1 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Good evening everyone. My  
2 name is Lori Lightfoot and I am the president of the  
3 Chicago Police Board. I'm calling the meeting to  
4 order. Board member Conlon is unable to attend this  
5 meeting in person and wishes to attend via audio  
6 conference. Is there a motion to permit him to do  
7 so?

8 MR. FOREMAN: Motion.

9 MR. EADDY: Second.

10 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Any  
11 opposed? Motion passes. Tonight is Elisa  
12 Rodriguez's final meeting as a member of the Police  
13 Board. We thank Elisa for more than four years of  
14 dedicated public service and wish her all the best  
15 in her future endeavors.

16 The first item of business is the  
17 approval of the minutes of the Board's public  
18 meeting of August 20, 2015. Is there a motion to  
19 approve the minutes?

20 MS. FRY: So moved.

21 MR. FOREMAN: Second.

22 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Any  
23 opposed? The motion passes.

24 Our next regular public meeting will be

1 on Thursday, October 15th at 2015 at 7:30 here at  
2 Chicago Public Safety Headquarters. At this time I  
3 ask for a motion to close the series of executive  
4 sessions for the purposes of considering litigation  
5 and personnel matters as authorized by Sections,  
6 2C1, 3, 4, and 11 of the Illinois Open Meetings Act.  
7 Is there such a motion?

8 MS. BALLATE: So moved.

9 MR. FOREMAN: Second.

10 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Any  
11 opposed? A report of disciplinary actions taken by  
12 the Board during the previous month has been made  
13 available at this evening's meeting. This report  
14 and the Board's written findings and decisions are  
15 posted on the Board's website. The Police Board is  
16 authorized by the Open Meetings Act to consider in a  
17 closed meeting several disciplinary cases. The  
18 Board will now take final action on these cases.

19 Regarding case number 14 PB 2875, is  
20 there a motion to find Police Officer Richard Rizzo  
21 guilty of failing to secure his firearm off duty and  
22 to discharge him from the Chicago Police Department?  
23

24 MS. FRY: So moved.

1 MR. EADDY: Second.

2 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. May I  
3 have a show of hands? Unanimous. Any opposed?  
4 Voting in favor are Board members Foreman, Ballate,  
5 Conlon, Eaddy, Fry, Rodriguez, Sweeney, and myself.  
6 The motion passes.

7 Is there a motion to adopt the written  
8 findings and decisions that's been reviewed by all  
9 Board members who participated in the case?

10 MS. FRY: So moved.

11 MR. FOREMAN: Second.

12 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Any  
13 opposed? Motion passes by a unanimous vote.

14 Regarding case number 14 PB 2879 and  
15 14 PB 2880, is there a motion to find both Police  
16 Officer John Adreani and Sergeant Robert Bondi  
17 guilty of associating with and assisting an  
18 individual involved in and subsequently convicted of  
19 cannabis trafficking, and to discharge both Adreani  
20 and Bondi from the Chicago Police Department.

21 MS. SWEENEY: So moved.

22 MR. EADDY: Second.

23 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. May I  
24 have a show of hands? Any opposed? Voting in favor

1 are Board numbers Foreman, Ballate, Conlon, Eaddy,  
2 Fry, Rodriguez, Sweeney, and myself. The motion  
3 passes.

4 Is there a motion to adopt the written  
5 findings and decisions that have been reviewed by  
6 all Board members who participated in the case?

7 MS. FRY: So moved.

8 MS. FOREMAN: Second.

9 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Any  
10 opposed? Motion passes by a unanimous vote.

11 The Illinois Appellate Court recently  
12 reversed the Circuit Court Order to the Board to  
13 impose a penalty less than discharged in case number  
14 11 PB 2742. The Appellate Court remanded the case  
15 to the Board. Is there a motion to vacate the  
16 suspension and to reinstate the Board's original  
17 order of discharge of Officer Dale Prince from the  
18 Chicago Police Department?

19 MS. FRY: Motion.

20 MR. EADDY: Second.

21 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye.

