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POLICE BOARD  
PUBLIC MEETING  
June 19, 2014

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PRESENT:

1           PRESIDENT CARNEY: I think it's time to  
2 call the meeting to order. Call the Police  
3 Board and calling the meeting of June 19th,  
4 2014, to order. First item of business is  
5 approval of the minutes of the Board's public  
6 meeting of May 15th. Is there a motion?

7           MR. FOREMAN: So moved.

8           PRESIDENT CARNEY: All in favor.

9                           (CHORUS OF AYES.)

10          PRESIDENT CARNEY: Next meeting will be  
11 held here on Thursday, July 17th, at 7:30, here  
12 at the office of Public Safety, 35th and  
13 Michigan.

14                           At this time, I ask for a motion  
15 to close a series of executive sessions for the  
16 purpose of considering litigation and personnel  
17 matters, as authorized by the Open Meetings  
18 Act. All in favor?

19                           (CHORUS OF AYES.)

20          PRESIDENT CARNEY: A report of  
21 disciplinary action taken by the Board for the  
22 previous month has been made available at this  
23 evening's meeting. This report and the Board's  
24 findings and decisions are posted on our

1 website.

2 Now, we are required by The Open  
3 Meetings Act to take final action on  
4 disciplinary matters that were before us at our  
5 May 15th meeting, going into our meeting  
6 tonight, as well.

7 The Police Board, as authorized  
8 by The Open Meetings Act, has considered in a  
9 closed meeting several disciplinary cases. The  
10 Board will now take final action on these  
11 cases.

12 When we say final action, that  
13 means we bring it before the public, and we  
14 vote before you as a public as to the final  
15 action on our cases, so that's why we're doing  
16 this.

17 Regarding case number, 13 Police  
18 Board 2845, the Superintendent filed charges to  
19 discharge Police Officer Michaeline Maciejewski  
20 from the Chicago Police Department for  
21 submitting false official reports. The  
22 Superintendent subsequently moved to withdraw  
23 the charges because our Respondent resigned  
24 from the Chicago Police Department.

1                   Is there a motion to grant  
2 Superintendent's motion to withdraw the  
3 charges?

4           MR. FOREMAN:   So moved.

5           PRESIDENT CARNEY:   Second.

6           MR. CONLON:   Second.

7           PRESIDENT CARNEY:   All in favor?

8                               (CHORUS OF AYES.)

9           PRESIDENT CARNEY:   Please raise your  
10 hands.   Any opposed?   Motion passes by  
11 unanimous vote.

12                               Next case we have is regarding  
13 case number 14 PB, that means Police Board,  
14 2864.   The Superintendent filed charges to  
15 suspend Officer Venus Rodriguez for 45 days for  
16 failing to remain at the scene of her off-duty  
17 traffic crash.   The Superintendent subsequently  
18 moved to withdraw the charges because the  
19 officer allegedly filed a grievance prior to  
20 filing the charges.   By grievance, police  
21 officers have a right to grieve decisions under  
22 their Collective Bargaining Agreement.   So  
23 that's what happened here.   So it was removed  
24 from the Police Board and goes to a grievance

1 Board.

2 Is there a motion to grant the  
3 Superintendent's motion to withdraw?

4 MR. FOREMAN: So moved.

5 PRESIDENT CARNEY: All in favor?

6 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

7 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Any opposed? The  
8 motion passes by consensus.

9 The Board's orders in these two  
10 cases on which the Board took final action this  
11 evening will be entered as of today's date and  
12 issued to the parties. A copy of the written  
13 orders will be posted on our website within ten  
14 business days of tonight.

15 The Superintendent is  
16 requesting -- this is a request by the  
17 Superintendent to the Board. The  
18 Superintendent has requested the Board's  
19 permission under Rule 52 of the Department's  
20 rules and regulations to solicit donations to  
21 offset the cost of hosting the Major Cities  
22 Chief and International Association of Police  
23 Chiefs conferences here in Chicago in May 2015.  
24 Is there a motion to approve this request?

1 MR. FOREMAN: So moved.

2 MR. CONLON: Second.

3 PRESIDENT CARNEY: All in favor?

4 (CHORUS OF AYES.)

5 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Copies of orders issued  
6 by the Superintendent during the previous month  
7 are listed and available in the blue books on  
8 the table in the back.

