Alderperson Dowell asked for a breakdown of type of complaints COPA has received for 2022.

As of October 17, 2022, COPA has retained 961 complaints as being within its jurisdiction. The following chart reflects, by type, 1,967 allegations of misconduct contained within those 961 complaints:

Alderperson Hairston asked for how many cases have went through CCR and which communities were those cases in.

The Community-Police Mediation Pilot Program launched on October 1, 2022, and COPA has since begun recommending eligible cases to the program's facilitator Center for Conflict Resolution (CCR). Due to the infancy of the pilot, COPA has not yet received any information regarding outcomes and/or results from CCR. COPA is happy to provide further information regarding program outcomes in the future when an appropriate amount of data is compiled.

Alderperson Hairston asked what the findings of sexual misconduct cases were in 2022.

In 2022 (as of October 17, 2022) COPA concluded 12 investigations that contain one or more allegations of Sexual Misconduct. Of these 12 cases, eight (8) were closed with no findings and four (4) were closed with findings. The four (4) cases with findings contain 14 total allegations of Sexual Misconduct, 13 of which were **Sustained** and one (1) which was found **Not Sustained**.

^{*}COPA policy prevents the release of findings until the non-concurrence process and review by a single member of the Police Board is complete AND the accused officers have been served with the charges against them by the City of Chicago Department of Law (DOL). For cases where the process is not complete or officers have not yet been served, COPA has marked the incident date as confidential.

^{**}Penalty increases imposed by the Superintendent are not noted in this chart. Per Section 2-78-130 of COPA's Ordinance, "nothing [...] shall limit the Superintendent's ability to impose additional action to that recommended by the Chief Administrator, including discipline that is more severe than that recommended by the Chief Administrator [...]."

The following information is provided in response to questions posed at our department's hearing on October 17, 2022 to discuss the proposed 2023 budget.

Alderperson Napolitano asked for the number of officers in callback.

COPA does not retain data regarding 'callback' assignments and would suggest contacting the Chicago Police Department directly for more detailed information.

If during a COPA investigation it is determined the nature of allegations against an officer warrant an evaluation of the officer's ability to continue performing their duties, the agency will make such a recommendation. The Department is given the opportunity to review this recommendation and any associated supporting evidence and may elect to relieve the officer of their police powers. If the Department makes this decision, the accused officer may then be assigned to 'callback' by the Department. COPA does not make recommendations regarding where an officer is assigned if relieved of their powers. As our investigations continue, we may request that an officer's police powers be restored if the evidence supports restoration.