22 Unanimous. Any opposed? Voting in favor are Board  
23 members Foreman, Ballate, Conlon, Eaddy, Fry,

24 Rodriguez, Sweeney, and myself. Is there a motion

1 to adopt the written orders and dissent that's  
2 reviewed by all Board members who voted in the case?

3 MS. FRY: Motion.

4 MR. FOREMAN: Second.

5 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Any  
6 opposed? Motion passes by unanimous vote. The  
7 Board's decision in all the cases that we have just  
8 discussed in which the Board took final action this  
9 evening will be entered as of today's date and will  
10 be issued to the parties. A copy of the written  
11 decisions will be posted on the Board's website  
12 within ten business days pursuant to the Chicago  
13 Municipal Code.

14 Earlier this evening the Board is  
15 required by the Illinois Open Meetings Act met and  
16 considered minutes and recordings of all past closed  
17 meetings to determine whether the need for  
18 confidentiality still exists. The Board members  
19 unanimously agreed that it continues to be necessary  
20 to keep confidential minutes and recordings of its  
21 past closed meetings.

22 The general orders and other directives  
23 issued by the Superintendent of Police during the  
24 previous months are listed in the blue books -- that

1 are these -- and are available on the Police  
2 Department's website.

3 The next item on our agenda is the  
4 Superintendent's report. We have with us this  
5 evening First Deputy Wysinger.

6 DEPUTY WYSINGER: Good evening. This portion  
7 of the Police Board meeting is generally used for  
8 the Superintendent to relay upon the membership the  
9 various crimes statistics that happen in the City of  
10 Chicago such as the murder rate, shooting rates,  
11 et cetera, et cetera, et cetera. I would like to  
12 take this moment not to follow that script, and I  
13 think use something that might be a little bit more  
14 personal tonight, and that's the very reason you  
15 guys and young girls are here, and that is protest.  
16 I'm asked all the time what's the difference that's  
17 happening in Chicago that separates us from  
18 Baltimore and Ferguson?

19 I tell people without any hesitation that  
20 it's the ways in which our young people protest.  
21 Our protestors are eloquent. Our protestors are  
22 intelligent, and they don't react the same way that  
23 they have across the country. That goes to the  
24 reasoning why I don't think you see the violence in



1 other cities that you see here today. It's also  
2 entangled in the youth movement. The majority of  
3 the crowd here tonight is of a young age. You're  
4 our future. This is your defining moment.  
5 This is your opportunity to write your notation in  
6 history.

7 You're going to be defined from here on  
8 out as to how you guys act from this point forward,  
9 and I just want to commend you guys and let you know  
10 that you're the fork in the road. Two things I want  
11 you to remember. If you look at history, who is  
12 remembered most for what they did to emancipate  
13 their people, Harriet Tubman or Nat Turner? You be  
14 the judge of that. Thank you.

15 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you First Deputy. At  
16 this time we will now have a report from Scott Ando,  
17 chief administrator of the Independent Police Review  
18 Authority.

19 MR. ANDO: First of all, let me say just  
20 because of a little confusion I have seen in the  
21 press and some of the conversations I have had that  
22 I want to make it clear that the Independent Police  
23 Review Authority and the Police Board are two  
24 separate entities, both of which are independent of

1 one another and independent of the Chicago Police  
2 Department.

3           Regarding the case that is on everyone's  
4 mind, I want to assure everyone that IPRA thoroughly  
5 investigates every police-involved shooting as we  
6 did in the case involving off duty CPD Dante Servin.  
7 On Tuesday the investigation completed in advance of  
8 this meeting as I promised last month. IPRA  
9 sustained several allegations against Detective  
10 Servin. They included violation of CPD deadly force  
11 policy, specifically by discharging a firearm into a  
12 crowd striking and killing Rekia Boyd. Also,  
13 failing to qualify with the weapon he discharged on  
14 the night of the incident, also in violation of CPD  
15 policy; and also, inattention to duty for making  
16 inconsistent statements in his various accounts of  
17 the incident to Chicago Police detectives, State's  
18 Attorney's Office, and to IPRA.