9 The next item is the  
10 Superintendent's report to the Board. Is there  
11 a motion to waive the oral presentation and  
12 receive the report in writing?

13 MS. FRY: So moved.

14 MR. CONLON: Second.

15 PRESIDENT CARNEY: One question I would  
16 like to ask the Deputy Superintendent. How is  
17 the Superintendent doing?

18 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER:  
19 Mr. President, he is actually on the road to  
20 recovery. He actually stopped in this morning  
21 for a couple of hours. He went back home to  
22 get back in bed. He is on the slow road back  
23 to recovery.

24 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Guys like him have a

1 hard time getting sick. So hoping he takes it  
2 easy and watches his signs.

3 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: Yes, sir.

4 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Tell him the Board  
5 wishes him well and a speedy recovery.

6 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: Will do.

7 PRESIDENT CARNEY: I will now ask those  
8 members of the public who signed up to speak in  
9 advance, when your name is called, please step  
10 up to the microphone.

11 Tina James. Welcome.

12 MS. JAMES: Hi. I'm Tina James from New  
13 Light Community Church. We wanted to come and  
14 introduce ourselves to you this evening.

15 New Light Community Church is a  
16 church in the City of Chicago. We are one  
17 church with 20 locations across the City. We  
18 started with four members. We're now 4700 on  
19 weekly basis with an annual budget of 4.5  
20 million. We have very many concerns across the  
21 City as you can imagine. Most of our  
22 congregants are not feeling safe altogether,  
23 and we want to come today and say we're here,  
24 were we're in the City. We appreciate all the

1 hard work that all the officers are doing. We  
2 know there's a lot going on. We want to be  
3 more involved in whatever we can be. Some of  
4 our constituents just have an overall sense of  
5 not feeling safe where they live.

6 I personally live in Chicago  
7 Lawn, and there's a lot going on in my  
8 community. A lot of gun violence, a lot of  
9 concerns. Some of our businesses in particular  
10 have issues and concern. We have some on 63rd  
11 Street. One in particular, 2439 West 63rd, LMB  
12 Food Mart that we're having a lot of  
13 difficulties with. We would love to see some  
14 movement on. We're not sure what it is you  
15 would like for us to do moving forward. We've  
16 had conversations with the commander. We've  
17 had conversations with our local alderman.  
18 We've spoken with both of them.

19 Yeah, as a church community we  
20 are just here. We want to say we're in the  
21 City, we're concerned, we want to be partners  
22 with you. We want to move forward. We  
23 appreciate your hard work. What else would you  
24 like for us to do going forward to tackle these



1 kinds of issues?

2 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Mr. Deputy  
3 Superintendent, can you speak to someone after  
4 the meeting about the whole CAPS program?

5 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: Sure, I  
6 will see what -- get your contact information  
7 where you can contact the Eighth District CAPS  
8 office and I can give you a bit more  
9 information after the meeting.

10 MS. JAMES: Thank you very much.

11 PRESIDENT CARNEY: If you want to get  
12 involved.

13 MS. JAMES: We have been attending CAPS  
14 meetings. We know it's a new commander. We  
15 appreciate the opportunity to meet the new  
16 commander and find out what his desire is for  
17 our area. And I do appreciate that  
18 opportunity. We would love to have an  
19 opportunity as a church community to do more.  
20 So we just want to put that out there.

21 We will be back again if we feel  
22 the need. Thank you.

23 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Thank you.

24 Ms. Anna Czapkowska and John

1 Perryman. Everybody from the 11th District can  
2 step up. We have a new commander in the 11th  
3 District. Is it getting any better?

4 MS. CZAPKOWSKA: Not yet. I'm coming  
5 tonight regarding my situation what happened in  
6 February. So one of the people, she's under  
7 16, and I cannot get an order on her because  
8 she is too young. So the detective, he advised  
9 me to tell police when I see her and they will  
10 arrest her. So I do it. But on weekend I saw  
11 her on the street walking around and I called  
12 cops, they showed up. And they spoke with her  
13 family before. And later they wanted to talk  
14 to me, and they said that I am causing problem  
15 in neighborhood, and I'm acting like animal  
16 because I cannot talk to people in human being  
17 way. So they refuse to arrest her. And they  
18 said they're not going to arrest her anyway.  
19 So I made complaint, and --

20 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Why did you want her  
21 arrested? You wanted -- why did you want the  
22 lady arrested?

