





Overview – Week of November

13th

New Arrivals Numbers as of November 14, 2023, in the last 24 hours.

- •There are **12,242** residents in **25** active shelters.
- •Total awaiting placement: 1,846
- •1,444 waiting in CPD districts, 402 at O'Hare, and 0 at Midway.
- •Chicago has received over **21,200** new arrivals since the mission began.
- •495 Buses have arrived in Chicago Since, August 31, 2022
- •394 Buses have arrived in Chicago since Jan 1, 2023
- •385 Buses have arrived in Chicago since May 12, 2023
- •1 Bus arrived yesterday, November 13, 2023
- •2+ Buses arrived today, November 14, 2023

•NOTE: The census numbers are updated daily and can fluctuate due to resettlement, finding housing independently, onward movement, among other factors. Additionally, the bus numbers are fluid and can change.

From November 1 – 15, we placed 1,650 individuals in shelter.

We are **currently averaging 350 individuals exiting our system** due to outmigration and resettlement efforts

Total number of beds by next Tuesday around **650**.






Overview – Week of November

13th



For the week ending **October 21, 2023**, according to the weekly DHS report, **1,519** noncitizens provided an intended destination of the Chicagoland area, down from **2,063** last week.



For the week ending **November 4, 2023**, according to the weekly DHS report, **1,704** noncitizens provided an intended destination of the Chicagoland area.



Resettlement-Week of November

13th

- Catholic Charities monthly resettlement :
 - September: 350 households (approx. 763 individuals)
 - October: 500 households (approx. 1,090 individuals)
- Per Catholic Charities, the average time from their initial client contact to moving into longterm housing is 2-3 months

- OEMC Citywide Winter Weather Workshop held on 11/14

TPS Workshops

- An estimated 11,000 migrants in Chicago are eligible for work permits.
- In a partnership between city, state, and federal governments, a pilot project offering immigrant asylum-seekers the ability to apply for work permits begins in Chicago.
- On 11/9, in collaboration with State, City, sister agencies, delegate agencies, and USCIS, 150 new arrivals submitted their applications for TPS or EAD
- Ongoing workshops from November through early 2024 to capture people that are eligible for TPS and EADs
- Coming up: Call to Action for volunteers

Donation Efforts



New Life Centers is working directly with the City of Chicago and Illinois Department of Human Services to move an estimated 500 families per week from shelters into permanent housing a month. The need is only expected to grow. New Life Centers will continue the effort until shelters are decompressed.

Cradles to Crayons

Cradles to Crayons Chicago is partnering with New Life Centers to provide clothing, shoes, and basic essential items for new arrivals. Cradles to Crayons Chicago is the only large-scale organization addressing clothing insecurity: the lack of access to affordable, adequate, and appropriate clothing. The organization provides children from birth through age 12, living in homeless or low-income situations, with the essential items they need to thrive through their service partners. MUTUAL AID

Mutual Aid is a form of public and political participation for neighborhoods, organizations and groups of all sizes. They provide an avenue for looking after and tending to each other's health and well-being to create more livable, sustainable environments. The process and goal of mutual aid is to create accessible and collective care by accepting and sharing mutual responsibility within one's community space. Mutual aid networks across the city have mobilized to fill the gaps at our police stations.

• Community Care Collective 33

Community Care Collective is made up of engaged community members, grassroots organizations, faith-based organizations, and elected officials
working together to build a community based on mutual aid and collective care. They formed around supporting the needs of new arrivals staying

PSRT

 The Chicago Police Station Response Team is a network of volunteers meeting the needs of recently arrived asylum seekers sheltering in police stations. PSRT has organized to meet needs for food, bedding, and supplies as well as connecting new arrivals to medical services and showers.

Throughout the summer, MMHT's responsibilities have grown and their teams have been entrusted by the City of Chicago to address a few
emergent situations: They are the first and only medical team to have provided care to the hundreds of migrants currently living at O'Hare

Shelter Operations RFP

- The RFP closed on Friday, October 6th
- Update: Beginning phase 2 of the RFP evaluation with oral presentations for 19 proposals representing 7 agencies across 11 sites.
- Targeting award recommendations by November 13th



Federal Asks

Coordinated federal advocacy with County, State, Illinois Congressional delegation, and external partners to reduce the financial and operational burdens, and to secure increased funding that will cover comprehensive sheltering and resettlement work in Illinois. *Five core asks:*

- 1. Nationwide coordination of resettlement to receiving cities/States with a single federal leader,
- 2. Donated use of Federal land and buildings for sheltering throughout Illinois such as military bases and training facilities,
- 3. Flexible use of federal funding for sheltering operations and overall expenses.
- 4. Resources and technical assistance for expedited Temporary Protective Status (TPS) and employment authorization document (EAD) processing, and
- 5. Expansion of TPS and EAD for all non-citizens

Policy specific

- Waive fees for work authorization requests
- Improve backlog on asylum applications and workforce authorization request



Federal Asks

<u>President Biden's supplemental budget requests \$1.4 Billion</u> for state and local governments providing food, shelter, and other services to new arrivals.

**Our ask, along with Mayors from a border city/interior city coalition, is for the President to increase that funding to \$5 Billion.

We hope that all of you will work to ensure that local and state governments receive the most amount of funding possible, and advocate specifically for Chicago to be a primary recipient.



State Asks

- 1. Establish Shelter and resettlement hubs in at least two other municipalities directly supported and operated by the State
- 2. Increase Asylum Seeker Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ASERAP) to \$50M
- 3. Additional Support for Chicago Public Schools
 - Increased STLS services for all students
 - Additional resources and flexibility in licensing of Bilingual educators
 - Expedite existing capital projects and new construction for replacement purposes
- 4. Create sustainable funding stream for Chicago to cover costs from shelter to resettlement services.