19           As a result, I recommended to the  
20 Superintendent that Detective Servin be separated  
21 from the Chicago Police Department. As chief  
22 administrator of IPRA, I take my responsibility for  
23 conducting these investigations and making  
24 recommendations very seriously. As I did in this

1 case, I looked at the recommendation and made the  
2 recommendation based on all the available evidence  
3 including forensic evidence and witness statements,  
4 and policies and procedures of the Chicago Police  
5 Department. Thank you.

6 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Now, as you just heard Chief  
7 Administrator Ando has just announced that the  
8 Independent Police Review Authority has recommended  
9 that Officer Dante Servin be terminated in  
10 connection with the shooting of Rekia Boyd. I  
11 wanted to take this moment to reiterate the process  
12 by which a case comes to the -- within the  
13 jurisdiction of the Police Board. Again, I think  
14 based on comments from the last meeting and  
15 otherwise, there was some confusion about that. I  
16 want to try to clarify that if possible.

17 We have also provided copies of a summary  
18 that sets forth the process by which a case reaches  
19 the Police Board. I believe those are available to  
20 the audience. If anybody wants them, we will make  
21 those available after the meeting.

22 In summary, if IPRA recommends  
23 termination, any such recommendation goes to the  
24 Police Superintendent, as this case has. The

1 Superintendent has 90 days to either concur or  
2 reject the recommendation. If the Superintendent  
3 concurs with the recommendation, then typically  
4 charges are then filed with the Police Board, and  
5 only then do we have jurisdiction over a case.

6 If the Superintendent does not concur in  
7 the recommendation and a dispute arises, then a  
8 three-member panel of the Board considers the  
9 matter. It's only in these circumstances that the  
10 Police Board will take jurisdiction over an IPRA  
11 termination case. As you heard earlier, IPRA has  
12 made its recommendations of termination in the Dante  
13 Servin matter and now the case is under review by  
14 the Police Superintendent.

15 I will now call upon those members of the  
16 public who signed up in advance to speak. When your  
17 name is called, please step up to the microphone.  
18 We ask that you limit your comments. Before we open  
19 the floor for comments from individuals that signed  
20 up in advance, I want to reiterate a few minutes  
21 about the importance of civility and respect.  
22 Members of the Police Board view the comment section  
23 of our meeting as a very important opportunity for  
24 members of the public to bring issues of concern to

1 the Board, the Superintendent, and IPRA.

2 Many people who come to these meetings  
3 travel some distance to be here and want to be  
4 heard. It is important therefore, that everyone who  
5 signed up in advance has an opportunity to speak. I  
6 would ask that when you come to the podium, please  
7 be considerate of the people who come after you and  
8 remember that we expect everyone to express  
9 themselves in a civil and respectful way and abide  
10 by the timeline. I would have take -- I would hate  
11 to take action because someone decides to deviate  
12 from these very basic standards and thereby deprive  
13 other people the opportunity to speak.

14 Tonight several people are signed up to  
15 speak about the Dante Servin-Rekia Boyd matter.  
16 That includes her brother, Mr. Martinez Sutton,  
17 who's here with us in the audience and sitting here  
18 in the front row. As a courtesy to him and his  
19 family who are here, he will be the last speaker to  
20 speak on this very important issue, and I hope that  
21 you will afford him the courtesy and respect by  
22 allowing all the other speakers before him the  
23 opportunity to be heard.

24 First on our list, John Perryman. Is he

1 in the audience? (No response). Marrissa Baker.  
2 Is she in the office? (No response). Theodore  
3 Daffin.

4 MR. DAFFIN: Hello everybody. I wanted to  
5 walk over here because I wish I could walk, right,  
6 because for a few years some doctor was saying it  
7 was my imagination. I can't walk because my legs  
8 were beaten and I was injected with stuff at the  
9 hospital. A while ago I had a police investigation  
10 on me. I didn't do nothing. They were using people  
11 I know, friends and some relatives to try and extort  
12 money from me. I had to go to other countries  
13 trying to get medical help. I was followed there,  
14 harassed. I went to some hospitals here and was  
15 kidnapped from the hospital. They wouldn't give me  
16 medical help. I had damage to my stomach, as you  
17 see, and my walking is not my imagination. I went  
18 to over 30 hospitals here and nobody waited on me.  
19 I tried to get lawyers. My phone is blocked from  
20 getting lawyers because lawyers will not take my  
21 case.