23 MS. CZAPKOWSKA: Because she pushed me down  
24 when I was with the baby. We both fell down.

1           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    So that was --

2           MS. CZAPKOWSKA:    Back in February.

3           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    With your husband with  
4           the police officer.

5           MS. CZAPKOWSKA:    Yes.  And from the street  
6           he said that 11th District, he is not --  
7           because I indicated -- and I have 50 people,  
8           even, besides me.  And even if it's hard to  
9           believe in this, he is not -- he gave me  
10          another reason why they're not going to arrest  
11          her.  He said even if they arrest them, they  
12          going to let the people -- going to get upset,  
13          going to do something for me, and that's the  
14          reason that the district is not helping me with  
15          this.

16                                So my question is:  Is it make  
17          final decision?  Is it right decision?  Or is  
18          any chance to review and pick up case again  
19          from someone else?

20          DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER:  I'll let  
21          you have the detective handling your case,  
22          Detective Callahan.

23          MS. CZAPKOWSKA:    He said there is a number,  
24          911, that they open seven days a week, 24

1 hours, 365 days per year, and they will help me  
2 to solve the problem.

3 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: I'll let  
4 you talk to the chief detectives tomorrow, see  
5 if we will drill down and find out what the  
6 hang-up is with this case.

7 MS. CZAPKOWSKA: Yes. But there is another  
8 situation. I've already made complaint against  
9 Officer Ray who was on the scene back in  
10 February. I feel like other officers, they  
11 don't want to cooperate with us and we  
12 cannot -- we do have -- because of this, like  
13 we made complaint against them.

14 So we notice that we do have  
15 walking patrol on street during the week, but  
16 there's no one helping with the worse situation  
17 coming our way, 100 people. So every Friday,  
18 Saturday and Sunday I have like 40, 60, 70  
19 people around my house drinking, selling drugs,  
20 and we just don't feel safe, you know. I am in  
21 the corner house. They can easily reach my  
22 windows. And now because they are so upset and  
23 police is so upset, it's not -- so my question  
24 also like is there a chance if you or some of

1     you made a call to 11th District and like point  
2     them, you can give us some support from  
3     like -- you give us one person that we can  
4     trust and they can take care of us, because  
5     there's some of us. I have two kids. They  
6     have three kids. I have four more people in my  
7     building, they have more ten more people. We  
8     have another Polish family on our block. And  
9     it just -- just doesn't work out.

10                     And we've been coming here for  
11     three years, three years. And, you know, if  
12     you ask for help, it's -- it's not sign of  
13     weakness. We are so strong. We're ready to  
14     cooperate, but it just doesn't work. And  
15     believe me, you have no idea why not.

16             PRESIDENT CARNEY:     You show tenacity.  
17     Keep on coming.

18             MS. CZAPKOWSKA:     Every time we be here, you  
19     say keep coming, keep coming. It just doesn't  
20     work. So my question is why not.

21                     And last meeting, he said it's  
22     different culture. I'm from different culture.  
23     My culture is completely different. And I  
24     like --

1           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    Have you had a chance  
2           to meet with the new commander?

3           UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:  I've asked them to  
4           meet and he sidesteps.

5           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    I thought at the last  
6           meeting the Superintendent had indicated that  
7           he was going to have this community here meet  
8           with the new commander.  That was one of the  
9           reasons he took them out of Woodlawn and put  
10          them in the 11th District.

11          DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER:  I'll see  
12          if I can facilitate.

13          PRESIDENT CARNEY:    Probably sooner than  
14          later.  I think these people need to speak with  
15          him because they were promised a meeting.  I  
16          remember the meeting and it was packed with the  
17          folks from Woodlawn.

18          DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER:  It will  
19          happen before the next Police Board meeting.

20          PRESIDENT CARNEY:    Who can they follow up  
21          with?  When they come back, I would like to say  
22          they met -- even if no new results, at least  
23          they met with the new commander.

24          DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER:  They can

1 follow up with me. I will ensure that he does  
2 meet with them before the next Police Board  
3 meeting. I'll take their numbers after the  
4 meeting, and I'll have someone reach out to  
5 them to make sure this meeting takes place.

