I. PURPOSE

This directive:

- A. continues procedures, responsibilities, and restrictions for all sworn Department members who become involved with motor vehicle pursuits.
- B. introduces:
 - 1. procedures, responsibilities, and restrictions for Department members who become involved with eluding vehicles.
 - 2. the CLEAR Eluding Vehicle Incident application.
 - 3. the Eluding Vehicle Incident Report (CPD-22.962).
- C. continues the:
 - 1. CLEAR Pursuit Report application
 - 2. Pursuit Tracking Number
 - 3. Traffic Pursuit Supplemental Report (CPD-22.959)
 - 4. Traffic Pursuit Report Continuation Report (CPD-22.960)
 - 5. Media/Data Request — Office of Emergency Management and Communication (OEMC-109)
 - 6. Digitally Recorded Data Viewing/Hold/Duplication/Shared Request In-Car Video Systems Chicago Police Department (CPD-65.224).
- D. satisfies the CALEA law enforcement standard in chapter 4 and chapter 41.

II. GENERAL INFORMATION

- A. It is the Chicago Police Department's goal to ensure Department members consider the need for immediate apprehension of an eluding suspect and the requirement to protect the public from the danger created by eluding offenders.
- B. The Department will not discipline any member for terminating a motor vehicle pursuit.
- C. The procedures in this directive provide Department members with guidelines to follow when involved in an eluding or pursuing incident. These procedures also serve as a standard for any administrative review of the judgment exercised by the members involved.
- D. Any motor vehicle pursuit that is **NOT** conducted in accordance with this directive will be immediately terminated by the involved Department members or monitoring supervisors.
- E. Department members will follow the procedures outlined in the Department directives titled "**In-Car Video Systems,**" "**Radio Communications,**" and "**Body Worn Cameras.**"
- F. Verbatim text

For the purpose of this directive, fleeing or attempting to elude a peace officer as defined in 625 ILCS 5/11-204, occurs when:

1. any driver or operator of a motor vehicle who, having been given a visual or audible signal by a peace officer directing such driver or operator to bring his vehicle to a stop, wilfully fails or refuses to obey such direction, increases his speed, extinguishes his lights, or otherwise flees or attempts to elude the officer; and
2. the signal given by the peace officer may be by hand, voice, siren, red or blue light. The officer giving such signal shall be in police uniform, and, if driving a vehicle, such vehicle shall display illuminated oscillating, rotating or flashing red or blue lights which when used in conjunction with an audible horn or siren would indicate the vehicle to be an official police vehicle.

III. ELUDING WITHOUT A MOTOR VEHICLE PURSUIT

- A. When a motor vehicle pursuit is not initiated, eluding exists after a driver is issued a visual and audible signal to stop and, after a reasonable time to yield, the driver flees by doing any of the following:
 1. Increases speed;
 2. Takes evasive actions; or
 3. Refuses to stop.
- B. An eluding incident only occurs when the Department member deactivates all emergency equipment and stops following the other vehicle immediately after its driver refuses to pull over and flees.
- C. If a Department member states that he or she is following a vehicle whose driver has refused to pull over after being signaled to do so, the incident will automatically be classified as a pursuit.
- D. Eluding vehicle incident procedures

If a driver's actions meet the definition of an eluding incident, and no further action was taken to apprehend or stop the vehicle, the member will immediately:

1. disengage from the eluding vehicle;
2. deactivate all emergency equipment;
3. notify the OEMC zone dispatcher;
4. complete a CLEAR Eluding Vehicle Incident Report (CPD-22.962) before the end of his or her tour of duty; and

NOTE: If warranted, the reviewing supervisor will ensure video of the eluding incident is preserved consistent with the Department directives "**Body-Worn Cameras**" and "**In-Car Video Systems**."

5. if applicable, complete a Request to Impound a Vehicle by Police (CPD-34.342). Department members will follow procedures consistent with the Department directive titled "**Impoundment of Vehicles for Municipal Code Violations**."

NOTE: Department members must have a license plate or VIN to complete the Request to Impound a Vehicle by Police (CPD-34.342).

6. The Eluding Vehicle Incident Report will be forwarded to the unit secretary, who will make one copy for the unit file and forward the original directly to the Commanding Officer, Traffic Section.
7. The Commanding Officer, Traffic Section, will review and analyze the Eluding Vehicle Reports and present the findings to the Traffic Review Board.

IV. MOTOR VEHICLE PURSUIT POLICY

- A. The initiation, continuation, and supervisory authorization of each motor vehicle pursuit must conform to the following **BALANCING TEST**:

The necessity to immediately apprehend the fleeing suspect outweighs the level of inherent danger created by a motor vehicle pursuit.

- B. When applying the balancing test, members will:
1. make a determination whether the:
 - a. speeds involved and the maneuvering practices engaged in permit the Department vehicle operator complete control of the Department vehicle and do not create unwarranted danger to the driver or others;
 - b. volume of pedestrian and vehicular traffic reasonably permits initiating or continuing the pursuit; and
 - c. weather and road conditions reasonably permit initiating or continuing the pursuit.
 2. consider not initiating or terminating an active motor vehicle pursuit whenever the suspect's identity has been clearly established to the point that later apprehension can be accomplished without the risk of a pursuit.
 3. consider terminating a pursuit whenever a pursued vehicle or pursuing Department vehicle is involved in any property damage traffic crash.
 4. consider relevant information received from the helicopter support unit.

V. PROHIBITIONS

- A. Members will not engage in a motor vehicle pursuit whenever the most serious offense wanted for is a:
1. traffic offense, other than driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs; or
 2. theft (including Possession of Stolen Motor Vehicles).
- B. Members will not engage in a motor vehicle pursuit while:
1. there is an arrestee or non-[law-enforcement personnel](#) in the Department vehicle.
 2. operating squadrols, covert vehicles, vans, other truck chassis vehicles (including the 2006 and earlier Chevrolet Tahoe models), motorcycles, and police all-purpose vehicles.

