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



# Telecommunicator Defined

**Consent Decree** ¶789: "Telecommunicator means the Police Communications Supervisors, Call-takers, and Dispatchers employed by the OEMC."

**Police Supervisors:** Oversee daily operations and ensure that telecommunicators are adhering to

established policy and procedure

**Police Call-takers:** Directly interface with members of the public who dial 9-1-1

- Gather and record pertinent information

- Forward events to dispatchers

**Police Dispatchers:** Deploy appropriate public safety response resources, communicating with CPD

field units via radio transmissions

- CPD (dispatched by priority set by CPD)

- CFD (dispatched by parameters set by CFD)

- EMS (dispatched by parameters set by CFD)



# CIT Training for All Active PCO1s and PCO2s

Consent Decree Paragraphs 143 and 144 ¶143 The OEMC Training will be at least an eight-hour course taught jointly by qualified OEMC staff and a mental health clinician or advocate.

¶ 144 The OEMC Training will cover, at a minimum, the following topics: identification of individuals in crisis; telephonic suicide prevention strategies; crisis and stress management, de-escalation, and scenario-based exercises; interactions with individuals with mental illness; information that should be gathered and shared with the responding officer or Certified CIT Officer when the call-taker suspects that the call involves an individual in crisis; the types of calls that may require the dispatching of a Certified CIT Officer or a coordinated crisis response of first responders reflective of established policy for intake and dispatch; and the procedures for dispatching a Certified CIT Officer.



# CIT Training for All Active Telecommunicators

Consent Decree Paragraphs 143 and 144

- OEMC provides its comprehensive 8-hour CIT course to all new telecommunicators. This course includes direct contributions from CPD, NAMI experts, and lived experience experts.
- OEMC offers regular CIT policy review by Watch Managers and Supervisors at roll calls quarterly.

• OEMC has established a Quality Assurance Program, which focuses on reviewing mental health events and addressing any discrepancies with employees.



# OEMC CIT Refresher Training

Consent Decree Paragraph 146

### CIT Refresher Training

¶146: All telecommunicators will receive at least an annual refresher training on mental health and CIT awareness that is adequate to refresh the telecommunicators' skills on identifying, dispatching, and appropriately responding to calls for service that involve individuals in crisis.

- O In-person 2hr refresher training.
- O Currently, 98.7% of active Police telecommunicators have received the mandatory 2024 CIT refresher training
- 2024 CIT refresher training will be completed by mid-Nov.

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# CARE Transition from Pilot – Relaunch

- As of September 27, 2024, all CARE teams have been staffed by a CDPH Crisis Clinician and a CDPH EMT
- CARE has been approved for 7 teams to be launched before the end of the year
  - 6 District teams
  - 1 Citywide/Special team

- CARE Teams have been preparing for a full relaunch before Thanksgiving
  - Area familiarization within existing and two new districts TBA
  - Trainings for new and existing staff
  - Proactive outreach within encampments
  - Create and distribute updated resources








# Mental Health Expansion Timeline





# **Highlight |** MH Clinic Staffing Updates

#### Staffing Levels:



 Total budgeted FTE includes 31 additional positions added for the 2024 budget, totaling 107 budgeted FTE (without 2024 adds, 76 total budgeted FTE)



#### Fall Highlights:

- 4 of our new Public Health Nurses have onboarded and are scheduled to support two clinics each throughout the week
- Onboarded 4 new Behavioral Health Assistants
- Onboarded 2 new Administrative Assistants
- Finalized the Health Resource Navigator job specs

Future hiring progress and will depend on 2025 budget decisions

# 2024 Summer Opioid Response EXECUTIVE SUMMARY




In Chicago, fatalities due to opioid-related overdoses have risen by over 1.5-fold since pre-pandemic levels, from 855 in 2019 to a high of 1441 in 2021. For Chicagoans, the number of opioid-related fatalities exceed those due to traffic accidents and homicides combined. Overdoses related to opioids are also one of the top drivers of the racial life-expectancy gap, contributing on average a 1.5-year shorter life expectancy for Black Chicagoans compared to white Chicagoans in 2022. The number of opioid-related fatalities have been on a trajectory of modest decline starting in 2022. To ensure that Chicago meets the Healthy Chicago 2025 goal of closing the racial life expectancy gap, the Chicago Department of Public Health (CDPH) has adopted a hyper-local place-based approach through the Summer Opioid Response Incident Command System (SOR-ICS). Launched from June 1, 2024 to August 31, 2024, the SOR-ICS had the mission of ensuring a sustained decline in opioid-related overdoses during the summer, when overdoses tend to seasonally increase. While citywide in reach, the SOR-ICS had a geographic focus on five West-Side communities, where over one-third of opioid-related EMS responses in Chicago occurred in 2023: Austin, East Garfield Park, Humboldt Park, North Lawndale, and West Garfield Park. The SOR-ICS consisted of five main components.