22 I have like estimated about 35 to 40  
23 pounds of parasites in my body, some on my shoulder  
24 that came out of stool. I gave reports to the

1 Police Board, the Review Board, IPRA. I gave  
2 reports from other countries. They said oh, that is  
3 from another country. But I can't walk and I have  
4 trouble breathing air, and the more I try to show my  
5 damage, the more they try to say I'm crazy or  
6 nothing happened, but I have reports to show it. I  
7 hope the police understand sometimes, you know, you  
8 have some bad police and you have good police. The  
9 good ones should stop the bad ones because what this  
10 is about, it was total harassment. I never did  
11 anything to nobody. They were destroying my  
12 relationship I have with people, trying to  
13 financially break me. They followed me 24 hours a  
14 day harassing me.

15 I would like to be able to make a report  
16 because I couldn't file a police report for over 20  
17 years and be able to stop the harassment and stop  
18 them from signing my name and destroying my life.  
19 If you want, I'll give you medical reports to prove  
20 the damage to my body. Thank you.

21 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you for your time.  
22 Mark Clements.

23 MR. CLEMENTS: Hello and good evening to the  
24 Board. My name is Mark Clements, and I'm one of the

1 organizers and administrators with the campaign to  
2 end the death penalty. We are a national  
3 organization that primarily centers our attention  
4 around death penalty related cases. From 1972 until  
5 1993 John Burge is known to have tortured over 100  
6 African American men and Latinos. His tortures  
7 continued even once he had been fired by the Chicago  
8 Police Department by and through his subordinates.  
9 One of his subordinates are Daniel McQueen, John  
10 McCann, Michael Keel, James O'Brian, and Michael  
11 McDermott.

12 The city of Chicago passed a resolution  
13 making Chicago a torture-free zone a few years ago,  
14 and just this year acknowledged that torture  
15 occurred to many survivors of torture such as  
16 myself. Passing a reparations package for many that  
17 were victimized as a result of John Burge and his  
18 subordinates without acknowledging the fact that  
19 there still remains to be over 100 men that languish  
20 and sit inside of a prison is somewhat cold hearted  
21 to me.

22 As a Chicago Police torture survivor, I'm  
23 ashamed that the city of Chicago and its Police  
24 Department remain to promote and practice criminal



1 behavior with murder and torture at the top of the  
2 list, not to neglect to mention racial profiling.

3 I'm ashamed that the city of Chicago and  
4 the Police Department remain to pay the pensions of  
5 these former detectives that all work at Area 2 or  
6 3, violent crimes units. I'm ashamed that the city  
7 of Chicago and the Police Department remain to pay  
8 the slavery that these men and women had to go  
9 through. When I say slavery, meaning, being placed  
10 inside of a prison knowing that you should not be  
11 inside of a prison, but you're mistreated and  
12 neglected by a system. All of you have some type of  
13 responsibility to address this. Burge torture in  
14 the city of Chicago --

15 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Clements, your time is up,  
16 but I'll allow you a few more moments.

17 MR. CLEMENT: Okay, I'll read fast. Burge  
18 torture in the city of Chicago will not fade away  
19 until this Board stops playing political football  
20 and honors the request of the people that all  
21 detectives labeled as Burge cops be stripped of  
22 their pensions. This means, and I mean totally  
23 means, the city of Chicago through your mayor, he  
24 acknowledges the fact that tortures occurred. You,

1 primarily, having the responsibility, knowing the  
2 law, make it right for your people. Make it right  
3 for your people. Make it right for your people.  
4 Either stand up for us or get off the platform.

5 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Next is Ed Regalado is our  
6 next speaker. Is Mr. Regalado in the audience?  
7 (No response). Lorenzo Lenz? (No response).