NOTE: In 2007, Chevrolet significantly redesigned the Police Package Chevrolet Tahoe for police work up to and including high speed [emergency vehicle operations](#). Therefore, Chevrolet Tahoes that meet all of the following specifications may be used in [motor vehicle pursuits](#):

- a. model year 2007 or newer;
- b. equipped with two-wheel drive only; and
- c. equipped with the "Police Package."

VI. SUPERVISORY RESPONSIBILITIES AND PROCEDURES

- A. **At all times during their tours of duty**, field supervisors, district station supervisors, and watch operations lieutenants will continuously monitor the radio to ensure that all motor vehicle pursuits occurring within their respective districts or involving members under their daily supervision are conducted in accordance with this directive.
- B. **At all times during their tours of duty**, supervisors of members assigned to field duties that use a city-wide frequency will, whether they are assigned to either station or field duties, continuously

monitor the radio to ensure that all motor vehicle pursuits engaged in by members under their supervisory command are conducted in accordance with this directive.

- C. The on-duty Street Deputy, Office of Operations, will be available to monitor pursuits that could potentially cross zone or city-wide frequencies.
- D. The assigned supervisor will be responsible for monitoring and managing all motor vehicle pursuit activities until termination, regardless of what geographic areas outside the district of initiation the pursuit may enter, until or unless relieved by a higher-ranking member.
- E. If a motor vehicle pursuit is initiated on a city-wide radio frequency, the immediate supervisor of the initiating unit will be assigned to monitor the pursuit. If the immediate supervisor does not respond, any supervisor monitoring that frequency may be assigned to monitor the pursuit, regardless of the supervisor's unit of assignment.

NOTE: If no supervisor can be raised on the city-wide frequency, the OEMC dispatcher will immediately assign a supervisor from the district of initiation and notify that supervisor that no supervisor is monitoring the pursuit on the city-wide frequency.

- F. If a motor vehicle pursuit continues into another district, the original monitoring supervisor assigned to the district in which the pursuit was initiated will retain primary responsibility for monitoring, reviewing, and, if necessary, terminating the pursuit. However, the supervisors assigned to that additional district will have authority to terminate the pursuit.
- G. Any monitoring supervisor, regardless of unit of assignment, who has additional specific knowledge that would necessitate the termination of a motor vehicle pursuit has the authority to do so.

NOTE: Once acknowledged by radio call identification number, a nondistrict supervisor not assigned by OEMC who terminates a pursuit will identify himself or herself by rank and name.

- H. Once a pursuit is terminated, the termination can be overruled only by a member of higher rank than the one ordering the termination. A higher-ranking supervisor that overrules an order to terminate relieves all supervisors of equal or lesser rank from the duties associated with monitoring and supervising the pursuit.
- I. Any motor vehicle pursuit that is **NOT** conducted in accordance with this directive will be immediately terminated by the involved Department members or monitoring supervisors.
- J. All supervisors assigned to review a pursuit will review relevant body-worn camera videos, in-car camera videos, GPS data, and, if available, POD camera footage in the SDSC room prior to submitting related reports.

VII. INITIATION OF A MOTOR VEHICLE PURSUIT

- A. The decision to initiate a motor vehicle pursuit rests with the individual officer when encountering a motor vehicle operator who refuses to voluntarily stop after having been lawfully directed or signaled to do so. **The Department member will only engage in a motor vehicle pursuit when:**
 - 1. applying the balancing test and other restrictions of this directive;
 - 2. if in a **marked** vehicle, the emergency-roof lights and siren are activated or, if in an **unmarked** vehicle, the high-beam flashing headlights, siren, and light bars (if equipped) are activated throughout the duration of the pursuit; and
 - 3. notification has been made to the OEMC dispatcher regarding the facts concerning the pursuit.
- B. An active motor vehicle pursuit will involve **no more than** a primary and secondary pursuit unit unless otherwise authorized by a supervisor. The assigned secondary pursuit vehicle must be a marked vehicle. All other units will remain aware of the direction and progress of the pursuit, but will not

actively participate and will NOT respond or engage in [pursuit paralleling](#) unless specifically authorized to do so.

NOTE: The supervisor assigned to monitor a pursuit may approve requests for additional units to join a pursuit if it appears that the members engaged in the pursuit may not be able to safely effect the arrest of the suspect(s) or offender(s) being pursued once the pursuit terminates.

- C. *If the primary pursuit unit is an unmarked vehicle, the secondary pursuit unit will assume the duties of the primary unit as soon as it is safe to do so. The unmarked vehicle will then withdraw from the pursuit and another marked vehicle will be designated as the secondary pursuit vehicle.*
1. Members, whether operating a marked or unmarked Department vehicle, will apply and adhere to the balancing test and restrictions established under Item IV of this directive.
 2. For purposes of this directive, the use of portable oscillating or strobe dashboard or roof lights does not change the designation of an unmarked vehicle to that of a marked vehicle.
- D. *Before driving through an intersection, the member operating the vehicle will check for traffic that is approaching or in the intersection.*
- E. The following activities are prohibited during a motor vehicle pursuit:
1. [Boxing in](#);
 2. [Caravanning](#) (unless approved consistent with Item VII-B of this directive);
 3. [Forcing collision](#);
 4. [Overtaking](#);
 5. [Pursuit paralleling](#) (unless approved consistent with Item VII-B of this directive);
 6. [Ramming](#);
 7. [Roadblocks](#).

VIII. RESPONSIBILITIES AND PROCEDURES WHEN A MOTOR VEHICLE PURSUIT IS INITIATED

- A. [Primary Pursuit Unit](#)
1. The sworn member initiating the pursuit will, in all instances, immediately notify the OEMC dispatcher that a pursuit is in progress and provide the following information:
 - a. Radio-call identification number;
 - b. The **specific reason for the pursuit**, including known laws violated;
 - c. Location, speed, and direction of travel;
 - d. Vehicle description, including the state license plate number if known;
 - e. Number of occupants;
 - f. Any other relevant information.
 2. The initiating unit, when operating a Department vehicle authorized for use as a primary pursuit unit, will serve as the primary pursuit unit unless directed otherwise by a supervisor.
- B. OEMC Dispatcher
1. For units initiating a motor vehicle pursuit on a **district zone frequency**, the OEMC dispatcher will:
 - a. immediately clear the air of all radio traffic;
 - b. establish the identity of the unit initiating the pursuit;

- c. establish the location, direction of travel, speed, license plate number (if available), and the reason for the pursuit.
- d. immediately assign a district supervisor to monitor the pursuit. Attempts will be made to notify a district supervisor in the following sequence until one is given the responsibility to supervise the pursuit:
 - (1) sector, rapid response, or tactical sergeants;
 - (2) field operations lieutenant or tactical lieutenant;
 - (3) watch operations lieutenant;
 - (4) on-duty executive officer or commander.