6 PRESIDENT CARNEY: I want to assure you  
7 before the next Board meeting you will meet  
8 with the new commander, because I think the new  
9 commander has to hear your concerns before any  
10 action to -- trigger any action.

11 MS. HODOWANY: I just wanted to say that  
12 since this happened to Anna in February and  
13 nobody got arrested, we are -- our life became  
14 hell, because now the people know that there's  
15 no consequences, they can just push us around.  
16 They just destroyed the flowers we planted on  
17 the ground. It's hell right now.

18 PRESIDENT CARNEY: So I mean you see the  
19 Deputy afterwards. You have to meet with the  
20 commander.

21 Thank you, folks.

22 MR. FOREMAN: For the purpose of the  
23 record, state your name.

24 MR. HODOWANY: Alexandra Hodowany,

1 H-O-D-O-W-A-N-Y.

2 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Thanks, folks.

3 MR. PERRYMAN: I just have two quick  
4 stories I think that illustrate a point. About  
5 six weeks ago, some people started selling  
6 drugs out of the house on our block. And our  
7 block we cleaned of drugs for quite awhile. It  
8 is very noticeable. Some neighbors came up to  
9 me and we talked about it. So we started  
10 calling 911 like we're supposed to. Nothing  
11 happened. Same people, same thing, day after  
12 day out of a house. The guy was under house  
13 arrest. We even said that. I said that he is  
14 under house arrest. He is dealing out of his  
15 house. I had to email the commander and CC the  
16 Deputy Wysinger. And after I did that, problem  
17 solved the next day.

18 Now, it was amazing. I guess I'm  
19 trying to figure out why do I have to go all  
20 the way up to the top brass in order to get  
21 this. It doesn't make sense to me.

22 If Deputy Wysinger has to  
23 intervene on every drug house, that explains  
24 why there's so many drug houses.



1                   Now, currently at California and  
2                   Monroe, it's happened again, and we cleared  
3                   that corner. And as soon as it starts, we try  
4                   to stomp it out so it doesn't get an  
5                   established drug market.

6                   So all the neighbors are calling  
7                   police, giving good information, descriptions,  
8                   license plates, you know, again and again very  
9                   specific descriptions, but the same people are  
10                  dealing drugs day after day, wearing the same  
11                  clothes and exact same spot doing the same  
12                  thing day after day.

13                  So here we are again, I have to  
14                  talk to the Deputy Wysinger and say we need  
15                  help again.

16                  I have emailed the commander. It  
17                  seems like there's just no strategy. And it  
18                  starts to become very clear to me that this is  
19                  why it is such a problem. When there is a drug  
20                  house, there's no strategy. There's no flow  
21                  chart that says we're going to do this and then  
22                  this. If that doesn't work, we're going to  
23                  come around. No strategy. It seems like a  
24                  shrug of the shoulders, yeah, one more drug

1 house on the west side. You know, it's  
2 frustrating. I feel like there's no strategy.  
3 And I just don't know how to communicate that  
4 we will refuse to live and allow this in our  
5 neighborhood. I refuse to live in a place  
6 where people get to deal drugs flagrantly and  
7 the good citizens are reporting it and nothing  
8 happens.

9 So I would like a response why is  
10 there no strategy? Why do these drug dealers  
11 get to keep dealing the same way, wearing the  
12 same clothes, day after day? How are the  
13 police not getting these guys?

14 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: We do have  
15 a comprehensive strategy to address the  
16 narcotics problem.

17 In your particular area, since  
18 January we made 16 arrests for narcotics alone.  
19 Two search warrants within the last month, 2900  
20 Wilcox, one on the 22nd of May with two  
21 arrests, and we came back on the 30th of May  
22 and did another search warrant with two  
23 arrests. So we are in the area. We are making  
24 arrests.

1           MR. PERRY: That's one house. We were  
2 calling about two other locations.

3                     If you feel like that one house  
4 showed success, then I have to wonder at your  
5 definition of success, because there's a lot of  
6 houses and there's -- where drugs can happen.

7                     I gave my contact information  
8 every time. Guess how many people contacted me  
9 for follow-up to try to fix this problem?

