps. Once the frameworks are finalized and adopted over the next six months, there will be a year of refining the specific policies.

Isobel Araujo (Territory NFP) observed how "overwhelming" it was to incorporate the various We Will Chicago discussions and working documents into a specific action plan for her team of young people. Next meeting, Araujo says her team will have an intergenerational discussion about processes for engaging the community.

Skyler Larrimore (Office of the Mayor) requested continued feedback as the team moves forward. Larrimore also wants to make sure there isn't confirmation bias in the next round of surveys and offered her email for further discussion.