NOTE: Any supervisor that fails to respond to a minimum of three separate pages in an estimated one minute period will be redlined. After exhausting the above list without response from any of the supervisors, the dispatcher will terminate the pursuit.

- e. notify the district station supervisor.
 - f. under the direction of the [assigned supervisor](#), coordinate assistance. The supervisor and primary pursuit unit will be advised of the identity of the [secondary pursuit unit](#).
 - g. create an event for the pursuit and record all incoming information on the pursuit and the pursued vehicle.
 - h. provide continual updates on the pursued vehicle's location and maintain radio discipline until the pursuit is concluded or terminated.
 - i. if the pursuit continues into another district:
 - (1) ensure the appropriate zone is notified; and
 - (2) notify the on-duty Street Deputy, who will acknowledge to the OEMC dispatcher that he or she is monitoring the motor vehicle pursuit. Once acknowledgement is given, there will be tacit approval for continuation of the pursuit unless the pursuit is ordered to terminate.
 - j. request air support if available.
2. For units initiating a pursuit on a **city-wide frequency**, the OEMC dispatcher will follow the procedures outlined in Items VIII-B-1 of this directive and:
- a. assign the unit's immediate supervisor to monitor the pursuit. If the unit's immediate supervisor does not respond, assign any supervisor monitoring that frequency.
 - b. ensure that the pursuit is immediately simulcast to the appropriate zone(s).
 - c. if the pursuit switches to a district zone frequency or district units become involved in the pursuit, assign a district supervisor to monitor the pursuit.
 - d. ensure the coordination of information concerning the pursuit between the affected city-wide and district zone frequencies.

C. Secondary Pursuit Unit

- 1. The secondary pursuit unit will maintain a safe distance behind the primary unit and be close enough to render backup assistance if and when required. The secondary pursuit unit will be responsible for keeping the primary pursuit unit in sight, not the vehicle being pursued.
- 2. If the primary pursuit unit becomes disabled, the secondary pursuit unit will become the primary pursuit unit. The OEMC dispatcher will advise the assigned supervisor of other units available, and the supervisor will designate the new secondary pursuit unit.

D. Supervisors Assigned to a [Motor Vehicle Pursuit](#)

1. The assigned supervisor must acknowledge to the OEMC dispatcher that he or she is monitoring the motor vehicle pursuit. Once acknowledgement is given, there will be tacit approval for continuation of the pursuit by the assigned supervisor unless the pursuit is ordered to terminate in accordance with the guidelines outlined in this directive.
2. if a primary pursuit unit is an unmarked vehicle, ensure:
 - a. it is replaced with the secondary pursuit unit as soon as it is safe to do so;
 - b. the unmarked vehicle has withdrawn from the pursuit; and
 - c. another marked vehicle has been designated as the secondary pursuit unit.
3. The assigned supervisor and higher-ranking members from the district of initiation, using all available information, will:
 - a. **determine if the initiation of the pursuit was authorized and terminate the pursuit if appropriate;**
 - b. **continuously apply the balancing test and other restrictions of this directive and terminate the pursuit if appropriate;**
 - c. determine if additional units are needed; and
 - d. proceed immediately to the scene and assume command and oversight of the scene unless or until relieved by a higher-ranking supervisor.

NOTE: If the assigned supervisor is unable to immediately respond, another supervisor from the district of initiation will respond.

IX. INTER-JURISDICTIONAL PURSUITS

- A. The continuation of a pursuit into another jurisdiction must be approved by the assigned supervisor.
- B. The OEMC dispatcher will notify affected law-enforcement agencies when a member continues a pursuit into another jurisdiction. The dispatcher will specify any assistance that will be needed.
- C. Members will not become involved in a pursuit initiated by another law-enforcement agency unless specifically authorized by a supervisor. The approving supervisor in such instances will assume responsibility as the [assigned supervisor](#) for the pursuit relative to the participating Department personnel. All Department members participating in or supervising pursuits initiated by another agency will adhere to all of the procedures outlined in this directive.

X. TERMINATION OF MOTOR VEHICLE PURSUITS

- A. **A pursuit will be immediately terminated whenever:**
 1. an involved Department member determines that the pursuit no longer conforms to the balancing test as described in Item IV or other restrictions of this directive.
 2. an order to terminate the pursuit is given by a supervisor consistent with Item VI of this directive.
 3. a pursued vehicle or pursuing Department vehicle is involved in any traffic crash in which there is a probability of personal injury;

4. audio communication between the Office of Emergency Management and Communications (OEMC) and the pursuing vehicle is lost.

NOTE: In this instance, only those units that lose audio communication with OEMC are required to terminate the pursuit. If the OEMC dispatcher loses audio communication with the primary pursuit unit, the dispatcher will, with the approval of the [assigned supervisor](#), assign the [secondary pursuit unit](#) as the primary pursuit unit.

5. the primary pursuit unit loses the vehicle being pursued and the secondary pursuit unit cannot reasonably assume the primary pursuit unit's duties.

- B. If the termination of a pursuit results in the unsuccessful apprehension of a fleeing vehicle, the operator of the [primary pursuit unit](#) will refer to the Department directive titled "**Impoundment of Vehicles for Municipal Code Violations**" for possible impoundment of the fleeing vehicle.

XI. RESPONSIBILITIES AND PROCEDURES WHEN A MOTOR VEHICLE PURSUIT IS TERMINATED

Upon a termination order, a voluntary termination, or the apprehension of the offender:

- A. the OEMC dispatcher will:

1. immediately simulcast the termination alert to each affected zone frequencies and each city-wide frequency;
2. notify all units of the termination and ensure that all units involved immediately acknowledge the termination order;
3. simulcast the description of any wanted vehicle and offenders and ensure that the adjacent radio zones are notified; and
4. complete an event record of the pursuit.

