Sign up to receive \$30 off your home internet bill with the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP)!

- What is ACP? The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a federal program that makes broadband internet more affordable for eligible households and families.
- How? ACP provides a \$30 monthly subsidy towards qualifying families' home internet bill.
- Who is eligible? Participants in any of the following assistance programs: SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Housing Assistance, Veterans Pension or survivor benefits, SSI, WIC. Households with gross annual incomes 200% or less than the federal poverty guidelines also qualify.

Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced the new Skip-the-Line Program for Illinois DMVs. On Sept. 1, 44 of our busiest locations will require appointments to eliminate wait times and provide better customer service. Customers will be required to make appointments for in-person visits for Real IDs, driver's licenses and ID card services, and in-car driving tests. All DMVs will have expanded hours on Monday-Friday, 8 AM - 5:30 PM. 16 DMVs will also be open on Sat, 8 AM -12:30 PM.



Department Water Management Private Sewer Drain Program



PRIVATE SEWER DRAIN PROGRAM

Having problems with water in your basement when it rains or toilets that back up?

If so, you may have a problem with your private sewer drain and you should look into the Chicago Department of Water Management's Private Sewer Drain Program. Although the private sewer drain is owned by the homeowner, under this program, private sewer drains are repaired when the problem is on the public side of the property. (see diagram next page)

If you qualify, the Private Sewer Drain Program can save on average between \$10,000 and \$20,000 in repairs and alleviate the financial burden for sewer repairs in the public way for homeowners

- The program is for existing non-commercial/non-mixed-use residential properties up to and including four units.
- Maintenance and televising to look for roots and breaks and rodding to remove obstructions of the private sewer drain will remain the responsibility of the homeowner.*
- New construction, rehabbed buildings and commercial properties/mixed-use properties do not qualify for the program.

A PRIVATE SEWER DRAIN MOVES WASTE FROM THE HOME TO THE MAIN SEWER.










HOW TO APPLY.

- Homeowner files a "Water in Basement" service request by calling 311 or online at https://www.311.chicago.gov. This service request is routed to the Department of Water Management (DWM).
- 2. A DWM crew is dispatched to verify the main sewer in the street is working properly. If the main sewer is working properly, there may be a problem with the property's private sewer drain, and the crew will leave a Private Sewer Drain Program pamphlet explaining the next steps the homeowner should take.
- 3. If the problem is in the private sewer drain, the homeowner must hire a licensed sewer contractor to rod and televise the private sewer drain with a Department of Water Management House Drain Inspector present. The contractor must call the Department of Water Management at 312,747,4591 to schedule an appointment with a House Drain inspector.
- 4. During the appointment, the sewer contractor and the DWM inspector will determine whether or not there is a break in the private sewer drain and if the break is on private property or in the public way. If the break is on private property, the homeowner must hire and pay a licensed sewer contractor to repair the private sewer drain, including full restoration. If the break is in the public way and all program guidelines are met, DWM will schedule and pay to repair the line.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is my responsibility as a homeowner?

All general maintenance, including cleaning, rodding and televising the entire private sewer drain line, remains the responsibility of the homeowner. Only breaks found in the public way that fit the program criteria will be repaired by the City. Breaks on private property are the responsibility of the homeowner. (See diagram above.)

I own a multi-unit building. Do I still qualify for the program?

Non-commercial residential properties up to and including four units may qualify for the program. New construction, rehabbed buildings and commercial properties/mixed-use properties do not qualify for the program.

If the City will make the repair, why do I need to call a contractor?

The private sewer drain is wholly owned by the homeowner, not the City. The licensed sewer contractor will determine if the private sewer drain needs a simple rodding or if there's a break in the private sewer drain. To qualify for the program, a Department of Water Management (DWM) House Drain Inspector must be present at the time of the rodding and televising to confirm the location of the break. The homeowner or contractor can call 312.747.4591 to schedule an inspector.

Where do I find reputable sewer contractors?

You can search online but be sure to identify licensed sewer contractors. DWM recommends that you receive at least three estimates. Once you have selected a contractor, cell 312.744.3155 to verify their licensing. You can also find a list of licensed contractors on the Department of Buildings website at: https://webapps1.chicago.gov/plumbing-contractorsWeb/21.

Will I be charged for this program?