10           DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: That was  
11 not a definition of success, Mr. Perryman, that  
12 was letting you know that we are in the area,  
13 we are working.

14                     Success is when there are no more  
15 drug houses on the west side, then we will  
16 consider that success. Until we can reach that  
17 point, we are going to knock these houses down  
18 one at a time.

19           MR. PERRYMAN: But how do we to that? How  
20 do we contact? Do I have to email you every  
21 time, is that what we have to do?

22           DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: After you  
23 have the meeting with the commander before the  
24 next Police Board meeting, you will have direct

1 contact with the person who is responsible for  
2 helping you eliminate the problem.

3 MR. PERRYMAN: I've already emailed him. I  
4 have called his office.

5 PRESIDENT CARNEY: We're going to try --

6 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: You will  
7 have a face-to-face meeting with the commander.

8 MR. PERRYMAN: Thank you.

9 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Thank you.

10 Darva Watkins. David Sartore.

11 And Mr. Robert More.

12 MR. SARTORE: I'm sorry. I'd like to  
13 reserve my right to repeat this when the  
14 Superintendent's here in the future. When I'm  
15 done, I'm hoping for a detailed recorded  
16 response from the CPD on how to prevent this  
17 victimization of a 63-year-old me in the  
18 future, including whether CPD will give me  
19 video of the second battery. On April  
20 11th -- on April 11th, 2014, 6:00 p.m., 1941  
21 West North Avenue, a stranger hit me in the  
22 head, which sent my glasses flying into  
23 traffic. I asked 911 to send police to make an  
24 arrest for battery and property damage, and

1 while I was talking to 911, the stranger yelled  
2 into my phone that they hit me because I called  
3 them a blank blank, leaving out that they  
4 started the assault. Stranger also yelled to  
5 911 they were a kid, which was off by 20  
6 something years, more like 30 something.  
7 Officer Saria and that's star number 16495,  
8 Officer Eaton, star number 13975, so I'm told,  
9 of the 14th District showed up and accused me  
10 of starting a fight and refused to write any  
11 report of battery, et cetera.

12 I used freedom of Information to  
13 get a copy of the criminal's tape recorded  
14 confession. I then told people I would be here  
15 at the Police Board with my evidence. That's  
16 when a series of attacks on me began, the worst  
17 of which was when I biked through Wicker Park,  
18 and a young man, again a stranger to me, chased  
19 me and knocked me off the bike and sent me  
20 flying through the air. This took place in  
21 front of a blue light security camera in the  
22 park. I told him he would be arrested for  
23 battery. I then asked Chicago Police  
24 Department Officer Jenny Warnecki,

1 W-A-R-N-E-C-K-I, of the 11th Police District to  
2 help me. She was standing by the fountain 20  
3 feet away. And I called 911 to have them send  
4 a police car to arrest him. While on the phone  
5 with 911, Warnecki, who was talking with my  
6 attacker -- now talking with my attacker, waved  
7 good-bye to him and he slowly walked out of the  
8 park. I told 911 I'd file -- he lost me so I  
9 returned to the park to wait for the police car  
10 when I again saw Officer Warnecki, so I asked  
11 her if she had at least ID'd him, she indicated  
12 no, so I told her I'd complain about her. When  
13 she then said I was permanently banned from  
14 Wicker Park, could never come back.

15                   When the 911 CPD car arrived,  
16 they wrote up my report of the battery and then  
17 told me I am never to return to Wicker Park per  
18 Warnecki. I asked OEMC, the people who run 911  
19 and have -- I'm told there's a fee from the  
20 blue light camera in the park to OEMC, park  
21 department and police. I have asked OEMC and  
22 park department through the Freedom of  
23 Information for a video of my attacker and  
24 Warnecki, they both refused.

1                   So will CPD give me the videos  
2                   from the park from 8:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on  
3                   May 14th per battery report RD number HX255389?

4                   I have Black's Law Dictionary  
5                   with me if you care to see the definition of  
6                   chain of conspiracy. If you want to refer to  
7                   it yourself, I'm sure that would be faster.

8                   But Black's Law Dictionary under  
9                   chain of conspiracy explains the type of the  
10                  criminality we're talking about here.