- B. the members that were actively engaged in the pursuit will:

1. notify OEMC of their location and **remain at that location** until directed by the supervisor assigned to the pursuit;

EXCEPTION: Officers may leave the termination point to respond to an emergency situation occurring within the immediate vicinity but, as soon as practical, they must notify the assigned supervisor and OEMC of the new location and the nature of the emergency.

2. if acting as the [primary pursuit unit](#)
 - a. obtain a Pursuit Tracking Number from the Major Accident Investigation Unit; and
 - b. submit a CLEAR Pursuit Report and attach relevant documents (e.g., Traffic Pursuit Supplemental Reports, General Offense Case Reports, Arrest Reports, Supplementary Reports).
3. if not acting as the [primary pursuit unit](#), complete a Traffic Pursuit Supplemental Report;
4. ensure the in-car camera video capturing the event is correctly labeled and saved before leaving the termination point or as soon as possible before the end of the tour of duty.

NOTE: If the member is physically unable to save the video, the responding supervisor will ensure the video is saved correctly.

5. if not physically able to perform any of the above items, then the assigned supervisor will perform these duties with the information then available.

C. The supervisor assigned to the pursuit will:

1. ensure that the OEMC dispatcher simulcasted the relevant information to each affected zone and city-wide frequencies that the pursuit was terminated;
2. immediately proceed to the termination point. If another supervisor was assigned to the termination point, relieve that supervisor and take control of the scene, providing guidance and necessary support;
3. ensure that medical attention is requested for any person who may be injured;

NOTE: Consistent with the Department directive titled "Traumatic Incident Stress Management Program," the assigned supervisor will notify the affected member's watch operations lieutenant/unit commanding officer if the pursuit resulted in a traffic crash involving serious personal injury or death.

4. ensure that the driver and all occupants from the pursued vehicle are removed from the scene and transported to a police facility for further investigation or processing;
5. order all members on scene not directly involved in the pursuit or any related investigation to return to their normal duties;
6. ensure that the vehicle operators of all Department vehicles participating in the pursuit complete a CLEAR Pursuit Report or Traffic Pursuit Supplemental Report as soon as practicable but **before** his or her tour of duty is completed;
7. complete the "Supervisor" section of the CLEAR Pursuit Report and any Traffic Pursuit Supplemental Reports and submit the reports to the watch operations lieutenant of the district where the pursuit was initiated before his or her tour of duty is completed;
8. ensure a Media / Data Request — Office of Emergency Management and Communications is completed and:
 - a. indicate in the "Additional Comments and Information" section of the request that the audio tape is to be forwarded to the Commanding Officer, Traffic Section, Unit 145; and
 - b. attach a copy of the request to the CLEAR Pursuit Report.
9. ensure a Digitally Recorded Data Viewing/Hold/Duplication/Shared Request form is completed for a duplication request and:
 - a. indicate in the "Additional Remarks and Information" section of the request that the video is forwarded to the Commanding Officer, Traffic Section, Unit 145; and
 - b. attach a copy of the request to the CLEAR Pursuit Report.
10. ensure all members equipped with an in-car camera system correctly save and label the pursuit event prior to leaving the termination point or as soon as possible before the end of their tours of duty.

NOTE: If the member is physically unable to save the video, the responding supervisor will ensure the video is saved correctly.

11. flag any body worn camera recordings consistent with the Department directive titled "**Body Worn Cameras.**"
12. if a helicopter was assisting the pursuit, ensure video recordings are processed consistent with Department directives titled "**Helicopter Support of Motor Vehicle Pursuits**" and "**Helicopter Operations Video Systems.**"

D. The district station supervisor of the district where the pursuit originated will ensure that the district field lieutenant and watch operations lieutenant are notified of the pursuit.

- E. The watch operations lieutenant will complete an administrative review of the CLEAR Pursuit Report and:
1. complete the appropriate section of the CLEAR Pursuit Report and any Traffic Pursuit Supplemental Reports and sign or otherwise approve and submit the reports acknowledging his or her review of the completed reports;
 2. if appropriate, initiate Summary Punishment for any violations of this directive resulting from a [motor vehicle pursuit](#) when the pursuit will be reviewed at the district level;
 3. **not** initiate Summary Punishment for any violations of this directive resulting from a [motor vehicle pursuit](#) prior to the review of the pursuit by the Traffic Review Board when the pursuit will be reviewed by the Traffic Review Board;
 4. if a Department vehicle involved in the pursuit is towed from the scene due to a traffic crash or other circumstances, ensure:
 - a. a Help Desk ticket is requested; and
 - b. CPIC is notified to request an emergency on-site retrieval consistent with the directive titled "**In-Car Video Systems**" to preserve for evidence any recordings of the pursuit or Department vehicle crash event.
- NOTE:** The retrieval request will include that the vehicle was towed, the vehicle description, and pursuit event number.
5. ensure the incident is recorded on the Watch Incident Log (CPD-21.916).
 6. if the pursuit resulted in a traffic crash involving serious personal injury or death, refer the affected member(s) to the "**Traumatic Incident Stress Management Program.**"
- F. Any supervisor who becomes aware of a violation of Department policy or procedures requiring a complaint register investigation will initiate the investigation in accordance with the Department directive titled "**Complaint and Disciplinary Procedures.**"

XII. EXEMPT LEVEL RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. The initiating member's exempt commanding officer will:
1. complete the appropriate section of the CLEAR Pursuit Report and any Traffic Pursuit Supplemental Reports and sign or otherwise approve the reports acknowledging his or her review of the completed reports;
 2. if appropriate, initiate Summary Punishment for any violations of this directive resulting from a [motor vehicle pursuit](#) when the pursuit will be reviewed at the district level;
 3. **not** initiate summary punishment for any violations of this directive resulting from a [motor vehicle pursuit](#) prior to the review of the pursuit by the Traffic Review Board when the motor vehicle pursuit will be reviewed by the Traffic Review Board;
 4. submit the report and all attachments, **no later than 72 hours after receipt**, to the:
 - a. Commanding Officer, Traffic Section; and
 - b. exempt commanding member next in the chain of command.
- NOTE:** A copy will be retained in the unit files in accordance with existing records-retention requirements.
- B. The Commanding Officer, Major Accident Investigations Unit, will ensure:
1. a ledger of Pursuit Tracking Numbers is maintained; and
 2. Pursuit Tracking Numbers are issued on a 24-hour basis as requested by Department members.