The homeowner will NOT have to pay for DWM repairs made in the public way. Private contractors will bill the homeowner for their services on private property.

PROGRAMA DE DRENAJES PRIVADOS

¿Tiene problemas con el agua en su sótano cuando llueve o sus baños se acumulan?

Si es así, es posible que tenga un problema con su drenaje de alcantarillado privado y debe consultar el Programa de Drenaje de Alcantanillado Privado del Departamento de Administración del Agua de Chicago: Aunque el drenaje privado es propiedad del propietario, bajo este programa, los drenajes de alcantarillado privados se reparan cuando el problema se encuentra en el lado público de la propiedad. (vea diagrama página siguiente)

Si califica, el Programa de Drenaje de Alcantarillado Privado puede ahorrar en promedio entre \$10,000 y \$20,000 en reparaciones y aliviar la carga financiera de las reparaciones de alcantarillado en la vía pública para los dueños de casas.

- El programa es para propiedades residenciales existentes no comerciales/no de uso mixto de hasta cuatro unidades.
- El mantenimiento, la inspección de cámara para buscar raíces y roturas y uso de varillas de líneas para eliminar obstrucciones del drenaje alcantarillado privado seguirán siendo responsabilidad del propietario."
- Las construcciones nuevas, los edificios rehabilitados y los condominios no califican para el programa.








COMO APLICAR

- 1. El propietario llama al 311 para presentar una solicitud de servicio de 'Agua en el sótano' o en línea a http://www.311.chicago. gov. Esta solicitud de servicio se envía al Departamento de Administración del Água (DWM)
- 2. Se envia un equipo de DWM para verificar que el aicantariliado principal en la calle está funcionando correctamente. Si el alcantarillado principal funciona correctamente, es posible que haya un problema con el drenaje del aicantarillado privado de la propiedad, y el equipo dejará un folleto del Programa de Drenaje del Alcantarillado Privado que explica los próximos pasos que debe seguir el propietario.
- 3. Si el problema está en el drenaje privado, el propietario debe contratar a un contratista de alcantarillado con licencia para que coloque varillas y haga inspección de cámara del alcantarillado privado con la presencia de un inspección de Cámara del alcantarillado privado con la presencia de un inspección de Departamento de Administración de Aqua. El contratista debe llamar al Departamento de Administración del Aqua al 312 747.4591 para programar una cita con un inspector de Drenaje de Casa.
- 4. Durante la cita, el contratista de alcantarillado y el inspector de DWM determinarán si hay una ruptura en el drenaje del alcantarillado privado y si la ruptura está en propiedad privada o en la vía pública. Si la rotura se encuentra en la propiedad privada, el propletario debe contratar y pagar a un contratista de alcantarillado con licencia para que repare el drenaje. del alcantarillado privado, incluyendo restauración completa. Si la interrupción es en la vía pública y se cumplen todas las directrices del programa. DWM programará y pagará la reparación de la línea.



PREGUNTAS FRECUENTES

¿Cuál es mi responsabilidad como propietario?
Todo el mantenimiento general, incluida la limpieza, el uso de varilles de líneas y la inspección de cámara de toda la linea de drenaje de alcantarillado privado, sigue siendo responsabilidad del propietario. La Ciudad solo reparerá las roturas encontradas en la vía pública que se ajusten a los criterios del programa. Las roturas en propiedad privada son responsabilidad del propietario. (Vea el diagrama arriba.)

Soy dueño de un edificio de unidades múltiples. ¿Todavia califico para el programa?

Las propiedades residenciales sin espacio comercial de hasta cuatro unidades pueden calificar para el programa. Las nuevas construcciones, los edificios rehabilitados y las propiedades comerciales / propiedades de uso mixto no califican para el programa

Si la cludad hará la reparación, ¿por qué necesito llamar a un contratista? El drenaje de alcantarillado privado es propiedad del propietario, no de la Ciudad. El contratista de alcantarillado con licencia determinará si el drenaje del alcantarillado privado necesita un simple varillaje o si hay una ruptura en el drenaje privado. Para calificar para el programa, un inspector de drenajes domésticos del Departamento de Administración del Agua (DWM) debe estar presente en el momento del varillaje y la inspección de cámara para confirmar la ubicación de la ruptura. El propietario o contratista puede llamar al 312.747.4591 para programar un inspector.