8 MR. MORE: Mr. Lenz is absent. Can I speak on  
9 their behalf?

10 MS. LIGHTFOOT: No you cannot. Next speaker  
11 is Crista Noel.

12 MS. NOEL: Good evening everyone. First of  
13 all, I want to acknowledge Scott Ando for doing the  
14 right thing. I know it wasn't difficult, but I  
15 appreciate it. I also want to acknowledge Ron  
16 W-i-s-e-n-w-i-g, who started us down this path of  
17 getting this done, and I hope that you all  
18 understand that we are going to be here until it's  
19 absolutely done. I wanted to show you  
20 something. That's the picture of the detective,  
21 okay, that testified to what -- ya'll got it? Ya'll  
22 got it? I hear you.

23 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Please continue.

24 MS. NOEL: Yes, ma'am. That is what he

1 testified to shooting. That's how he testified to  
2 shooting. That ain't over your shoulder. That  
3 wasn't over your shoulder. You didn't see him  
4 shooting over your shoulder. You saw him shooting  
5 like this (indicating). That's what the detective  
6 testified to him shooting, like this, okay, not  
7 this. So I have a question for you, Scott. Did you  
8 recommend the termination under Rule 14 for false  
9 statements or did you recommend it under a different  
10 rule?

11 MS. LIGHTFOOT: You know what, Ms. Noel, I  
12 appreciate you have some questions about the IPRA  
13 investigation. If I could suggest Mr. Ando make  
14 himself available to you afterwards. I'm not sure  
15 it's appropriate for him -- I don't want to speak  
16 for you, but I'm not sure it's appropriate for him  
17 to get into specifics yet beyond what he has said.  
18 I'm sure he would be happy to meet with you after  
19 the meeting.

20 MS. NOEL: Okay. The reason why I'm saying  
21 that is because it's my understanding if it has been  
22 recommend firing under Rule 14 for false statements,  
23 he cannot work anywhere as a police officer. And  
24 this man does not deserve to work anywhere as a

1 police officer.

2 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, Ms. Noel. Our next  
3 speaker is Tyrone White. (No response).

4 Next is Grant Newberger.

5 MR. NEWBERGER: Good evening. It tells you a  
6 lot about what kind of society we live in when the  
7 police superintendent considers it a public safety  
8 hazard to indict a cop who murders an unarmed woman.  
9 Everyone knows that McCarthy considers it a public  
10 safety hazard that Dante Servin was indicted for the  
11 murder of Rekia Boyd. If you say it's a public  
12 safety hazard for a police officer to be indicted  
13 for the murder of an unarmed Black person, then  
14 you're saying it's legal for the police to kill  
15 unarmed Black people. What does that mean for the  
16 public safety of Black people?

17 In this country, the lives of Black  
18 people have never been considered worthy of  
19 protection, and this statement by the Superintendent  
20 of Police is another indicator that the police have  
21 the right and freedom to murder Black people with  
22 impunity and it has to be stopped.

23 Look, the fact that not just Dante Servin  
24 has not been fired, but the Superintendent McCarthy

1 has not been fired is an indicator that  
2 fundamentally to get rid of police terror, it's  
3 going to take a revolution to get rid of the white  
4 supremacist system. But now --

5 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Sir, can I just ask you not to  
6 grip the microphone? I think that's giving us  
7 feedback.

8 MR. NEWBERGER: Okay, fine. Now, even short  
9 of a revolution, we have to raise the struggle  
10 against police terror. We have to put hundreds and  
11 hundreds of thousands -- hundreds and hundreds of  
12 people in the streets of New York City October 24th  
13 in Rise Up October in a vehicle to make everyone see  
14 which side are you on? Are you on the side of  
15 continuing to kill our young Black and Brown  
16 brothers or sisters or are you on the side of  
17 putting an end to that?

18 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. Newberger, your time is  
19 up. I'll give you a moment to wrap up.

20 MR. Newberger: So I want to conclude by  
21 saying fire Dante Servin. It should have been done  
22 years ago. And finally, re-indict, convict, and  
23 send Dante Servin to jail.