GLOSSARY TERMS:

1. **Law Enforcement Personnel**

Any person who by virtue of his or her office is vested by law with a duty to maintain public order or to make arrests for offenses, whether that duty extends to all offenses or is limited to specific offenses, regardless of the employing agency.

2. **Emergency Vehicle Operation**

The authorized use of a Department vehicle beyond the normal traffic regulations undertaken consistent with the exemptions provided under 625 ILCS 5/11-205 of the Illinois Vehicle Code.

3. **Motor Vehicle Pursuit**

A. An active attempt by a sworn member operating an authorized emergency vehicle to apprehend any driver or operator of a motor vehicle who, having been given a visual and audible signal by the officer directing such driver or operator to bring his or her vehicle to a stop, fails or refuses to obey such direction, increases or maintains his or her speed, extinguishes his or her lights, or otherwise flees or attempts to elude the officer.

NOTE: A routine traffic stop or other instance in which an officer activates his or her emergency lights and/or siren and the citizen/vehicle operator complies by coming to a stop in a reasonably short distance will NOT be considered a motor vehicle pursuit.

4. **Assigned Supervisor**

Any supervisor assigned and acknowledged by the Office of Emergency Management Communications to monitor a vehicle pursuit.

5. **Secondary Pursuit Unit**

Any police vehicle which becomes involved as a backup to the primary pursuit unit.

6. **Pursuit Paralleling**

The deliberate tactic of a vehicle operator to mirror on adjacent streets the direction and speed of vehicles actively involved in an authorized pursuit.

7. **Boxing In**

A deliberate tactic by two or more police vehicles to force a pursued vehicle in a specific direction or to force a pursued vehicle to stop or reduce speed by the maneuvering of police vehicles in front of, behind, or beside a pursued vehicle.

8. **Caravanning**

The following and direct participation in a pursuit by more than two police vehicles.

9. **Forcing Collision**

A deliberate tactic by a police vehicle operator to cause a pursued vehicle to crash into parked vehicles or fixed objects.

10. **Overtaking**

The passing of a pursued vehicle by a police officer operating an authorized emergency vehicle.

11. **Ramming**

The deliberate tactic by one or more police vehicles to forcibly strike, while attempting to stop, a pursued vehicle.

12. **Roadblock**

Any method, restriction, or obstruction used or intended for the purpose of preventing passage of a motor vehicle.

13. **Primary Pursuit Unit**

The first police vehicle immediately behind the vehicle being pursued.

Body Worn Cameras (BWCs)

Upgrade of the Axon Body Worn Camera from the AB2 to the AB3 began in JAN 2020. Though the roll out was slowed by COVID 19, 8025 cameras were replaced in District Patrol. Additional Units were outfitted with BWCs to include the Citywide Safety Teams and Summer Mobile. Expansion of the BWC deployment to Public Transit and the Traffic Unit is planned for the end of October 2020.

Genetec City Graph Mobile

Genetec has made a Mobile app version of City Graph which has many of the features of City Graph available for Mobile devices. The app is in pilot in the 011th district with continuous updates and improvements implemented by Genetec.

Samsung DeX Pilot

This product extends the functionality of a mobile phone to the desktop and vehicle environment. Samsung DeX functionality for CPD will allow officers to use their mobile phones to replace the use of antiquated Portable Data Terminals (PDT's) in their vehicles. Currently the project is in a pilot phase.

Acadis

[Consent Decree Compliance] The Acadis Readiness Suite is designed to make certain our law enforcement, emergency responders, and military are trained, equipped, and ready. It measures readiness by automating complex, high-risk training, and compliance operations. Acadis increases the accuracy and effectiveness across every level of critical incident response by consolidating information about personnel and resources. The modular system enables the implementation of functionality where needed to support the compliance lifecycle.

TherapyNotes Software

[Consent Decree Compliance] Implement cloud based TherapyNotes all-in-one Electronic Health Record (EHR) Therapy Management Software for Behavioral and Mental health practitioners. The software features capabilities like client Agenda, Calendar, Billing, Custom Forms, Reports, Staffing and Organizations.

The software will allow the Professional Counseling Services/ EAP Clinicians to do for either a CPD member or their family that requests for counseling services, the following- register, schedule appointments, documentation, tracking, coordination and management of the therapeutic and structured clinical services rendered.

CDP Mobile Electronic Ticketing System

METS Mobile for Chicago Police Department (CPD) is a mobile application intended for use by the Troubled Buildings Unit of CPD for use in the issuing of violation tickets. It will make end-to-end processing more efficient and reduces paper processes. The application will be on CPD issued Android phones, which once turned on, requests an IP from the City network and then receives access. All the data from METS goes to Administrative Hearing (AH). So, CPD's feed from AH will include- Trouble Building Database updates when citations are issued. The goal is to increase police officer productivity. Currently 10 mobile devices are out for testing. Once fully implemented, the TB's will go citywide and require approximate 100 mobile phones and or tablets.

South Shore High School Setup for CPD Training Academy

The project is a build out/restoration of the old CPS building to setup and expand the CPD Training Academy on the South Side of Chicago.

This project entails, adding new AT&T circuit, installing new network infrastructure and configure and deploy 150 new workstations across all the floors.

Project is scheduled to be completed in early 4Q-2020

WIFI equipment upgrade @ CPD Headquarters

The Project is for upgrading end of life equipment and expanding public WIFI coverage @ HQ. Also, includes is the future ready configuration for expanding the WIFI across Area's/Districts.

Details – Upgrade (2) WLC (wireless LAN Controllers), replace/add up to (50) WAP's (Wireless Access Points) across CPD Headquarters building.