¿Dónde puede encontrar contratistas de alcantarillado de buena reputación?

Puede buscar en línea, pero asegúrese de identificar a los contratistas de alcantarillado con licencia. DWM recomienda que reciba al menos tres presupuestos. Una vez que haya seleccionado un contratista, llame al 312.744.3155 para verificar su licencia. ¿Me cobrarán por esta programa?

El propietario NO tendrá que pagar las reparaciones de DWM realizadas en la vía pública. Los contratistas privados facturarán al propietario por sus servicios en propiedad privada.

Leaks and Breaks FREE Lead Service Line Replacement

Summary

This Lead Service Line Replacement (LSLR) initiative offers to replace leaking or broken water service lines to impacted properties for FREE. Under Illinois State Law effective January 1, 2023, if your water service line is made of lead, galvanized iron, or steel, the service line must be completely replaced following a leak or a break. Thus, after a leak or break has been identified on a water service line, the City will replace the full water service line all the way into the property. Barring circumstances outside of the City's control, this replacement must be completed within 30 days of the leak or break.

What You Need to Do

If you receive this flyer following a repair to your lead water service line, contact the City to schedule the full replacement. **This construction work is FREE for you.**

REEMPLAZO **GRATIS** DE LA LÍNEA DE SERVICIO DE PLOMO DE FUGAS Y ROTURAS

Resumen

Esta iniciativa de reemplazo de línea de servicio de plomo (LSLR) ofrece reemplazar las líneas de servicio de agua con fugas o rotas a propiedades impactadas GRATIS. Bajo la Ley del Estado de Illinois a partir del 1 de enero de 2023, si su línea de servicio de agua está hecha de plomo, hierro galvanizado o acero, la línea de servicio debe reemplazarse completamente después de una fuga o rotura. Por lo tanto, después de que se haya identificado una fuga o rotura en una línea de servicio de agua, la Ciudad reemplazará la línea de servicio de agua completa hasta la propiedad. Salvo una circunstancia atenuante fuera del control de la Ciudad, este reemplazo debe completarse dentro de los 30 días posteriores a la fuga o rotura.





Department Water Management Water Service Line Directory






LOOK UP YOUR SERVICE LINE

Check out DWM's new citywide water service line inventory website.

The service line is the pipe that carries water from the water main in the street to the property.





Once at the website, input the address to search and the results for the service line material will populate. Results will show either: Not Lead, Lead, Galvanized Requiring Replacement or Suspected Lead.

You should know:

- The Department of Water Management (DWM) has made all reasonable efforts to ensure that the
 information on Water Service Line Inventory website is accurate according to the information available
 to us, but accuracy is not in any way guaranteed.
- Having a lead service line does not automatically mean you have elevated levels of lead in the water.
 DWM adds corrosion control to the water to help prevent lead from leaching into the water. Each house will have different test results based on factors such as water usage (which refreshes the corrosion control coating in your pipes), interior plumbing, and previous periods of vacancy. To check the levels of lead in your water, call 311 for free water testing.
- In Chicago, lead paint is by far the biggest source of lead poisoning in children. It is a good idea to check
 your house for lead paint while also checking to see if you have a lead service line.

La línea de servicio es la tubería que lleva agua desde la tubería principal de agua en la calle a la propiedad.

Una vez en el sitio web, ingrese la dirección para buscar y los resultados para el material de la línea de servicio aparecerán. Los resultados mostrarán: No plomo, plomo, galvanizado que requiere reemplazo o sospecha de plomo.

Usted debe saber:

- El Departamento de Administración de Agua (DWM) ha hecho todos los esfuerzos razonables para garantizar que la información en el sitío web del inventario de líneas de servicio sea precisa de acuerdo con la información disponible para nosotros, pero la precisión no está garantizada de ninguna manera.
- Tener una línea de servicio de plomo no significa automáticamente que tiene niveles elevados de plomo
 en el agua. DWM añade control de corrosión al agua para ayudar a prevenir que el plomo se filtre al agua.
 Cada casa tendrá resultados de prueba diferentes basados en factores tales como el uso de agua (que
 revigoriza el revestimiento de control de corrosión en sus tuberías), plomería interior, y períodos
 anteriores de vacantes. Para verificar los niveles de plomo en el agua, llame al 311 para pruebas de agua
 gratuitas.
- En Chicago, la pintura con plomo es, con mucho, la mayor fuente de envenenamiento por plomo en los niños. Es una buena idea comprobar su casa para la pintura del plomo mientras que también comprueba si usted tiene una línea de servicio del plomo.