11                  I have the audiotape and Freedom  
12                  of Information Act letters and crushed glasses  
13                  and Black's Law Dictionary and police report,  
14                  et cetera, here with me now for you to see.

15                  Can one CPD officer permanently  
16                  ban/trespass me because another CPD officer  
17                  says so without even bothering to accuse me of  
18                  anything?

19                  PRESIDENT CARNEY: Have you filed a  
20                  complaint with the Independent Police --

21                  MR. SARTORE: Where -- excuse me. It  
22                  escapes me. I can't think -- I stopped using  
23                  IPRA about probably three, four years ago. I  
24                  got about 50 complaints with them in the first

1 ten years I was here in Chicago. And about  
2 three years ago I just stopped using them. I  
3 consider them above -- protect the police  
4 department.

5                   What happens, if you make a  
6 complaint against the police department,  
7 internal affairs should handle it. That's the  
8 police department. Then if they botch the job,  
9 you would still have a complaint against the  
10 police department. But when IPRA botches the  
11 investigation, now you have a complaint against  
12 IPRA which is -- I don't even know why they  
13 exist. Now you no longer have a complaint  
14 against the police department. I've got wise  
15 to that scam. I did that about 50 times. I  
16 probably got the record in ten years for  
17 turning -- I only turned over the cream of the  
18 cream of my victimization to IPRA. But they  
19 were all good complaints. Never accomplished  
20 anything.

21                   I can tell you some of the scams  
22 they have working there. I mentioned some last  
23 time. I believe the individual here said that  
24 I was wrong with the information I gave here in



1 the -- recorded in front of the Board, and when  
2 we got back and talked about it, I believe he  
3 indicated that I was exactly right. So I don't  
4 want to deal with IPRA.

5 I've actually asked Mr. Marconi  
6 when I made the appointment. Well -- and I  
7 tried to make the appointment two months ago,  
8 which apparently I didn't end up on the list.  
9 But I did two months ago tell Mr. Marconi who  
10 runs the Police Board that I didn't have any  
11 intentions on ever speaking with the  
12 Independent Police Review Authority in the  
13 future. Thank you.

14 PRESIDENT CARNEY: Thank you.

15 MR. SARTORE: I glad I got an opportunity.  
16 So I'd like to hear from the police. I wish  
17 there was someone from the Mayor's Office or  
18 anything, but the police department would be  
19 wonderful to get a response from. And if you'd  
20 like to take it under consideration, look into  
21 it -- I have stuff that you can -- some things  
22 I even have copies that you might get a  
23 photocopy of. I certainly have the RD numbers.  
24 And if I can get a response from -- the

1 Superintendent's here in the month.

2                   You can see this is a big deal to  
3 me. And, you know, it's not so much I'm in a  
4 rush, I'd rather some quality response rather  
5 than a fast response.

6                   I've lived in this world for --  
7 since I've been back in Chicago for 12 years  
8 now.

9           PRESIDENT CARNEY: Is there a response?

10          MR. SARTORE: They're discussing it.

11          DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: We're  
12 going to have General Counsel look into this  
13 matter for you and have a response by the next  
14 Police Board meeting.

15          MR. SARTORE: On the response?

16          MR. O'NEILL: On the Freedom of  
17 Information --

18          MR. SARTORE: Oh, that would be very  
19 helpful, the Freedom of Information. There's  
20 several issues but that would be a great one.

21          MR. O'NEILL: If you have a copy of the  
22 request, could you leave it with the officer?

23          MR. SARTORE: I certainly could. I got a  
24 copy of the ones I've given OEMC and park

1 department and that would suffice for you guys.

2 MR. O'NEILL: Did you give one to the  
3 police department?

4 MR. SARTORE: I have not. I though I'd ask  
5 first. Because I tried it through the other  
6 two and getting letters saying things like we  
7 don't have camera equipment. I didn't ask for  
8 camera equipment I asked -- I'm told they have  
9 a fee. I didn't say they owned the camera. So  
10 I'm not getting a responsive answer. I thought  
11 if I went on record first, maybe I would get a  
12 better response when I tried the police  
13 department. That would be my third try for the  
14 same tape.

15 MR. O'NEILL: If you submit Freedom of  
16 Information -- if there was a Freedom of  
17 Information request to the police department,  
18 we would be able to handle that.