Project is scheduled to be completed in early 4Q-2020

Miscellaneous Infrastructure Upgrades

- Area WAN/LAN switches upgrades. Adding new LAN/WAN equipment to obtain the optimized speed within the existing 1G ring.
- Increasing the current bandwidth as needed for BWC and other ASE locations. Increasing bandwidth on existing backhaul circuits to meet the new demands.

Project is scheduled to be completed in early 4Q-2020

SDI

CPD is part or the City contract for SDI, the vendor for Infrastructure support of all computer hardware, network and software support.

GIS

Public Safety Administration (PSA) GIS created an internal Covid-19 website integrating the various data from Public Safety, city agencies and external city partners. The information is displayed using various dashboards, which display the information in the form of charts, graphs and spatially aware maps. The website integrated COVID-19 related 311 service calls, CFD calls for service, hospital resources, cases and number of deaths related to the COVID-19 pandemic. The information was coordinated by OEMC and PSA, thus allowing secure sharing of the information within Public Safety and limited city users. During the Civil Unrest this spring, PSA GIS put together an internal HUB website focusing on civil unrest related CPD and CFD calls for service. Additionally, two mobile applications were stood up to allow field collection for damage surveys and visualization.

PSA GIS developed a set of tools that the Detective Division Area Technology Centers (ATC) can use to add private camera locations via a desktop interface or in the field using a mobile

application. Detectives can quickly retrieve information related to cameras in an area of a crime using a spatially enable web mapping site.

There have been ad-hoc updates to Caboodle and Mobile Caboodle along with various dashboards stood up to quickly analyze information.

Telecom

T-Mobile

CPD is exploring the opportunity offered to us by T-Mobile. This would offer ten years of free 5G voice, data and text service to CPD phones. CPD would have to purchase and support the device.

District Coordination Officer (DCO)

The program is fully implemented in the 15th and 25th Districts. Each district has 15 cell phones and 15 Tablets. The cell phones are used as a new method of communication between the community and the police. The community and business owners can now call, email and text the DCO's directly without having to call 911. The program has also begun using the 311 app to allow DCO Officers to directly research and address community concerns that would otherwise be called in to the 311 center. The Officers are deployed with tablets to facilitate the processing of reports and allowing them to be mobile. DCO programs have also started in Districts 009, 010, and 011. Total device deployment currently: 75 cell phones, 75 mobile tablets. The DCO program is set to go citywide in the near future to all 22 police districts. A total of 660 mobile devices will be required.

Mobile Device Manager(MDM)

Allows the Mobile Team to manage all mobile devices through one system. All new mobile apps and new software updates can be pushed out through the MDM to thousands of devices without a need to physically install. MDM allows the Team to create policy specific apps to certain groups that require specialty applications.

Development

CASE-Incident (AIRA 2.0)

[Grant Funded Project] Develop a modern mobile-web-enabled incident reporting system that replaces the 17-year old legacy AIRA application that has become unsupportable. The new system reuses and builds on components of the CLEARNet Incident reporting module developed for Multi-Agency use in Spring 2018. Project focuses on wizard-style user interface that is streamlined and familiar to legacy AIRA users.

Project includes Automated Arrest integration and NIBRS compliance. Project includes NIBRS Reporting and compliant data exports to FBI.

NIBRS Data transmission

[Grant Funded Project / Compliance Project] Develop a middleware application that converts CPD crime and arrest reports to the new Federal NIBRS data standard and transmit automatically to Illinois State Police. NIBRS compliant reporting deadline is Jan 1, 2021.

CEMS

[Consent-Decree Compliance] Develop system that allows community policing to publicize events and “Engagement Opportunities” to the public who can register personal user accounts to receive updates and provide feedback. Phase 1 included content creation workflow; basic communication functionality; a separate event check-in tool; constituent database that tracks interests and participation. System will blend into existing CPD website and public facing web apps. Phase 2 included more robust automatic

communications; more robust constituent database features; meetings app. Now in Phase 3, collection of smaller enhancements requested throughout the agile program of continuous improvement and for integration with the ESRI product that is being contemplated.

CLEARNET: BIA

[Grant Funded – UASI] The purpose of the Ballistics Information Alert report is to compare test results for shell casings against other results in the database to determine a potential match to a crime. This replaces reports filed using Microsoft word so that ballistic matches can be captured in the CLEAR database and used more easily in analysis and investigations

CLEARNET: Timecard

Develop a web application to replace the paper timecard. Includes automatic data imports from AA Sheets and OT Slips. Provides a platform for Timekeepers to review inputs, make manual adjustments, and apply business rules and exceptions. The application does not attempt to embody all business rules and exceptions that are known by the timekeepers. Calculations that are not business rule dependent will be done by application.

CLEARNET: TRR Tactical Response Report

The Tactical Response Report a Department application used to capture information regarding the use of force by Department Members and to support the multi-layer force review process. This in-production application is undergoing its 3rd revision to support another round of pending changes to the department's Use of Force policy.

Directives Management System

Develop a replacement for the existing Directives Management System that was built on the content management system from Xyleme which is no longer supported.

DWH 12c Tactical Reports

[Grant Funded – UASI sustainment] Upgraded version of these mission critical reports have been revamped and now include the Single Sign-On feature. With the deployment of these new reports, personnel will only be required to log in and authenticate one time and for the remainder of the session, will be able to run each tactical report without re-entering their log-in credentials. Credential are now based on Role permissions. Reports now reference the new data warehouse. Report now provide usage statistics.

RCASE

[Grant Funded – UASI sustainment] Replaces the 20-year-old legacy CHRIS Case management application for detectives with a new browser-based application that is fully compatible with CPD's established case reporting and management practices. Phase 1 is already in production with the case management module. Phase 2 is in process with the detective case supplement reporting module.

Learning Management System

[Consent Decree Compliance] Implements application feature changes to support CPD's evolving approach to bulk class registration. The system includes the aggregation of training records from multiple legacy in-house systems and third-party systems. The project includes integration with the ACADIS Learning management system now being implemented.