Department Water Management FREE Water Lead Test Kits





Water Testing

You can get your home's drinking water tested for free.

- The Department of Water Management (DWM) developed and began distributing inhome lead test kits in 2016.
- The free, at-home, lead test kit includes bottles to collect water samples, instructions on how to collect the samples and how to label the sample bottles.
- DWM has mailed more than 90,000 kits to Chicagoans since 2016. The certified laboratory testing results are available online for the public to review at chicagowaterquality.org.
- You can request a free lead test kit via 311 or by registering online at www.chicagowaterquality.org.
- You can also request in-person testing by a DWM Representative who will use the inhome kit for testing.

Water Quality and Consumer Confidence are top priorities at DWM.

There is no lead in the water when it leaves the water treatment plant. When lead is found in drinking water it is due to water dissolving the lead in pipes and plumbing.



- El Departamento de Administación del Agua (DWM) desarrolló y comenzó a distribuir kits de prueba de plomo para el hogar en 2016.
- El kit de prueba de plomo incluye botellas para recolectar muestras de agua, instrucciones sobre cómo recolectar las muestras y cómo etiquetar las botellas de muestra.
- DWM ha enviado más de 90,000 kits a los habitantes de Chicago desde 2016. Los resultados de las pruebas de laboratorio certificadas están disponibles en el internet para que el público los revise en chicagowaterquality.org.
- Usted puede solicitar un kit de prueba de plomo gratis llamando al 311 o registrándose en el internet en www.chicagowaterquality.org.
- También puede solicitar una prueba en persona por parte de un representante de DWM que utilizará el kit en su hogar para la prueba.

Illinois Emergency Homeowner Assistance Fund (ILHAF) program

The Illinois Emergency Homeowner Assistance Fund (ILHAF) program is now accepting applications for assistance!

The Illinois Emergency Homeowner Assistance Fund (ILHAF) provides up to \$60,000 in mortgage assistance to eligible homeowners — paid directly to the servicer, taxing body or other approved entity. If you need immediate assistance with housing expenses due to a pending foreclosure, or assistance completing an application, please contact a <u>legal aid organization</u> or a HUD-approved housing counseling agency (see <u>map</u> below) right away.

What is the difference between residential and nonresidential/commercial evictions?

Residential evictions involve personal living spaces where the tenant resides. Nonresidential, or commercial, evictions involve businesses leasing or renting space in a property, such has a grocery store, cleaners, etc.

What is needed to fil for an eviction?

The plaintiff would need to complete a Civil Action Cover Sheet, Complaint, Summons, Notice of Eviction Resolution Program, Plaintiff Certifict ion of Compliance, Tenant Declaration Form and a copy of the Eviction Notice.

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MOPD HomeMod Program

The HomeMod Program provides accessibility modifications for Chicago residents with disabilities, with low income. Renters and homeowners may apply. Landlord permission is required for renters. Modifications may include ramps, porch and stairlifts, roll-in showers, widened doorways, accessible sinks, and cabinets. HomeMod works with licensed, insured, and experienced home remodeling companies. All services will be performed in accordance with federal, state, and municipal accessibility legal requirements. Qualifying individuals may re-apply for additional modifications after waiting one year from service.

What kind of **modifications** can be made?

A licensed contractor, along with MOPD staff, will conduct in-home assessments of the client's home environment to determine what accessibility features will enhance the person's independence and safety.

Typical alterations include kitchen and bathroom modifications and the addition of interior and exterior lifts and ramps. Specific modifications can include the installation of grab bars, lowering cabinets and countertops and widening doorways. Subsequent work may include, but is not limited to: plumbing, electrical, carpentry, masonry, dry wailing, tiling and painting. All services will be performed in accordance with federal, state and municipal accessibility legal requirements.

Modifications are based on available funding. Site inspections are performed by licensed, insured and experienced home remodeling companies.

What are the eligibility requirements?

