## **Preparedness for Pets**

- 56% of US households own at least one pet
- Approx. 1.5 pets per household
- Animals in US households:
  - 70 million dogs (36.5% of households)
  - 74.1 million cats (30.4% of households)
  - 8.3 million birds (3.1% of households)
  - 4.9 million horses (1.5% of households)

- Sort by likelihood of occurrence








- Identify hazards
- What are the possible results of a hazard?
  - Do the hazards have things in common?



## Risk Analysis

HAZARD	EFFECTS
Tornado	Damage to buildings Power outage- loss of heating, cooling, lights, refrigeration Heavy Rain - flooding
Flood	Damage to buildings Power outage- loss of heating, cooling, lights, refrigeration Damage to roads
Wildfire	Damage to buildings Power outage
Earthquake	Damage to buildings Damage to roads Power outage- loss of heating, cooling, lights, refrigeration










- How will you know if there's an emergency?
  - Local emergency notification
    - Evacuation notices
    - Sheltering locations (people and pets)
  - NOAA weather radio
  - Wireless Emergency Alerts







- Create a family communication plan
  - Contact information
  - Designate a contact person outside of area
  - Phone service may be disrupted
    - Text messages
- Designate a family meeting site
- Plan for pets at home if you are away





- Include all animals
  - companion animals
  - livestock







### **Small Animal Evacuation Kit**

- Identification
- Proof of ownership
- Medications
- Medical information
- Vaccination information
- Food (2 weeks)
- Water (2 weeks)
- Collar and leash
- Crate/pet carrier

- Litter box, litter, scoop
- Muzzle
- Water and food dishes
- Spoon
- Manual can opener
- Animal first aid kit
- Blanket/toys



## **Livestock Evacuation Kit**

- Feed and water (7-10 days)
- Cotton halter
- Veterinary records
- Proof of ownership
- Duct tape
- Emergency contact list
- Heavy gloves (leather)

- Instructions (feeding and care)
- Knife
- Medications
- Water bucket
- Rope or lariat
- Plastic trash cans and lids





#### **Small Animal**

- Collar tag (tape on inside of collar)
- Microchip (updated)
- Tattoo
- Written on cage/housing
- Ownership documents

### **Large Animal Examples**

- Microchip
- Tattoo
- Halter tag
- Luggage tag braided into mane or tail
- Livestock marker



## Contact Information

- Addresses and 24 hour contact numbers
- Your contact information
- Alternate local contact
- Veterinarian
- Alternate veterinarian
- Local emergency agency numbers
- Other contacts?



## **Animal Care Information**

- Vaccination information
  - Rabies
  - Other vaccinations
- Medical information
  - Allergies
  - Medications
  - Behavioral issues
  - Medical records

- Instructions
  - Diet: food, quantity, allergies
  - Medications: drug name,
     dosage, frequency,
     contact for refills





- Evacuation site outside immediate area
- Leash, collar and/or harness for each pet
- Pet carrier for each animal (bowls for water and food and litter box)
  - appropriate size
  - get them used to the carrier





### Large Animal

- Trailers
- Practice loading and unloading trailer
- Prearrange evacuation site



# Basic Pet First Aid Kit

- Vet's name and phone number
- Bandage material
- Muzzle
- Eye dropper
- Blanket
- Nylon/latex gloves
- Thermometer
- Tweezers



## Practice, Practice, Practice

- Practice the plan
- Keep your kit up to date
  - Fresh supplies, medications, update prescriptions