24 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Our next speaker is Icka

1 Beamon (no response). Frank Bergh.

2 MR. BERGH: Good evening. I have something in  
3 common with Dante Servin. We live four blocks  
4 apart. We hear a lot of the same noise in Douglas  
5 Park in the evenings. But unlike Mr. Servin, I  
6 didn't acquire my property through a program called  
7 Officer Next Door, a program of the Federal Housing  
8 Administration which incentivizes the purchase of  
9 homes by police officers in the areas that have been  
10 designated for revitalization, including North  
11 Lawndale.

12 Based on publicly available information,  
13 Dante Servin's house was last sold for \$340,000.  
14 The program entitled him to 50 percent of that money  
15 from the federal government totalling \$170,000,  
16 therefore, in addition to the three and a half years  
17 of pay he has received from our tax dollars, he also  
18 received \$170,000 of our federal tax dollars to  
19 incentivize him to become our officer next door.

20 With great privilege comes great  
21 responsibility. Detective Servin used that  
22 responsibility not to promote presumably peace in  
23 the neighborhood where he is sworn to serve and  
24 protect to keep the peace. Instead he chose to do

1 something drastically different, ending the life of  
2 Rekia Boyd.

3 We can't bring Rekia Boyd back tonight.  
4 We can't erase what happened, but if the purpose of  
5 this Department is to serve and protect, I would  
6 urge you in order to serve the community of North  
7 Lawndale, protect us from the officer next door.  
8 And after firing Detective Servin without pension,  
9 it would be appropriate to institute reparations for  
10 \$170,000 of taxpayer money that he has received  
11 attributable to his personal net worth. So  
12 entertain a proposal for a scholarship fund for  
13 North Lawndale youth, particularly women of color,  
14 as we move forward to actually repair damage that  
15 has been done.

16 We aren't going to forgive, forget, fire,  
17 terminate. We will move forward. So I submit that  
18 for consideration tonight. Thank you.

19 MS. LIGHTFOOT: The next speak is Valerie  
20 Papillon (no response). Niara Richards  
21 (no response). Alyson Kennedy (no response).  
22 Shannon Wilson. (No response.) Are you Ms. Wilson?

23 MS. WILSON: Good evening. I'm here tonight  
24 just in support of Martinez and I just -- I don't

1 believe that Rekia should have been killed. I think  
2 she should still be here. And I honor life, you  
3 know. That's the purpose of why we fight. And I  
4 honor Rekia's life. I honor all these kids lives.  
5 I don't want to see any other kids be killed, and if  
6 we continue to allow the Dante Servins all over this  
7 country to continue to have their jobs, then we will  
8 see more Revias every day. I don't feel safe when a  
9 person like that is allowed to continue to work on  
10 their job. I don't feel safe. I really don't.

11 More than anything, when I think of the  
12 police now, I think of death and that's bad. I  
13 don't think of being served and protected. We have  
14 to change that. You all have to make decisions that  
15 are going to be right, that are going to help truly  
16 effectuate change so we can live and be free.  
17 That's all I have to say.

18 MS. LIGHTFOOT: The next speaker is Martinez  
19 Sutton.

20 MR. SUTTON: Thank you. First off, before I  
21 start, I have my mom in the room, you know, so I  
22 would like to acknowledge her. She's the young lady  
23 up here in the pink, you know. It's kind of hard  
24 for her to come out. I also have my sister, my



1 older sister, and my cousin up front, you know.  
2 First of all, I would like to thank IPRA for the  
3 recommendation for the firing, you know. When it  
4 comes to McCarthy, and I expressed this to several  
5 folks, I'm kind of uneasy about his recommendations  
6 or the paperwork that he has to do because of the  
7 fact that, you know, he openly said, you know, he  
8 doesn't have remorse for the killing. Also he said  
9 that this shooting is justified. And that's been  
10 one of the hardest things to try to live with, him  
11 saying that my sister's death was justified.

12 Like I'm not sure if you all know, I'm  
13 pretty sure you all do, you know, to put it into the  
14 hands of this guy that, you know, back in 2006 when  
15 he got arrested for being drunk, confronting two  
16 officers in New Jersey over his daughter wrongfully  
17 parking in a handicapped parking lot, you know, him  
18 and his wife got out and you know, a firearm was  
19 brandished, and when they put the firearm inside the  
20 back of the vehicle, his wife went and grabbed it  
21 outside of the vehicle. He only got ticketed for it  
22 for \$200, but also he had another event where he was  
23 also drinking. And long story short, it's like to  
24 put this inside the hands of this man, I'm really

1    uneasy about. I'm really uneasy. If he can't be --  
2    if he can't contain himself around his brothers of  
3    the law, then I'm pretty sure he won't be able to do  
4    it for my family, you know.