Officer Support System

[Consent Decree Compliance] Develop system that uses predictive analytics to identify at-risk behavior of officers requiring intervention and support based on data including CR/SPAR, Use of Force (TRR), Training, and officer activity records from numerous systems. System automates the workflow of intervention and support “Work Items”. System replaces and enhances the functions of the Performance Recognition System (PRS) and Personnel Jackets applications which provide a view of detailed officer history data. Data model to be developed by U. Chicago Crime Lab.

New Talent Management System (TMS): Performance Evaluation System

[Consent Decree Compliance] Performance Evaluation System (PES) Redesign – Replace the 14-year-old legacy Performance Evaluation system as a module of the modern Talent Management System that meets new consent decree requirements for annual performance evaluations.

TMS: Workforce Allocation

[Consent Decree Compliance] Develop a system that replaces the paper watch sheet and related legacy CLEAR modules like AA Sheets with an automated system for supervisors to plan beat assignments using drag and drop controls. The system pre-fills assignments based on past patterns of watch & day off group while considering planned furloughs, time-off requests, training courses, court appearances, and other records that predict unavailability. The system provides tools for readily measuring and enforcing unity of command and span of control factors.

TMS: Action Request Application

Develop a system that replaces the paper Action Request Form. The action request process shall be evaluated and measured against standard workflow industry standards. The final product will be designed to allow for the re-using of the Action Request by other Bureaus. The action request will allow for up and down workflow approvals, across multiple business units. Project is currently in pilot testing with need for some refinement expected.

Case Management System (CMS)

The replacement of Automated CR/SPAR and CRMS for Internal Case Investigation and disciplinary activities. Will support the following:

- Investigative Case Management process workflow
- Cases involving Summary Punishment and disciplinary Recommendation (SPAR)
- Supports tracking of grievance cases through appeal, hearing, arbitration,
- Settlement (MLAS) and Non-Intervention Disciplinary (NDI)
- Migration of Legacy CR data to CMS- Centralizing data for accurate reporting

Eluding Vehicle Application

Ensures CPD fills the need for the collection of data regarding incidents of an eluding suspect.

COVID-19 Notification Report

To track or inform department members about the procedures related to the response to coronavirus disease and the affected members.

Traumatic Incident Stress Management Program

System to manage members that are experiencing emotional or psychological distress.

Gang Database

Redevelop the Gang Member investigative database with features for constitutional policing according to requirements developed by the Civic Consulting Alliance.

The following information is provided in response to questions posed at the Chicago Police Department's hearing on October 29, 2020 to discuss the proposed 2021 budget.

Aldерwoman Rodriguez Sanchez asked for information on the plan CPD is formulating in regards to developing a co-responder model for responding to calls with persons in mental crisis.

Please find below the responses to the questions submitted in regard to the best-practices research that was conducted on crisis response models in other cities, as well as how they informed the initial design of the Chicago crisis response pilot.

1. What are they doing in other cities?

We looked at eight programs in Boston, MA; Dallas, TX; Denver, CO; Milwaukee, WI; Eugene, OR; Portland, OR; and two in Houston, TX that are considered best practices among our law enforcement and behavioral health partners. These programs represent three types of responses to individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis: 1) mobile crisis response – a model in which mental health and EMS professionals respond inside or outside of the EMS system; 2) co-response – a model that integrates mental health professionals into the dispatch response with first responders to a call; and 3) call diversion – a model in which calls to 911 are resolved by a mental health professional as an alternative to a first responder dispatch.

2. What research has been conducted around the potential costs or savings of a mental health program?

Crisis response models focus not only on reducing the potential harms of involvement with the criminal justice system, but on addressing underlying health concerns that led to the call in the first place. With that in mind, we looked first and foremost at designing a best practice-informed model that improved outcomes for Chicagoans experiencing crisis. Secondary to that goal, we analyzed how costs are recouped when these practices are implemented. The programs we considered found individual, community, and systemwide savings across four broad categories:

- a. Costs to the individual of criminal justice involvement. This includes fines, financial impact of incarceration, loss of employment, impact of ability to get future employment, housing, etc.
- b. Emergency room visits. Following incarceration, emergency room visits are the costliest response to individuals experiencing mental and behavioral crises and tend to focus on stabilization of the immediate episode rather than addressing the causes of the episodes themselves. As a result, individuals with unmet mental and behavioral health needs will be brought into ERs time and time again unless something is done to meet these needs.
- c. EMS availability/call response time: In 2019, Chicago Fire Department responded to over 27,000 calls with a mental health component. In the first half of 2020, CFD has responded to over 13,000 mental health calls. Reducing the demand for ambulance transports will reduce the financial burden of experiencing a mental or behavioral health crisis and will free up ambulances to respond to other calls.
- d. Officer time: In 2019, the Chicago Police Department responded to over 41,000 calls with a mental health component. In the first half of 2020, CPD responded to over 22,000. Similar to EMS availability, by engaging mental and behavioral health professionals in call diversion, officers who would have otherwise spent their time responding to these calls would be free to reallocate their time to other issues, such as proactive crime prevention. Furthermore, in pairing officers with mental health professionals, the co-responder model reduces the number of officers needed when responding to individuals experiencing crisis.

3. What are the cost considerations of each model?

Alternative response: these programs focus on low-risk calls where there is no indication of a threat to the responder or that a crime with a victim has been committed. In the alternative response programs we considered, these were teams of two – one paramedic and one mental/behavioral health professional. These teams utilized unmarked vans that operated as ambulances for purposes of non-medical transport.

Co-Response: these programs focus on the full spectrum of calls with a mental health component. Co-response teams are teams of two or three, including a plainclothes CIT-certified police officer, a mental/behavioral health professional, and a community paramedic. Programs differed in how they handled transport, some travelled in unmarked police vehicles, while others in unmarked vans.

Call diversion: call diversion embeds a mental/behavioral health professional in the call center and requires a dedicated call-taker to work with the mental/behavioral health professional for the duration of their tour. There is obviously no transport involved in the call diversion model.

4. Who takes the lead on research costs?

We haven't determined who our research partner will be yet, but this cost is built into the Mayor's budget proposal with approximately \$275,000 allocated to CDPH for a third-party evaluation of the program's outcomes.

