THE AGRO-ECO DISTRICT VISION

Agroecology as defined by the FAO

(Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations):

The scientific core of agroecology is based on applying ecological concepts and principles to optimize interactions between plants, trees. animals. humans and the environment.

In addition, agroecology places social issues at the center of solutions for a sustainable and fair food system. As a set of practices, agroecology provides multiple benefits to society and the environment, by restoring ecosystem services and biodiversity.

OVERALL:

- Implement design principles that celebrate black culture, black urbanity, and black people.
- Maximize sites for urban agriculture.
- Maximize spaces for Fun and Rest in Nature.
- Center, expand, and improve Parks as the catalyst to address the social disconnections. (Moran, Hermitage and Lindbloom) – i.e. connecting hub parks – Sherman and Ogden via better mobility solutions
- Maximize sites to attract and foster businesses to locate across the 59th street corridor.
- New industries to provide work and career paths.
- Prioritize design interventions that simultaneously deliver social and environmental justice.
- Look at the design guidelines for black spaces.

Black joy is a radical act. Give due space to joy, laughter, humor, and gratitude.









Make visible and strengthen Black cultures and spaces to honor their sacredness and prevent their erasure. Amplify and support Black assets of all forms-from leaders, institutions, and businesses to arts, culture, and histories.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES



1. COMMUNITY FIRST

Honor, reflect and build from the rich history of Black culture and the current Black residents of Englewood and West Englewood. Ensure accountability and community sustainability.

2. STRENGTH

Preserve and enhance the resiliency of the natural habitat of the trail, adjacent areas and that of the residents.



3. HEALTH AND SECURITY

Create an Agro-Eco district and trail that integrates ecological agriculture with public space to improve the social determinants of health of the residents of Englewood and West Englewood by providing a safe place to work, heal, play, celebrate and grow food.

4. STABILIZE

Position the land surrounding the trail to provide a sustainable future and economic security for the current residents of Greater Englewood by providing opportunities to create generational wealth via community investment and by stabilizing housing.

5. PATHWAYS FOR WORKAND WEALTH

Provide economic, educational and career opportunities for residents through the planning, design, remediation, construction and management of the public land and through the Englewood Agro-Eco Trail and District.




FIVE MAJOR NODES