# Seasonal Trends and Peaks (April-August)

# Suspected opioid-related overdose EMS responses by day, May 11-8/25






# **Most Impacted Communities**

**Every community area** in Chicago had an opioid-related overdose EMS response (fatal or non-fatal) in **2021**, **2022**, and **2023** 

However, **West Side community areas** are the most impacted

In 2023, **34**% of opioid-related overdose EMS responses occurred in **5 West Side Community Areas:** Austin, East Garfield Park, Humboldt Park, North Lawndale, & West Garfield Park





# **X** Operation SOS

- Door knocking campaign in five most impacted community areas to meet people where they are
- Distributed outreach kits with Narcan and other harm reduction supplies
- From July 20 (kick-off) to Aug 27, Operation SOS reached nearly 1000 individuals and distributed over 800 leave-behind kits
- Outreach efforts are ongoing and currently include street-outreach with treatment organizations

There are more opioid-related overdose deaths in Chicago than traffic crash deaths and homicides combined. Overdoses tend to increase in the summer, with around a third occurring in 5 West Side neighborhoods: Austin, East/West Garfield Park, Humboldt Park, and North Lawndale.

This summer, we're going door-to-door to give out Narcan and information on overdose prevention and accessing treatment.


# Harm Reduction Supply Distribution

SOR-ICS enabled expansion of distribution footprint to include DCASE-sponsored events


Over a 75-day period from 5/13/2024 to 8/23/2024, CDPH and distributed 10,327 Narcan kits and 42,574 fentanyl and xylazine test strips to partner organizations.






# Opioid-related EMS responses citywide, 2022 & 2023 & 2024

# **Mental Health Clinics Current Offerings**

#### What Behavioral Health services do we offer?


Outpatient mental health services intake/assessment, individual therapy, group therapy, case management, and medication management.

#### Who do we serve?

Clinics serve Chicago residents ages 6 through the lifespan appropriate for Outpatient level of care.

#### What is our reach?

Currently, we serve approximately 300 people at any given time per clinic location but with our expanded offerings we expect to increase capacity of people served

# Highlight | Same-Day Medication Expanded Offering

Starting 9/1, we will implement a new workflow change to offer **Same Day Medication** appointments.

#### Benefits:

- Prescribing medication without the requirement of therapy can offer a viable treatment option for individuals unable to engage in regular sessions.
- Additionally, medication may be necessary to address serious conditions, provide immediate relief during crises, or improve a person's readiness to participate in therapy by alleviating acute symptoms.

**Service Impact:** we expect to increase capacity of people served as well as the following:

- Strengthen relationship with CARE clients: CARE Clients often face distress or instability due to lack of medication or missed doses. Same-day medication appointments can promote more sustainable treatment and access to complementary healthcare resources
- Strengthen partnership with MHEI network:
  Facilitate more referral opportunities, particularly for providers without or limited psychiatric capacity
- Fill service gaps across the City: Address the gap in psychiatric capacity by offering same-day appointments for clients in urgent need of medication



# **Expand Mental Health Services**

#### Planning Phase:

In order to ensure a community-driven approach, the team produced several analyses to understand needs



Conducted suitability analyses to understand service demand gaps and accessibility problems across priority community areas



As part of the <u>People's Vision for</u> <u>Mental and Behavioral Health</u>, the Mayor's Office and CDPH



announced 3 new service expansions for 2024: (1) Pilsen (2) Roseland (3) Legler CPL

#### Implementation Phase (June-Present):

Opening new service areas requires significant collaboration across several departments and operations

**Hiring**: Ramped up hiring processes, reducing time to post and filling 34 related clinic vacancies, representing ~55% of total vacancies from the beginning of the year

**Updated Titles:** Created/ing new titles such as Public Health Nurse II to expand primary care screening and linkage to community services

Physical Space Design Scheme: Developed a trauma informed interior design scheme to ensure welcoming space for clients

**Expanded mental health services programming:** Expanded evening hours and same-day medication appointments to improve access

**Expanded supplementary programming**: Healing Arts Chicago embeds 10 artists (certified as Community Health Workers) across our clinic sites to offer free arts programming on a daily basis

**Health Hub rebranding:** Partnering with Health Hub team to integrate CDPH services and strengthen the provider referral network