- Chicago residents with disabilities under 60 years of age
- Must be head of household, spouse or legal dependent of the head of household
- Households with incomes below 80% of the area median income may qualify
- Both homeowners and renters may qualify for this program.
- Payment of any outstanding property taxes.
- · If applicable, child support compliance.

Prior to beginning modifications, MOPD will perform on-site inspections for environmental issues and lead-based paint. In addition, MOPD will verify that there are no existing Building Code violation(s) for the residence undergoing modifications.

What are the benefits of participating in the **HomeMod Program**?

- Allows people with disabilities to achieve their maximum level of independence.
- Provides a safe and suitable living environment for people with disabilities and their families.
- Enhances the independence of people with disabilities. An accessible living environment provides people with disabilities a greater opportunity to fully participate in all aspects of life, such as employment, recreation and education.
- Increases the housing stock for people with disabilities—making apartments and single family homes accessible ensures that people with disabilities have appropriate and safe housing.

When to Apply

The application period for the **HomeMod Program** is open year around.





Community Safety Coordination Center Emergency Supplemental Victims' Fund

The City of Chicago's Emergency Supplemental Victims' Fund (ESVF) pilot provides financial assistance in set amounts to survivors and their families to alleviate the immediate financial impacts of shooting incidents. Launched in December 2022, the program eases the financial burden and trauma inflicted on those who experience loss from gun violence.

Financial assistance through the City's Emergency Supplemental Victims' Fund is available until funds are depleted to:

- City of Chicago residents* who have experienced gunshot injuries in West Garfield Park, East Garfield Park, Englewood, West Englewood, or New City, on or after January 1, 2023, provided they are not detained by law enforcement.
- City of Chicago families who lost a loved one to gun violence on or after January 1, 2023, in any of the designated neighborhoods.

^{*}The program is open to anyone who lives in Chicago, regardless of immigration status.







AVAILABLE NOW:

Victims and families of victims who have experienced penetrating gunshot injuries in 5 community areas can receive funding through the City's Emergency Supplemental Victims Fund pilot program.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW: A pilot program from the City of Chicago's Community Safety Coordination Center and Chicago Department of Public Health provides financial assistance in set amounts to survivors and their families to alleviate the immediate financial impacts of shooting incidents.

AVAILABLE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE:

- Funeral Expenses (\$1,500 if applicable)
- Relocation Expenses (\$1,000 for temporary or permanent relocation)

ELIGIBILITY:

- Incident occurred in West Garfield Park, East Garfield Park, Englewood, West Englewood, or New City.
- Proof of City of Chicago address

IL ABLE Financial Program for People with Disabilities

FAQS

The Account Owner is on public benefits. Will they lose them if they have an IL ABLE Account?

No. The Account Owner will not lose, or lose eligibility for, federal benefits including SSI, SSI), Medicalid and HUD. SSI beneficiaries can save up to \$100,000 in their IL ABLE Account and still receive monthly SSI benefits. SSI benefits are not affected by the amount in the IL ABLE Account.



- Does the Account Owner have to live in Illinois to open an IL ABLE Account? No. Any Eligible Individual Uring In any state or U.S. territory can own an IL ABLE Account. However, check your state's ABLE plan first. Only one ABLE account can be owned per Eligible Individual nationwide.
- If an Account Owner is working and earning income can they contribute above the Annual Contribution Limit?

 LABLE Account Owners who earn income may be eligible to make additional contributions exceeding the Annual \$17,000 Contribution limit. Certain conditions apply. Visit illinoisable.com for more information.
- What is Medicaid recovery? Federal law gives state Medicaid agencies authority to recover certain benefits from a Medicaid beneficiary's estate. Check with a benefits specialist about an Account Owner's specific circumstances
- Can the Account Owner have a Special Needs Trust and an IL ABLE Account?
 Yes. An Account Owner can have an IL ABLE Account and be the beneficiary of a special needs trust. Circumstances and requirements vary. Consult a tax or legal professional for more information.
- Does the IL ABLE Account have to be opened before the eligible person's 26th birthday?

 No. An IL ABLE Account can be opened at any age, as long as the onset of the disability occurred prior to the eligible adminute. 28th kirthday. individual's 26th birthday.