19 MR. SARTORE: Would you like me to do that  
20 now? That will be fine. And then we can  
21 discuss it in a month perhaps.

22 MR. O'NEILL: Yes. Thank you.

23 MR. SARTORE: They have five days, so I'll  
24 probably have a --

1           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    Thank you.

2           MR. SARTORE:    Thank you.

3           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    Mr. More.

4           MR. SARTORE:    But it's the other issues we  
5    want to discuss more than the Freedom of  
6    Information.

7           MR. MORE:    It is the -- let's see, 19th of  
8    June of 2014.  This is the Chicago Police Board  
9    meeting, 3510 South Michigan, Chicago,  
10   Illinois.

11                               For the record, this is  
12   the -- that is the Board members here on this  
13   date.  The Superintendent once again absent.

14                               (Unintelligible) Robert J. More  
15   is at the June meeting demanding a reason for  
16   the absence of the police Superintendent from  
17   the June 2014 meeting.  Why is he not here  
18   today?  Let the record reflect that there's no  
19   response.

20           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    Have you been reading  
21   the paper?

22           MR. MORE:    With whom?

23           PRESIDENT CARNEY:    Have you been reading  
24   the paper?  Everybody here --

1           MR. MORE: He said he was going -- I don't  
2 read the paper at all. I don't watch the news.  
3 He was in the hospital I understand. It said  
4 on June 7th he was going to be out. Is this  
5 the explanation for his absence, physical  
6 incapacity to participate in the meeting, is  
7 that the official explanation?

8           PRESIDENT CARNEY: He's out ill. Keep  
9 going.

10          MR. MORE: So he is not -- I have an  
11 answer.

12                           The next issue, so now -- we  
13 covered that.

14                           Notice: Robert J. More is going  
15 to (unintelligible) the City of Chicago with  
16 regard to every Police Board meeting in which  
17 the Superintendent is absent. And secondly, in  
18 regard to each and every meeting in which RJM,  
19 Robert J. More, has not received notice that  
20 he's going to be absent. This is not a  
21 justified expenditure of non-unlimited time and  
22 resources as well a break of martial law for me  
23 to have to come down here when he's not here.

24                           That's other thing, because that

1       defeats the whole purpose of why he's supposed  
2       to be here, and so there will be fewer  
3       violations, transgressions of constitution  
4       protected liberty (unintelligible) just by the  
5       City of Chicago Police Department, because he  
6       will have to stand there and a jury will see  
7       that he was put on notice. Now it makes it  
8       more difficult for a plaintiff to prove that in  
9       a civil case or for a prosecutor to prove in a  
10      criminal case.

11                       RJM demands a proper disposal  
12      regarding Bland, Young and Spencer murders.  
13      What's the present status of the Bland, Young  
14      and Spencer investigation? Let the record  
15      reflect there is no response.

16                       RJM demands a response regarding  
17      whether the Superintendent will wear a wire in  
18      order to diffuse or otherwise counter the  
19      claim --

20               PRESIDENT CARNEY: You got 30 seconds.

21               MR. MORE: To the ongoing defraudment of  
22      legitimate (unintelligible) perpetrated under  
23      the color of law, an action (unintelligible)  
24      242 and 7020 ILCS 5/33-3.

1                   I got more two more things, Mr.  
2                   Carney. Since the April meeting, RJM has been  
3                   preoccupied with the restoration -- the issue  
4                   of the restoration of the independent federal  
5                   Grand Jury, specifically in regard to crimes  
6                   perpetrated in South Bend, Notre Dame, Indiana,  
7                   Chicago, Illinois, regarding statute of  
8                   limitations. So for those following this  
9                   coming off the Internet, that's the reason  
10                  there hasn't been more progress with regard to  
11                  those three murders and regards to wearing a  
12                  wire.

13                  The petitions for indictment for  
14                  federal Grand Jury, regard to denial of  
15                  independent --

16                  PRESIDENT CARNEY: Thank you, Mr. More.  
17                  Thank you.

18                  Okay. All those who have signed  
19                  up to speak have been called upon. Now I will  
20                  entertain a motion to adjourn.

21                  The meeting is adjourned. Thank  
22                  you.

23   (Whereupon, the proceedings  
24   were adjourned at 8:02 p.m.)
