I am writing to inform you about an important, upcoming change to the Emergency Housing Assistance Program (EHAP), which provides grants for emergency furnace, roof and porch repairs on behalf of income-eligible applicants.

The start time for the next round of roof and porch applications is being moved to the first business day of the New Year. As a result, applications will be accepted starting Jan. 2, 2013 at 9a.m. – 3p.m. or until capacity is reached. At that time, residents will be able to initiate the application process by phone. In previous years, applications were accepted starting at midnight on New Year's Day, a difficult time for many homeowners to initiate the process.

All the other guidelines for EHAP will remain the same and applications will continue to be processed on a first-come, first-served basis. To apply, residents can call 311, your office's 311 liaison, or the Department of Housing and Economic Development's customer service line at (312) 744-3653.

#### City of Chicago Emergency Housing Assistance Program (EHAP)

#### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

EHAP provides grants to low-income homeowners to repair roofs, porches and heating units that are in serious disrepair. Owners of 1-4 unit properties in Chicago must live in the property and have no other means to pay for the repairs. If the property is sold within one year of the repairs, the City will require the homeowner to repay the grant amount.

#### **Heating Unit Repair/Replacement:**

From **November 1**<sup>st</sup> **through March 31**<sup>st</sup>, improvements are limited to the repair and replacement of heating units. Applicants should bring the required documents to the Department of Housing and Economic Development to apply.

#### Roof and Porch Repair/Replacement:

Applicants must call Chicago's City Services 311 or the Department of Housing and Economic Development's (HED) customer service phone line (312) 744-3653 on **January 2<sup>nd</sup> at 9am – 3pm or until capacity is reached to be placed on the intake list for services.** Roof and porch repair and replacement will be performed between April 1<sup>st</sup> and October 31<sup>st</sup>. Appointments will be given to applicants whose names are on the intake list only. HED will accept applicants based on available funding and the following eligibility requirements:

- All services are provided on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Assistance is limited to homes that have not received prior assistance through this program.
- Applicants must be owner-occupants and reside in the property for at least one year before applying for assistance.
- Total household incomes must be within the following income limits:

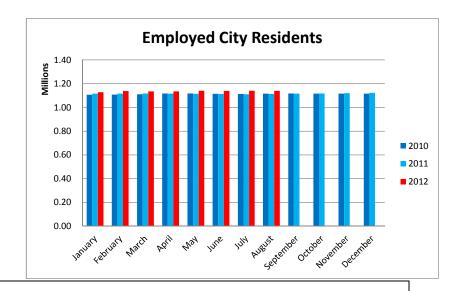

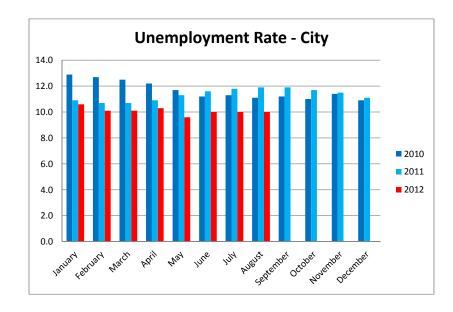
