ROGRAM RULES

To enter, complete the attached entry form by answering all questions. Submit only ONE application per category. Include at least TWO photographs of your landscape; the photos must be 4" x 6", printed on regular photo paper and will not be returned. Polaroid or digital photos on disc or via e-mail will not be accepted. Please, no bound presentations, staples or tape.

Applications must be postmarked by July 2, 2010. Applications that advance to the on-site judging round will be viewed from late July through August. This program is open to all residents, businesses and organizations located in the City of Chicago.

CATEGORY DEFINITIONS

One 1st, 2nd and 3rd place award is given in each of these eight city-wide categories.

Commercial Landscapes – On the grounds of private businesses including restaurants, hotels, shopping centers, industrial parks, storefronts and high-rise office buildings.

Container Gardens – Challenged by space constraints and using mostly containers, including porches, rooftop decks and window boxes.

Living Green Roofs and Walls – Vegetated areas located on the top and sides of buildings including high rises, homes, businesses, garages, etc.

Multi-Unit Residential High Rise – Landscapes on the grounds of residential buildings over eight stories.

Native Landscapes – Provide habitat for wildlife, feature primarily native plants, and utilize conservation practices that minimize watering and maintenance.

Public Institutions – Buildings which serve the general public such as hospitals, museums, libraries, fire stations, etc.

Specialized Gardens – Rain Gardens, sidewalk cafes, highway beautification, spaces tended by Chambers of Commerce, and other specialty sites that are not covered by other categories.

Vegetable Gardens – Gardens grown for vegetables, fruit and herbs.

REGIONAL AWARDS

This program divides the city into four regions. One 1st, 2nd and 3rd place award is given in each region in these four categories.

Community Landscapes – Designed, installed and/or maintained by groups such as block clubs, CHA organizations, community centers, houses of worship, etc.

Multi-Unit Residential – Residential buildings under eight stories that contain more than one dwelling.

Schools – Property surrounding public or private educational facilities, public or private, pre-K through university.

Single Family Residential – Property containing only one dwelling.

Award Application Narrative

The first round of judging is based on this application and the photographs you submit. If your garden advances to the second round, judges will visit your garden in person. They will be looking for a garden that is:

- Well planned Sun plants in sun, shade plants in shade, good uses of form, color and texture.
- Well maintained Free of weeds, watered adequately, correct horticultural practices.
- Creative What makes your garden stand out? Is your garden used by the community for special events, do you raise vegetables for your neighbors, do you engage children in activities? Do you use artistic objects? Make sure the judges can tell what makes your garden unique.
- Environmentally sound Do you garden organically, harvest rainwater, compost, transform turf into garden space, use recycled materials, cater to birds and wildlife?

Please be thorough in this application as it will be used to judge your garden. Please tell us:

- How long have you tended to this garden/landscape, and who tends it with you? (neighbors, students, professional landscapers, etc.)
- What is the look or goal of the garden/landscape, if any? (examples: formal, informal, naturalistic, to build community relations, beautification, provide habitat, etc.)
- What were, or are, the challenges in creating and maintaining this garden/landscape?