5. How do we get good metrics with a small pilot?

The final geography and operational hours of the pilot will be designed in such a manner that lends itself to generalizable research and statistically significant results. One important component of the pilot is ensuring fidelity to the design of the model which is best achieved by starting at a sustainable size and scaling over time as it is analyzed and key learnings can be incorporated.

6. Does the administration plan to start up a pilot program involving crisis workers responding to calls for service in FY 2021?

The administration intends to start a pilot crisis response program responding to calls for service in FY 2021. The details of the pilot are still being finalized, but we would like to get started as soon as possible, taking care to make sure the intervention is well thought out and rolled out in such a manner that we can evaluate its impact. The administration intends to partner with the Mayor's Chicago Council for Mental Health Equity which developed the co-responder recommendation in October of 2019 and will continue to support implementation of the recommendation. We look forward to continuing to work with you and your colleagues on this important issue.

Alderman Smith and Alderman Vasquez asked for information explaining CPD's plan for the upcoming changes to the JISC.

Executive Summary

The Mayor's Office, CPD, and DFSS would like to clarify plans for the CPD Juvenile Intervention and Support Center (JISC) and the corresponding timeline following recent City Council budget hearings. We are committed to strengthening the services offered to Chicago's young people through programming, supervision and supports, with the overarching goal of reducing the harmful effects of the justice system on our youth. To that end, we have implemented short-term changes in 2020 and are working to collaboratively develop a new model for youth diversion and deflection anticipated for full implementation in 2022. As part of this vital effort, we are working to provide a menu of services to young people to ensure they have options for services once they are deemed eligible for diversion. The Mayor's Office, CPD, and DFSS welcome input from the City Council, and would like to schedule briefings for Council members on the short- and long-term plans in December 2020.

Short-term plans for reform

In response to the City Council's concerns and the Inspector General's February 2020 report, the Mayor's Office, CPD, and DFSS have been working in partnership to develop and implement reforms to the JISC in order to improve the experience and outcomes for youth.

Short term changes focus on:

- providing trauma-informed trainings for CPD staff at the JISC,
- improving CPD's data reporting and tracking,
- updating CPD policies related to the JISC to emphasize a service-oriented approach, and
- scheduling visits for community-based service providers within the JISC on a volunteer basis (to complement the scope of City-funded services).

Long-term plans for reimagining youth deflection and diversion

CPD, the Mayor's Office, DFSS and partners are actively engaging in a process to determine the long-term vision for youth diversion in Chicago that expands pathways beyond post-arrest diversion, and will ultimately replace the JISC. Pro-bono consultants, Civic Consulting Alliance, are facilitating project management and research on best practices for the new model, and plan to present a high-level overview of options for the City's consideration before January 2021.

The previously formed JISC Advisory Council will continue to play a role in determining priorities for youth diversion and will regularly be informed of metrics from CPD and the City-funded service provider. In addition, the City will expand this council to include more community members for broader input and engagement.

The City intends for a future state of youth deflection and diversion that will be expanded to serve young people citywide, with a priority on services. We also plan to find other facilities that fulfill needs of the new model and therefore will collaboratively look to relocate from the current JISC building at 3900 S. California.

2021 Budget proposal for expanded services

No additional funding has been allocated to CPD to support the JISC in the next budget year. In 2020, CPD began to strategically engage volunteer service providers to offer community-based services to young people and families at the JISC. In 2021, CPD will continue to work strategically to supplement City-provided services at the JISC through these partnerships, at no cost to the City.

In 2021, we propose allocating \$900,000 to DFSS for increased service provider capacity and expanded scope for limited legal representation to increase number of youth diverted. There are several key differences that the new service provider will offer, which have been informed by the OIG report:

- **Diversion advocacy:** a limited legal advocate provided by the service provider will be on-site at JISC to support CPD by building upon the information gathered by CPD to administer an initial risk assessment for diversion services, and to advocate for as many youth as possible to be diverted.
- **Community-based case managers** that will meet youth in their own neighborhoods.
- The new provider will **shift on-site hours** in order to maintain a presence during high-traffic times when the most youth are interacting with the JISC.

Service provider selection

While the youth diversion model is being re-envisioned for a 2022 rollout, the selection of a new DFSS delegate in the meantime will ensure that the needs of Chicago's youth are being met through an expanded scope of services, which includes limited legal advocacy and case management. The new service provider will also be encouraged to partner with other community-based organizations across the city to reach more youth in 2021.

The delegate will be selected via a mayoral directive process. The recipient of this funding will fulfill a unique role, and will be selected based on the provider's experience working with young people in the justice system in the areas of case management and diversion advocacy. Stakeholder feedback provided via the JISC Advisory Council indicates that legal services are an important but missing component in the delivery of services for youth at the JISC.

Alderman Thompson asked for data showing the usage and implementation of the license plate readers.

CPD does not provide information about Automated License Plate Reader locations due to public safety concerns, because they are used in the Department's anti-terrorism efforts. Please see the information below regarding the usage of ALPRs.

City of Chicago Automated License Plate Readers (ALPRs)

Automated license plate readers (ALPRs) are high-speed, computer-controlled camera systems that are typically mounted on street poles, streetlights, highway overpasses, mobile trailers, and attached to police cars, and other city vehicles. ALPRs automatically capture license plate numbers that come into view, along with the location, date, and time. The data is then uploaded to a centralized database and compared to lists that have been created by law enforcement. Examples of license plates on these lists include stolen vehicles, stolen plates, vehicles suspected of use in terrorism, drug trafficking, human trafficking, and amber alerts. ALPRs store the reads locally until network connectivity is available, then the software can upload the reads to the centralized database.

For personnel with the appropriate credentials and law enforcement requirements, ALPR data can be viewed in city locations like the Operations Center at OEMC, Chicago Police Information Center at Public Safety Headquarters and the Strategic Decision Support Centers in CPD District stations. These users have the option of monitoring for all reads from a camera, or they can monitor for matches on a list coming from any of the fixed or mobile ALPRs once the reads are uploaded to the centralized database.
