## **Contact Tracing: Virtual Community Briefing**

**Background and Summary:** Dave Kern, *Deputy Commissioner at CDPH* 

- Contact Tracing Overview
  - o What: Public Health Intervention for COVID-19
  - o Why: Helps stop transmissions of COVID-19
- Steps Involved:
  - o Person receives COVID-19 test
  - o If positive, state Health Department receives case
    - Separate cases in two categories
      - 1) Congregate Facility/Settings i.e. workplaces, nursing homes
      - 2) General Population (Community Transmission)
  - o After cases have been diagnosed, they are investigated by:
    - Gathering demographic information
    - Gathering information from those who have been in close contact
  - o CDPH **Notifies** contacts of potential cases
  - o Help connect contacts to COVID-19 Testing and Self-Quarantine
  - o **Introduce resource coordinators** to contacts
    - Help with housing, food insecurity, and various other needs
  - Surveillance monitoring
  - o Community wraparound services
- CDPH has been investigating:
  - o Congregate Areas
  - Racial Minority Populations
- Summary:
  - CDPH will be partnering with healthcare institutions and community organizations to assist the general population

## **Equity Approach:** Christina Anderson, *Project Director, Mayors Office*

- Reason: The City of Chicago wants to address the social determinants of health that preceded COVID-19
- RFP: Important that these jobs/positions go to underrepresented populations
  - o RFP dictates that at least 85% go to at least 30 community-based organizations
  - o Job placement will focus on those with barriers i.e. disabilities, returning residents...etc.
  - o "Earn as you learn:" Employees will have additional opportunities to seek job and educational opportunities

## **Questions and Answers:**

- 1) Will funding for contact tracing be federal funding only?
  - o Funding will originate from the federal government
    - The contact tracing will not ask questions pertaining to status
    - The City is working to support immigrant communities
- 2) How and where can people apply to be a contact tracer?

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- o Hiring will occur through those 30 community organizations (chosen by the lead organization)
- o For more information look to: Chicago.gov/coronavirus
- 3) What does the city plan to do to protect individual's privacy?
  - O City is taking privacy very seriously. Contact tracing is not new and the COVID-19 contact tracing will be handled with the same care.
- 4) Once people apply, what follow- up should individuals expect?
  - o Expect communication to come from the lead organization and the community-based partners and organizations for employment.
- 5) Can the city provide equity training for those involved in the contact tracing process?
  - o Resources and training will be provided to the 30 community-based organizations that represent multiple population groups.
- 6) How does the city plan on mitigating possible mistrust with contract tracers?
  - The city and CDPH has been doing this work. Much of the training will center around ensuring individuals' privacy be maintained.
  - Also, contact tracers will be provided emotional support for their own experiences.
- 7) Places individuals can go to seek contact tracing opportunities?
  - o Go to Chicago.gov/coronavirus
  - o Although there is no link, the coronavirus page will be updated frequently