Adult Protective Services (APS)

Case Advocacy & Support (CAS)

Intensive Case Advocacy Services (ICAS) Caregiver Respite provides a break from caring for loved ones. A variety of options include in home care - home care aides, hiring of a personal friend or family, and residential care in a facility. Support is available for up to two weeks annually.

People who care for their aging family or loved ones (caregivers) can receive supportive services such as one-on-one or family counseling, support groups, food boxes, information and referrals, help purchase of goods or services, and education opportunities. A range of ages qualify – please call for information.

The Savvy Caregiver™ Training Program is a 12-hour education program for family caregivers taking care of those with Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders. Each free weekly session is 2-hours over six weeks. A Caregiver Manual is provided. Training opportunities are available throughout the year.

Short-Term Chore service provides assistance with light housekeeping, laundry, shopping or other household support due to a life change, illness, disability, or temporary situation. Heavy-Duty Chore is an intensive cleaning for those whose living conditions pose a threat to their health and safety. Services include trash removal, moving heavy furniture, help with clutter, packing and more.

Grandparents or older relatives aged 55+ who have primary responsibility for a child under 18 or loved one with severe disabilities aged 19-59 are eligible for services including one-on-one or family counseling, support groups, information and referrals, education opportunities, and help purchasing goods or services such as clothes, school supplies, toys, and more.

Elder Rights, Legal Services, Protection, & Advocacy

Certified APS workers respond to reports of alleged abuse of Chicagoans aged 60+ and those with disabilities aged 18-59. Concerns including physical, emotional, and sexual abuse, self-neglect, neglect, confinement, and / or financial exploitation. APS stops the abuse and develops a plan for safety, well-being, and prevention.

CAS provides a Well-Being Check to Chicagoans aged 55+ living in the community who may be experiencing challenges living independently or are at-risk to themselves or others. The Team meets with the older adult, assesses their situation, then provides helpful referrals to services and links to community supports.

ICAS provides ongoing support to Chicagoans aged 55+ who are experiencing challenges living independently in the community by helping clients to access supports that prolong the ability to remain living at home. ICAS can also help those who are moving, experiencing transitions, health challenges, and more.





Legal Services

Legal Services protects the rights of older Chicagoans on matters such as: housing, guardianship, Powers of Attorney for health care and property, bankruptcy, fraud, employment, family law, financial and foreclosure counseling, reverse mortgages, and Advance Directives.

Ombudsman Program Ombudsmen protect, defend and advocate for residents in long-term care facilities such as nursing homes, assisted living, and more.

Ombudsmen protect resident rights, resolve complaints, provide information, and ensure quality care for Chicago's long-term care residents over aged 19.

Senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP) SHIP helps Medicare beneficiaries access Medicare, drug plans, and more. SHIP Counselors host educational programs and one-on-one counseling to help older adults and people with disabilities by providing objective information about health insurance to those who have questions about Medicare.

Senior Medicare Patrol

The Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) Program educates consumers about Medicare & Medicaid fraud, waste, and abuse. Program staff and volunteers help Chicagoans to prevent, detect, and report Medicare and Medicaid abuse.

Home Delivered Meals

Nutritious meals in a group setting are provided each weekday to nearly 50 community locations throughout Chicago. These meals promote better health through improved nutrition and reduced social isolation. Culturally specific meals are available.





QUALIFICATIONS:

Age Requirements:

- · 65 years of age or older before January 1 of the current year; or
- You must become 65 years of age this year; or
- You must be 16 years of age or older before January 1 of the current year and qualify as disabled.

Residency Requirements:

· You must live in Illinois at the time you file your application.

Income Requirements:

Income limits are new for January 1, 2020 for License Plate discount and Ride Free Transit Card.

*Total income last year must be:

NOTE: *You must include your spouse's income if married and living together on December 31 of last year. If your spouse died last year, you would file as single and claim only your income.

Disability Requirements:

To qualify as disabled, you must be at least 16 years of age prior to January 1 of the current year and be determined totally and permanently disabled (as defined by program requirements) prior to January 1 of the current year.

Must be assessed for eligibility.

- *Short-Term: Temporary home care assistance with cleaning, laundry, and / or self-care tasks like bathing, dressing, or grooming after an illness or hospital stay
- *Heavy-Duty: A one-time deep cleaning, removing trash or clutter or packing items for a move