5                    But I'm sure you all know, because I have  
6    been out here since the beginning, and I'm going to  
7    fight to the end, you know. Not only me, but as you  
8    see the room is full of my brothers and sisters out  
9    here. It's not just Black, but we have Latinos,  
10   Caucasians, Indian. It's a mixed crowd. I mean, we  
11   aren't the only ones that's out here hurting, you  
12   know. We have the public that's hurting. The power  
13   of the people, you know. This whole thing been --  
14   it's been fueled by people power.

15                   I want to say to ya'll that me and my  
16   family are very gracious to have met you all and to  
17   have you to continue fighting for us because Lord  
18   knows it's hard. It's hard. It's definitely hard.  
19   Just to close it off, I just want to mention a  
20   couple more cases really quick. We have LaQuan  
21   McDonald, the young man who was shot over 16 times.  
22   The mother has been fighting to get a release. We  
23   got other people out there, Rashon Macintosh,  
24   Stephan Rice, Dakota Bright, even Mr. Howard Morgan,

1 who's been shot 26 times and he's still fighting to  
2 get a federal charge removed.

3 I'm not sure if he got it removed yet,  
4 but he's out here fighting on a cane. Like I just  
5 ask, you know, that not only do you look into my  
6 case, but into my other fallen brothers and sisters  
7 that's lost their lives to the streets by the hands  
8 of the law officials.

9 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Thank you, Mr. Boyd. The last  
10 speaker is Mr. Robert More.

11 MR. MORE: It's the 17th of September, 2015,  
12 Robert J. More, associate administrative assistant  
13 to introduce Michael The Archangel addressing this  
14 is the Chicago Police Board component of the Jewish  
15 supremacist enslavement and extermination apparatus  
16 at this juncture in history.

17 The first question, is, what is the basis  
18 of the absence of Superintendent McCarthy from this  
19 meeting? That's addressed to you, Assistant Alfonza  
20 Wysinger.

21 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More --

22 MR. MORE: You won't answer that question?  
23 I'm objecting because you don't possess control over  
24 that's constitutionally protected speech over --

1 that's discriminated against the content of speech.  
2 I don't know how much time is even left here. I  
3 should have at least 74 seconds left.

4 The next issue is superior service  
5 testimony for Sergeant Wade and Officer Darnell, I  
6 don't know when it will get posted but that doesn't  
7 constitute an endorsement of the continued existence  
8 and operation of the city of Chicago Police  
9 Department or any government entity under the Jewish  
10 supremacist regime. Next --

11 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Keep going.

12 MR. MORE: I can't hear you, what?

13 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Keep going.

14 MR. MORE: Texas Governor Greg Abbott  
15 proponents, 25 special ops went to Washington during  
16 Operation Jane Helm. I salute you guys. You're  
17 stepping up in a huge way risking your lives to  
18 stand up against the regime, but you did prevent  
19 Jane Helm from going live and the imposition of  
20 martial law and the relocation of all dissidents and  
21 the rest of the population into the FEMA death  
22 camps. You guys are absolutely awesome.

23 Next issue is the next big date coming up  
24 is the 25th of September, the anti Pope raised his

1 position regarding gun control, entirely  
2 incompatible with the true Catholic position. The  
3 true Catholic position will be posted at --

4 MS. LIGHTFOOT: Mr. More, your time is up.  
5 Can you please wrap it up?

6 MR. MORE: Okay, thank you.

7 MS. LIGHTFOOT: At this time, all persons who  
8 signed up in advance to speak have been recognized.  
9 Is there a motion to adjourn?

10 MS. FRY: So moved.

11 MR. FOREMAN: Second.

12 MS. LIGHTFOOT: All in favor say aye. Meeting  
13 adjourned.
